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Introduction

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requires hospitals with a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status to complete a community health needs assessment (CHNA) once every three years. They must solicit input from persons who represent the broad interests of the community served by the hospital, including those with special knowledge of, or expertise in, public health. Bothwell Regional Health Center solicited input using modalities such as surveys and focus groups comprised of individuals representing the broad interests of the community served. A review of the BRHC CHNA and the secondary data resources available from the [exploreMOhealth](https://exploreMOhealth.org/) platform (<https://exploreMOhealth.org/>) was conducted as required of the process. This report provides a thorough description of the following.

- The community served by the hospital
- Process and methods used to conduct the assessment
- Approach used to plan, develop and conduct the assessment
- A prioritized description of all community health needs identified through the CHNA process
- A description of the existing health care facilities and other resources within the community available to meet the community health needs identified through the CHNA

The following dimensions of health were assessed to identify the current gaps for individuals, community and the population within the primary service areas: demographics, social and economic factors, behaviors, clinical care/access, environmental, mortality and quality of life. This powerful and innovative [exploreMOhealth](https://exploreMOhealth.org/) platform revealed the following top issues based on the ZIP Health Rankings Report for the FY 2021-2023 hospital inpatient, emergency department and outpatient diagnosed cases per 1,000. (Refer to the [Secondary Research Process section](#) for more details related to the analytics and capabilities of the database.)

- Chronic diseases
 - Heart disease
 - Diabetes
 - Cancer
 - Arthritis/joint disease
- Hospital and emergency department utilization

A secondary data analysis was conducted to help identify the top issues in the primary service areas served by Bothwell Regional Health Center. The [exploreMOhealth](https://exploreMOhealth.org/) platform was used to help identify disparities at the ZIP-Code level due to its innovative analytic capabilities. Having detailed, local information on health factors and outcomes in places where Missourians live can help stakeholders and partners take the appropriate actions to create and sustain healthy communities. The information gathered can help organizations target interventions with precision.

Primary data derived from the survey and information gathered from the focus groups were included in the analysis and overall report to help paint a clear picture of the issues facing this region. The 2022 CHNA findings were considered in the identification and prioritization of the 2025 top issues.

Executive Summary

Community Defined and About Bothwell Regional Health Center

As a nonprofit hospital, Bothwell Regional Health Center is required by the Internal Revenue Service tax code to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) every three years. This is also a requirement of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. The hospital must then use the findings from the CHNA to develop implementation strategies to address identified community needs. The purpose of the CHNA is to spur the creation of programs that improve the health of the communities served.

Headquartered in Sedalia, Missouri, in the west central portion of the state, Bothwell includes a hospital and 20+ outpatient clinics in four communities. Its primary service area is Pettis and Benton counties with a combined population of over 64,000 residents. The service area also extends into a 40-mile radius that reaches six contiguous counties: Saline, Johnson, Henry, Moniteau, Morgan and Cooper.

Industry in the area is primarily industrial, agricultural and business related. Bothwell is the largest employer in Sedalia and the second largest employer in Pettis County. Education and cultural experiences are readily available. Local secondary schools are strong and function as important cogs in their communities. State Fair Community College's (SFCC) flagship campus, located in Sedalia in Pettis County, has other locations throughout the central Missouri region. The Daum Museum of Contemporary Art at SFCC and the Liberty Center Association for the Arts provide arts and entertainment.

People seeking outdoor recreation can choose among many activities including a robust park system in Sedalia, biking, walking or riding on the Katy Trail, fishing in Clover Dell Lake, or fishing and water sports on nearby Truman Lake in Benton County. Sedalia is home to the Missouri State Fair, which attracts approximately 400,000 visitors annually. Opportunities for people to get involved in community activities exist in both Benton and Pettis counties.

In the 2022 CHNA, mental health, substance abuse, and heart disease and obesity were identified as priority health issues. Bothwell's [implementation plan](https://www.brhc.org/wp-content/uploads/chna-implementation-plan-brhc.pdf) (<https://www.brhc.org/wp-content/uploads/chna-implementation-plan-brhc.pdf>) to address these issues included system-wide and local strategies and activities, including the following.

Mental Health — Through grant funding and Bothwell's partnership with Burrell Behavioral Health, psychologists were embedded in pediatric and family medicine clinics, creating an immediate handoff from a provider visit to mental health professionals, thereby closing the gap in access that sometimes exists in this care. Additionally, more staff were trained through several mental health first aid sessions, including members of the security team, social workers and the resident chaplain. Bothwell also continued its participation in area mental health organizations, ensuring a visible presence and support of those efforts. Through its recent

participation in the state's Transformation of Rural Community Health (ToRCH) program, grant funds were made available to a health care partner to place a licensed Hospital Access Liaison in the hospital to assist patients with transition of care and finding resources.

Substance Abuse — Bothwell has also made efforts to address the challenges around substance abuse in the community. Educational materials around pain management and opioid safety were created and included in patient discharge packages to increase awareness levels for managing pain at home and dangers of opioid abuse. Community fitness nights were held as opportunities for youth to attend and explore ways to stay active and away from substance temptations, and Bothwell collaborated with local law enforcement on proper disposal of prescription medication and hosted Narcan training sessions in area schools.

Heart Disease and Obesity — The Bothwell Foundation, which exists to support Bothwell's mission, has led efforts to provide educational offerings to the public around women's health and heart health and by its annual sponsorship of a 5K/10K walk/run. Additionally, the Bothwell medical team hosted community fitness nights to connect the community with providers and talk about the importance of an active lifestyle to maintaining good health. Each month, Bothwell supplies a "From the Expert" feature story to the local newspaper that is repurposed on Bothwell's Facebook page to reach additional people. The articles are written by physicians or other providers and feature relevant health topics. Bothwell is also an annual sponsor of the Missouri State Fair and provides free blood pressure screenings during the event in the Senior Lounge. Internally, the Bothwell{ness} committee promoted eating healthy food by creating a garden in an outdoor space at the hospital and asking employee home gardeners to share produce with their coworkers. Employees also shared their favorite recipes for inclusion in Bothwell's monthly employee e-newsletter.

Priority Issues — 2025

After a careful review of the findings of the previous CHNA, current secondary data, survey results, focus group findings and leadership review, the following priority issues were identified.

- Chronic conditions
 - Heart disease
 - Diabetes
 - Cancer
 - Arthritis/joint disease
- Cost of health care
- Mental health

Chronic Conditions

A review of the primary and secondary data sources reveal that chronic diseases are prevalent in the primary and secondary service areas of BRHC. A review of ER data reveals chronic conditions and risk factors in the top diagnosis list. Community survey results further reveal a

similar trend of the prevalence of chronic conditions. From a preventive standpoint, encouraging regular physical activity, a balanced diet, targeting social determinants of health such as poverty, lack of education, and limited access to health care can improve overall health outcomes. Incorporating screening that involves early detection is important. Regular screenings for common chronic conditions, such as diabetes, high blood pressure and certain cancers is an important first step in the process. Promoting and implementing programs that seek to identify and address risk factors early on will prevent or delay the onset of chronic conditions. Implementing comprehensive care strategies that seek to empower individuals to actively participate in managing their chronic conditions through education, support and self-care strategies is important. Ensuring that individuals receive timely and appropriate care while integrating social services and community resources to address the needs of individuals with chronic conditions is very important to ensure that both clinical and non-clinical factors are addressed.

Secondary data supports the focus on chronic conditions as the general strategies deployed will be key to improving health outcomes in multiple areas beyond heart disease. The [exploreMOhealth](#) data reveals the following top chronic conditions: arthritis, cancer, diabetes, heart disease, hypertension and atherosclerosis, among others. The Robert Wood Johnson County Health Rankings 2024 report denotes both Pettis and Benton counties have higher rates of adult obesity at 42% and 43% respectively compared to the state rate of 38%. Both counties have a higher percent of physical inactivity compared to the state and nation.

Cost of Care

The cost of healthcare that includes a variety of factors such as health insurance premiums, deductibles, and co-pays, continues to be at the top of people in BRHC based on the primary and secondary data finding for the 2025 CHNA. This can stand between people and their health and can lead to delayed or forgone medical care. The community survey identified the ability to pay for care, cost of care, and lack of health insurance as the top pressing issue in Pettis and Benton counties respectively. Delayed or forgone evidently leads to worsening health conditions, increased risk of hospitalization, and potentially higher long-term health care cost. Cost of care can also lead to health disparities, with those who can afford care having better access to resources and services than those that may not have as much. BRHC's proactive approach of being a pilot for the ToRCH program will help identify strategies and can help address some of the gaps that may be attributable to the cost of care equation.

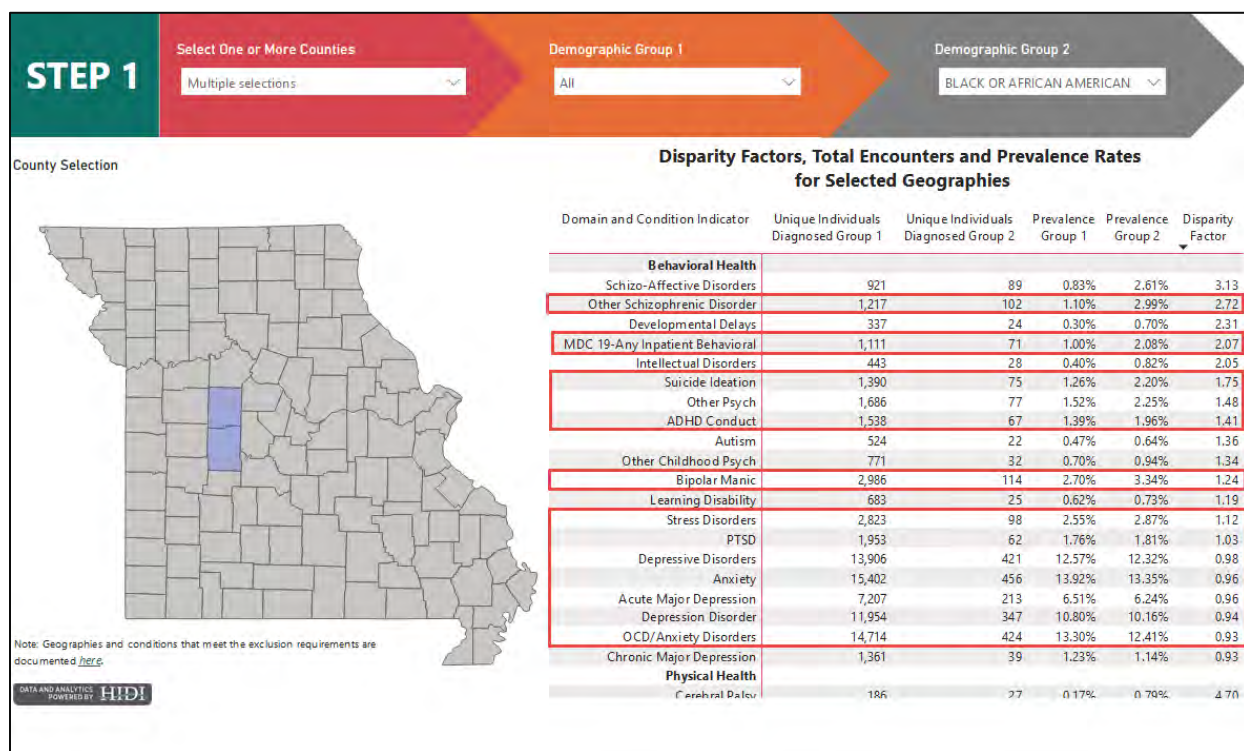
Mental Health

Findings of the focus group meetings for both Pettis and Benton counties identified mental health as a priority health issue. A review of the recently completed CHNA survey results revealed that of the 470 respondents to this question, 45.32% reported mental health is the most pressing issue in their community. The 2019 and 2022 CHNAs identified mental health as priority issues as well. According to national data, nearly 30% of the population live in a county

designated as a Mental Health Professional Shortage Area. As the mental health parity aspects of the Affordable Care Act create increased coverage for mental health services, many regions continue to see increased shortages in mental health providers.

According to the 2024 Status Report on Missouri's Substance Use and Mental Health, Pettis County experienced a decrease in the number of individuals who received psychiatric services when presented with attention deficit, bipolar mood disorder, depressive mood disorder, impulse control and conduct disorder, obsessive-compulsive and personality disorders, schizophrenia and psychotic disorders, trauma, and stress related disorder. Benton County saw an increase in each of the categories mentioned per their 2024 report. A review of the top emergency department diagnoses revealed several mental health related conditions such as anxiety disorder and suicidal ideation. See the appendix for more details.

A review of MHA's Health Equity dashboards (<https://web.mhanet.com/health-equity-dashboards/>) provided a summary of the largest disparities in hospital claims-based health outcomes and health factors between different demographic groups within Pettis and Benton counties. The following screenshot depicts the top four behavioral health disparities in Pettis and Benton counties. On the same note, it shows the top mental health issues with the highest number of unique patients diagnosed.

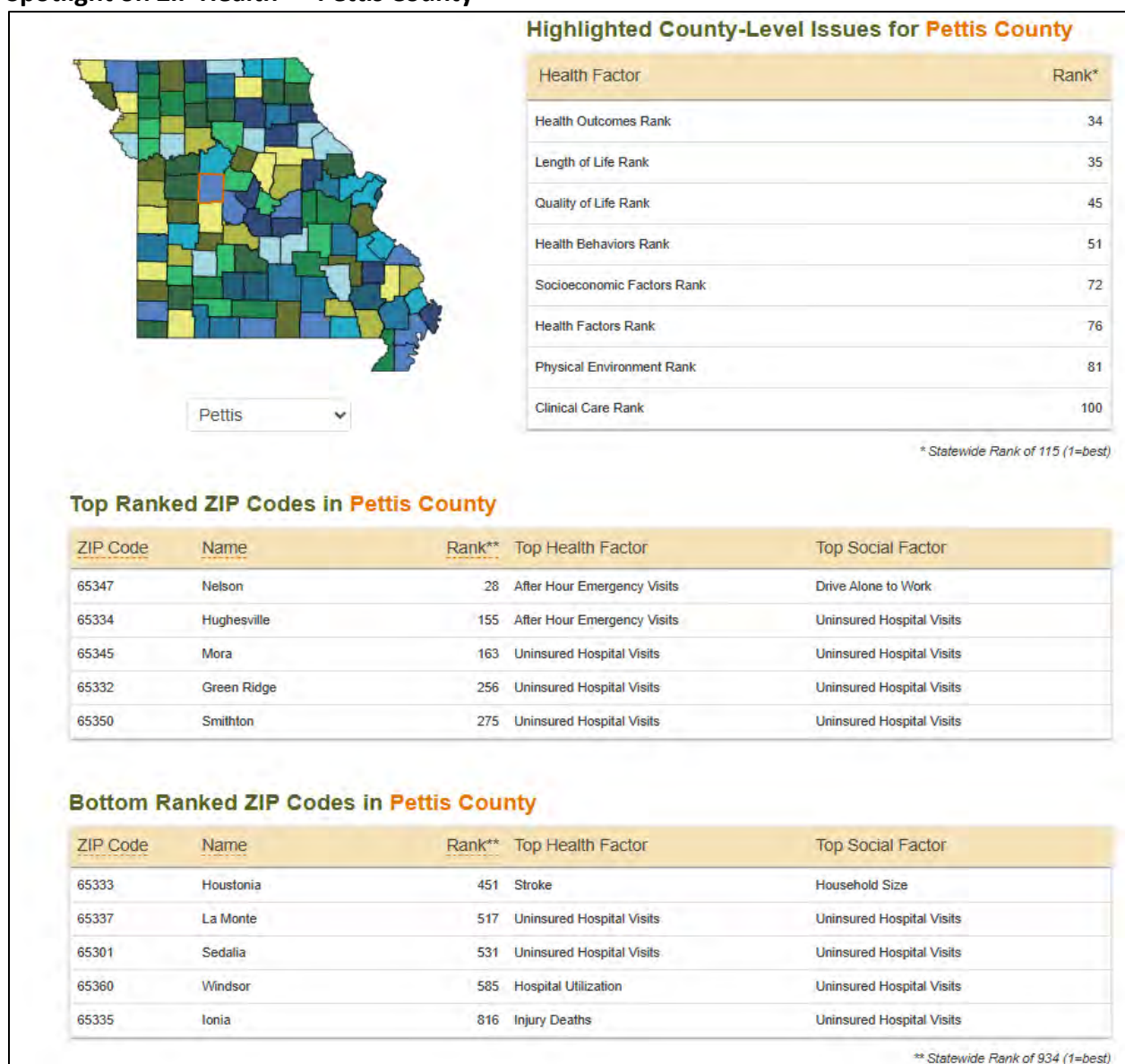

Spotlight on ZIP Health

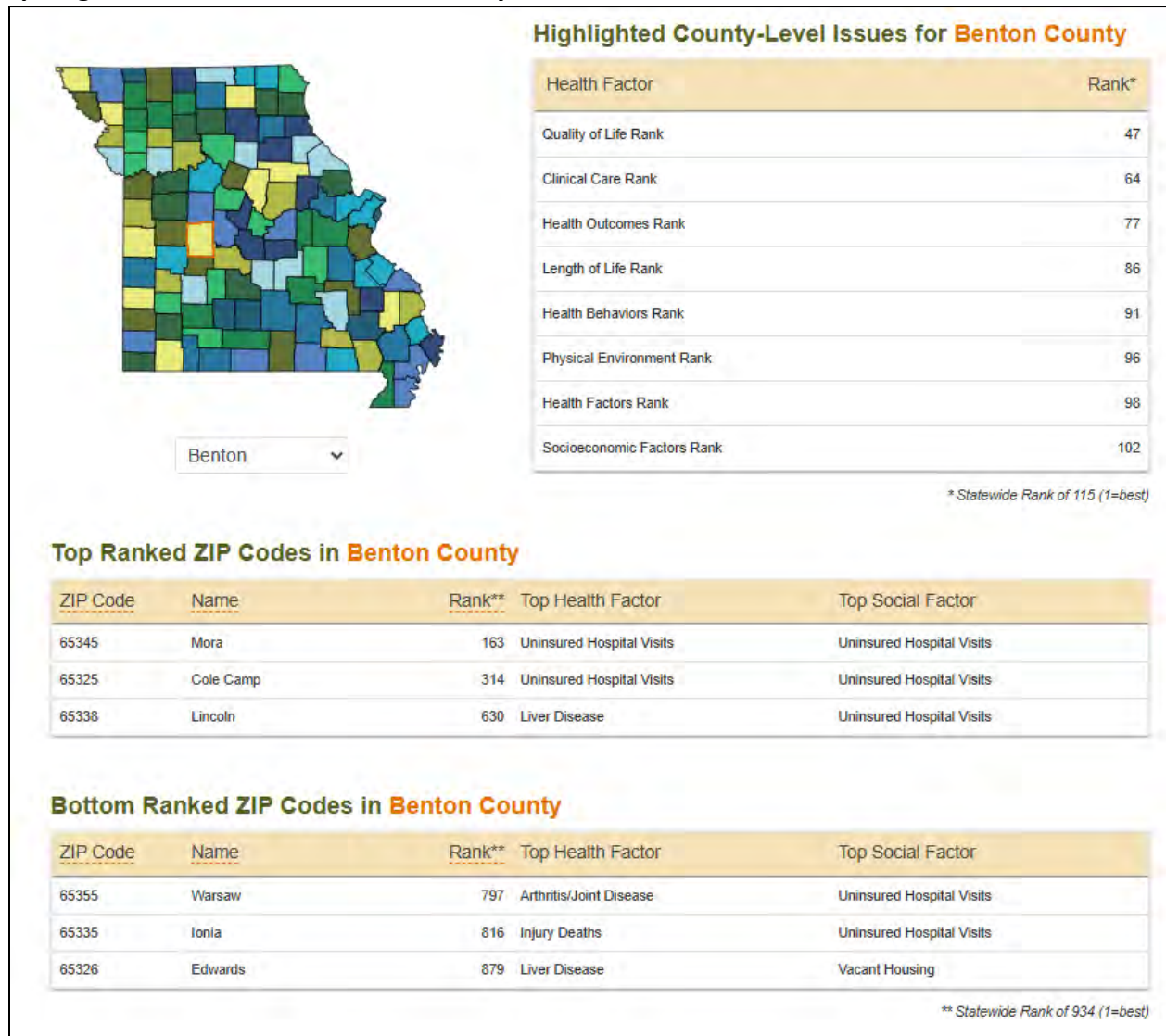
The Spotlight on ZIP Health Rankings report provides a ranking of key county-level issues out of Missouri's 114 counties and the City of St. Louis. It was used to identify the most and least healthy ZIP codes in Pettis and Benton counties. Health outcomes in the subject counties were ranked 34th and 77th out of the 114 total counties and the City of St. Louis. A review of the top and bottom ranked ZIP codes will help Bothwell Regional Health Center strategize the best ways to address the identified health and social factors. 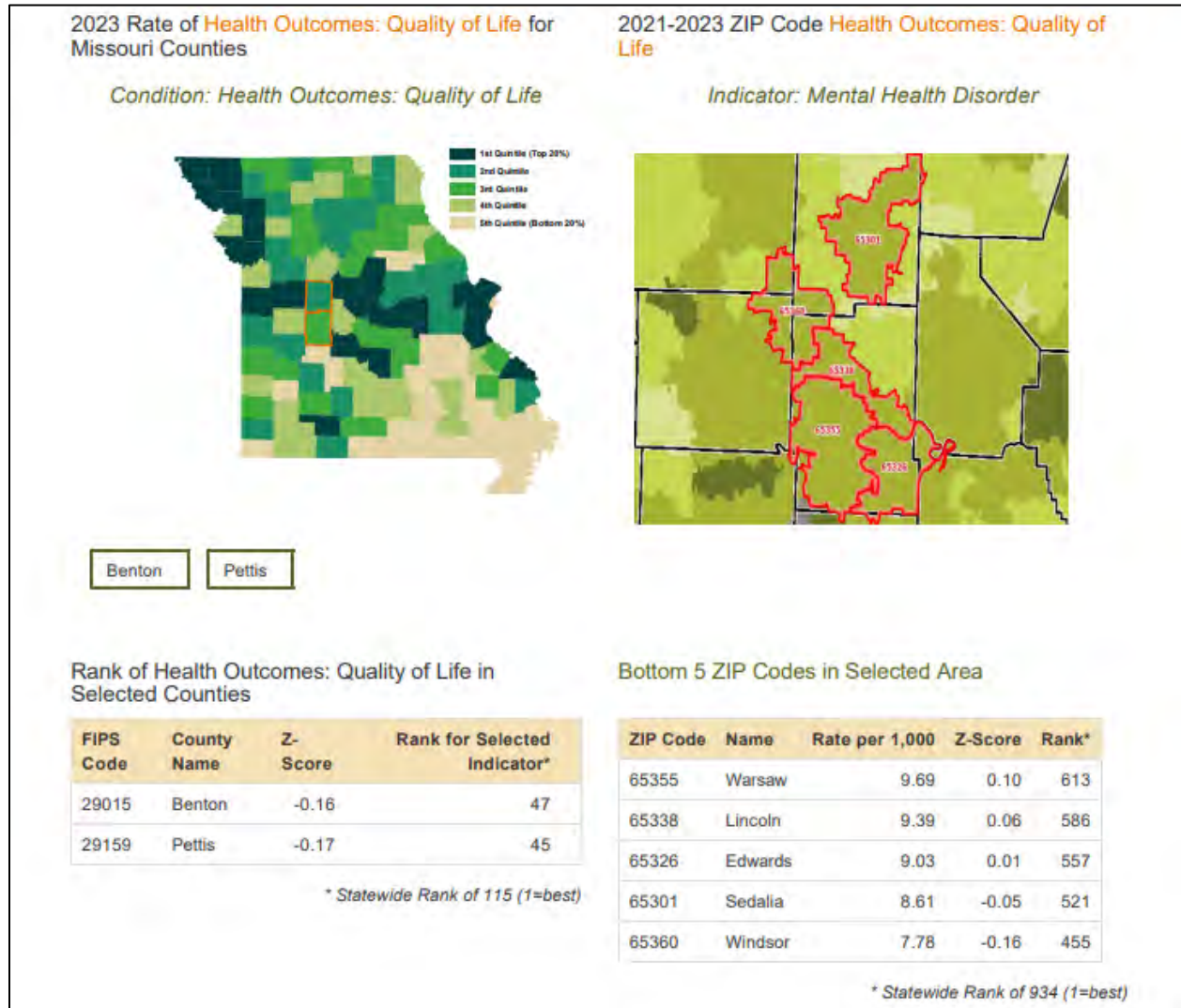
Spotlight on ZIP Health — Benton County

