annual Medical Explorers program for high school juniors and seniors interested in health care careers, or hosting student observers who just want to get an understanding of health care by job shadowing, teaching and learning is critical to the ongoing life cycle of not only new professionals entering health care but an important in-road to how we staff our health center.

Last week, Michael Wright, director of Smith-Cotton High School's Center for Advanced Professional Studies (CAPS), attended an SLT meeting to share information about the program and ask for our support.

The Queen City CAPS program at Smith-Cotton is a new and innovative approach to educating and training students. It is profession-based learning that involves collaborative partnerships between local industries, community organizations and educational institutions. Its mission is to "help students find their purpose and strengthen our community."

Wright will spend this school year developing curriculum, hiring instructors and creating partnerships to be ready for the program to start in fall 2024. Students enrolled in

CAPS will be outside of the classroom each day working on real-world projects in four professional "strands" including engineering, business, medical/health care and digital media/marketing.

For our part, I volunteered to serve on the CAPS Executive Advisory Committee to help provide support and direction, and we expressed interest in continuing to explore ways we can support the program. There are still questions to be answered and details to be discussed, yet I'm excited at providing professional interactions, establishing relationships and igniting the spark that eventually becomes the flame for students interested in being the next generation of caretakers of our community's health care system.

340B AND MARKET PAY UPDATE

We have received confirmation of acceptance for 340B status and received their official registration identification as well as identification for our designated Rural Health Clinics.

Section 340B of the Public Health Service Act is a federal program that allows hospitals to purchase outpatient drugs at reduced costs. For chemotherapy drugs alone, we anticipate saving \$2–3 million as a result of achieving this status.

At its July meeting, the board approved one-half of market pay adjustments for eligible employees. The board will consider approving the remaining adjustments at its October meeting.

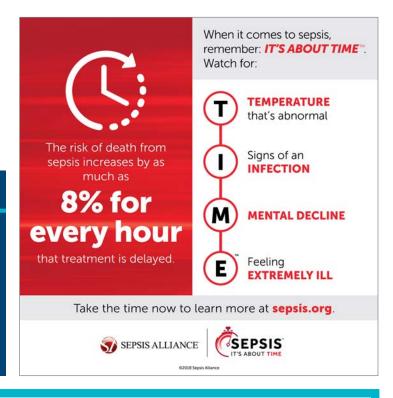
When it comes to sepsis, it is all about TIME. Take a moment to educate yourself and others on the symptoms and signs. You never know who you might save!

Supporting Fentanyl Education Awareness

On Aug. 7, Dr. Daron Olmstead, ED physician, Tammy Jackson, Critical Services director and Lesley Jackson, Emergency Department manager, attended a community-wide fentanyl forum in Belton hosted by Congressman Mark Alford.

The purpose of the meeting was to allow representatives from community resources to share the benefits of getting Narcan, an opioid rescue medication, and fentanyl test strips in the hands of drug users—not to encourage drug use but to help those who choose to use drugs to understand how to protect themselves from an overdose or death. Attendees also heard from four families whose loved ones died after taking drugs they didn't know were laced with fentanyl.

Teaching Stop the Bleed

Uncontrolled bleeding is the No. 1 cause of preventable death after injury. With the proper training, bystanders can learn how to save a life in a bleeding emergency.

Staff from Education and Emergency Services teamed up to provide Stop the Bleed training to 258 teachers and staff at several area schools including St. Paul's Lutheran School, Skyline Elementary, Horace Mann Elementary, Parkview Elementary, Heber Hunt Elementary, Washington Elementary, Smith-Cotton High School, Whittier High School, Smith-Cotton Junior High, Sedalia Middle School, Loftus Early Childhood Center and Sacred Heart School.

UNDERSTANDING GRIEF AND LOSS

Chaplain Rob Ayers to Host Support Group

Chaplain Rob Ayers recently became a Certified Grief Recovery Specialist and is hosting a new, eight-week grief support group for employees and the public. The group will meet from **6:30 to 8 pm. on Thursdays starting Sept. 7 through Oct. 26** in the Bothwell Education Center.

Ayers has served as Bothwell's chaplain for nearly eight years and is pastor at Camp Branch Baptist Church. He saw a need in the hospital for a program that helps employees cope with loss.

