EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT TRANSITIONA Letter from Lori

In mid-April, Envision Physician Services, the group that provides physicians and advanced practice clinicians that staff our Emergency Department (ED), sent us a 120-day letter of termination stating our contract with them would end on July 16 unless we agreed to a larger subsidy to the tune of several hundred thousand dollars. We have had a contract with Envision since 2018 and have out-sourced our ED services with other groups since 2011.

We attempted in good faith to negotiate with Envision to reduce the increased subsidy demand. While we were in discussions with them, we were also developing Plan B in the event negotiations fell through. Ultimately, we decided to end our agreement with Envision and return to employing and/or contracting ourselves with physicians, NPs and PAs in the ED.

Obviously, we can't just 'flip the switch' and return oversight of our ED to hospital management overnight. To help with the transition, we have contracted for at least a year with Dr. Marc Newquist and In-House Medical, a professional services group that manages the clinical, operational and financial aspects of hospital-based emergency medicine services.

In-House Medical's mission is "to provide the practice management expertise that hospitals need to develop a successful in-house program that ultimately positions your hospital as the leader in high quality medical care within your community."

Dr. Newquist is a board-certified ED physician with more than 25 years of leadership, clinical, administrative and advisory experience in emergency and hospital medicine. In-House Medical also has an in-house locum group that has been personally vetted by Dr. Newquist that we can tap into at lower costs without sacrificing quality.

While one of the perks of going back to an in-house Emergency Department is a cost savings that can free up resources to invest in other care and initiatives, I believe the larger benefit will be to our patients. Knowing the people who are caring for them are employed by Bothwell will change the perspective we sometimes hear on the street ... that caregivers aren't as invested because they are employed by someone else. I don't believe that yet we all know that sometimes perception outranks reality.

In all transparency, Envision Physician Services is owned by a private equity firm with goals that simply don't align with ours. My belief is that "closer is better" and that all of us who live here know better than a distant private equity firm. My hope is that this changes patient-caregiver engagement and relationships for everyone's betterment.

As always, my door is open to hear your questions or advice. In other ED news, I'm pleased to share that **Lesley Jackson**, ED charge nurse, has accepted the role of ED manager

effective June 6 ahead of Sherri Egbert's retirement on June 10. Lesley is an exemplary employee, and I'm confident she will excel in her new role.

GIVING HOPE AND SHARING LIFE Bothwell Receives Midwest Transplant Network Award

Bothwell Regional Health Center was honored May 3 with an Excellence in Donation Award from Midwest Transplant Network (MTN), a federally certified, nonprofit organ procurement organization that works with organ, eye and tissue donors, their families, hospitals and other professional partners.

Bothwell received the award for having a 40% or greater tissue donation conversion rate. In 2021, Bothwell had 10 donor heroes, and its conversion rate, which is the measure of the percentage of eligible deaths that become donors, was 50%.



Accepting the award on Bothwell's behalf were Michele Laas, chief nursing officer; Katy Touchstone, RN and Critical Care Unit charge nurse; and Julie Snow, Nursing Administration patient care coordinator.

In the United States, 20 people a day on average die because of the lack of available organs for transplants, and every 10 minutes, another person is added to the waiting list. According to MTN, about 2,000 people in Missouri are waiting for life-saving transplants. People who register to be organ and tissue donors can save as many as eight lives and enhance the lives of up to 100 more people.

More than 125 area businesses have agreements with Bothwell for their employees to receive work-related screenings and medical care. Kusgen will be doing pre-employment physicals and screenings and conducting workman's compensation evaluations for local employers. She will also see patients in the Bothwell Walk In Clinic when needed.

Knocke is from Chesterfield, Missouri, and received his undergraduate degree in Finance from Creighton University in Nebraska. He is working toward a Master of Health Administration (MHA)

degree at the University of Iowa.

CEO Lori Wightman's family connections to the University of Iowa's MHA program has led to a long line of sponsoring summer interns throughout her career. Wightman's father was in the program's second graduating class and went on to be a hospital administrator. This is the 17th summer Wightman has mentored an MHA student from the University of Iowa.