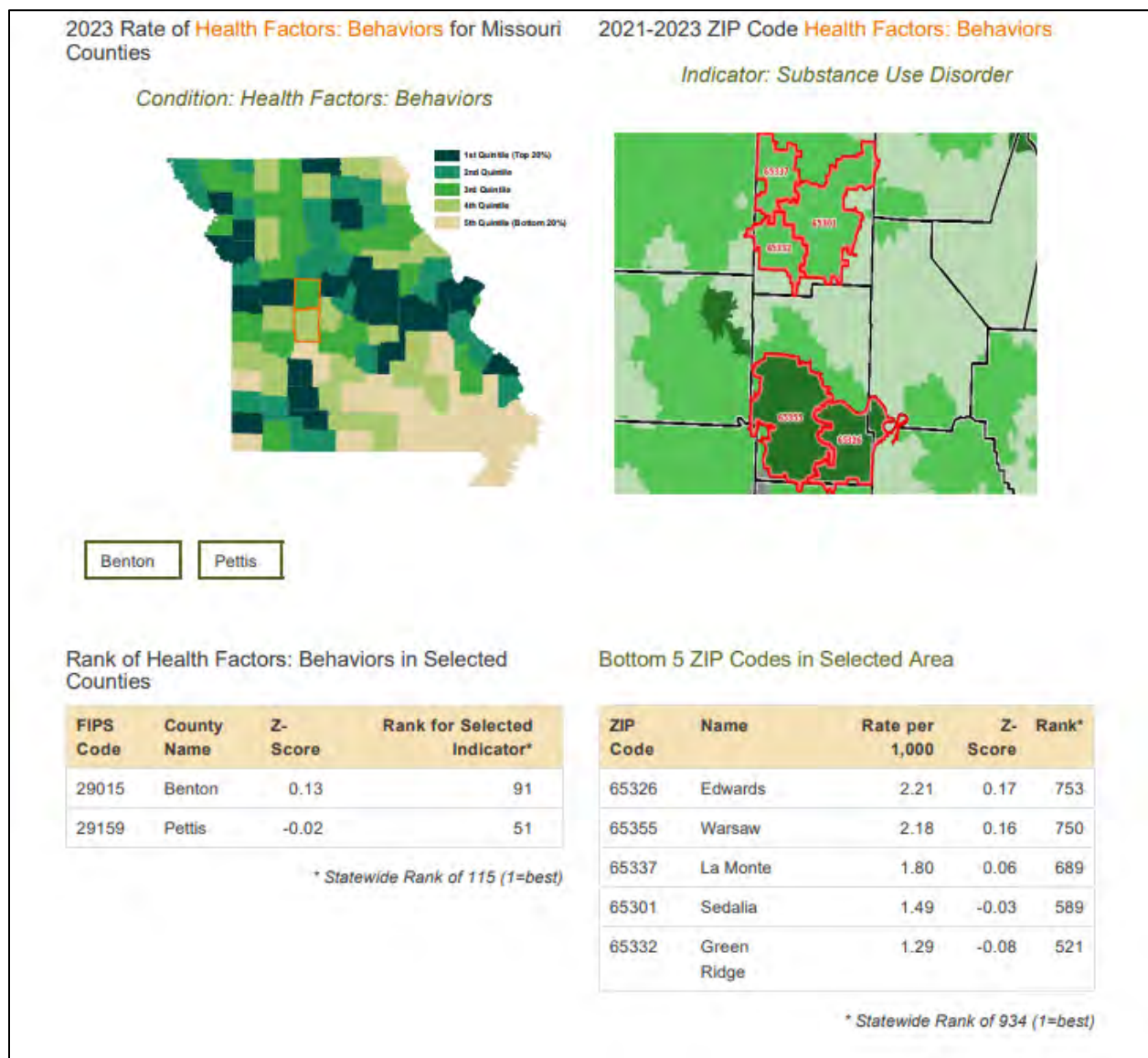

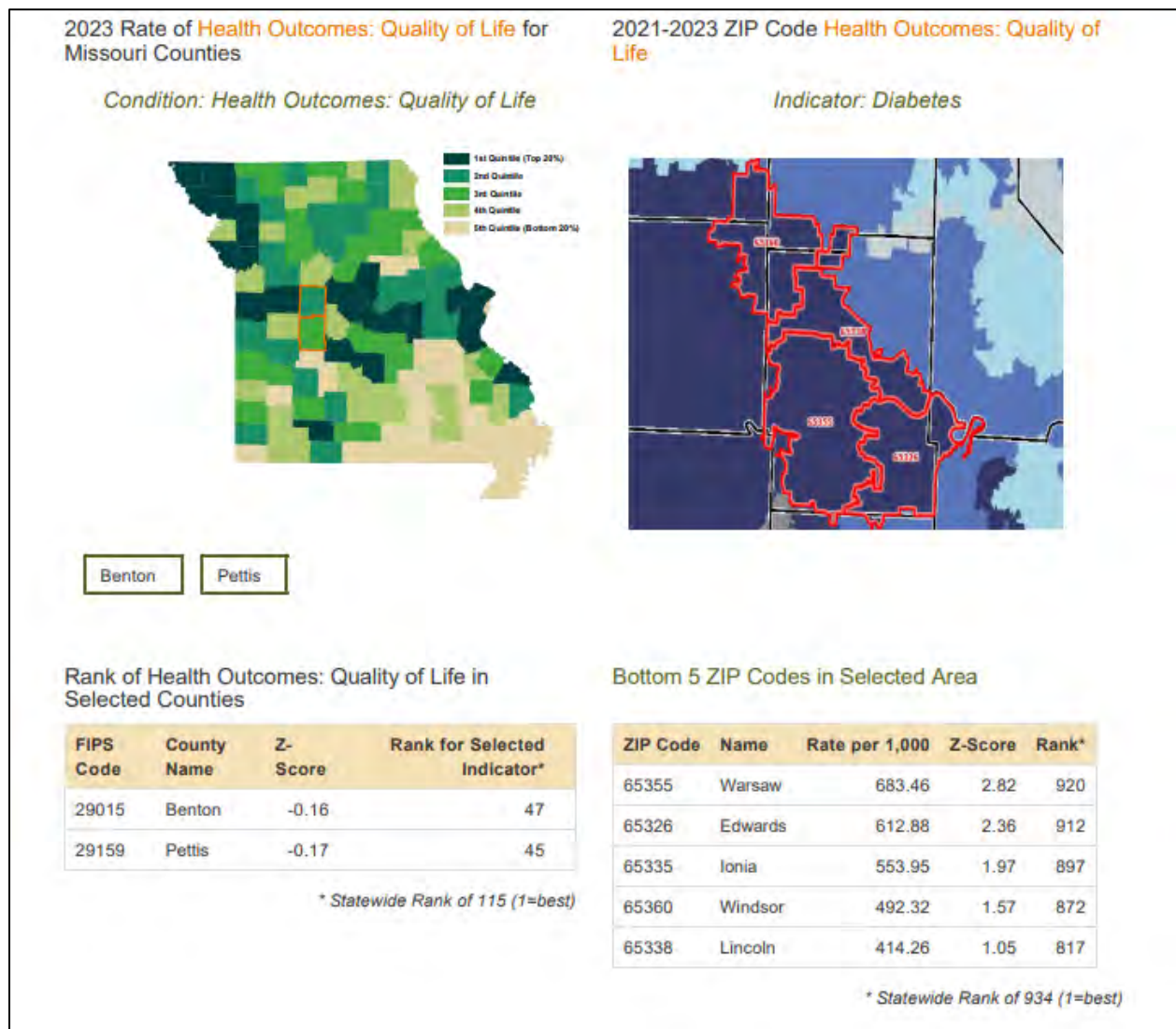

The Chronic Condition Explorer report below shows the bottom ranked ZIP codes for substance use in Pettis and Benton counties.



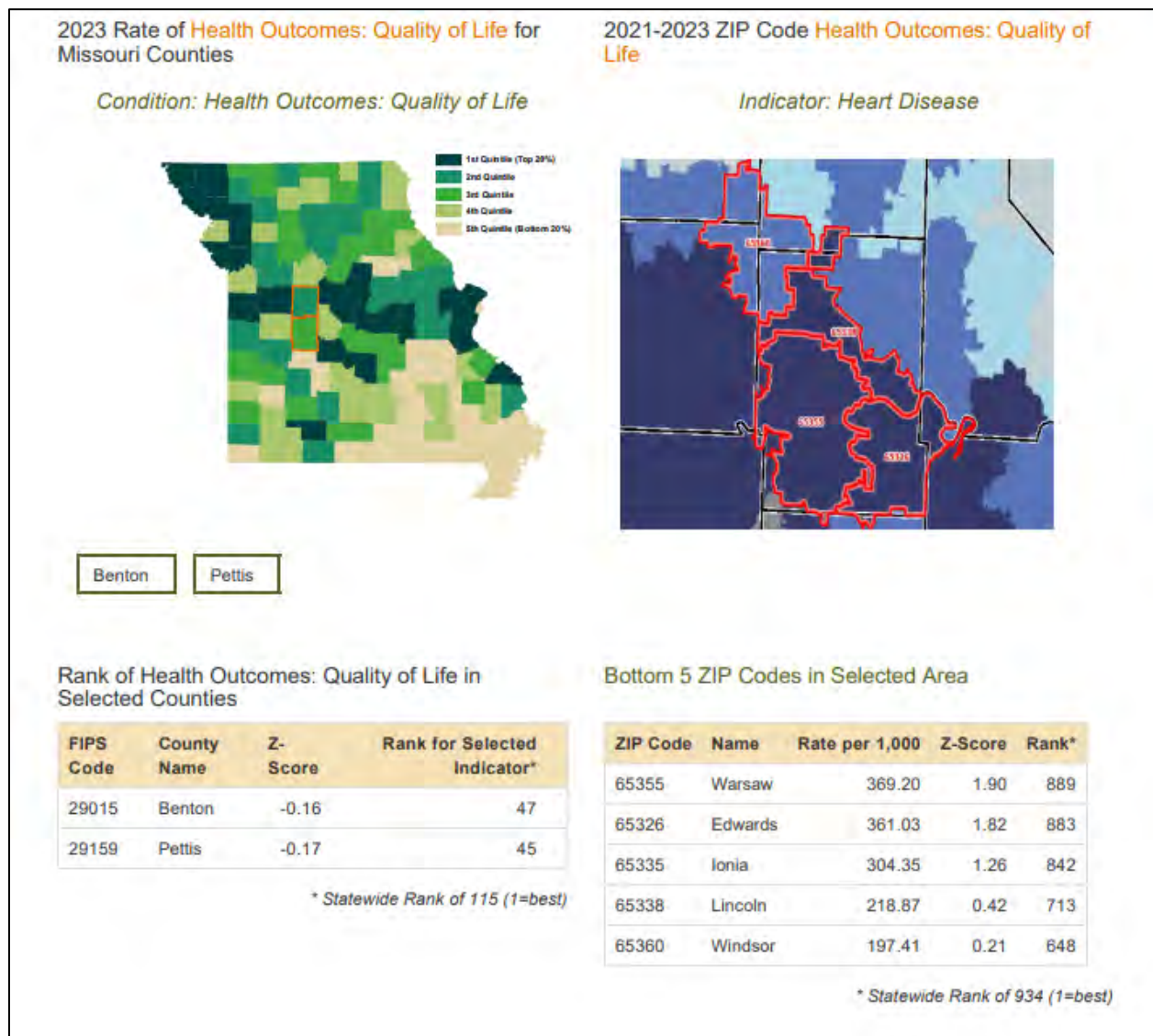

The Chronic Condition Explorer report below shows the bottom ranked ZIP codes for diabetes in Pettis and Benton counties.



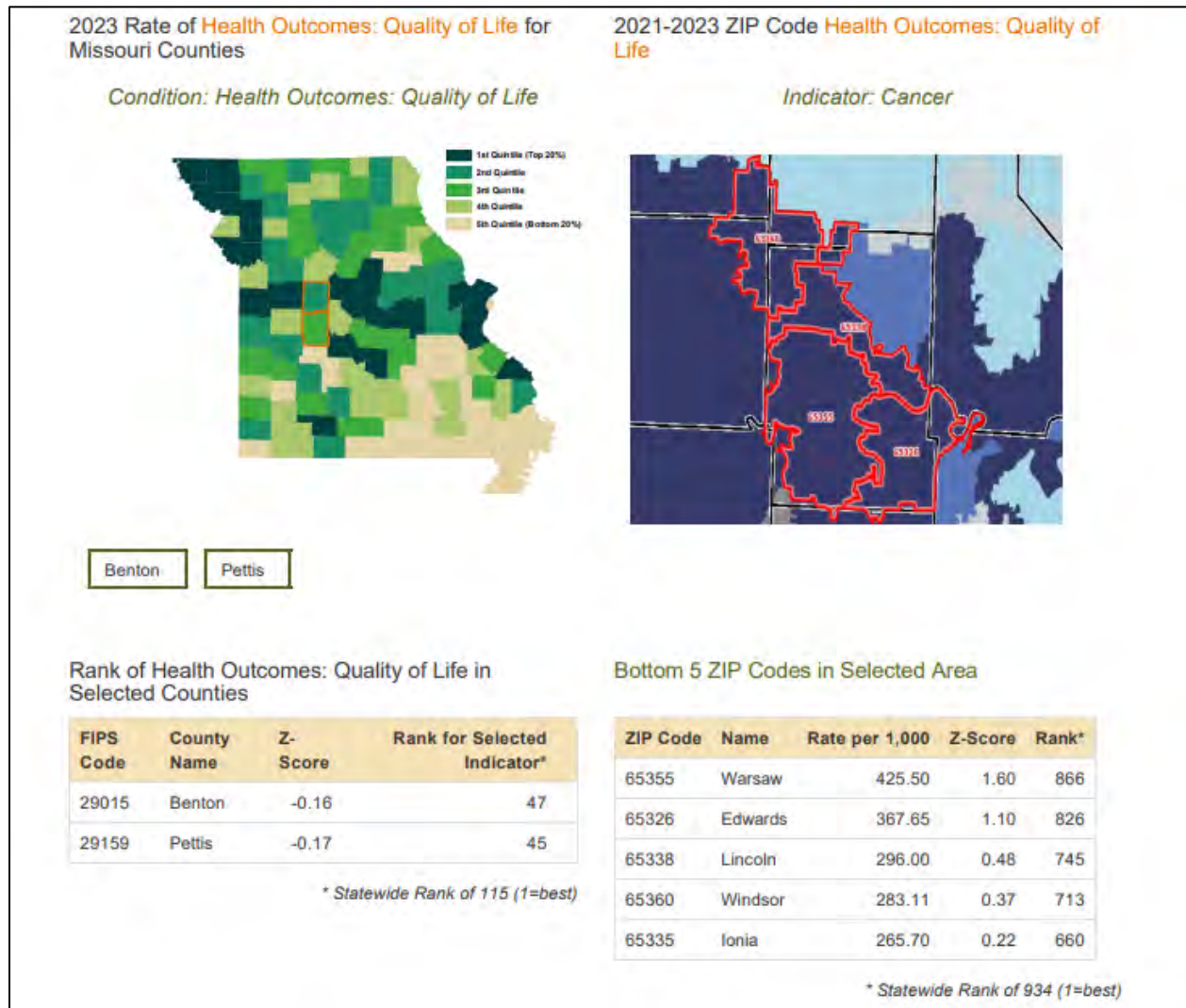

The Chronic Condition Explorer report below shows the bottom ranked ZIP codes for heart disease in Pettis and Benton counties.



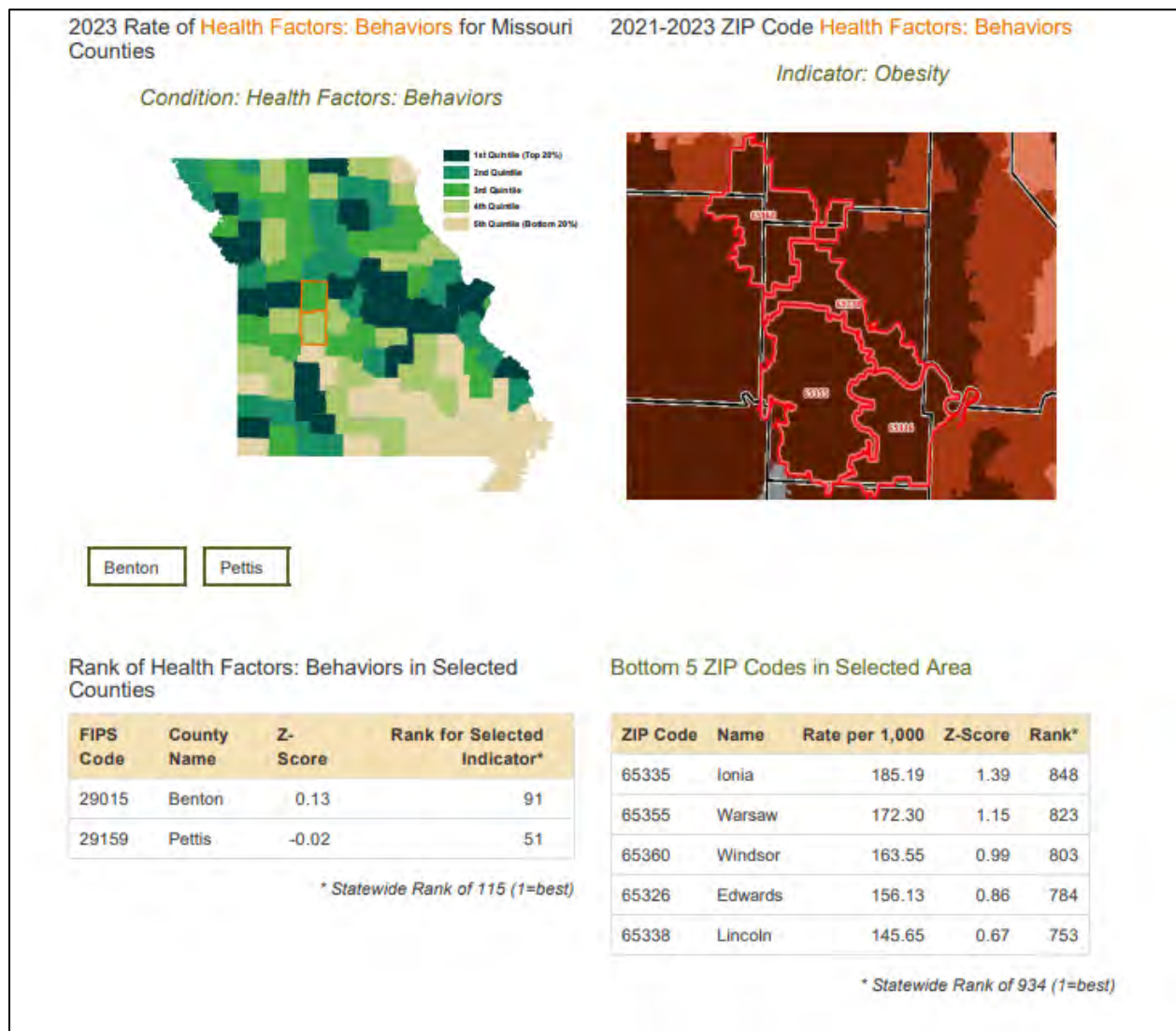

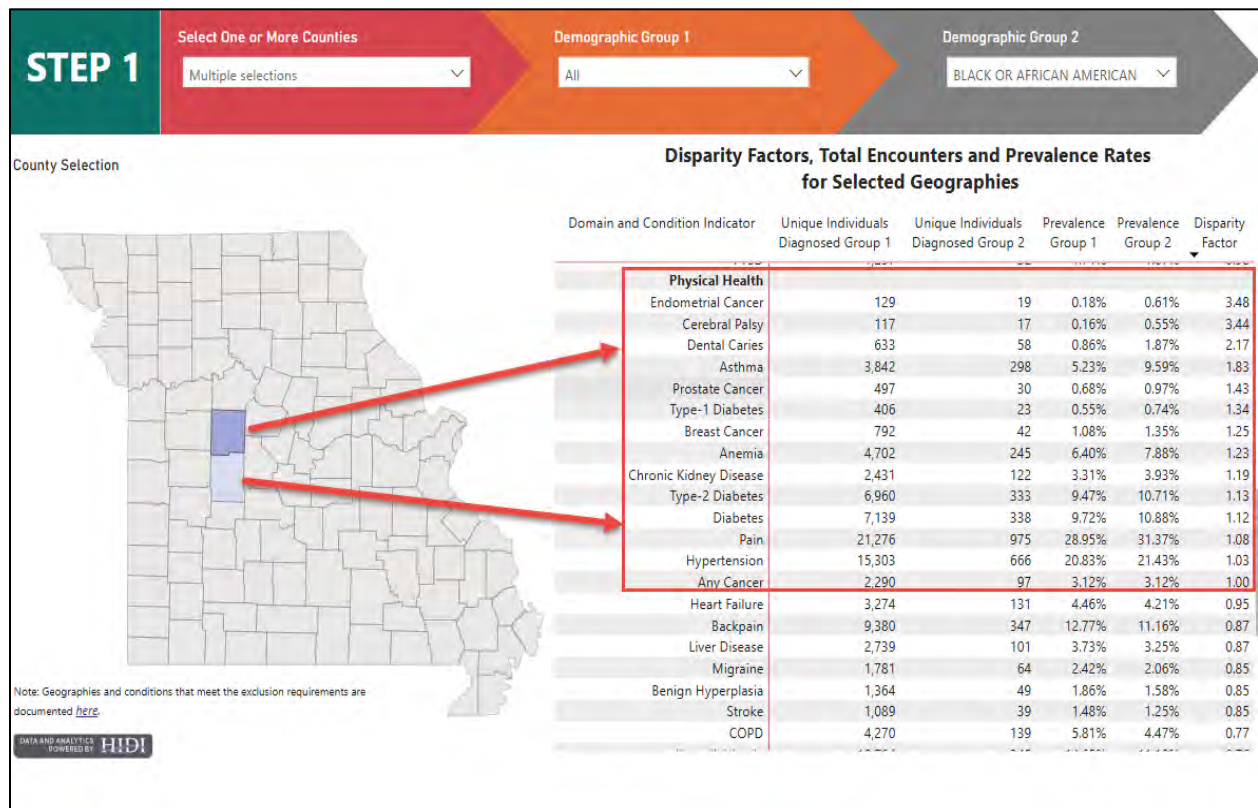

Recommendations

Identifying specific populations and specific health factors and outcomes that are influenced by the priority issues will enable Bothwell Regional Health Center and the community at large to focus resources with the needed specificity.

A myriad of strategies may be employed to address these seemingly disparate health issues. For example, work with community-based organizations, partner organizations and providers to educate on the prevalence of the priority issues identified. For instance, community health workers may assist individuals with complex health conditions navigate the health care system. On the same note, they may advocate for and liaise between their patients and a variety of health care and human services organizations, making them valuable in care coordination and transition.

Although implementation may be broad, focused implementation and evaluation must target specific populations or organizations to determine the effect. Health status and health outcomes will not change notably within a three-year period across a community. However, health outcomes such as preventable hospitalizations for short-term complications of the priority health issues may suggest improved access and care coordination within primary care settings.

Here are some important considerations to keep in mind when implementing priorities in different settings.

Community-Based Settings — This multifaceted approach focuses on strategies and activities to create change in the knowledge, attitudes, beliefs and skills that impact health. It is geared toward individuals and families, with the ultimate goal of making changes to organizational and environmental factors that impact health.

School-Based Settings — Prevention and interventions are aimed at helping students, parents, teachers and administrators prevent and manage chronic illnesses by providing programs, policies and environments that support healthy lifestyles.

Worksite-Based Settings — This group targets employees who spend most of their time away from home. Creating the necessary infrastructure to enable healthy diets and lifestyles is critical in helping prevent or manage many chronic illnesses.

Faith-Based Settings — Some communities believe that information delivered from the pulpit is more truthful, especially if delivered by their leaders, as opposed to information coming from other sources. This is an important consideration to make when implementing initiatives, as this can result in the difference between success and failure.

Health Care Facility-Based Settings — This initiative typically occurs in a health care or public health setting, such as a doctor's office, hospital or local public health agency.

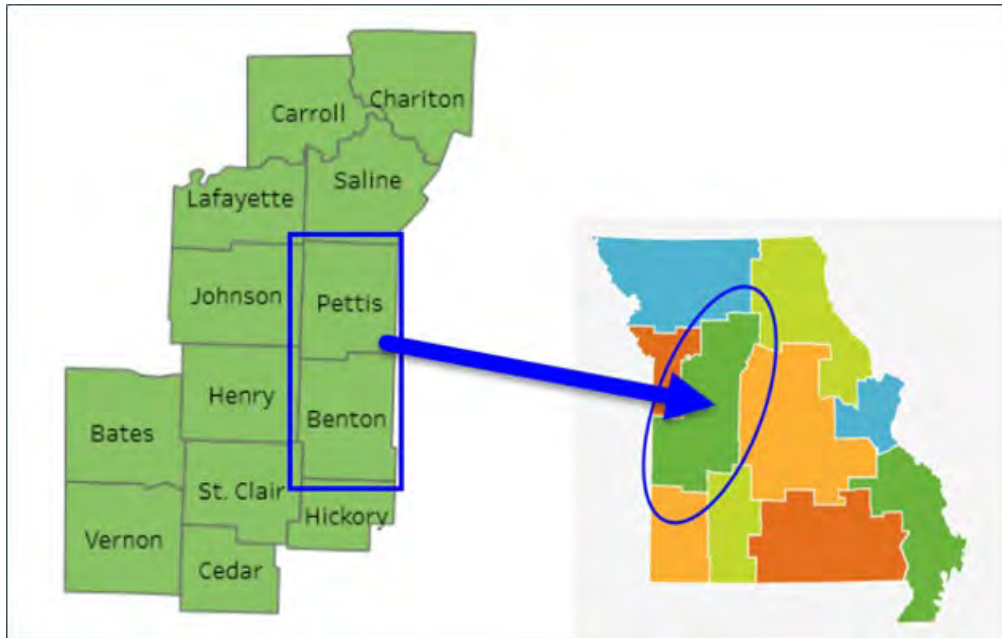
Home-Based Settings — The home-based approach involves entire families to prevent and manage chronic illnesses, forming the basis for much needed social support for disease prevention and management.

