SECURITY HINTS AND TIPS

Phish or Spam? No, it's Not What's for Dinner!

Phish or Spam? No, it's not what's for dinner! However, it could be a question you struggle with when deciding what types of email to report to your IT department. Potentially malicious emails make it to your inbox every day, so it's important for you to understand the difference between a phishing email and a spam email.

This Email Seems Phishy

Phishing is the process of attempting to acquire sensitive information (such as usernames, passwords, and credit card details) by pretending to be a trustworthy entity. Most commonly, phishing emails will try to lure you into clicking on a link or opening an attachment.

Phishing emails can appear to come from reputable businesses or even departments and users from within your own organization. They often have a sense of urgency to them. Some may even use shock and intimidation to get what they want.

If you come to the conclusion you've been sent a phishing email, we strongly recommend that you report the email to your IT department for their review.

Spam Alert

Spam is unsolicited, unwanted email typically sent for marketing purposes. It is often trying to sell you something, such as unwanted goods or services—but, it is not asking you to take specific action. Although spam can be annoying, it is common to receive it in your business email. These types of emails do not typically need to be reported, unless you believe they pose a threat to your organization. In most cases, spam email can simply be deleted or ignored.

Note: Always follow your organization's policy regarding what type of email to report in case it differs from the above.

Whether a phishing email or spam email, you should always be cautious when clicking on a link or opening an attachment. An email should never be considered safe until it is analyzed carefully. Remember, you're the last line of defense to prevent a phishing attack on your organization.

Missouri winters are a time where the weather can be as random as lottery numbers and accidents are waiting to happen. Winter storms and cold temperatures can be dangerous. Help stay safe by planning ahead.

- Allow extra time for travel
- Check tire tread, wiper blades and fluid levels on your car
- Keep an ice scraper in your car
- Focus on your footing
- Walk like a penguin (short and slow steps)
- Don't use your cell phone when walking
- Use handrails

- Be aware of changes in walking surfaces
- Free up your hands
- Report unsafe conditions
- Use authorized paths
- Step down off curbs, not out

Stipend Policy Update

The Stipend policy has been updated. New Faces in New Places



Certified Family Nurse Practitioner **Cara Arender** has joined the Bothwell Regional Health Center Cole Camp and Lincoln clinics and will care for patients of all ages.

As a nurse practitioner, Arender will provide patient care under the guidance and supervision of a collaborating physician. She can evaluate

and treat illnesses and injuries, order and interpret labs and tests, prescribe and monitor medications and refills, and perform annual health and well-woman exams and physicals.

Arender has been nurse for 12 years and received a master's degree in Family Nurse Practitioner from Simmons University in Boston, Massachusetts. She earned a bachelor's degree in Nursing from Southern New Hampshire University in Manchester, New Hampshire, and an associate degree in Nursing from Jones County Junior College in Ellisville, Mississippi.

Originally from Mississippi, Arender has lived in Missouri since 2019 and moved to south of Sedalia in 2021. She began working at Bothwell Regional Health Center in July 2021 as a registered nurse in the Post Anesthesia Care Unit (PACU). She has a variety of health care experiences in emergency care, intensive care, step down and PACU in many different hospitals. Arender said she knew she wanted to be in health care from an early age.

"I have always enjoyed caring for people and building relationships with them and their families. Nursing has let me do that and also help them heal," she said. "I have also had the privilege of working at many different hospitals ranging from community hospitals like Bothwell to Level 1 trauma centers like MU Health Care. That diversity has allowed me to know what resources are available to patients."

Arender said she decided to pursue becoming a Nurse Practitioner because she wanted to be more of a resource to people along their health care journeys. "I want patients to feel comfortable when they go see their primary care provider and know their concerns will be heard and addressed as well as they can be," she said. "Sedalia and the surrounding communities have a lot of underserved citizens who deserve health care, and I want to provide them with professional and appropriate services."

Keith Morrow, Bothwell's Clinic Operations vice president, said adding Arender to the medical team means more options for Benton County residents to be seen for care.

"We're excited to add Cara to the medical team," Morrow said. "She has a lot of different clinical experiences, yet she excels at caring for people in smaller communities because of her ability to connect with her patients and understand their needs."

Arender will start seeing current and new patients around the middle of January. She will be at the Lincoln clinic three days a week working with Dr. Matthew Roehrs and at the Cole Camp clinic two days a week with Dr. Misty Todd and Nurse Practitioner Pamela Eckhoff.

"As a board-certified Family Nurse Practitioner, I will be able to see health issues in pediatric and adult patients, including ear infections, upper respiratory illnesses like colds, flus and RSV, well visits, women's health care, school physicians, high blood pressure, diabetes and minor injuries," she said. "I want to help the community and provide them the best care I can. I plan to listen to my patients and be a compassionate and understanding provider and someone they can trust."

Arender is married and has three daughters aged 7, 5 and 2. She and her husband enjoy spending time outdoors fishing and hunting and keeping up with their children's activities.

We have a lot of work to do but my department likes to do as much of the construction and remodeling themselves to showcase what we can do.


NOVEMBER EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH Baylee Senesac



Life-Saving Devices Given to Area Groups

On Dec. 16, members of the Wear Red for Women committee presented automated external defibrillator (AED) devices to the Smithton Youth Sports Complex, The Pavilion and Lake Creek Methodist Church. An AED is a small, lightweight device that allows individuals and first responders to treat sudden cardiac arrest. The machine automatically analyzes the heart rhythm and when appropriate, it delivers an electrical shock to the heart to restore its normal rhythm.

According to research, the majority of sudden heart attack victims have good chances of survival under certain common conditions, including that the event is witnessed, the collapse occurs in a large public place, an AED is handy, and bystanders use CPR and the AED.

Funds to purchase the devices were raised during the 2022 Wear Red for Women luncheon and auction. The committee's goal is to have AEDs in every place people work, learn, play or pray in Sedalia and Pettis County. Since the inception of the luncheon event in 2020, 47 AEDs have been placed in or committed to various locations. The 2023 Wear Red for Women event is Feb. 24, 2023.