Knocke learned about the Bothwell internship through the university's MHA program assistant and was influenced to pursue the opportunity by Quincy Markham, last year's MHA intern.

"Quincy had a terrific experience here last summer and heavily recommended I apply," he said. "Meeting Lori and interviewing with her solidified that it would be a great choice for me."

Knocke said he chose health care and administration in particular because of his history as a patient and his father's influence.

"As a kid, I was a relatively high user of health care services with numerous broken bones, but just as important was the influence my dad had on me," he said. "He earned an MHA at Washington University in St. Louis and is a former hospital administrator. I found myself asking a lot of questions about his career and the field and pondering the career possibilities that come with a finance degree. I always came back to health care because I want to make a difference in the communities I serve."

The internship lasts 12 weeks and Knocke's projects include developing a list of leases to be used to evaluate the impact of new accounting principles from the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, writing an implementation plan for the recently completed Community Health Needs Assessment, using the SBAR (Situation-Background-Assessment-Recommendation) technique to evaluate adding a K9 security officer to our Security team, assisting a team of nine physicians and nurse practitioners to pilot the Nuance/DAX implementation, helping build a comparison dashboard that can be used to benchmark key department metrics (hours worked per unit) with Syntellis data, and helping develop a scatter plot that shows the relationship between hours worked and visits per clinic.

"I will be staying long enough to experience the Missouri State Fair for the first time and helping judge the gluten-free baking contest that Bothwell sponsors," Knocke said. "It will be the first official contest I have ever judged. I look forward to dialing in my palette for the wonderful dishes coming my way and being involved in one of the things that makes Sedalia such a unique place."

Knocke is the youngest of three in his family and they all share an interest in health care careers. His brother works in Chesterfield for a surgical equipment manufacturer, and his sister is a physical therapist in New York City. When he's not studying or working, Knocke's hobbies include playing golf, hanging out with friends and enjoying a cold beverage at an outdoor patio.

After he graduates next May with his MHA degree, Knocke has aspirations of following in his father's footsteps as a hospital administrator.

"My goal is to one day earn my way into a CEO role at a hospital somewhere in the midwest," he said.

SERVICE LINE NEWS Help for Frequent Urination

Mary Hamline used to plan her day around how fast she could find a restroom. Hamline, 75, suffered for nearly four years from an overactive bladder, and its most common symptom of the sudden need or urge to urinate.

"It was at a point where I had to use the restroom every 15 or 20 minutes," she said. "I live in Lincoln, 25 miles from Sedalia, so even a trip there meant I needed a plan. I was constantly worrying about where I could stop anywhere I went."

According to the Urology Care Foundation, as many as 30 percent of men and 40 percent of women in the United States live with overactive bladder symptoms like frequent urgency or leakage. The number may be even higher because many people living with the symptoms may be embarrassed or don't think there is treatment that can help.

After taking medications and facing a possible hysterectomy, Hamline heard from a friend about Dr. Michael Carozza, a gynecological specialist at Bothwell OB/GYN Associates. After evaluating Hamline, he recommended the InterStim system, a bladder pacemaker that restores communication between the bladder and the brain. Carozza joined the Bothwell medical team in 2019 and after going through special training started doing the procedure about nine months ago.

"Overactive bladder is caused by premature, spontaneous and repetitive bladder contractions that can lead to urinary leakage," Carozza said. "It is primarily a disorder that responds to medical management, but sometimes the contractions can be resistant to medicines. These are the times when InterStim may be beneficial."

After an initial evaluation and wearing the device externally for about a month, Carozza implanted the neurostimulator internally near Hamline's hip. The device delivers electronic stimulation to the nerve that helps calm the bladder and controls the spasms that tell the brain it's time to urinate.

"When I wore the device externally, I kept track of how much I was voiding and how it was helping," Hamline said. "At first, I had to get used to the fluttering feeling, but now I'm used to it and don't notice it all."

Hamline controls the device through a cell phone that has the device's program on it.

"If I feel like I need to adjust it, I can turn it up, down or off," she said. "I'm thrilled with it. It's working very well."