Identifying partners already engaged in addressing the priority issues, including forming workgroups to strategize on ways to move forward, is an important first step in this process. Lessons learned from such workgroups will help the hospital, health department and partners decide the course of action during the next three years of their implementation strategy. Using the power of new innovative data platforms like [exploreMOhealth](#) and the MHA [Health Equity Dashboards](#) will help BRHC and partners identify the prevalence of diseases at the ZIP-code level while highlighting the disparities that may need attention. This level of specificity and granularity will help the hospital target interventions with the needed precision. It will also help target the scarce resources where they are needed most, thus taking the necessary steps in promoting health equity. Recognizing the medical and non-medical factors of health as identified by the survey, focus group discussion and secondary data will assist the care teams customize each patient's unique needs. Meeting people where they are in their journey will ensure that all the residents of Pettis and Benton counties will have an equal chance of living a healthy lifestyle irrespective of their geographic location as defined by census tract or ZIP code.

Occupations by Projected Growth

According to the Missouri Economic Research and Information Center regions, Pettis and Benton counties, which comprise the primary service area of Bothwell Regional Health Center, are in the West-Central Region. It is comprised of 13 counties, with its largest cities being Sedalia and Warrensburg. The region's top industries are health care, social assistance, and manufacturing. The University of Central Missouri is a large government employer in this region. Some of the largest private employers in the West Central Region are Walmart, Tyson Poultry, and ConAgra Foods. In 2023, per capita personal income of the region was \$49,271 and estimated population was 282,658. The average annual wage for all occupations in the West Central Region in 2023 was **\$47,419**.

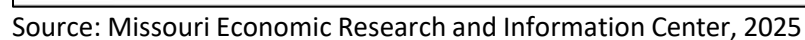
The table that follows shows that the health care and social assistance industry is the largest employing industry in the region with over 16,500 jobs. Manufacturing and Retail Trade are the next largest industries in the area, with over 13,200 and 11,000 jobs in 2023. Retail trade; manufacturing; health care and social assistance; accommodation and food services; educational services; construction; and professional, scientific, and technical services had employment gains from 2019 to 2023.

According to the April 2024 [unemployment report](#) published by the Missouri Economic Research and Information Center, Pettis and Benton counties have unemployment rates of 3.3% and 4.7% respectively.



Primary Research Process

Survey Layout and Methodology

The Community Health Needs Assessment Survey was a questionnaire-style survey based on a template provided by the Missouri Hospital Association. The 30-question survey contained three sections: (1) health behaviors, (2) medical care and services, and (3) demographics. With one exception, all were multiple-choice questions. One open-ended question, “What health or community services should Bothwell Regional Health Center provide that are currently not available?” was used to identify gaps in services. The demographic section was placed at the end of the survey to head off any barriers respondents may have felt when answering questions about income, age and insurance status.

Methodology

The survey was available online at brhc.org/health-survey, and paper copies were widely distributed throughout Pettis and Benton counties. The survey period was December 1, 2024 - January 7, 2025. To incentivize participation, respondents were entered into a drawing for a \$100 Visa gift card. The goal was to collect enough completed surveys to be statistically significant for the combined population of both counties (approximately 64,000) with a 5% margin of error. A total of 526 surveys were completed. Paper surveys were entered into the same online survey service used to collect online responses to easily analyze results. The survey was translated into Spanish and Russian; paper copies were provided upon request.

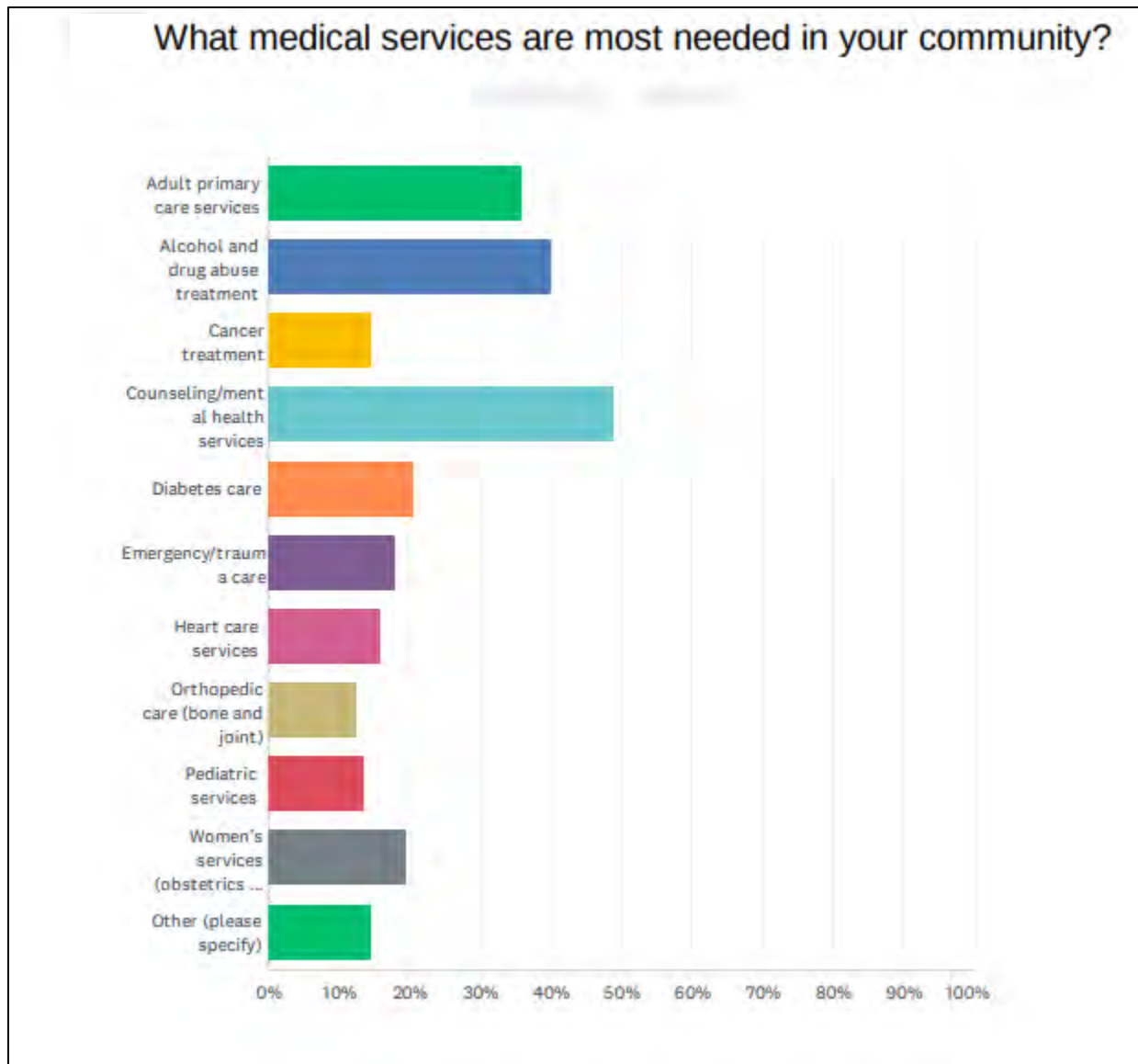

Summary of Key Findings

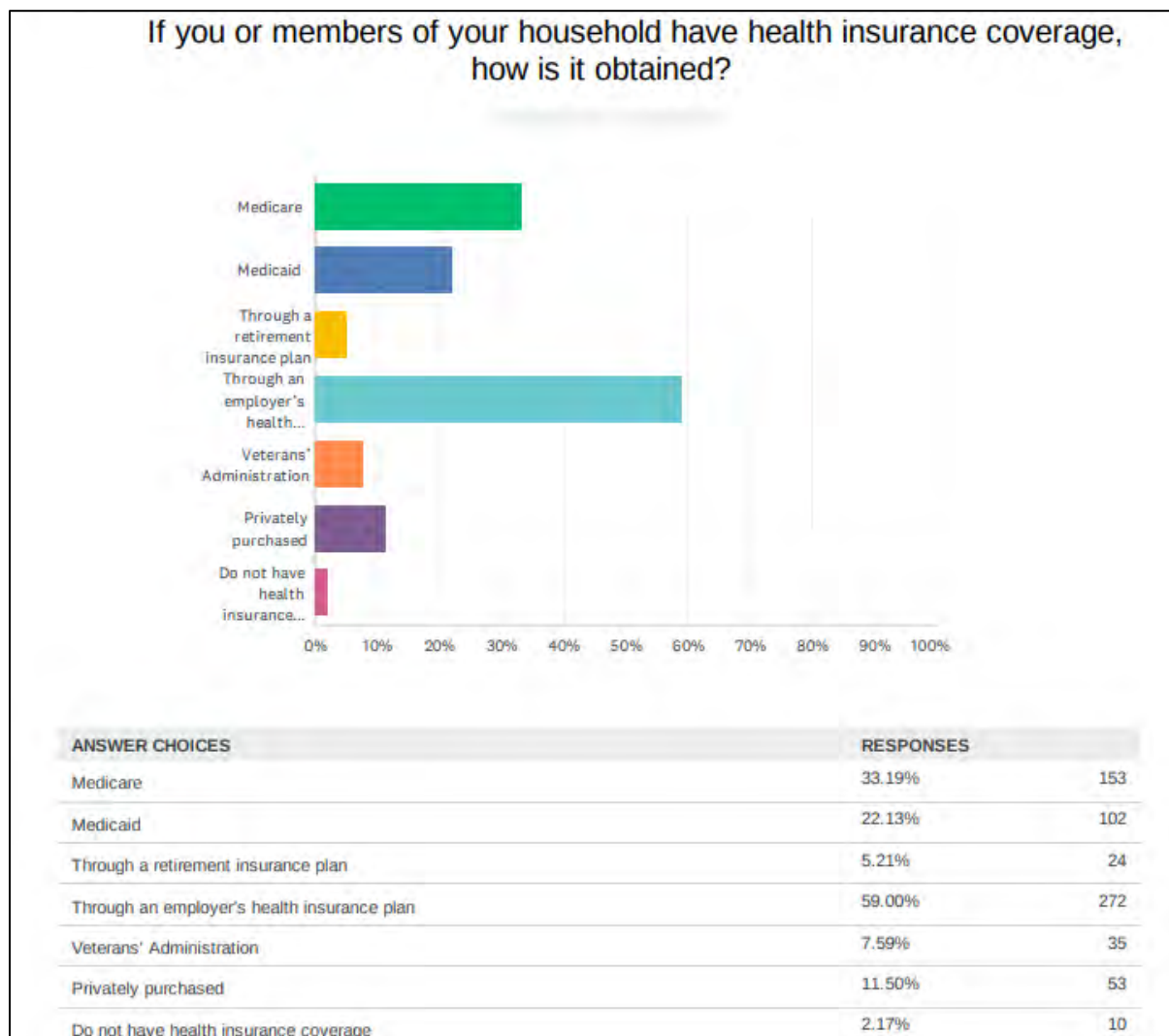
Key findings from the 2024 CHNA survey revealed that of the 462 surveys completed, about 89% of the respondents were female compared to 11% male. The mean household income for the survey respondents was over \$50,000. Most survey respondents were homeowners. Primary data are an important part of a community health needs assessment. These data can fill in gaps in secondary data sources, highlight critical issues or concerns, and provide opportunities for community members to actively engage in the community health assessment process.

The table that follows on the next page shows the percent of respondents indicating the medical services most needed in the community. Counseling/mental health services top the list followed by alcohol and drug use treatment, and adult primary care services respectively.



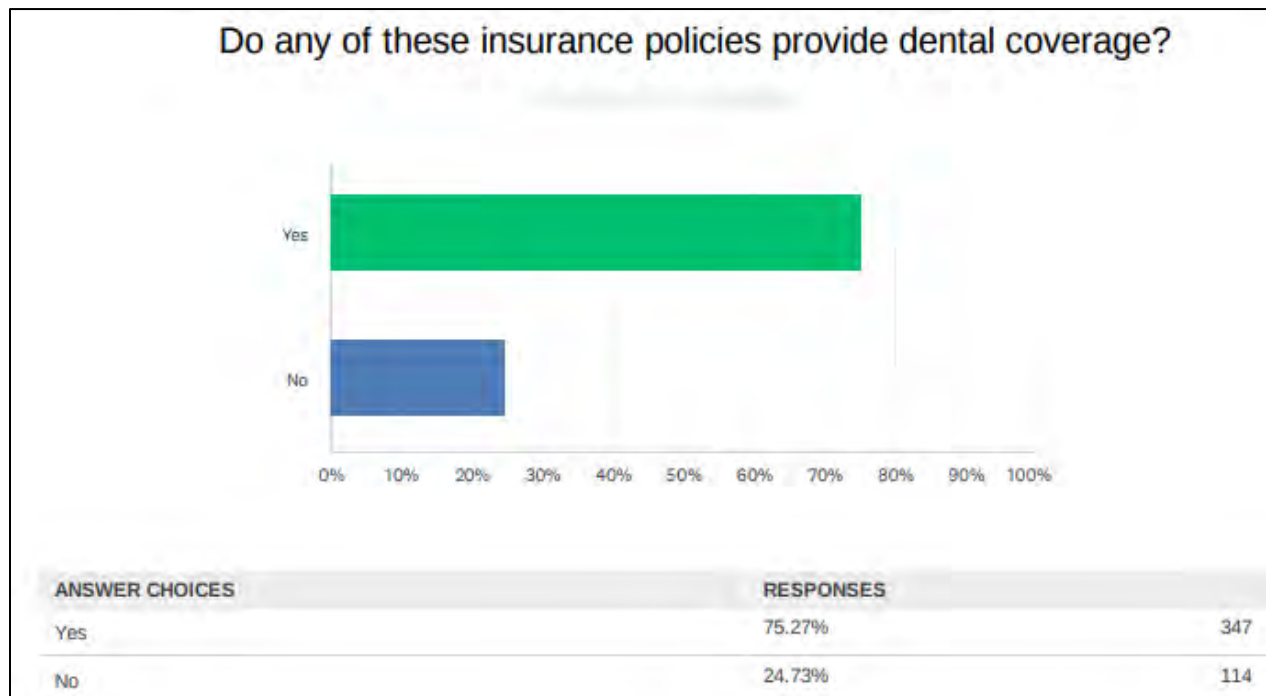

When asked about their insurance coverage status a majority indicated through their employer's health plan, followed by Medicare and then Medicaid respectively.



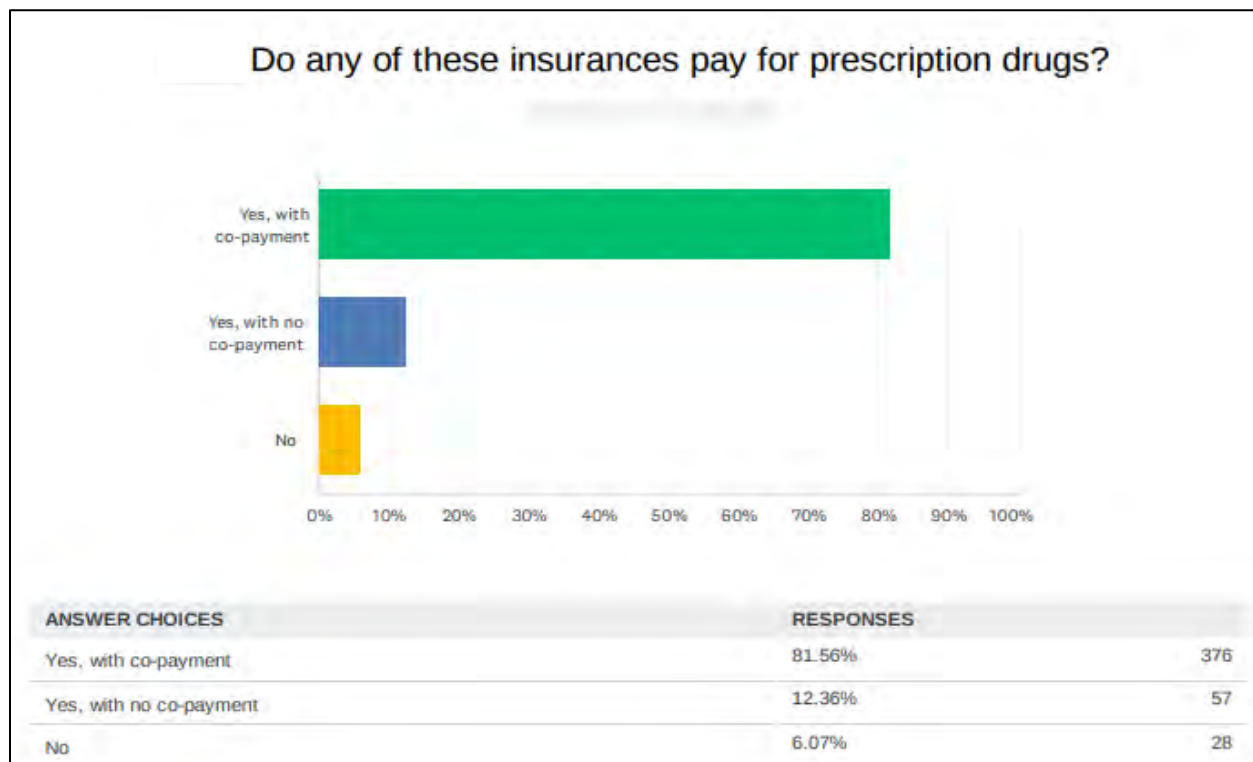

The graph below shows that most survey respondents indicated their insurance policies provide dental coverage.



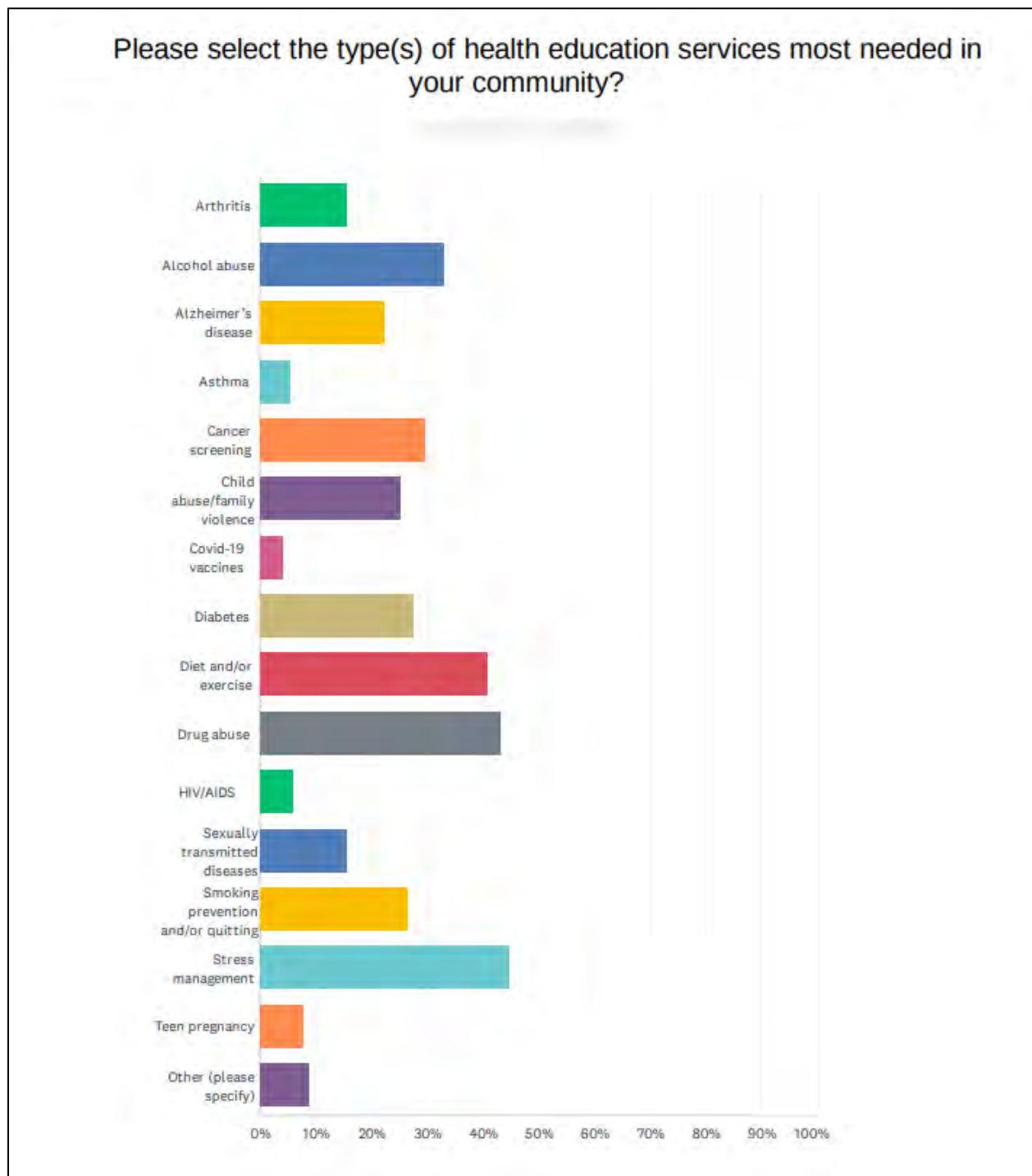

Survey respondents indicated the top three areas where health education services are needed the most in their community are stress management, drug use, and diet and/or exercise.



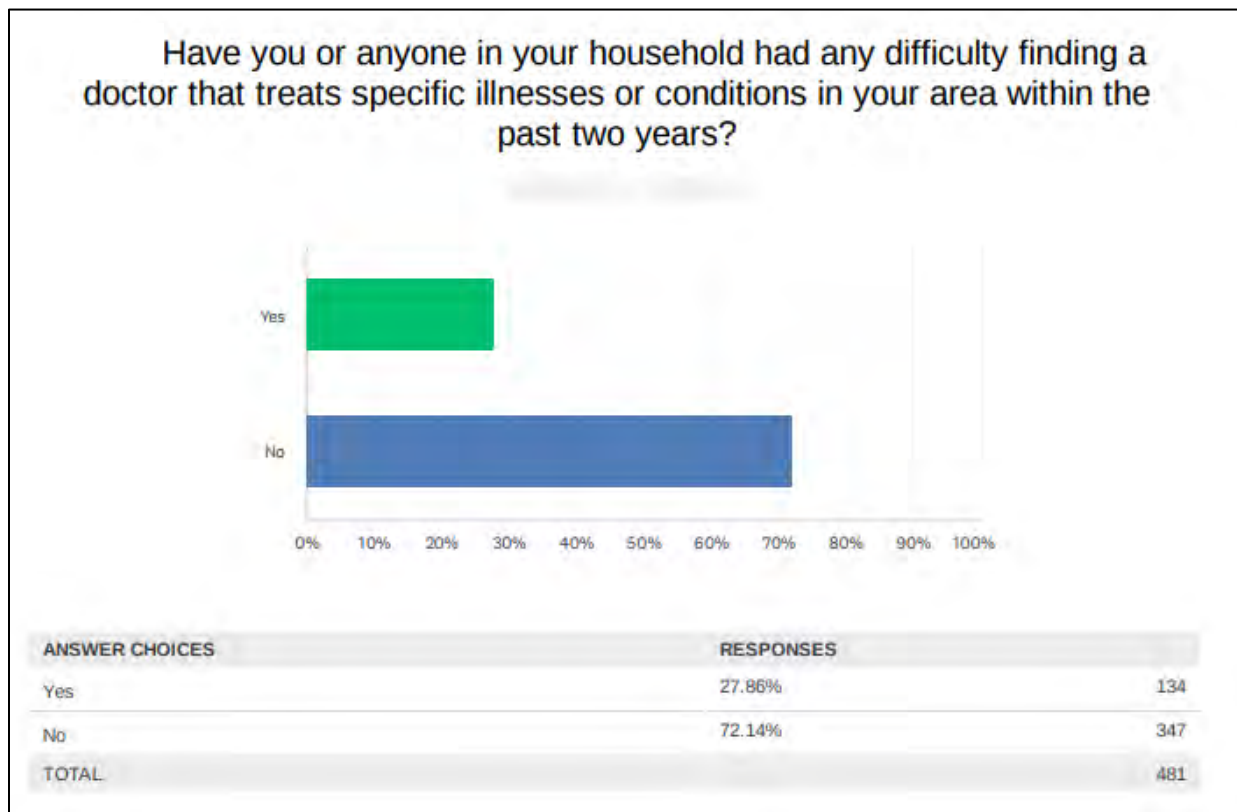

Approximately 28% of survey respondents reported someone in their household had trouble finding a doctor that treats specific illnesses in the past two years; 72% answered no. Further review of the results revealed the top three specialties respondents found difficult locating were in the fields of skin/dermatology, mental health and women’s health.