"Grief from loss comes in many forms including from death, divorce, career, trust, faith, safety and health," he said.
"I knew I needed to become certified in grief counseling because I have seen many Bothwell employees go through significant loss, and I want to help them understand grief in themselves and in their work."

Throughout the eight-week program, participants will work to discover what their grief is, develop helpful coping mechanisms and debunk myths associated with grief.

The class may be joined during the first two weeks, and it then becomes a closed group. There is no fee to join the group; however, participants are encouraged to purchase the program book for \$10 at the start of the course.

What does this department do?

Our primary responsibility is to clean, inspect and sterilize all used instrumentation. We are also the supply warehouse for the Operating Room (OR), Labor and Delivery, Urology and Endoscopy departments, meaning we count and replenish supplies to all these areas nightly. In addition, we are responsible for patient supply charges for the above departments, wound vac rentals, pacemaker charges, all crash carts in house and patient equipment. We pick surgery cases, set up case carts daily, manage the vaginal delivery and C-section setups as used, and order and stock our own warehouse, clinics and most areas of the hospital.

How would you describe your team?

Our team is made up of many different personalities and talents. We have three Certified Instrument Technicians on staff, one staff member working to achieve her Instrument Technician certification and one working on her Healthcare Leadership certification. This is a team that works together. Everyone rotates through positions weekly, but all are mindful of helping out in any area that needs it. There is an open atmosphere where questions are appreciated, and an understanding that none of us know it all. Training is a group effort. We like to think of ourselves as an evolving department because change happens everyday. We are more than teammates, we are a family here. We truly appreciate and respect one another.

What other departments does this department support?

We support all nursing units in the hospital and all clinical areas outside the facility. We also do our best to help other facilities in times of need, the most recent being Whiteman Air Force Base. In the past, we have collaborated with Warrensburg, Marshall and Columbia to aid in times of need.

What is one thing other people at Bothwell may not know about this department?

Our scope of practice goes well beyond just the instrumentation with overseeing patient charges, warehouse of supplies, crash carts, disaster carts and wound vacs. In addition, though most people might think the OR is our biggest customer, the clinics have taken over that role. Surprisingly, we actually do more instrumentation for the outside clinics daily than the OR department.

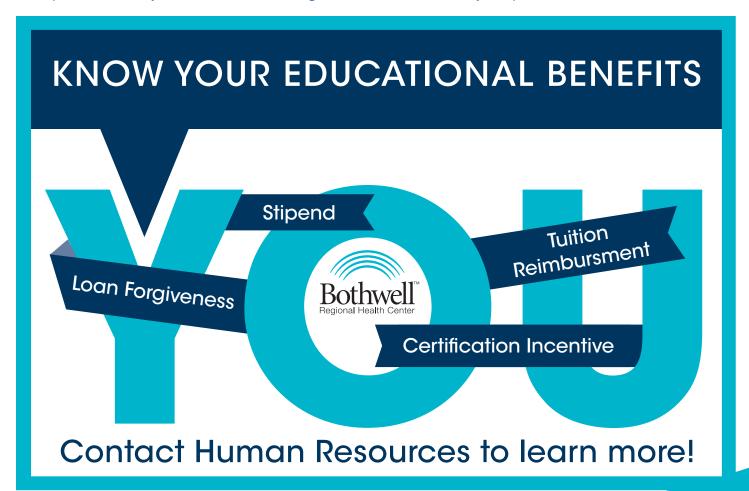
What do members of this department like to do for fun?

PATIENT SAFE HANDLING INITIATIVE

Bed Alarms

Patient alarm systems are an integral part of Bothwell's Patient Safe Handling and Fall Prevention program to help prevent adverse events related to mobility of fall risk patients. These include bed and chair pad alarms to help reduce patient falls, bed rail entrapment and patient wandering. To maximize the benefits of these devices and improve patient and caregiver safety, it is critical that front-line staff understand and use them in their daily practice.

In addition to alarm systems, nursing staff should complete frequent rounding to ensure the patient's 4Ps are met (potty, position, pain, periphery). This helps reduce the need for patients to mobilize on their own.