From the initial evaluation to the follow-up, patients are seen a total of five times. It is an outpatient procedure with minimal anesthesia, and patients go home the same day. Carozza said the majority of his patients who have had the InterStim device implanted are women who have been post-menopausal for about 10 or 15 years, yet he has treated others suffering from an overactive bladder and is the only physician in the area offering the procedure.

"I want people to know that having an overactive bladder, while fairly common, is not a normal part of getting older, being a woman or having a prostate issue, and it is treatable," he said. "By offering the InterStim procedure in my practice, people don't have to travel far for this treatment. The technology is safe and has been around since 1998. In the newest version, the batteries can last up to 15 years."

Hamline hopes others suffering from symptoms like hers take her experience to heart and has recommended Carozza to several friends.

"I do hope it helps other people," she said. "The whole team has been very professional and very helpful. Dr. Carozza is so personable and has a great bedside manner. At my age, I wasn't ready for a hysterectomy. He really listened to me, and that's a big thing for me. He was a godsend."

"Whether he's saving lives or giving information to patients' family members, Mike listens to everyone and acts or takes in information," Parrish said. "He always helps everyone out."







PATIENT SAFE HANDLING INITIATIVE Bed Alarms Help Prevent Patient Falls

Falls in hospitalized patients are serious and can complicate a hospital stay, resulting in increased length of stay and liability. Most falls in hospitalized patients occur in patient rooms and are related to ambulating from a bed, chair or toilet without adequate assistance.

Bed and chair alarms can help reduce falls by alerting personnel when at-risk patients attempt to leave a bed or chair without assistance. This allows the caregiver enough time to intercept the patient before a fall or at least to respond



more promptly if the patient has already fallen. They also reduce the need for physical restraints—a Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services quality-of-care indicator.

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) cites bed/chair alarms as an effective risk reduction strategy. They are an important component of a fall prevention program, if they are used effectively. Here are some things you can do:

- Know what your bed/chair alarm is and how it works
- Use the right type of alarm for your patient. Many reports describe patients removing alarms clipped to their garments or otherwise deliberately deactivating their alarm.
- Remember that some patients with hearing deficits may not hear their own alarms.
- Understand that bed/chair alarms may improve the timeliness of your response to a situation but may not prevent falls by themselves.
- Remember to utilize a gait belt prior to ambulation or transfer to provide proper support.
- Remember to round on your patient frequently to provide all their needs, especially toileting, to reduce the patient's need to get out of bed quickly.
- Place the call light in reach for the patient to be able to notify personnel they need assistance.

FROM THE BOTHWELL{NESS} COMMITTEE Summer Grilling Tips a Hot Topic

Summer is almost here, and many of you may be firing up the grill soon to avoid heating up your house. Here are some tips to keep in mind for a healthy grilling experience.

- Use herbs or marinades made with thyme, sage and garlic.
 This is a great way to cut down on carcinogen formation in the meat by as much as 88%
- Marinating meat in red wine for six hours prior to grilling has also shown to reduce carcinogens.
- Use a meat thermometer and cook meat at a temp below 325 degrees. If grilling burgers, the internal meat temperature should be at 160 degrees.
- Don't forget the veggies! Vegetables are naturally high in fiber and low in calories so they're a good balance to a meat-heavy barbecue. Vegetables are also great for grilling and don't contain the amino acids that form HCAs in grilled meat. However, that doesn't mean they can or should be overcooked; always grill veggies over indirect heat to avoid charring, which can form other carcinogens like benzopyrene.
- Flip those burgers. A 2003 study published in the Journal of Food Protection found that flipping a burger every 30 seconds reduced E. coli most effectively, while an earlier study in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute found that frequent flipping combined with low-heat cooking significantly reduced E. coli and produced the lowest level of HCAs.
- Try some salmon or other seafood. Some heart-healthy options include salmon, trout and herring, which are all packed with omega-3s.
- Go for the leaner cuts. When shopping, look for loin or round cuts of red meat and pork, and buy "choice" or "select" grades of beef rather than "prime;" these have the least amount of fat.
- Choose white meat over dark meat and remove skin. When buying chicken, choose breast cuts and remove the skin before eating. Skinless chicken breasts have less fat than dark meat legs and thighs.
- Try a salad or fresh veggies on the side. Raw veggies provide the same satisfying crunch as potato chips, but without all the fat, calories and preservatives.
- Dessert? Try some grilled fruit! Pineapples and stone fruit like peaches and plums make a simple and healthy dessert.