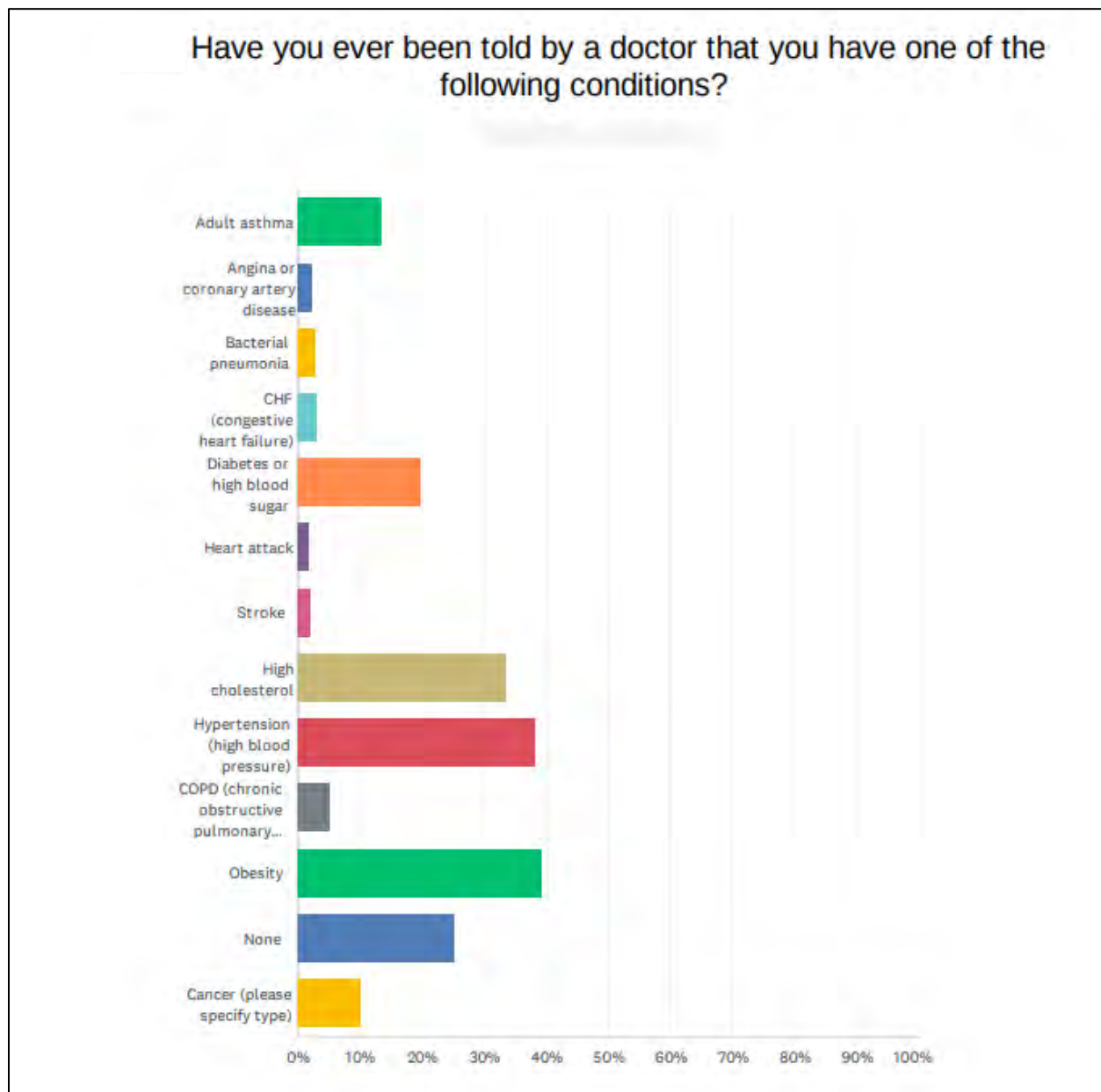

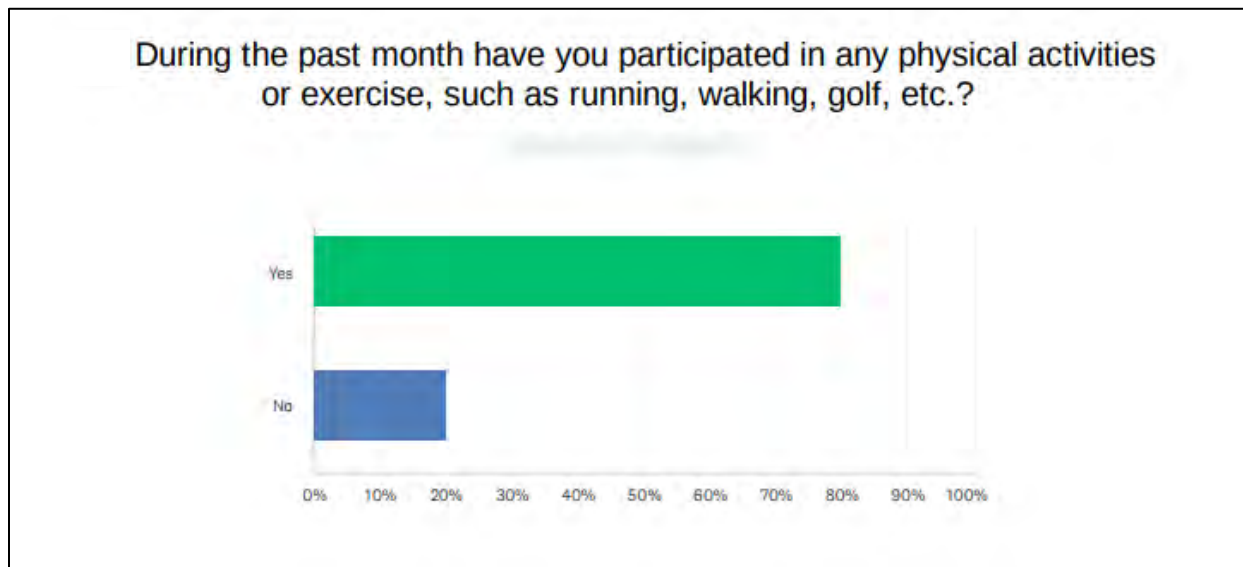

The survey results were incorporated into the focus group presentation to help community members understand the survey respondents' perspectives.

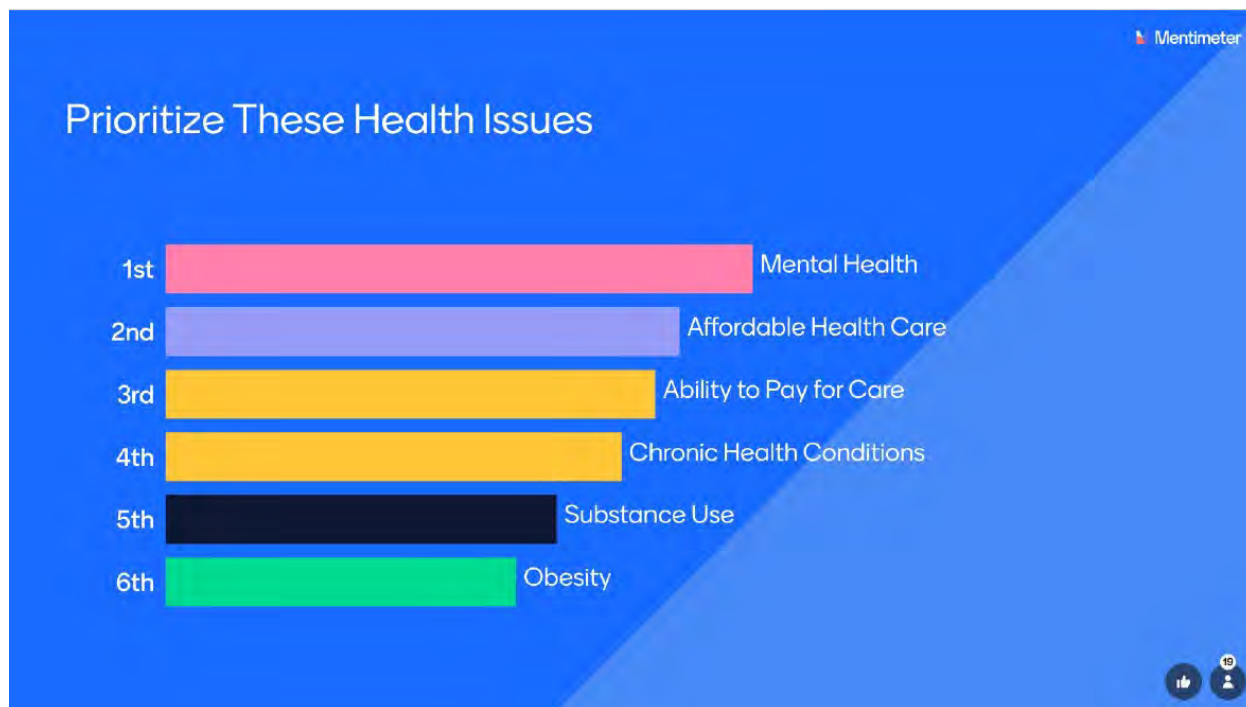
2025 Focus Group Summary

As part of the Community Health Needs Assessment, two focus groups were held — one in Sedalia in Pettis County and one in Warsaw in Benton County — to gather insights on health information and perceptions from a variety of people in each community. Focus groups were carved into smaller groups to facilitate deeper discussion. Participants were asked to prioritize health issues that surfaced from the survey and secondary data and then to discuss what is **getting in the way of making progress** on important health issues and **what role Bothwell should play** in addressing issues. Detailed summaries from each focus group are included below.

PETTIS COUNTY

Pettis County focus group members were invited to participate based on their organization's role in the community, with a particular focus on health care. Health care and leadership members represented Bothwell Regional Health Center, Katy Trail Community Health and Pettis County Health Center. In addition to health care representatives, the group included participants from State Fair Community College, community-based organizations, area nursing homes and active community members.

After hearing an overview presentation from CEO Lori Wightman, participants were asked to use an online interactive tool to rank order the health issues that were identified as key themes from the survey and secondary data. Out of six issues, obesity, chronic health conditions, mental health, affordable health care, substance use and ability to pay for care, participants ranked **mental health** as the most important issue, followed by **affordable health care** (defined as expenses incurred by providers and payers for delivering services), and the **ability to pay for care** (defined as the patient's financial capacity to cover health care costs).

Armed with these top three priorities, participants took to four groups and then each group reported what is getting in the way of progress and Bothwell's role in making changes or improvements.

Mental Health

Social stigma still exists that keeps people from either admitting they need help or seeking care. Several noted that most funding is allocated to severe mental health cases, leaving a gap in preventative and early-stage care.

Participants commented there is a lack of and in some cases an imbalance of mental health providers in the area and that patients often need to be transported or travel elsewhere for treatment. While there are telehealth psychiatrists available, many people dislike telehealth services, and in-person visits have long wait times of two months or more.

In addition to access, other barriers to getting care include transportation and financial challenges (ability to pay, lack of adequate insurance), as well as a general lack of knowledge and education of how to access resources and navigate complex health care and insurance systems.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Expand Community-Based Services

- Establish community paramedics to provide in-home care
- Implement home visiting programs to identify mental health stressors early
- Increase screenings for mental health, including at local employers
- Expand full-time social workers, therapists and counselors in satellite offices like ToRCH

Increase Access to Care

- Recruit nurse practitioners (NPs) and mental health providers
- Offer more education and resources to help residents navigate services
- Provide follow-up care after referrals
- Improve payment options, e.g., 0% interest loan programs

Advocate for Policy and Funding

- Support state-level reform for better insurance policies, e.g., HB618
- Partner with educational institutions to grow the local mental health workforce
- Help the community advocate for legislative changes
- Develop a sustainable community mental health model using cost-effective tools

Strengthen Partnerships

- Work with existing health care organizations and community resources to improve access
- Partner with employers to provide mental health education
- Collaborate with insurance companies to improve coverage and affordability

Affordable Health Care

Many people in the county cannot afford basic health care due to high costs and even those with insurance struggle with deductibles, copayments and out-of-pocket expenses. Without affordable access many people avoid preventative care until conditions worsen. In addition, many insurance companies deny claims or have long approval processes that delay or adversely impact care. In some cases, specialists do not accept insurance and require cash payments.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Expand Affordable Care Options

- Increase the number of nurse practitioners (NPs) and community health workers
- Provide more accessible primary and urgent care services

Improve Access and Education

- Offer more financial counseling to help patients navigate cost barriers
- Educate residents on how to access affordable care and insurance options

Strengthen Legislative and Policy Advocacy

- Advocate for statewide reforms to improve insurance approval processes
- Help push for laws that reduce prior authorization burdens

Increase Community Partnerships

- Work with local employers and organizations to improve affordable health care access
- Partner with legislators to push for cost-reducing policies
- Develop models to pool resources and reduce costs for community members

Ability to Pay for Care

As a rural community, many residents face low wages coupled with high costs. Many jobs are low paying, making it difficult to afford health care. It was especially noted that the cost of childcare is high, which creates additional financial strain on families. There also are many people without insurance, which can delay care and lead to chronic health issues. Even those with insurance may have high deductibles and out-of-pocket expenses that sometimes force them to choose between medical care and other basic needs.

There also is a lack of understanding of available payment options or financial assistance programs that could mitigate some of these barriers. Bothwell administrators noted that uncompensated care (bad debt and charity care) is a growing problem for all health care providers.

External forces affecting the ability to pay include big pharmaceutical pricing structures and fluctuating prescription costs that make budgeting difficult.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Expand Financial Assistance and Payment Options

- Increase education on available payment plans and assistance programs
- Promote 0% interest medical loans — many people don't know they exist
- Ensure financial support programs are easy to understand and access

Improve Awareness of Available Resources

- Provide clear guidance on navigating insurance and affordability issues
- Offer patient education programs to help people understand coverage and payment options

Advocate for Policy and Funding

- Engage in state-level advocacy to address affordability barriers
- Support legislation like HB618, which aims to improve prior authorization processes and limit insurance denials

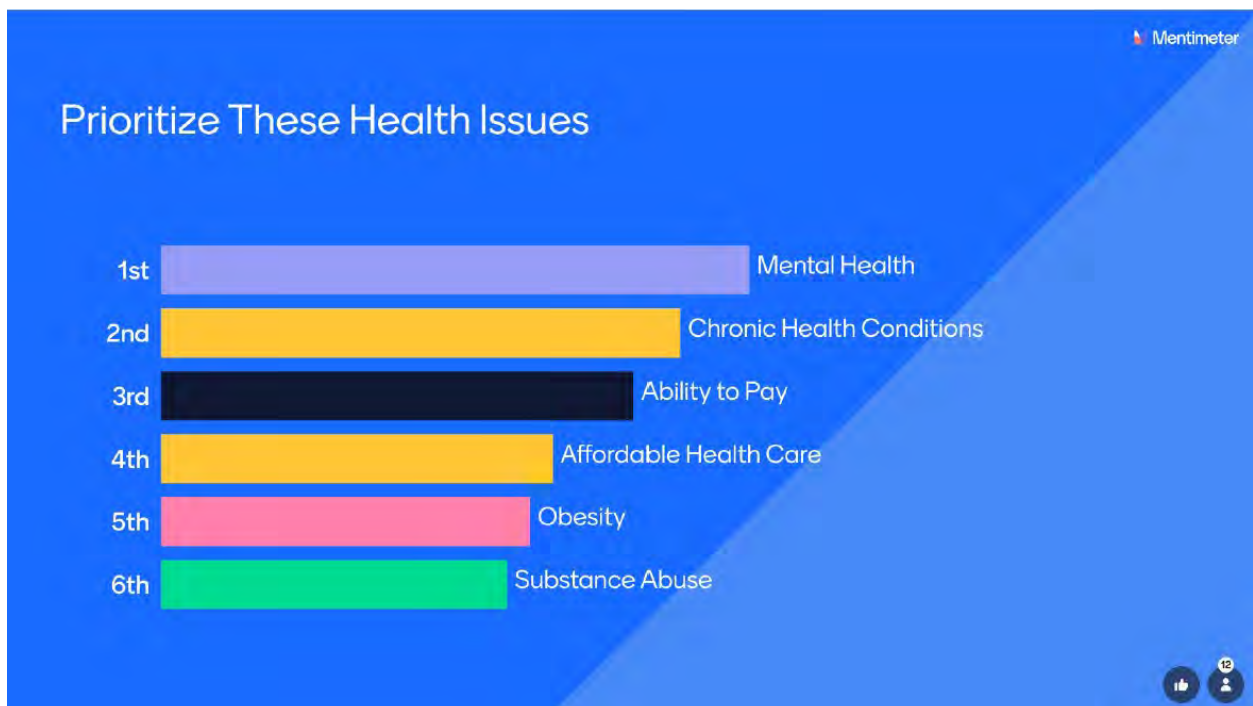
Key Takeaways

- **Affordability is a major concern**, affecting both mental and physical health care.

BENTON COUNTY

Benton County focus group members were invited to participate based on their organization's role in the community, with a particular focus on health care. Health care and leadership members represented Bothwell Regional Health Center and Katy Trail Community Health.

After hearing an overview presentation from CEO Lori Wightman, participants were asked to use an online interactive tool to rank order the health issues that were identified as key themes from the survey and secondary data. Out of six issues, obesity, chronic health conditions, mental health, affordable health care, substance use and ability to pay for care, participants ranked **mental health** as the most important issue, followed by **chronic health conditions** and the **ability to pay for care** (defined as the patient's financial capacity to cover health care costs).

Armed with these top three priorities, participants took to two groups and then each group reported what is getting in the way of progress and Bothwell's role in making changes or improvements.

Mental Health

Participants noted that there are not enough mental health providers and counselors in the area, and there is limited funding for medications, which make it difficult for patients to stay on treatments. Current school-based services are reactive, not proactive.

The group agreed that mental health education should start at a younger age so people have better coping skills and resource knowledge before a crisis happens, and that while there is some conceptual learning happening, social media as a source may not be the best and most accurate trusted source.

As in the Pettis County discussion, participants agreed other barriers to progress include an ongoing stigma about mental health and transportation to services.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Expand Mental Health Services

- Hire or partner with additional mental health providers
- Offer more telehealth options to improve accessibility

Increase Mental Health Education and Resources

- Work with schools to provide proactive mental health education and coping skills
- Improve public education campaigns about mental health resources
- Provide access to trusted mental health information to counter misinformation from social media

Improve Access to Services

- Consider an alternative mental health provider partnership instead of Burrell
- Explore ways to increase medication affordability

Chronic Health Conditions (*heart disease, diabetes, cancer, arthritis/joint disease*)

Participants shared that with multi-generational families in the area, there's a challenge in breaking the generational cycle of poor health choices that create and contribute to chronic conditions. There also is a lack of education on the causes and effects of eating poorly, not exercising regularly and not taking preventative health measures that can stave off long-term health issues. The ability to pay also directly impacts chronic disease management. People delay or avoid care due to the cost, and many adults avoid physician visits altogether, leading to late-stage diagnoses. Transportation, low wages and job availability all restrict health care access.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Increase Preventative Education

- Work with schools to implement early education on health habits
- Improve community-wide education on chronic disease prevention

Enhance Follow-Up and Patient Engagement

- Develop a system for consistent follow-ups with chronic disease patients
- Engage with patients on the importance of wellness visits and early screenings

Expand Accessibility and Economic Support

- Explore transportation solutions to help patients reach care
- Increase awareness of insurance and Medicaid enrollment assistance
- Consider expanding ToRCH services into Benton County

Ability to Pay for Health Care

Many people in Benton County cannot afford basic health care due to low wages, and limited job opportunities make it difficult for residents to improve their financial situation. There also is a lack of awareness and education of available resources to help pay for health care including no- or low-interest loan programs and state insurance. It was noted that the application process for Medicaid can be daunting so help with enrollment is also needed. A lack of adequate transportation and internet services, some vaccine hesitancy and lack of preventative care also are impacting community health outcomes.

What Role Should Bothwell Play?

Increase Financial Assistance Awareness

- Advertise interest-free loan programs for health care costs
- Promote counselors who help with Medicaid and marketplace insurance enrollment
- Increase education on available financial resources

Support Economic and Job Growth

- Advocate for economic development efforts to bring better-paying jobs to the county
- Support fiber internet expansion to allow more remote work opportunities

Address Transportation Barriers

- Explore solutions for health care transportation assistance
- Consider outreach programs in community centers to improve access

Key Takeaways

- **Mental health access is severely limited** — Bothwell can help by hiring providers, improving education and finding better partnerships.
- **Chronic health issues are tied to low income and lack of preventative education** — early intervention and follow-up care are critical.
- **Ability to pay is a major factor in all health concerns** — financial assistance programs exist but are underutilized due to lack of awareness.

Secondary Research Process

To meet the CHNA requirements governing secondary data collection, aggregation and analysis, Quality Works used the [exploreMOhealth](#) innovative platform, which pulls data from reliable local, state and national sources. The platform comprises hundreds of measures compiled from over 20 national data sources into health factors and health outcomes domains. It is aimed at groups working to improve population health in Missouri. The intended audiences for this innovative platform are hospitals, public health departments, researchers, grant writers, community action organizations and really any group in this space with an interest in better understanding and improving community health in Missouri at the state, county and ZIP-code levels.

The Z -Score analysis is used on multiple reports in [exploreMOhealth](#). This score represents a standardized measure of the number of standard deviations each rate lies from the mean. Positive values indicate a higher-than-average rate for the ZIP code, while negative values indicate a lower-than-average rate. A comprehensive overview of the methodology and data used for the platform is available on the website under the FAQs [section](#) (<https://exploremohealth.org/faqs/>). The [exploreMOhealth](#) CHNA platform was updated and relaunched June 6, 2024. The Missouri ZIP Health Rankings data included on the site were updated to reflect the most recent information on the health and social well-being of populations living in 934 Missouri ZIP codes. The latest ZIP Health Rankings data were generated by Missouri hospitals between fiscal years 2021 and 2023, and by the 2022 American Community Survey of the U.S. Census Bureau.

Findings were key in helping identify the gaps needing attention in Pettis and Benton counties. Results from the previous CHNAs were used as a basis for the 2025 CHNA process. As required of the process, multiple data sources were used in the secondary data analysis. Data from the primary service areas was benchmarked against state and national data whenever possible to identify emerging trends. It is important to note that data from the [exploreMOhealth](#) health atlas was used since it provides a comprehensive and customized community health needs assessment that evaluates health factors and health outcomes across counties and ZIP codes in the primary service area. Findings from these results will be the basis for any decision-making and will ensure that resources will be allocated where they are most needed.

Secondary Research Data

Secondary data findings revealed that the primary service area (PSA) comprised of Pettis and Benton counties had a population of 62,374 people according to the U.S. Census Bureau Decennial Census 2020. The county had a significantly lower population density of 45 per square mile compared to the state and nation at 90 and 94 respectively. Per the U.S. Census Bureau Decennial Census, Pettis and Benton counties experienced an 1.82% population change between 2010 and 2020. During the same time period, the state rate was 2.77% while the national rate was 7.13%. According to the U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey five-year estimates, Pettis and Benton counties had a median age of 38 and 54.1 years respectively compared to the state and national rates of 38.8 and 38.5 years respectively.

According to the 2020 U.S. Census Bureau Decennial Census survey data, 39.41% of Pettis and 100% Benton counties population lived in rural areas compared to the state and nation at 30.53% and 20% respectively. The veteran population of 9.81% in the PSA was close to the state and national rates of 7.59% and 6.64% respectively.

Within Pettis and Benton counties, there are 5,433 people aged 25 years and older without a high school diploma (or equivalency) or higher per the U.S. Census Bureau ACS 2018-22 survey. This equates to 12.42% of the counties' populations. The state and national rates are 8.69% and 10.86% respectively. It is worth noting that educational attainment is linked to positive health outcomes. Studies have shown people with more education live longer, healthier lives than those with fewer years of schooling.

Per the latest five-year American Community Survey estimates based on the 2018-2022 data, Pettis and Benton counties had a median family income of \$68,393 and \$65,553 respectively. These rates were significantly lower than the state and nation at \$84,745 and \$92,646 respectively. Secondary data further revealed that the PSA had a per capita income of \$31,145, which is lower than the state and nation at \$36,753 and \$41,261 respectively.

Pettis and Benton counties had 15.65% of its population living below the 100% Federal Poverty Level. This rate is higher than the state and national trends of 12.82% and 12.53% respectively. This indicator is especially important because poverty creates barriers to accessing necessities that contribute to poor health status, including health services, healthy food and others.

A review of the percentage of the population with insurance enrolled in Medicaid or other means-tested public health insurance shows that the PSA was 22.86%, which was higher than the state rate of 16.41% and nation at 22.34%. This measure assesses vulnerable populations which are more likely to have multiple health access, health status and social support needs. When combined with poverty data, providers can use this measure to identify gaps in eligibility and enrollment. This metric is especially important because of the associated health disparities that result from gaps in accessibility.

An estimated 10.72% of households in Pettis and Benton counties receive a Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefit compared to the state and nation rates of 10.04% and 11.52% respectively. The rate of food insecurity in the PSA was 16.52% compared to the state and national rates of 14.15% and 12.88% respectively. This metric is an estimate of the percentage of the population who did not have food at some point during the report year and one of the most common social determinants of health.

Per the 2023 County Health Rankings data derived from the [exploreMOhealth](#) platform, the adult obesity data for Pettis and Benton counties was 38% and 39% respectively. The adult smoking rate was 21% and 24%. The percent of adults who reported they are physically inactive in Pettis and Benton counties was 26% and 27% respectively.

According to the spotlight on ZIP health report derived from the [exploreMOhealth](#) platform, Pettis and Benton counties ranked 51st and 91st on health behaviors respectively. Health behaviors ranking measure is a weighted combination of multiple factors such as adult smoking, adult obesity, food environment index, physical inactivity, access to exercise opportunities, excessive drinking, alcohol-impaired driving deaths, sexually transmitted infections and teen birth factors.

According to the 2023 County Health Rankings data as reported on [exploreMOhealth](#), Pettis and Benton counties have an 1847:1 and 3271:1 ratio of population to primary care physicians; 1,800:1 and 6,636:1 ratio of population to dentists; and 831:1 and 1327:1 ratio of population to mental health providers.