Falls typically occur while the patient is getting in or out of bed, shortly after the patient has exited the bed, when transferring from bed or chair and during toileting. One means of decreasing patient falls is the use of bed exit and Stanley chair exit alarms, which alarm by pressure- or a position-sensitive sensor. They serve as an "early warning system," alerting nursing staff when patients attempt to leave their bed or chairs unassisted.

Alarms themselves do not prevent falls. To be effective, they need to be implemented with care and a clear understanding of their limitations and utilized by all staff when caring for patients.

Consistent use of alarm systems by staff is an integral part of our fall reduction program. Additional information regarding the alarm system is available on the Intraweb.

ENSURE THE FOLLOWING BEFORE YOU LEAVE THE PATIENT ROOM:

- All alarms are on
- You hear the alarm activate
- Back-up battery is working
- Chair pad is connected to the call system
- Staff is trained on the devices
- You can hear the alarm from outside of the room
- Patients understand the purpose (TIPS program)

Workplace Back Safety

To prevent back injuries at work, it is important to understand a few general techniques. Prepare by assessing the situation to decide appropriate equipment, techniques and number of people needed to move the patient or equipment to reduce the risk of injury.

When transferring or assisting a patient, consider weight, medical condition, recent surgery, body strength, and ability to see, hear or follow instructions. When appropriate, obtain assistance from other staff. A few best practices for back safety include bending at the hips and knees rather than the waist, shifting your feet to turn instead of twisting your back and avoiding lifting from the floor or higher than your shoulders without proper equipment.

Poor posture, poor sleeping position and lack of exercise, flexibility and back strength can increase the risk of a work injury. If you stand for long periods of time at work, try to maintain a neutral posture by keeping the spine aligned and shoulders back to avoid slouching and occasionally shift weight from one leg to the other.

Fueling Recipes!

AIR FRYER GREEN BEANS

Using an air fryer is a great way to quickly serve up a healthy side dish. These green beans pair well with air fryer chicken. Bonus points: an air fryer won't heat up your house like a traditional oven!

Ingredients

- 1 lb. fresh green beans
- 1 tbsp. Olive oil
- ½ tsp. Sea salt
- ¼ tsp. Freshly ground black pepper

Directions

- 1. Preheat the air fryer to 380°F.
- 2. Prepare the green beans by trimming the stems and cutting larger ones in half so they are relatively equal in size, if needed.
- 3. Place the clean, trimmed green beans in a large bowl along with the olive oil, sea salt and pepper. Toss to combine.
- 4. Transfer the green beans to the air fryer and shake the basket to make sure they are in a single layer. You may need to cook in two batches. Cook until crisp tender, shaking the basket halfway through, for 8-10 minutes total.
- 5. Squeeze fresh lemon juice on top and serve immediately.

- 15 oz. chickpeas, drained
- 2 cups shelled edamame
- 1 large carrot (shredded)

- ½ green bell pepper (chopped)
- ¼ teaspoon sea salt

- ¼ cup grape seed or olive oil
- ¼ cup of white vinegar
- ¼ teaspoon of garlic powder
- ¼ teaspoon of Italian seasoning or (Oregano, basil, marjoram, thyme, rosemary)
- Black pepper and cumin to taste



Directions

In a large bowl, mix in chickpeas, edamame, shredded carrot, cranberries, bell peppers, salt, oil, vinegar and herbs. Refrigerate and serve when chilled.

Gifting Life-Saving Devices to the Community

Members of Wear Red for Women, a Bothwell Foundation committee, recently presented Bothwell Regional Health Center and Hotel Bothwell with life-saving automated external defibrillators (AEDs).

An AED is a small, lightweight device that allows individuals and first responders to treat sudden cardiac arrest. The machine automatically analyzes the heart rhythm and when appropriate, it delivers an electrical shock to the heart to restore its normal rhythm.

Funds to purchase the devices were raised during the 2023 Wear Red for Women luncheon and auction. The committee's goal is to have AEDs in every place people work, learn, play or pray in Sedalia and Pettis County. Since the inception of the luncheon event in 2020, 72 AEDs have been placed in or committed to various locations.

The 2024 Wear Red for Women event is Feb. 23, 2024.