GARDEN GRILLERS RECIPE

Grilled Strawberry Salsa Fresca



large sweet onion
 jalapeño peppers
 cloves garlic, unpeeled
 lb. fresh strawberries, hulled
 cup chopped fresh cilantro
 Juice of 1 lime
 cup roasted, salted peanuts, coarsely chopped

- 1. Heat a grill to medium-high. Place a grill pan on the grill rack. Leaving the root and stem ends intact, cut onion into quarters.
- 2. Grill onion wedges and jalapeños on grill rack 5 minutes, turning to brown evenly. Add garlic and strawberries to hot grill pan. Grill 5 minutes (10 minutes total for onion and jalapeños), turning frequently, until slightly charred. Transfer strawberries and vegetables to a cutting board: let cool.
- 3. When cool enough to handle, coarsely chop strawberries and onion. Peel garlic. Finely chop jalapeños (if you like, remove and discard seeds) and garlic. In a bowl combine berries, onion, jalapeños, garlic, cilantro, lime juice, and ¼ tsp. salt. Cover and chill 1 hour. If you like, top with chopped peanuts. Serve over grilled chicken or shrimp or with tortilla chips. Makes 3 ½ cups

Pulse Oximeters for Bothwell Medical Equipment - \$500

Bothwell Medical Equipment will use the additional pulse oximeters due to the addition of Dr. Anders who is ordering oximetry testing more frequently. Clinic Director Elizabeth Green accepted the award.



Patient Scale for Bothwell Internal Medicine Specialists/Bothwell Pulmonology Specialists - \$543

BIMS/BPS is moving to a new location and is in need of an additional scale with side rails for patient safety. Clinic Director Toni Warren accepted the award.

Niox Vero System for Bothwell Pulmonology Specalists - \$4,700

A Niox Vero system measures nitric oxide in human breath. This is used to detect inflammation in airways (asthma). By using this test, it helps the physician to make the right diagnosis and find the best treatment plan. Clinic Director Toni Warren accepted the award.



Radiation Dose Monitoring Software for Radiology Department - \$19,400 Radiation dose monitoring software will allow the Radiology department to monitor, track and compile reports on radiation doses that patients receive. This software will "flag" the technologists and physicians every time a patient receives a high dose of radiation. It will track the patient's cumulative dose in the EMR. Radiation dose monitoring is a requirement in pediatric patients to satisfy Leapfrog scores and is also tied to Joint Commission national patient safety goals. Department Director Marc Dougherty accepted the award.

iCad Software for Mammography Units for Radiation Department - \$5,310 iCad Software will be used to aid and assist the radiologists in diagnosing breast abnormalities on mammograms. Department Director Marc Dougherty accepted the award.

Infrared Cameras for Bothwell Sleep Center - \$19,520


Recently, the Bothwell Sleep Center was able to upgrade its Polysmith SleepAcquisition System and installation specialists were able to resolve the ability to record sound during a sleep study. While upgrading the system, it was brought to their attention that the camera system purchased in 2009 was failing.

In 2013 the American Academy of Sleep Medicine initiated the standard for all new camera systems to have pan, tilt and zoom features. The Bothwell Sleep Center currently does not. In addition, the AASM now requires all interactions between the patient and the sleep technologist to be recorded for patient and technologist safety. Director of Neurodiagnostics and Cardiopulmonary Jenny Force accepted the award.



Virtual Reality Training for Nursing Education - \$33,497

The Nursing Education department is pursuing virtual reality training as an addition to the current nursing training program. This training will bring state-of-the-art training to employees who in turn improve patient safety and patient outcomes. This technology allows staff to practice in simulated real-life, high-risk situations in a controlled environment so they are prepared to make split-second lifesaving decisions if the situations arise at the patient's bedside. Director of Nursing Education Kim Perez accepted the award.