Information derived from the [exploreMOhealth](#) platform revealed that 61% of children enrolled in Pettis County and 85% in Benton County public schools are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. The high school graduation rates for Pettis and Benton counties are 87% and 86% respectively. Pettis and Benton counties are ranked 72 and 102 out of 115 counties when comparing socioeconomic factors. This metric is comprised of a weighted combination of high school graduation, post-secondary education, unemployment, children in poverty, income inequality, single parent households, social associations, violent crime rates and injury death factors.

According to the 2023 County Health Rankings data, the percentage of adults aged 20 and above with diagnosed diabetes in Pettis and Benton counties was 10%. Data further revealed that 11% of adults reported 14 or more days of poor physical health per month in Pettis County compared to 12% in Benton County. On the same note, Pettis County reported 77 per 100,000 population of people aged 13 years and older living with a diagnosis of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection compared to 226 in Benton County.

The results of this secondary data analysis show the strengths, weaknesses and opportunities for improvement across multiple drivers of health for Pettis and Benton counties. This will require Bothwell Regional Health Center to collaborate with other partners and adopt a well-coordinated, multi-faceted approach to address the challenges facing individuals, population,

and the community at large. Reviewing the secondary data closely and capturing the missing elements in the primary data collection process will assist the hospital and the community at large identify opportunities and current gaps to be addressed. Identifying the key partners that should be engaged earlier in the process will be critical to ensuring a successful prioritization and implementation of the CHNA.

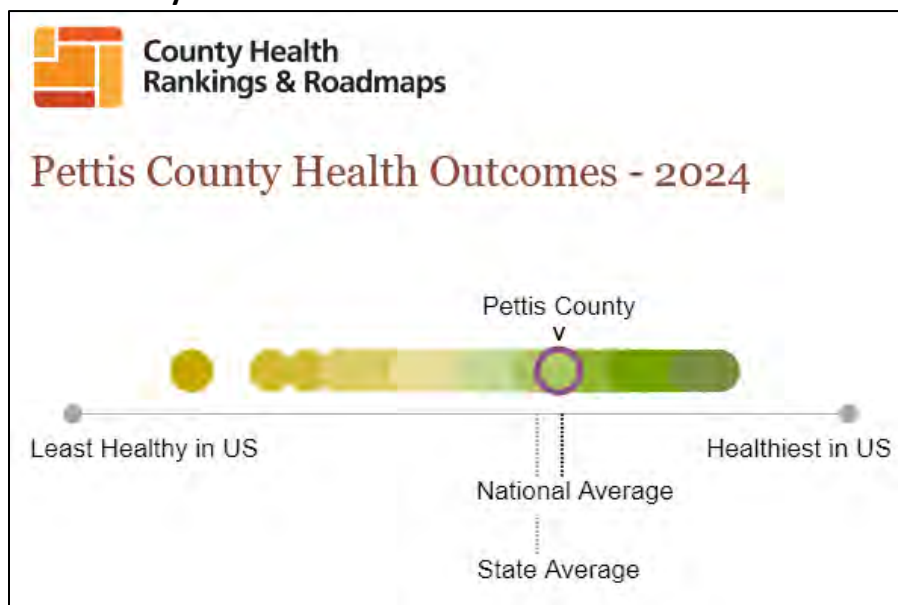
Data from the [exploreMOhealth](#) database was used to aggregate secondary data analysis to identify the health outcomes and health factors most important in Pettis and Benton counties. It was extremely important in helping generate this customized community health needs assessment using county- and ZIP-level data on demographics, socioeconomic status, risk factors, preventive practices, health conditions and environment. With the changing landscape in health care, new population health strategies are refocusing how care is delivered. However, health care providers should be looking upstream to the numerous factors that lead to positive health outcomes. These factors include social, environmental and contextual determinants.

These community factors create an intersection of traditional health care and public health. Integrating social determinants in care delivery will ensure the entire care team is using a holistic approach that considers both medical and non-medical factors of health. Using the power of data available through platforms like [exploreMOhealth](#) and MHA's [Health Equity Dashboards](#) will help magnify and stratify data, thus assisting Bothwell Regional Health Center implement strategies and actions with the needed precision.

County Health Rankings and Roadmap

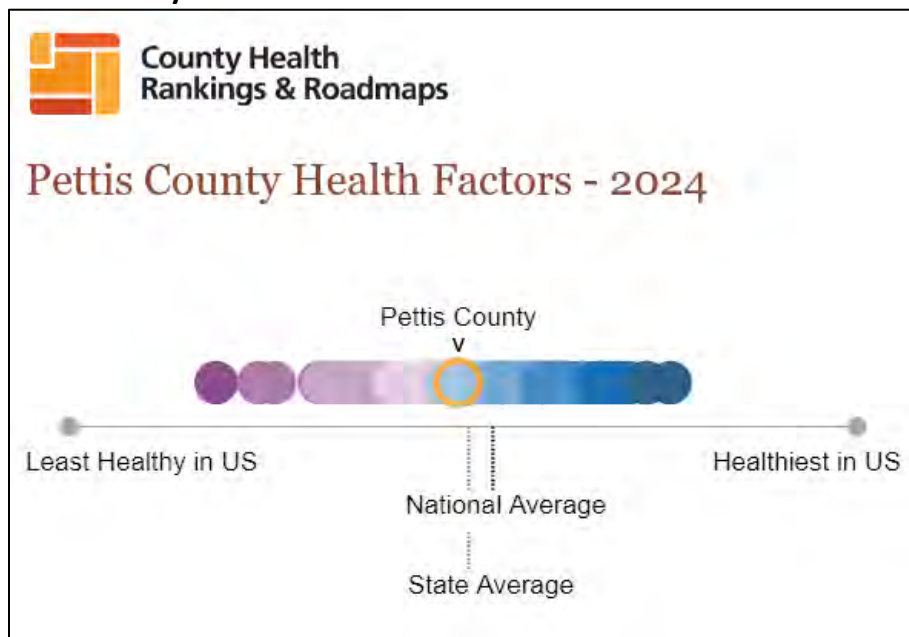
Pettis County Health Outcomes

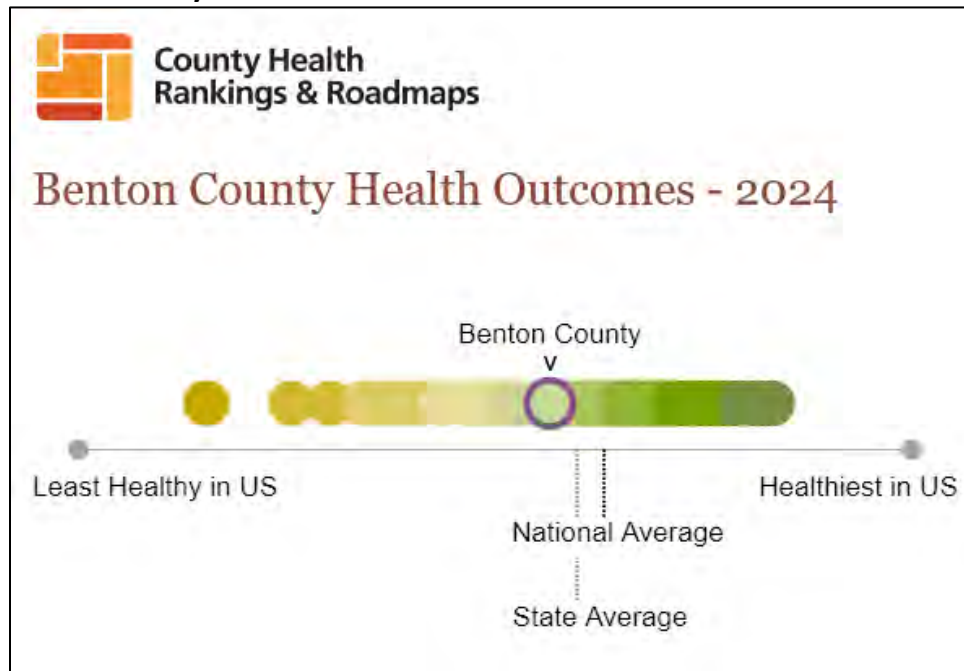
Pettis County Health Factors

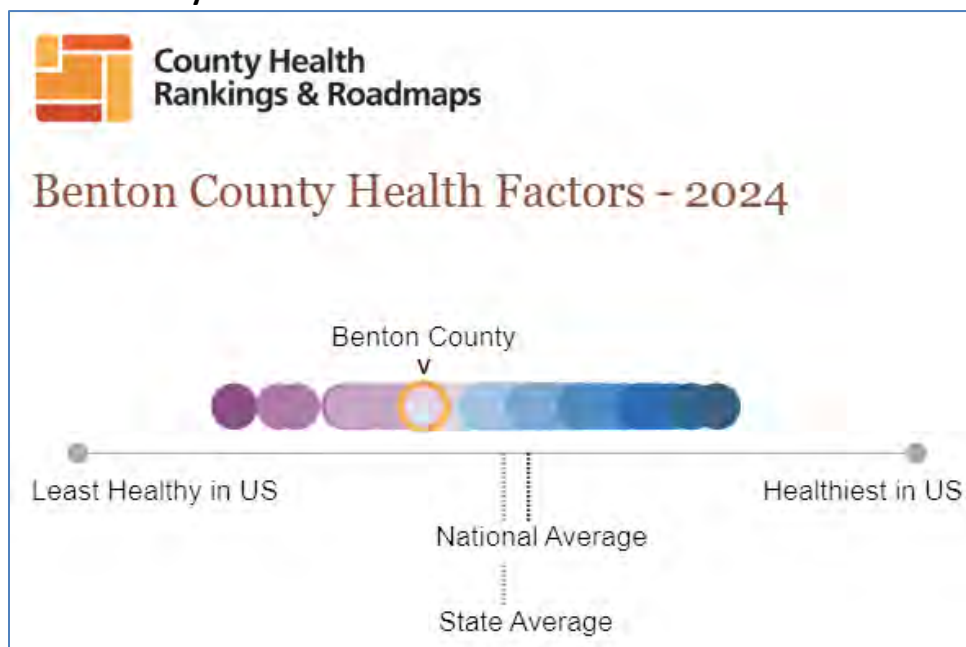
Benton County Health Outcomes

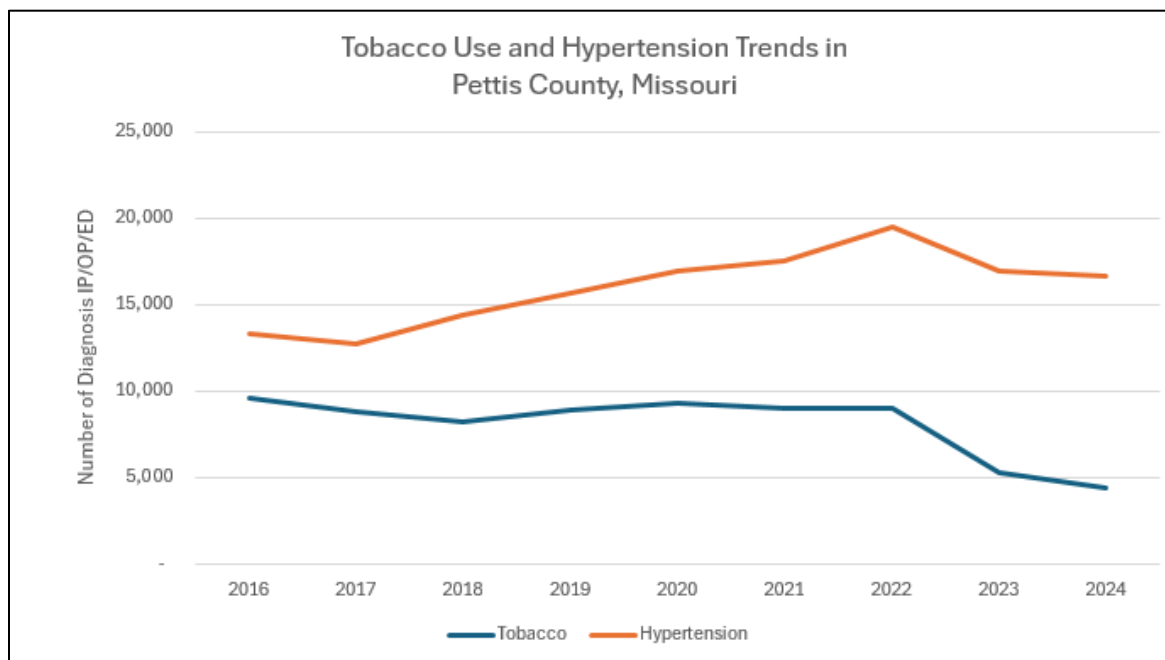

The results of this secondary data analysis show Pettis and Benton counties have similar issues, warranting a collaborative, well-coordinated, multifaceted approach to address the common problems together. Despite the significant differences in total population, the counties have more in common in health outcomes, factors, behaviors and social and economic factors

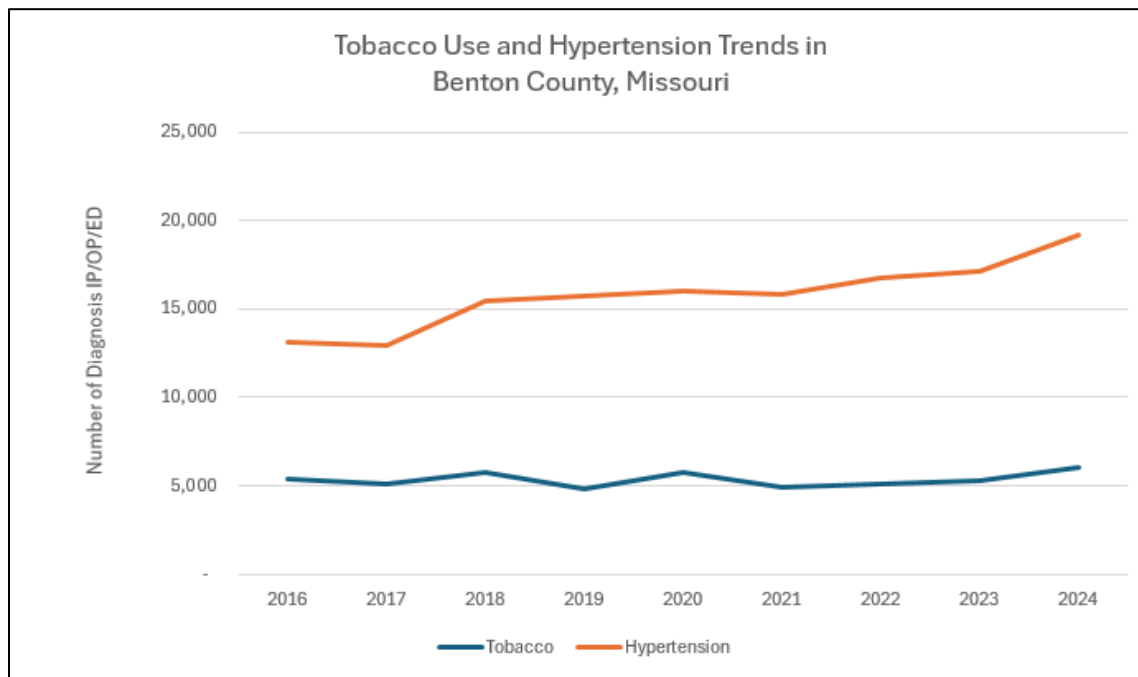

Sharing these results with the two primary service areas and looking for areas of collaboration will help address the underlying problems required to ensure healthy communities. Reviewing the secondary data closely and capturing the missing elements in the primary data collection process will assist Bothwell Regional Health Center and the community at large identify opportunities and current gaps to be addressed. Identifying the key partners that should be engaged earlier in the process will be critical in ensuring a successful prioritization and implementation of the CHNA.

The following data from the [exploreMOhealth](#) database was used to aggregate secondary data analysis to identify which health outcomes and health factors are most important in Pettis and Benton counties. It was extremely important in helping to generate this customized Community Health Needs Assessment using county- and ZIP-level data on demographics, socioeconomic status, risk factors, preventive practices, health conditions and environment. With the changing landscape in health care, new population health strategies are refocusing how care is delivered. However, to understand why poor emotional or physical health occurs in some communities, health care providers should be looking upstream to the numerous factors that lead to positive or negative health outcomes. These factors include social, environmental and contextual determinants. These are community factors that create an intersection of traditional health care and public health. Integrating social determinants in care delivery will ensure that the entire care team is using a holistic approach that considers both medical and non-medical factors of health. Using the power of data available through platforms like [exploreMOhealth](#) and MHA's [Health Equity dashboards](#) will help magnify and stratify data, thus assisting Bothwell Regional Health Center implement strategies and actions with the needed precision.

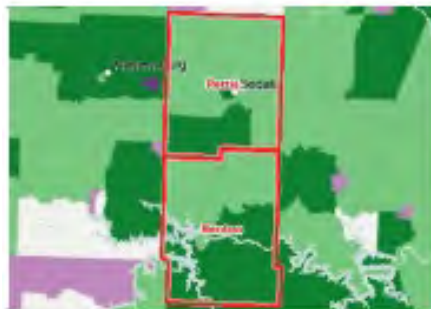
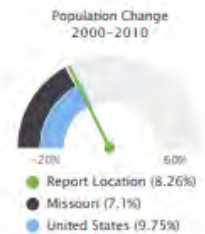

Population Change, Percent by Tract, US Census Bureau 2000 - 2010

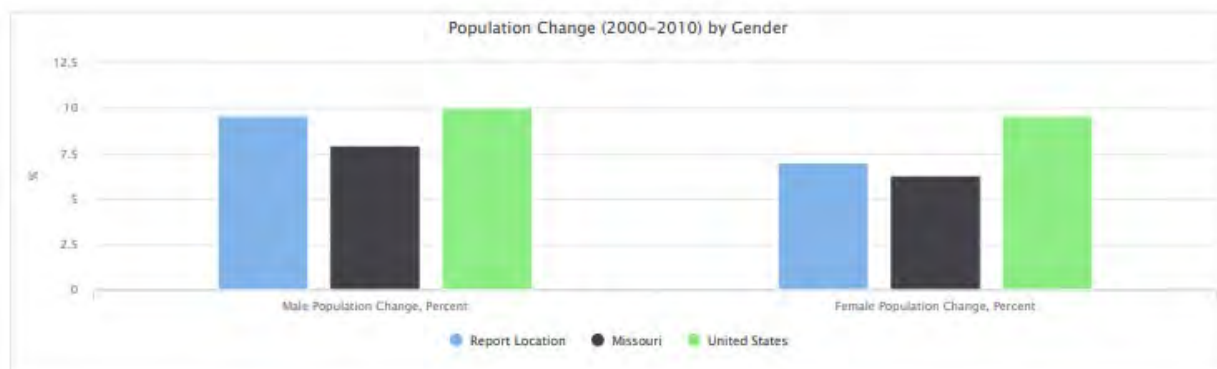

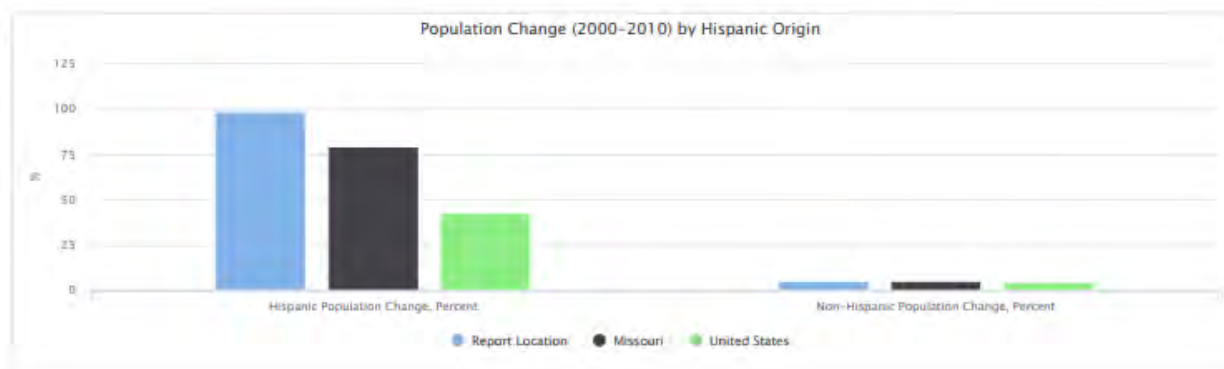

Population Change, Percent by Tract, US Census Bureau 2010 - 2020

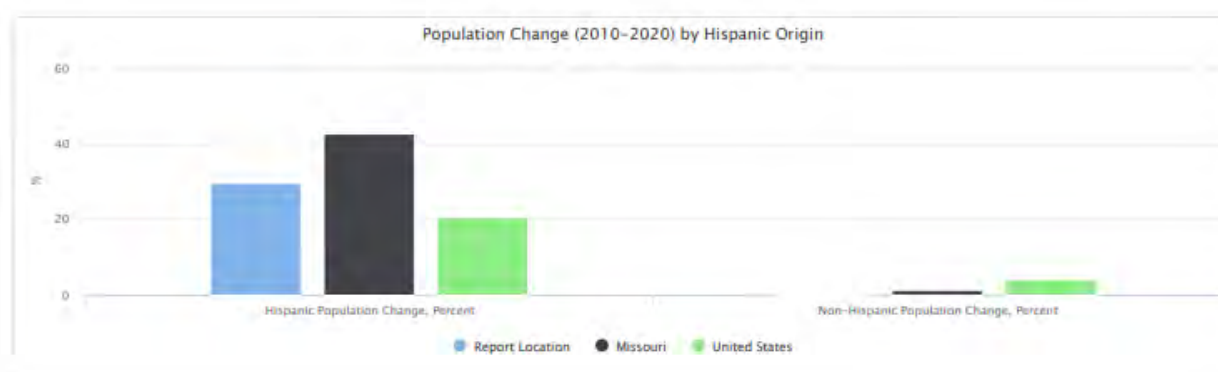

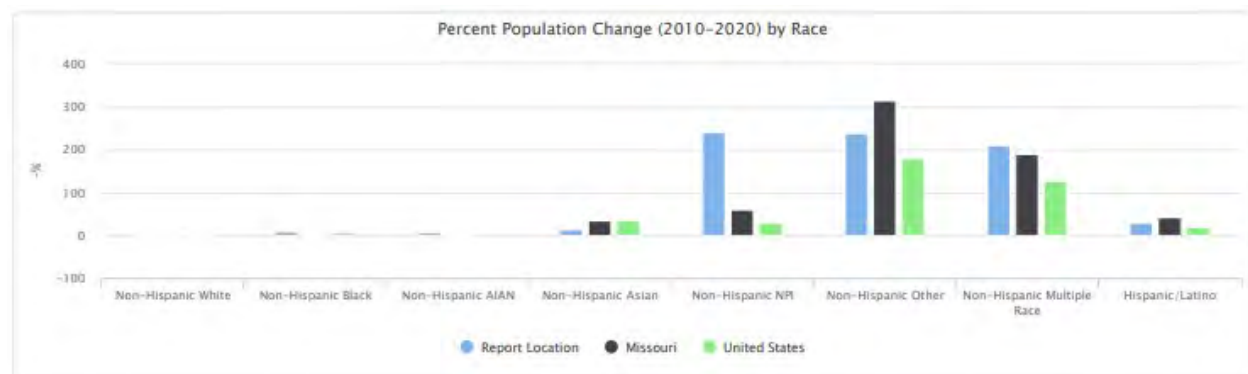

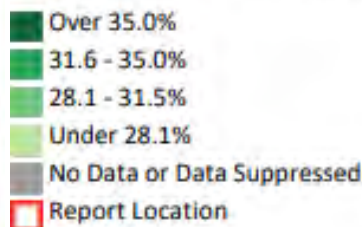

Households with Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

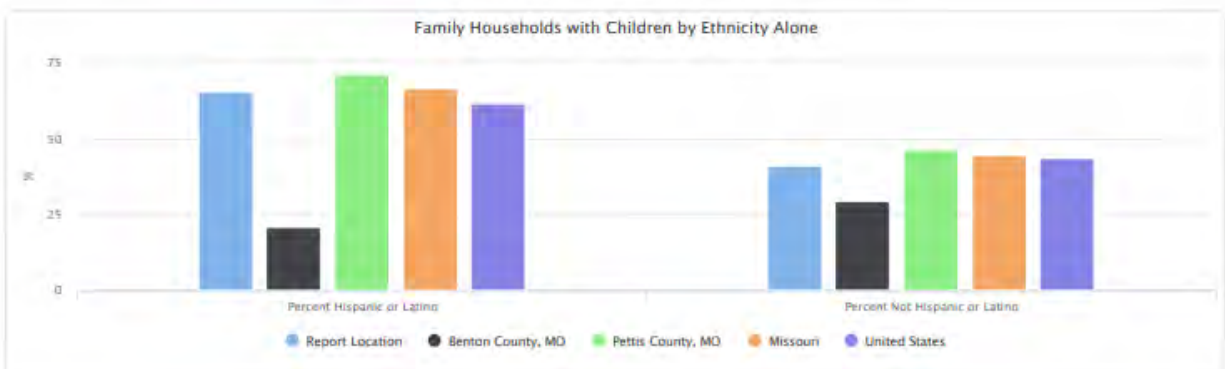

Female Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

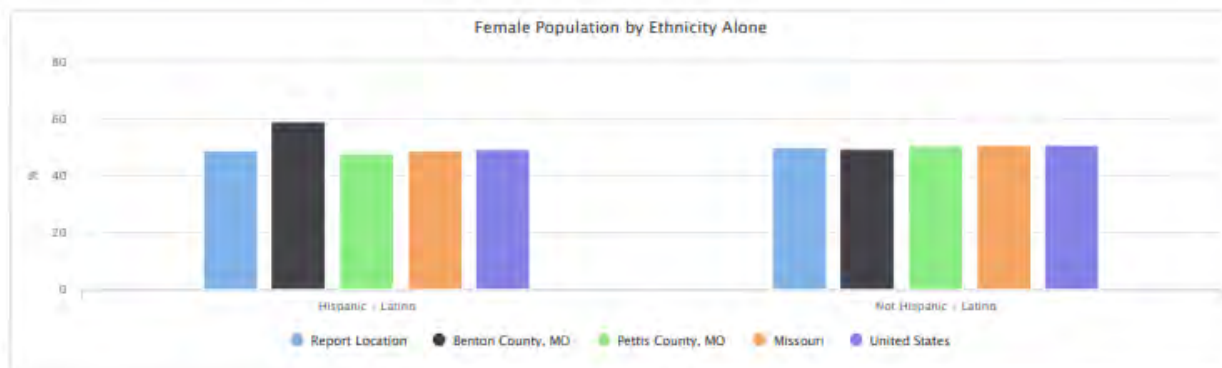

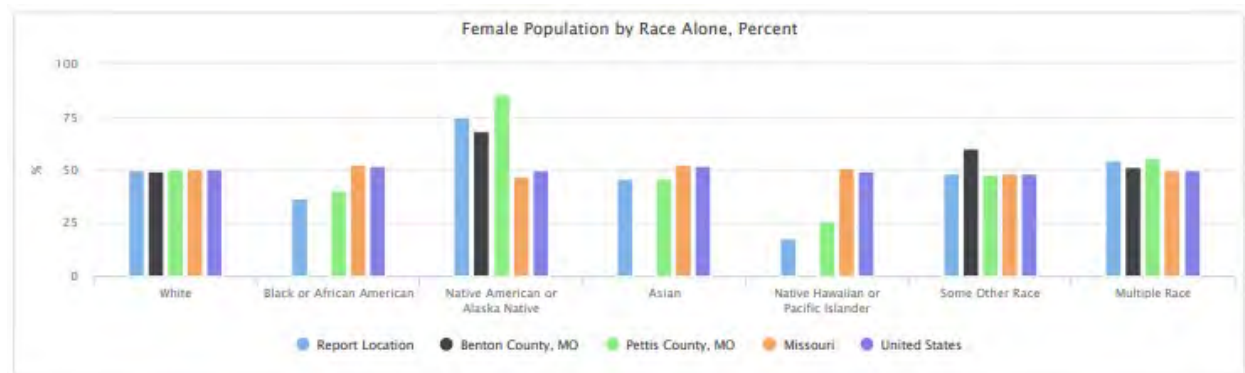

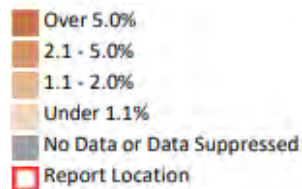

Foreign-Born Population (Non-Citizen or Naturalized), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