Creation of a Hospice Room in the Hospital - \$25,573

The hospice room will be used to provide an atmosphere at the end of life that will be quiet and homelike with the advantages of nursing care. This room will be located at the end of the hall on the Peds unit and will offer space for both the patient and family that can stay with the patient. Chief Nursing Officer Michele Laas accepted the award.



Two Arm Bikes, Two Recumbent Cross Trainers, Two Treadmills for Cardiac Rehab - \$20,000

Discharge Photo Wall for Women's Health and Newborn Care - \$3,500

A photo discharge will be created by Women's Health and Newborn Care that will allow each family to take a photo with their new addition before leaving the facility. The photo wall will help create a keepsake opportunity for each family, as well as provide a marketing opportunity for all currently pregnant patients or those thinking about delivering. Women's Health and Newborn Care Director Hollie Dubroc accepted the award.

Baby Bassinet for Women's Health - \$3,602.50

The Halo bassinet is the only hospital bassinet designed to safely keep baby closer to mom, enabling the closeness that a mother desires most in the first moments with her child. These bassinets move and allow mothers to reach their babies easier as well as will replace the wooden base bassinets that currently do not meet infection control guidelines. Women's Health and Newborn Care Director Hollie Dubroc accepted the award.



Tympanometer and Reflux Screeners and Two Scopes for Bothwell ENT - \$8,140.

A Tympanometer is frequently used in the ENT clinic to offer information about air pressure in the middle ear. Scopes are used frequently in the ENT clinic; however, they currently only have one scope and after each use have to take it back to Sterile Processing at the hospital, which can take up to two hours before it's returned. Purchasing two new scopes for the ENT clinic will allow Dr. Covington to use it several times a day which will help with patient care. Clinic Director Amber Allain accepted the award



Temporary Pacemaker for CCU - \$3,676

The Critical Care Unit (CCU) has requested a temporary pacemaker that is up-do-date. A temporary pacemaker is used if there is a temporary change in heart rate. A temporary pacemaker is used for a few days until your heart gets back in rhythm. PCU Unit Manager Sarah Hopper accepted the award

Equipment and Patient Resources for Cancer Center - \$36,000

For more than five years the Bothwell Foundation has assisted with providing gas cards to patients who may need financial assistance getting back and forth to their Cancer Center appointments, offering cases of Ensure free of charge, as well as offering funds that Kara with the Cancer Center oversees if their patients have urgent needs such as prescription costs, food, or other important items. These funds allow them to help their patients in a timely way and in ways that really make a difference.

In addition to these funds, the Bothwell Foundation also approved a two-step with handrail stool for radiation oncology patients to help them get on and off the new new linear accelerator table, which is taller than the previous table, and eight recliners for the Cancer Center Infusion Area that will replace the current chairs. Four Telepacks for PCU - \$16,480

The PCU is a very busy floor with high patient turnover. Some of the patients are in PCU when they could go to a Med-Surg floor but with telemetry capabilities. There are currently a limited number of boxes for the Med-Surg floor, so these additional telepacks will extend this service to accommodate more patients who need telemetry monitoring of their heart or oxygenation. Director of Critical Care and Emergency Services Tammy Jackson accepted the award.



Automated Blood Pressure Machines for Bothwell Family Medicine Associates and Bothwell Truman Lake - \$6,000

Each clinic will receive funding for a machine to help nursing staff collect patient vital signs. This will allow the patient and staff to not have to move around the clinic as much to find a machine. Benton County Clinic Director Ragin Boise accepted the award.

Nitrogen Canister for Bothwell Cole Camp - \$672.93

Item will replace the current canister at the Bothwell Cole Camp Clinic that is broken. Clinic Director Ragin Boise accepted the award.

EKG Machine at Bothwell Lincoln Family Medicine - \$2,531.29

Currently, the EKG machine being used is not reliable and is constantly being sent to Biomed for repairs. The new machine will help ensure staff has the properly functioning equipment to perform their daily orders and is imperative to providing safe and quality patient care. Clinic Director Ragin Boise accepted the award.

Hickman Excellence Award

The Bothwell Foundation Hickman Excellence Award was established by the friends and family of JaEllen Hickman, a longtime Bothwell nurse and employee.