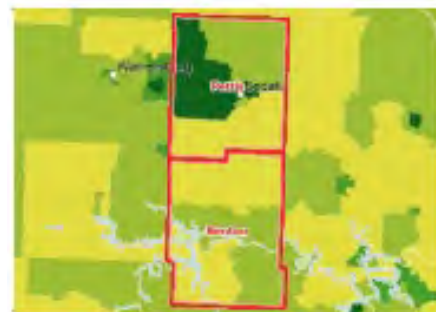

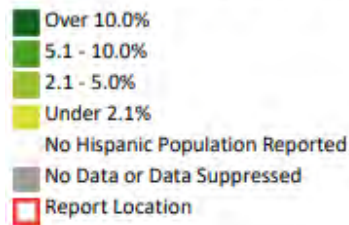

Population, Hispanic or Latino, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

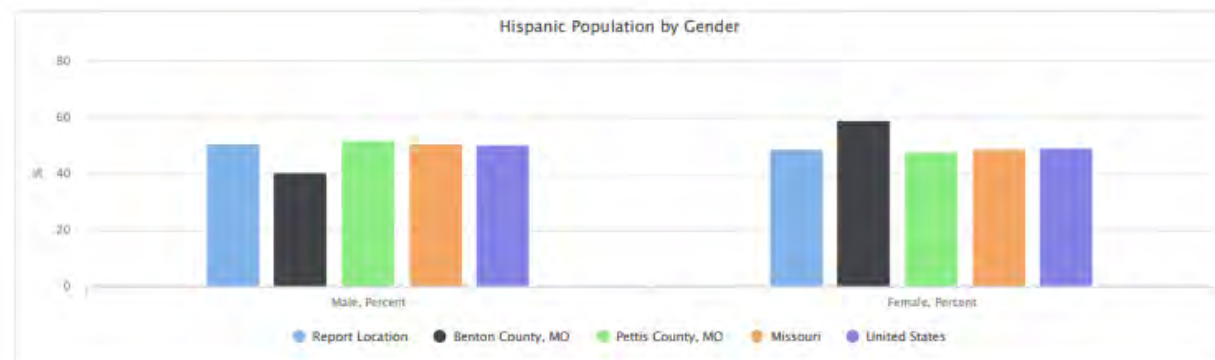

Male Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

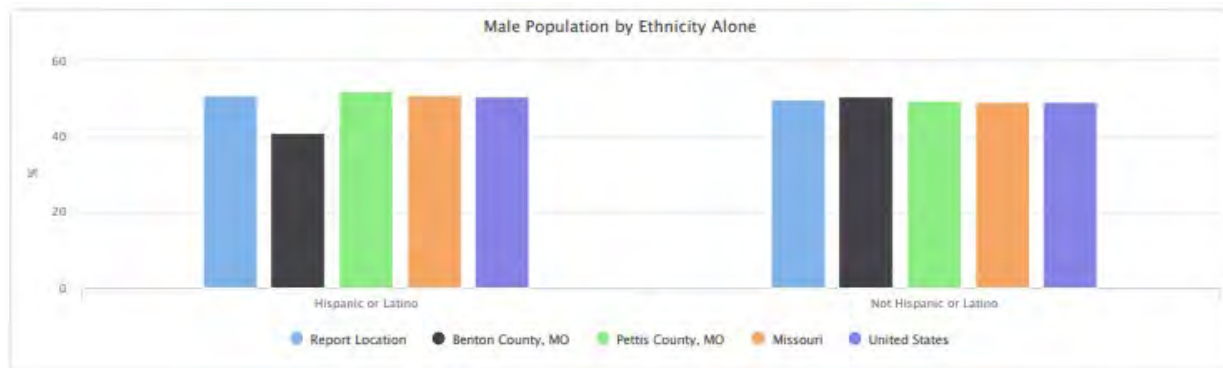

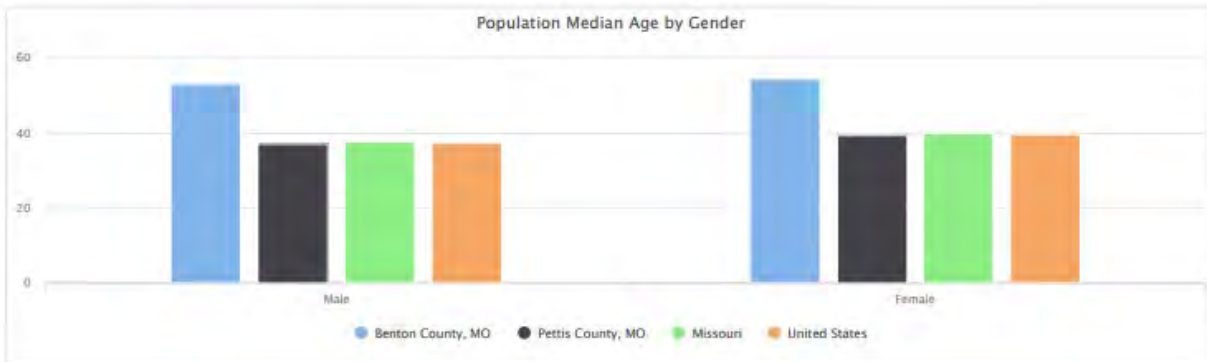

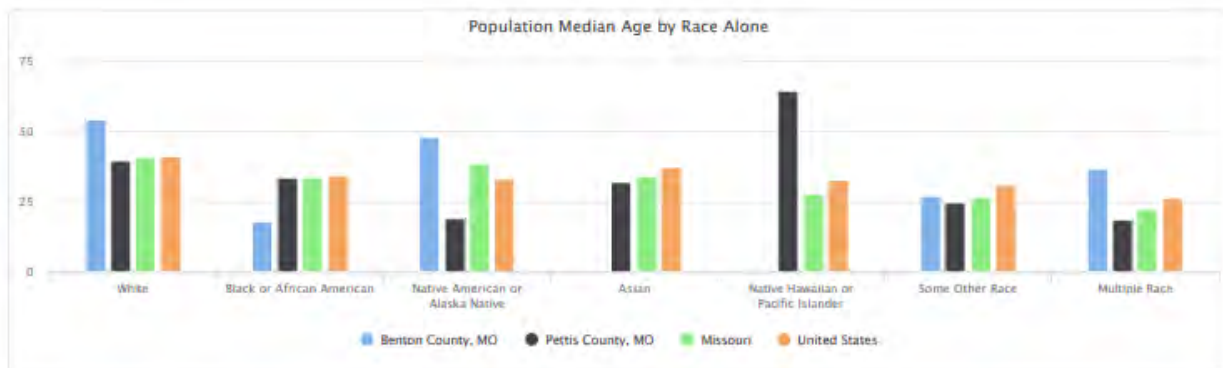

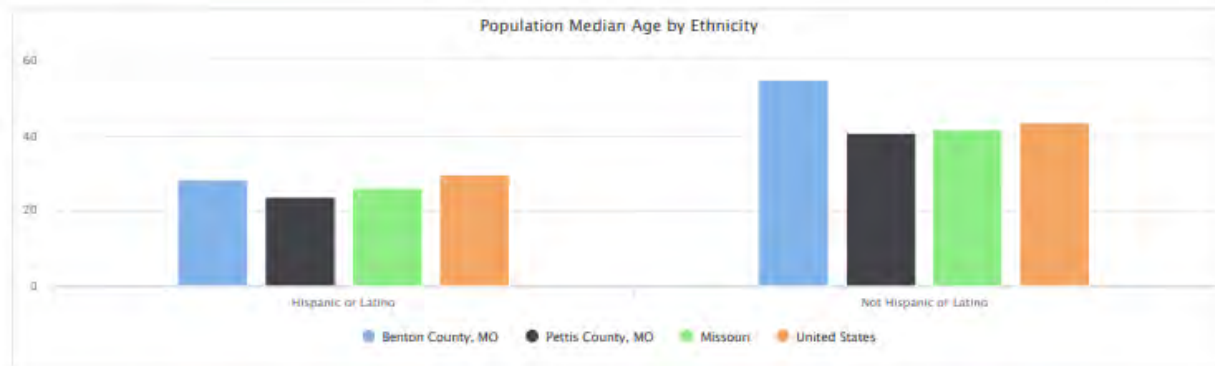

Population Age 0-4, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

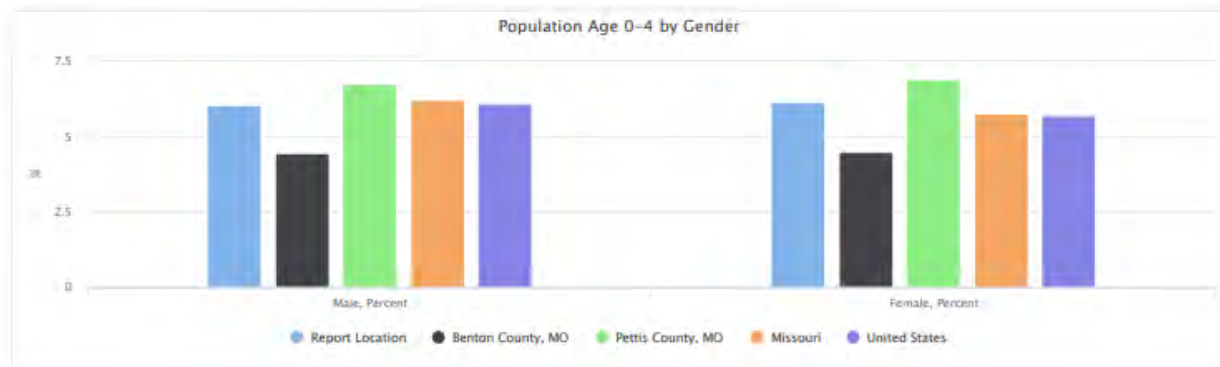

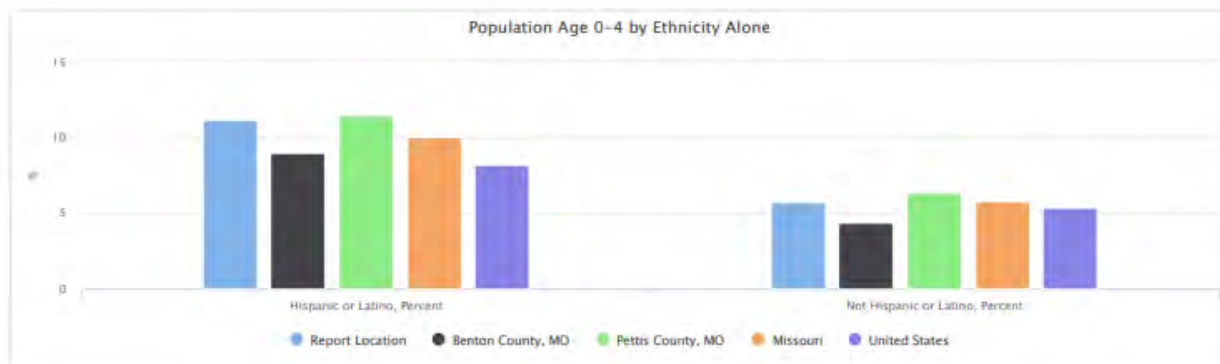

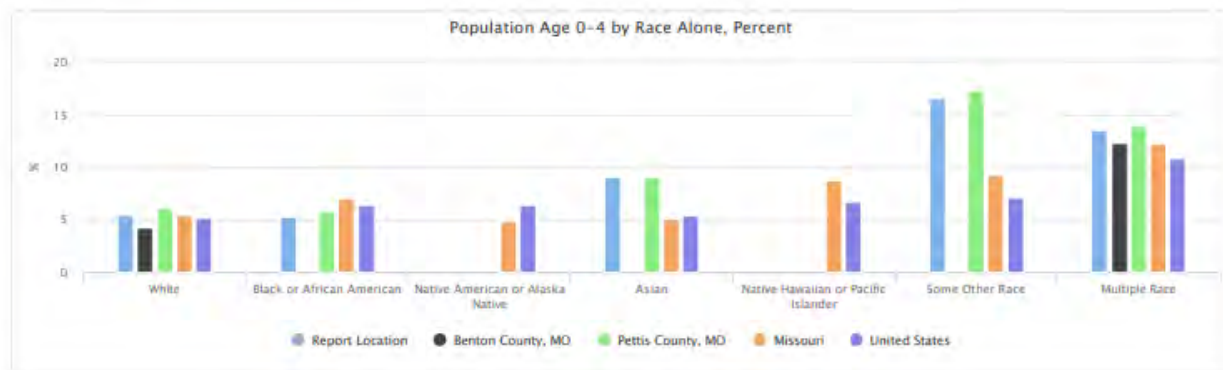

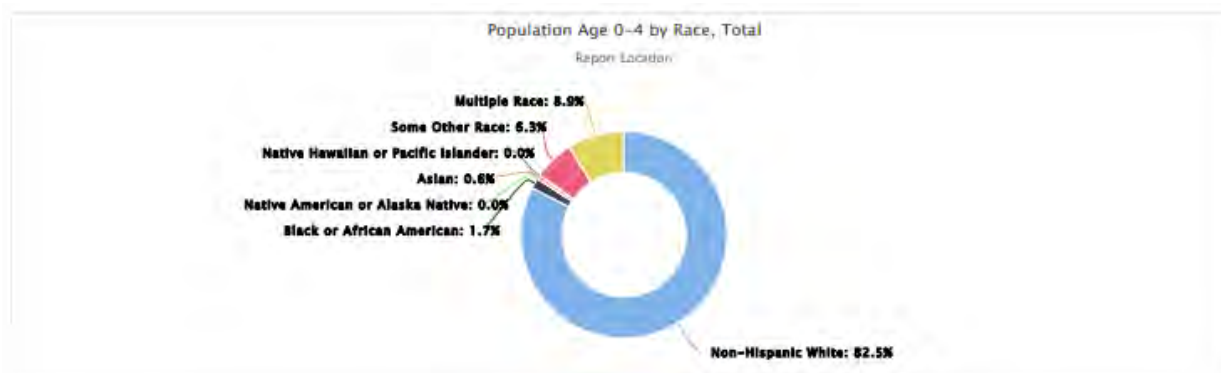

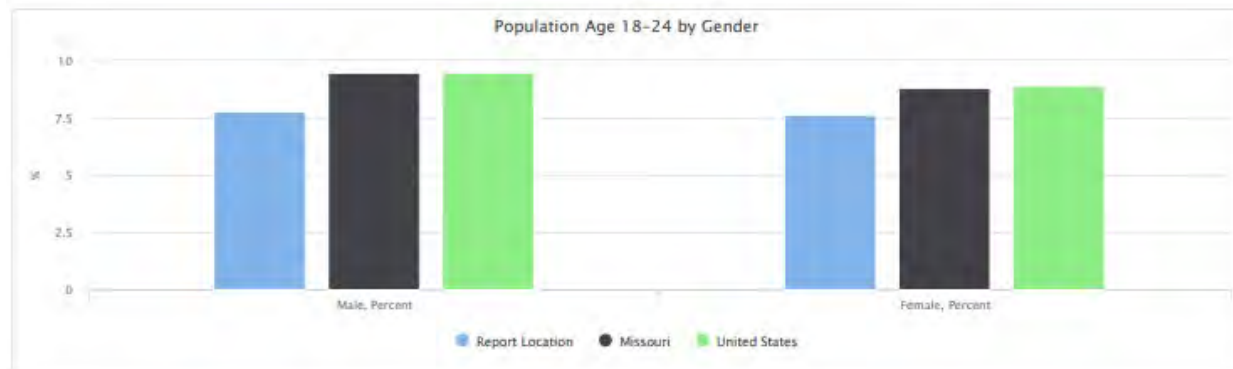

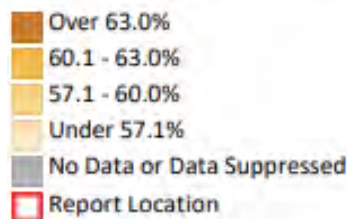

Population Age 18-64, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

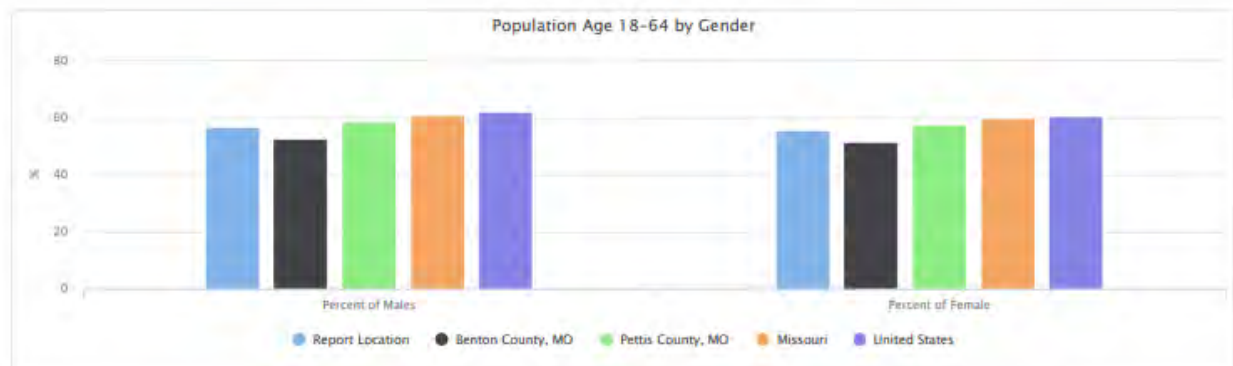

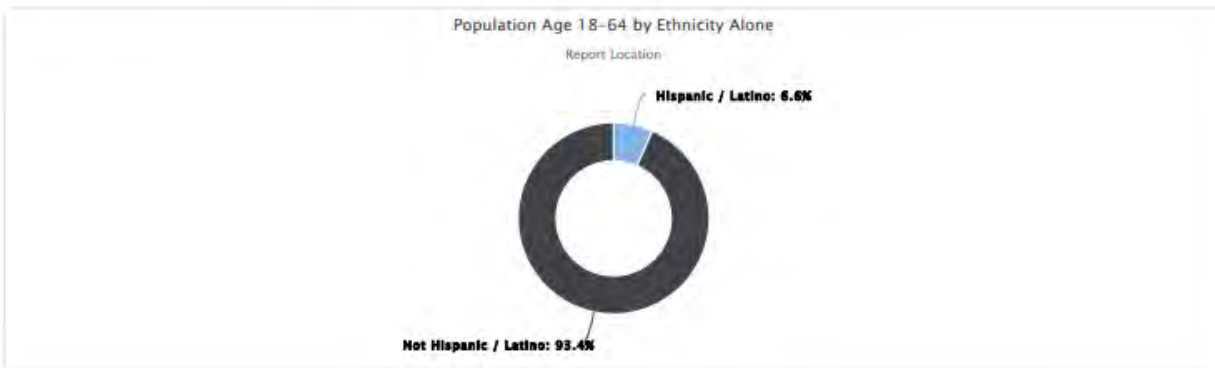

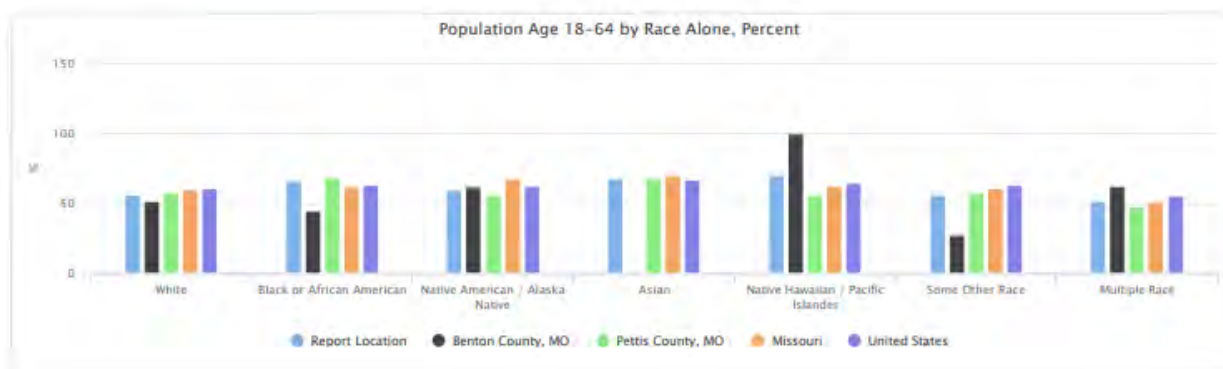

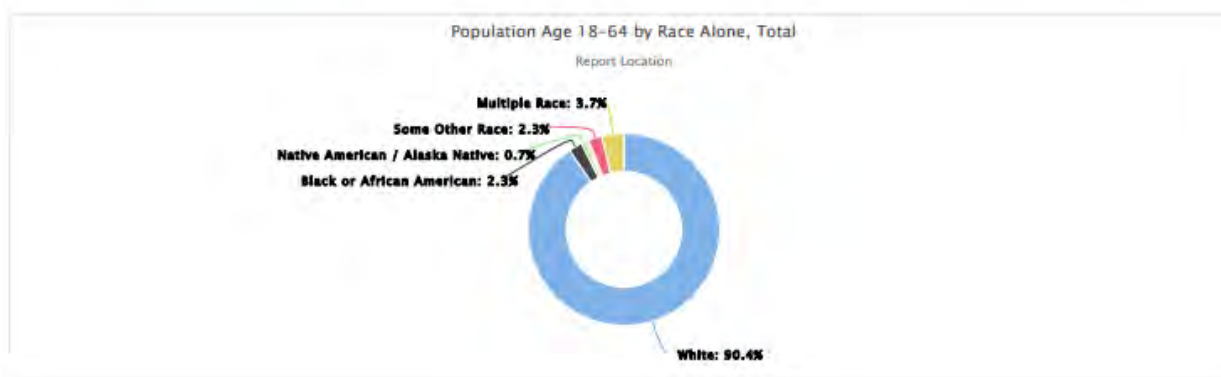

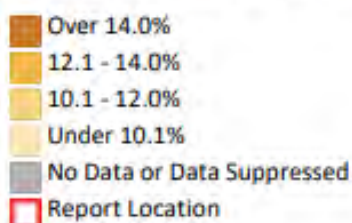

Population Age 25-34, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

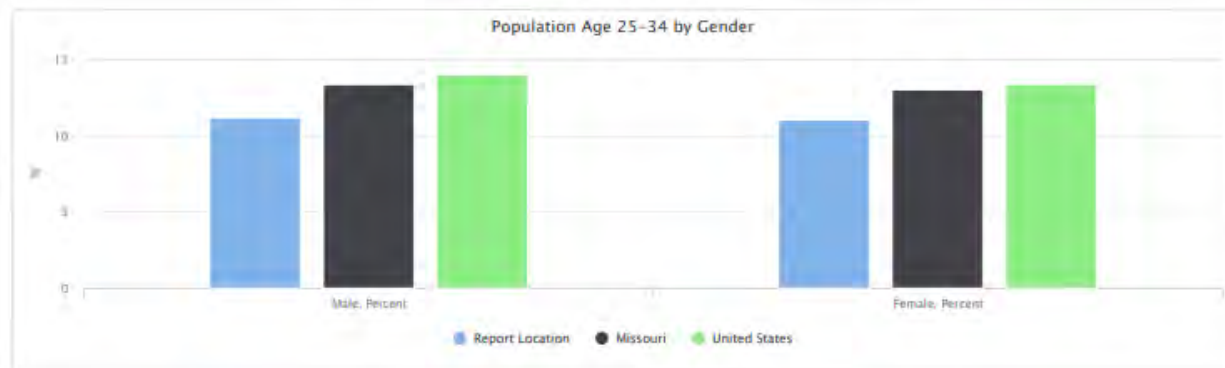

Population Age 35-44, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

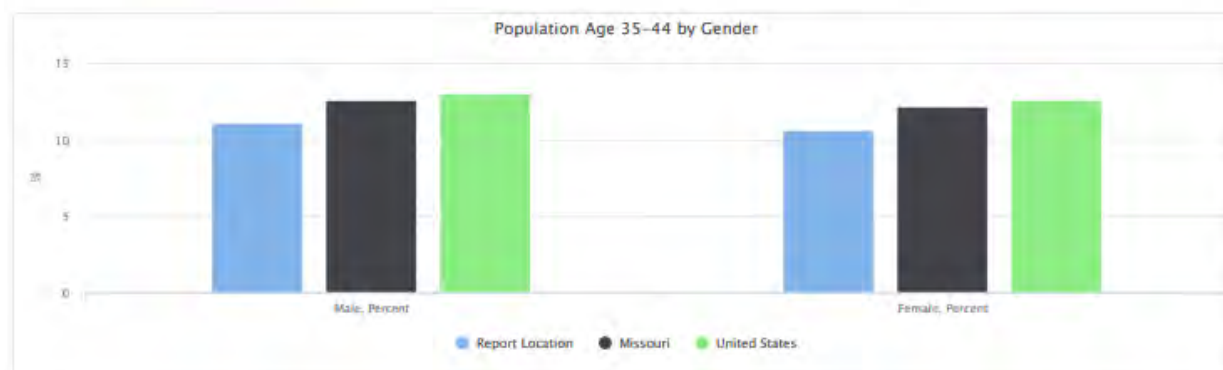

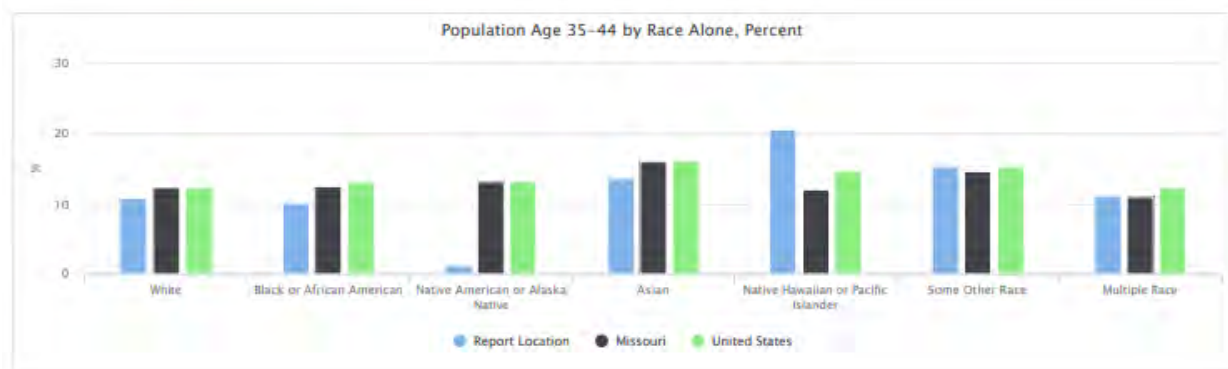

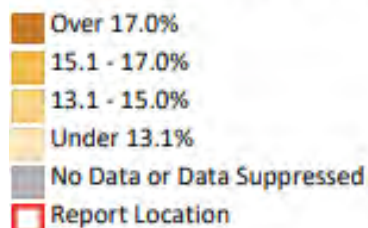

Population Age 45-54, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

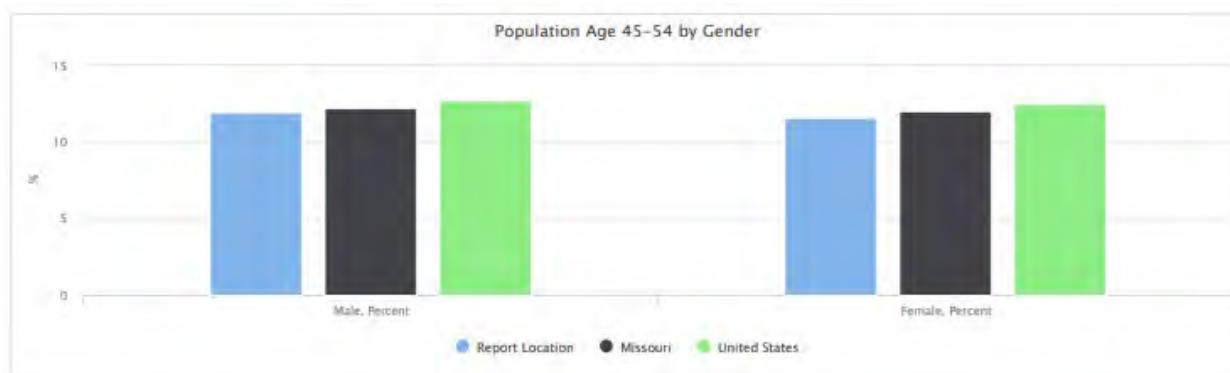

Population Age 5-17, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

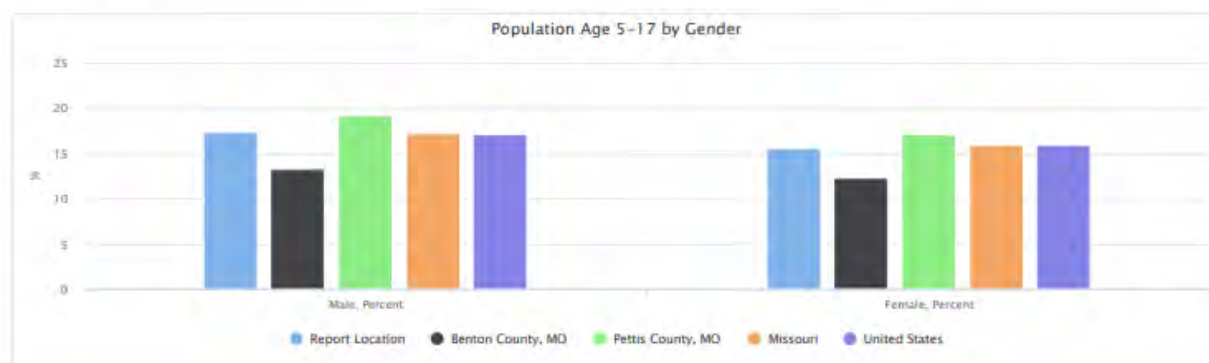

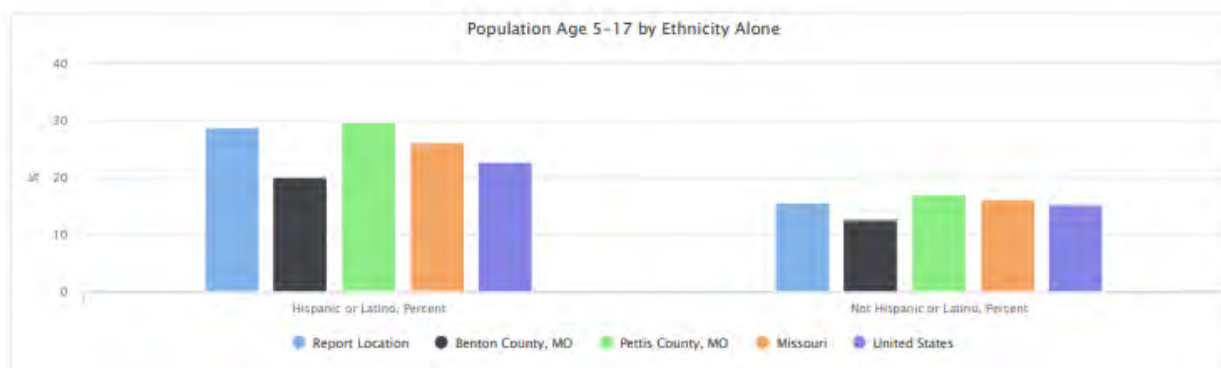

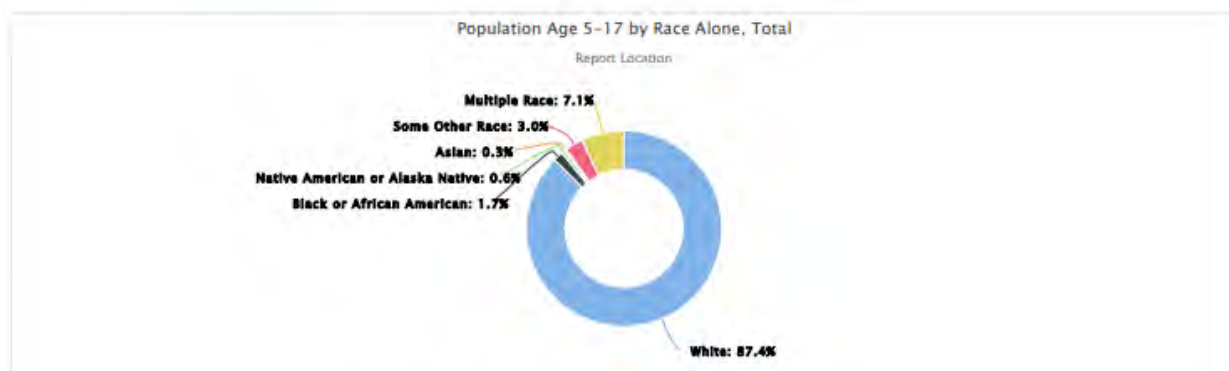

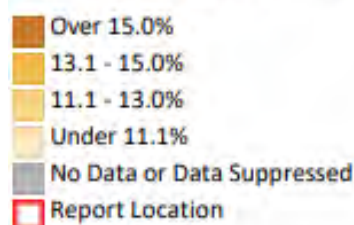

Population Age 55-64, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

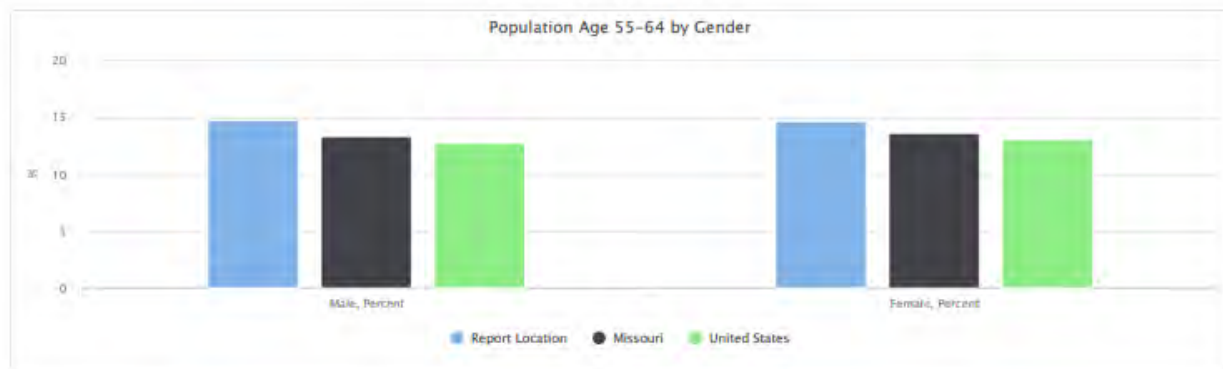

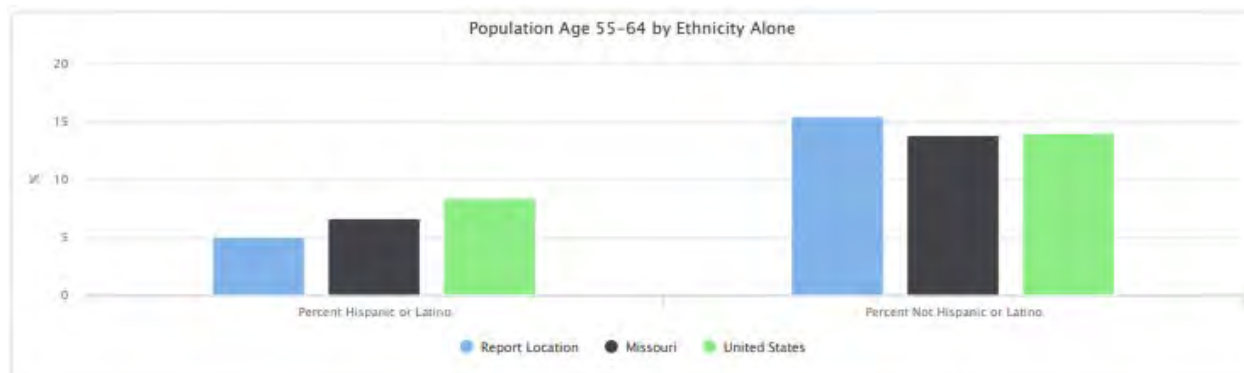

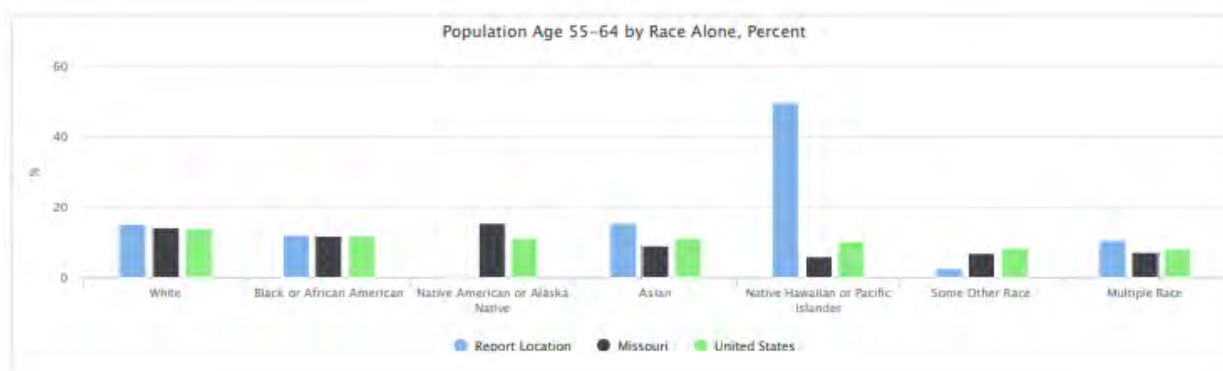

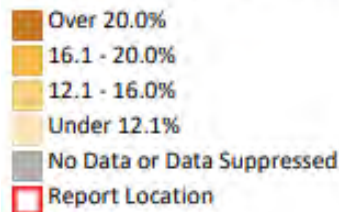

Population Age 65+, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

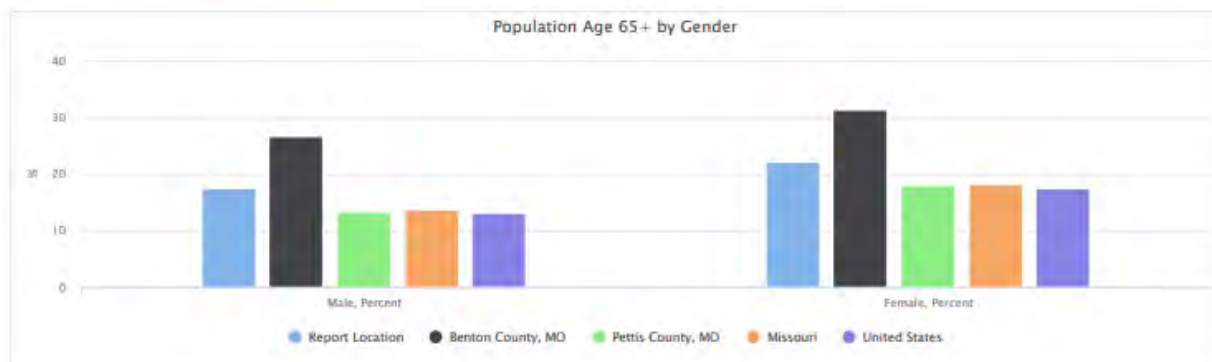

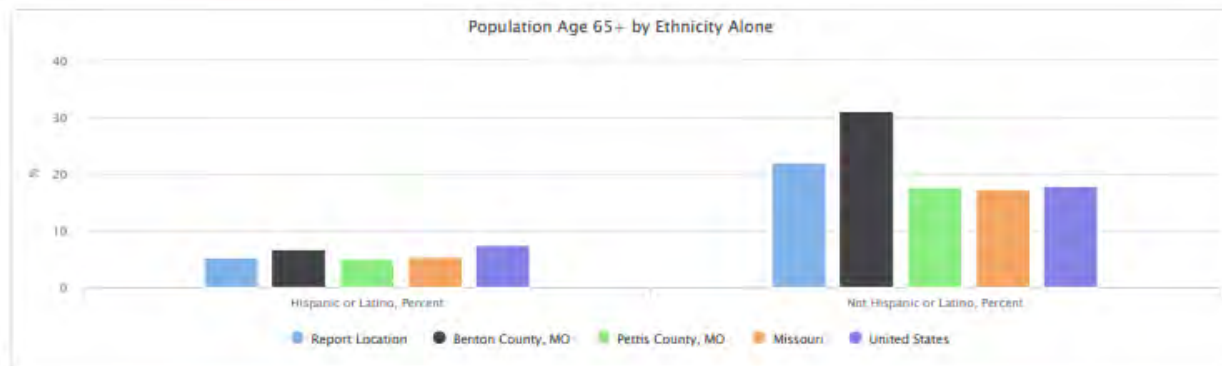

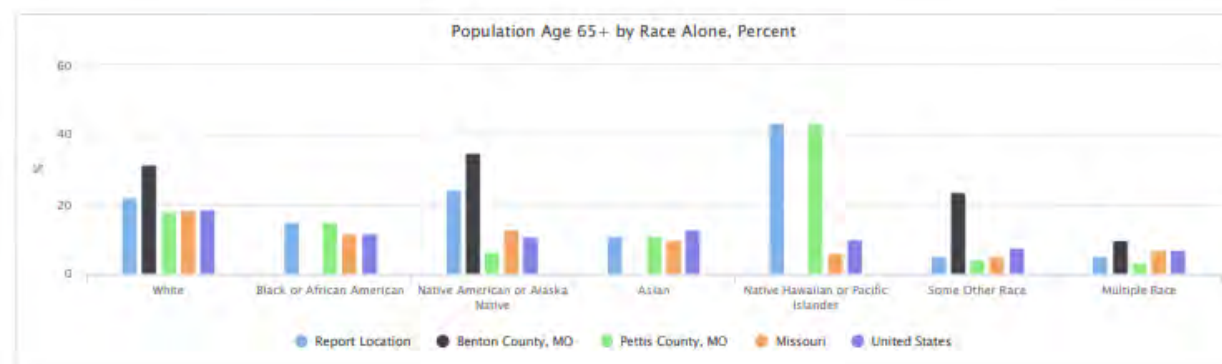

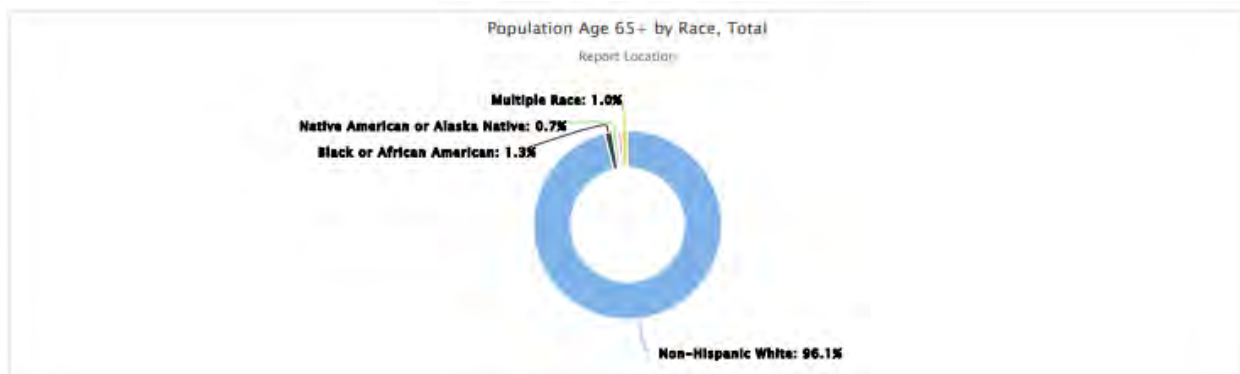

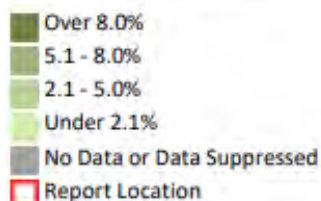

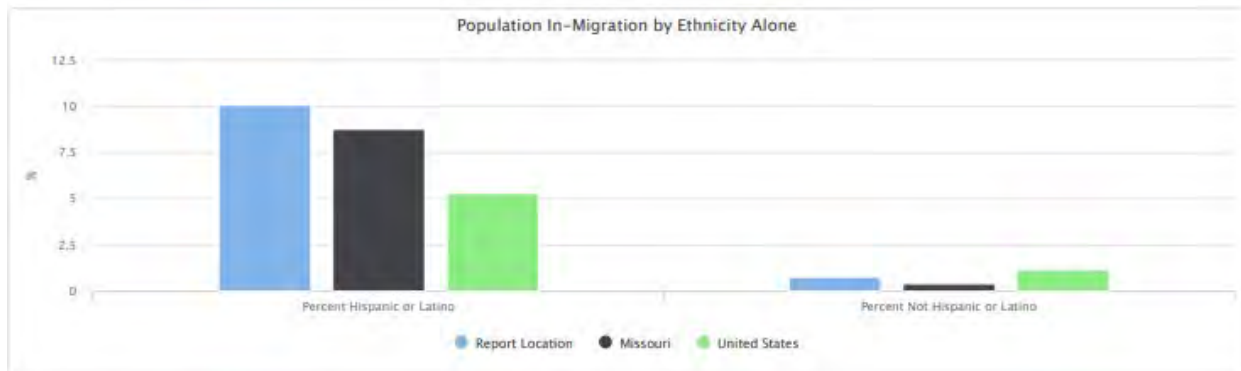
Population Migrated from Outside of the County, State, or Country, Percent of Total Population by Tract, ACS 2018-22

Population in Linguistically Isolated Households, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

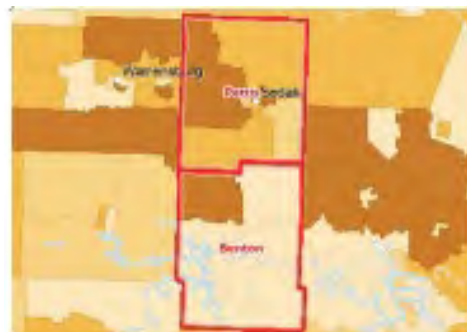

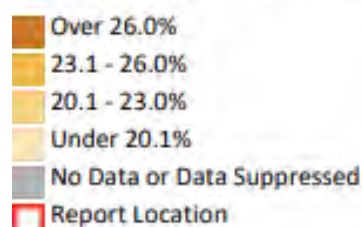

Population Age 0-17, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

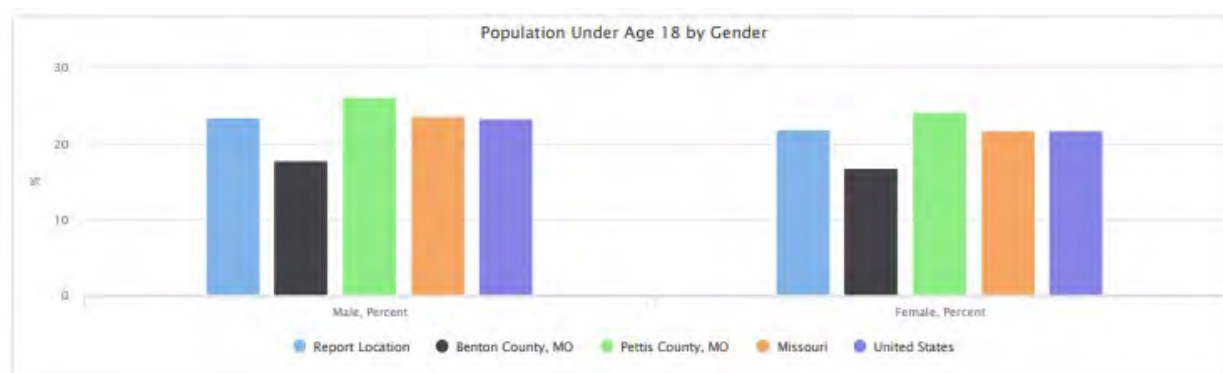

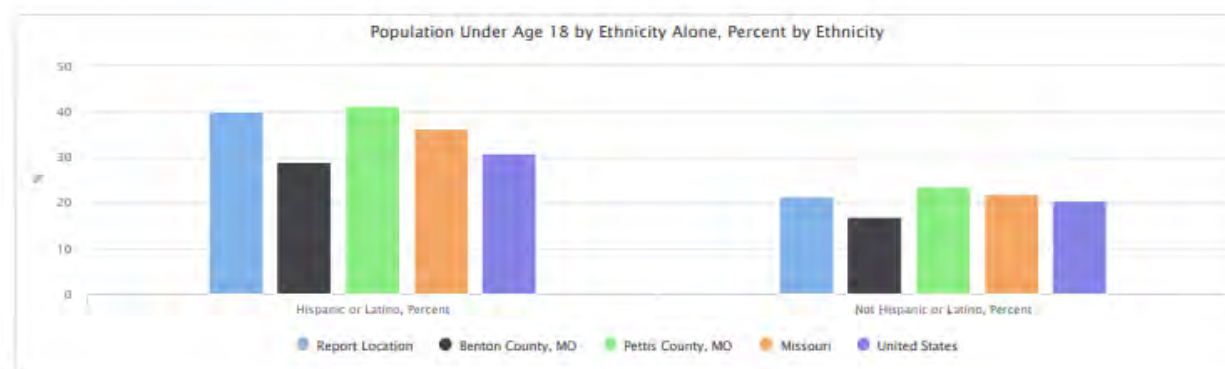

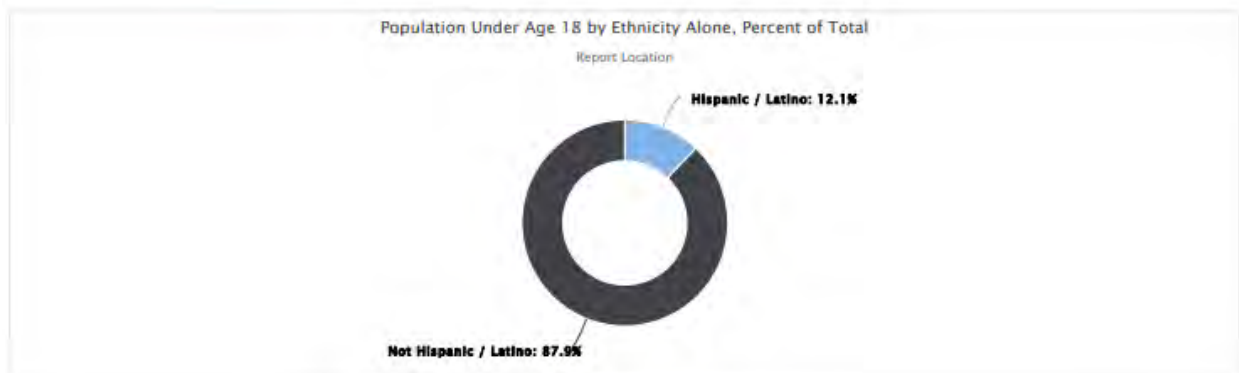

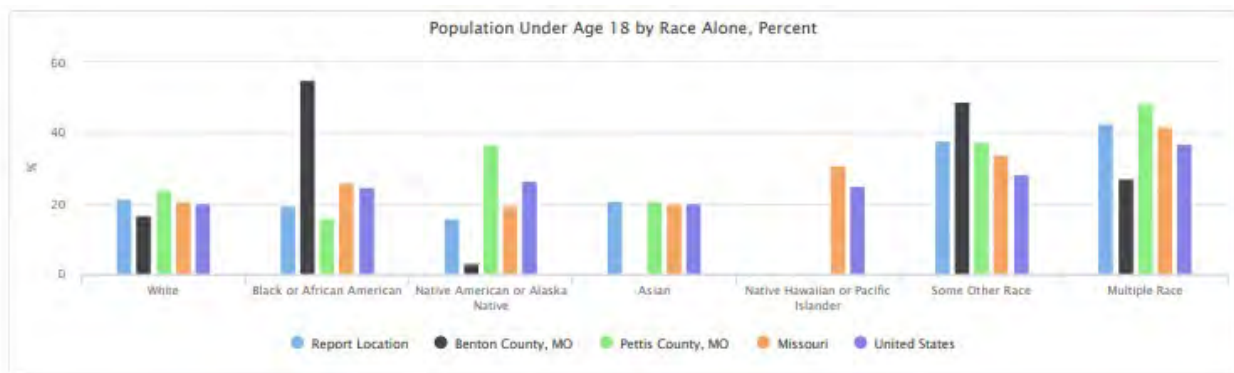

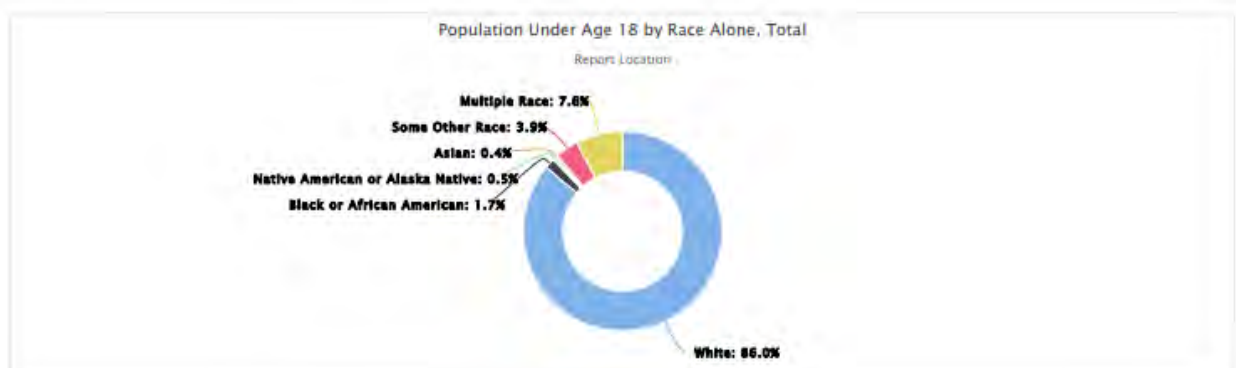

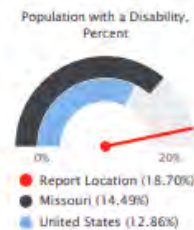

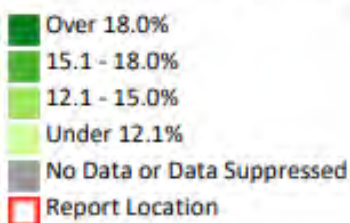

Population with Any Disability, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

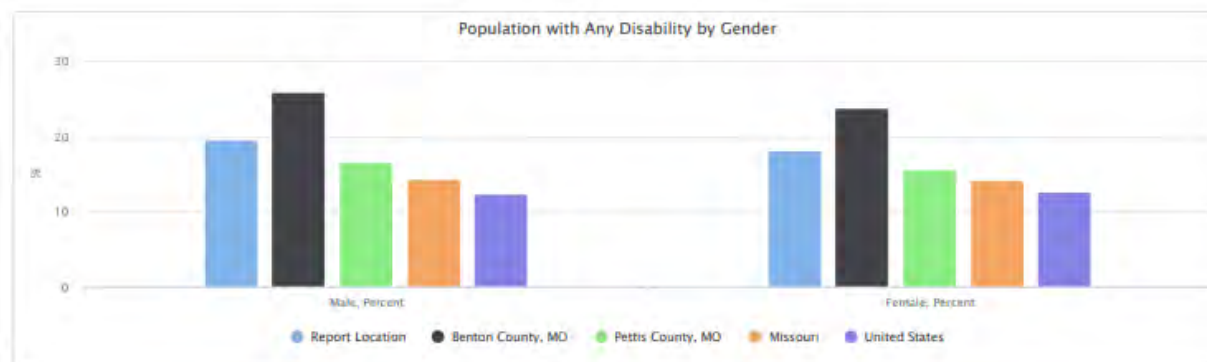

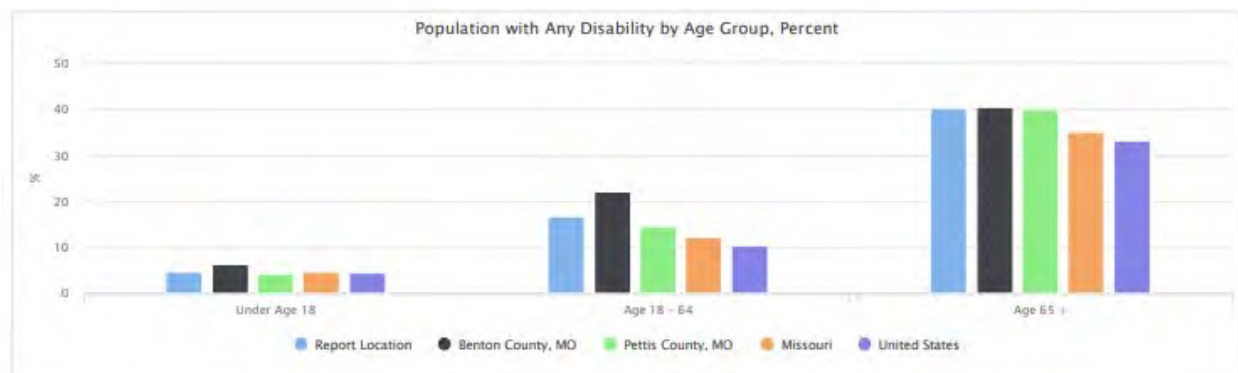

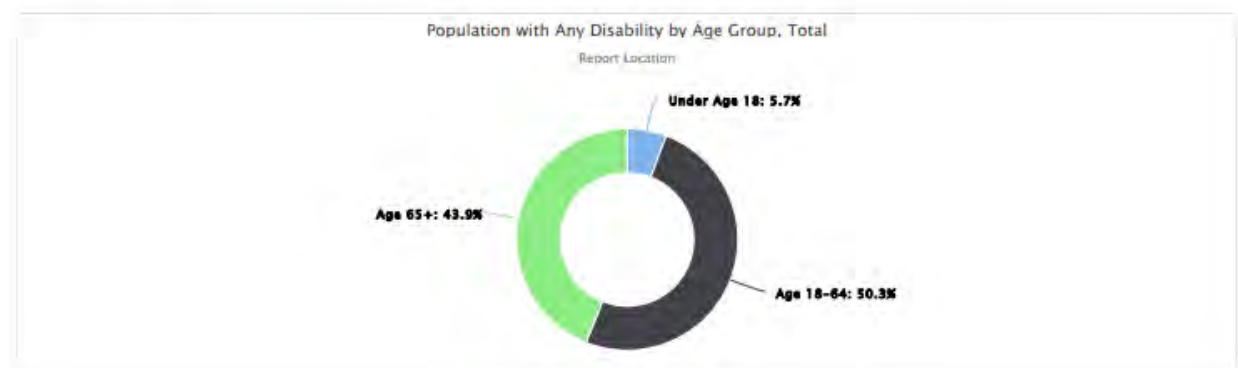

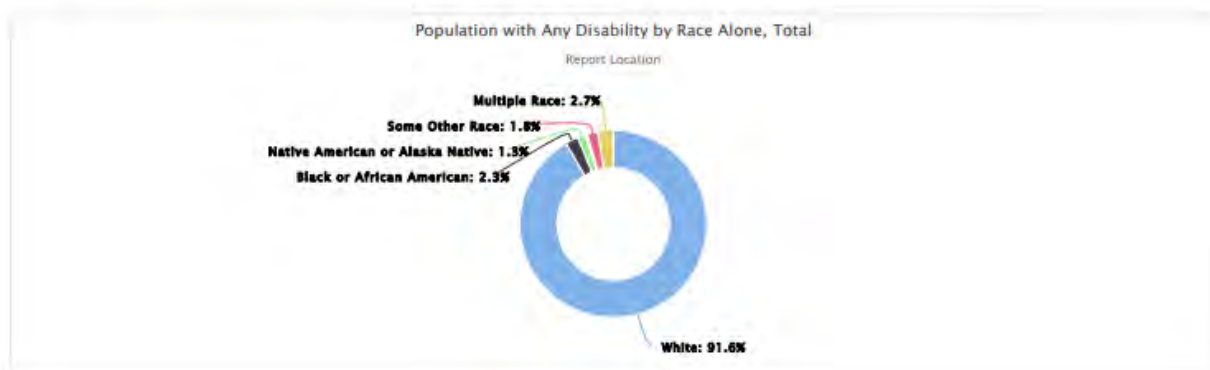

Population with Limited English Proficiency, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

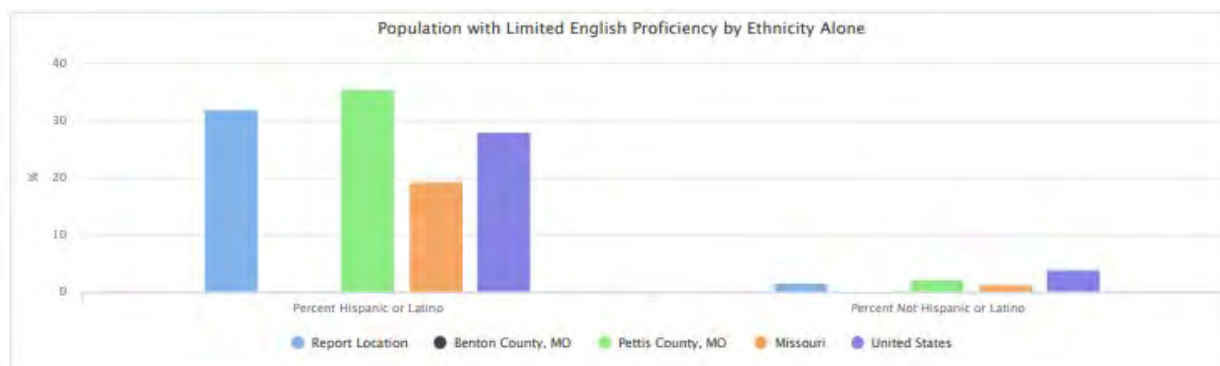

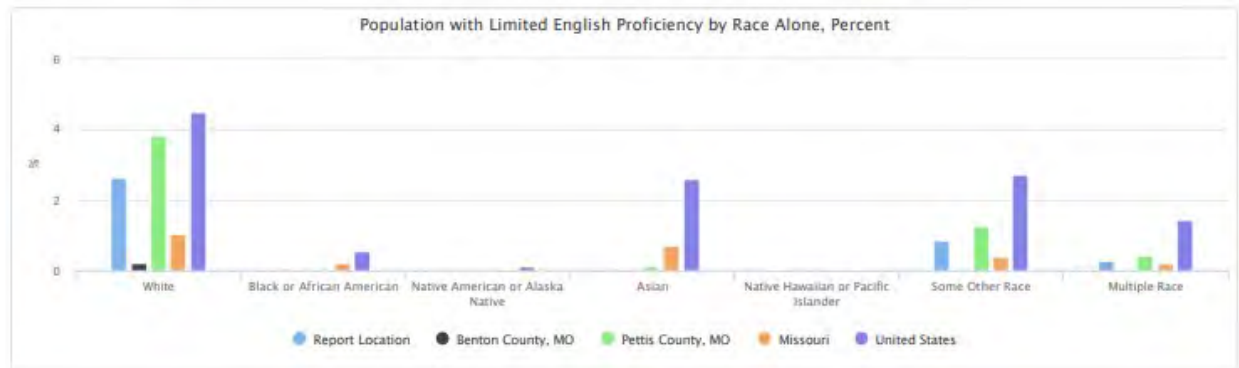

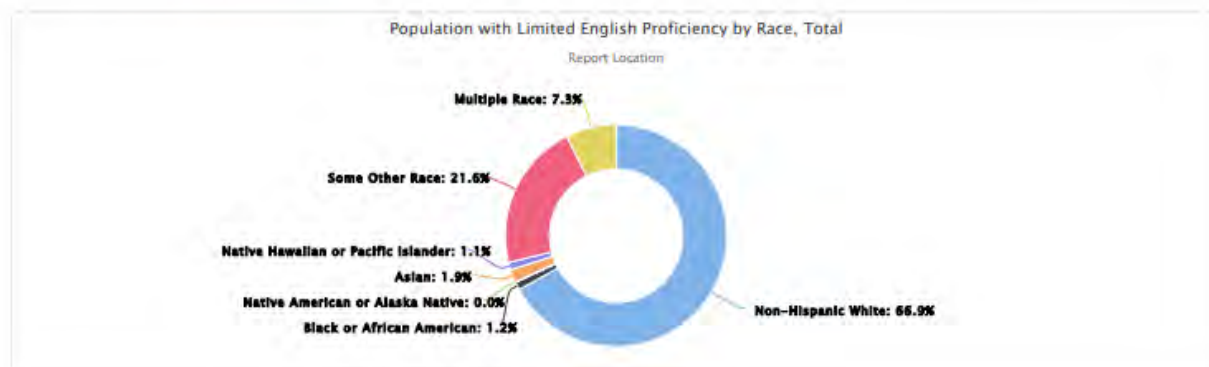

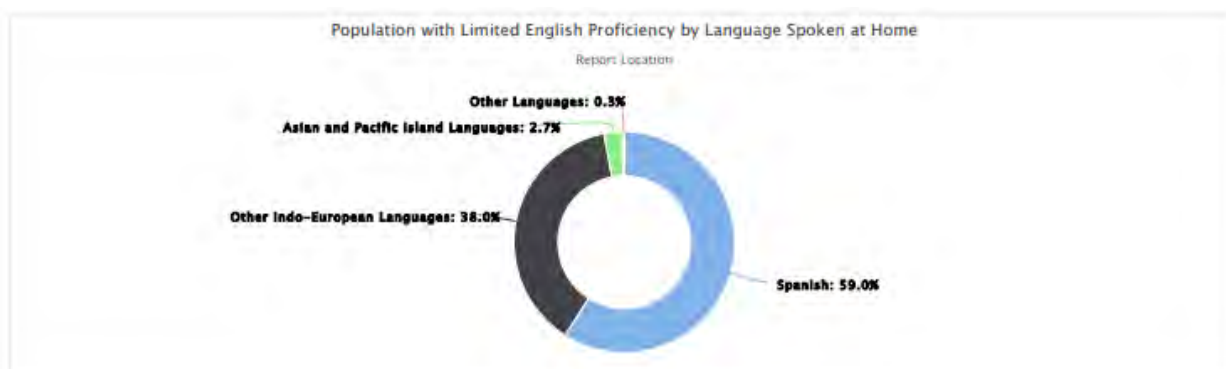

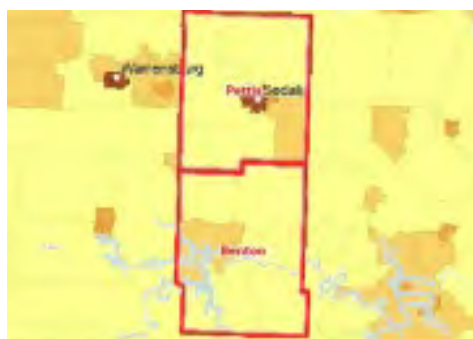

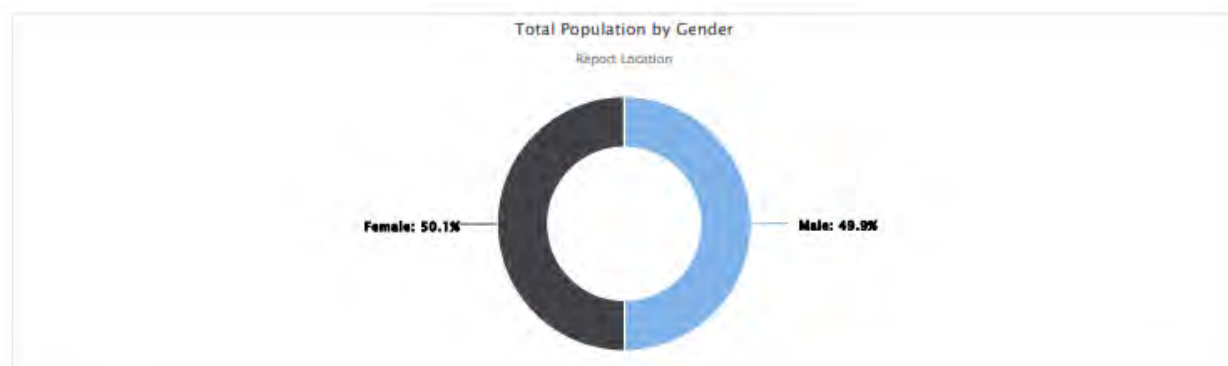

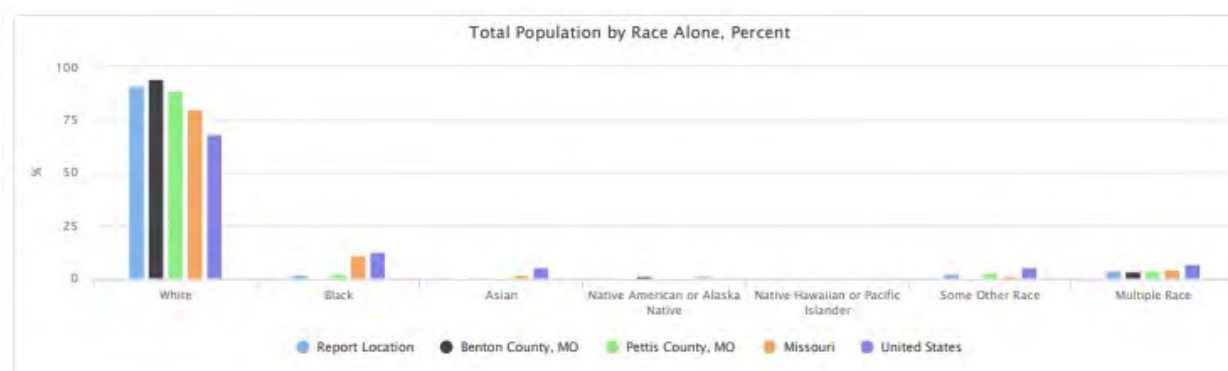

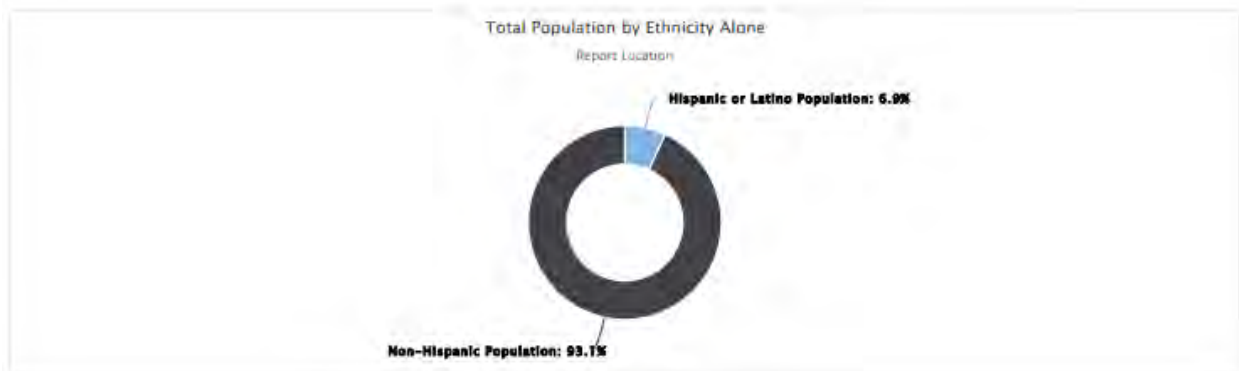

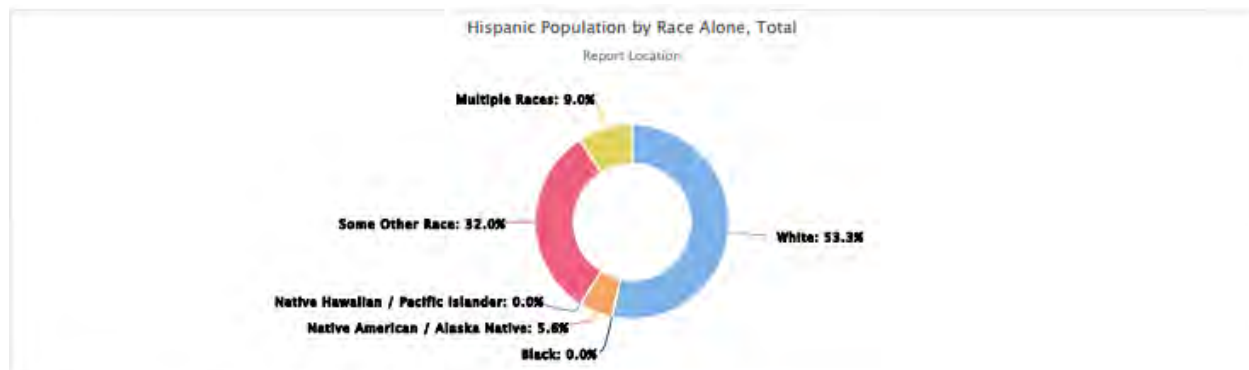

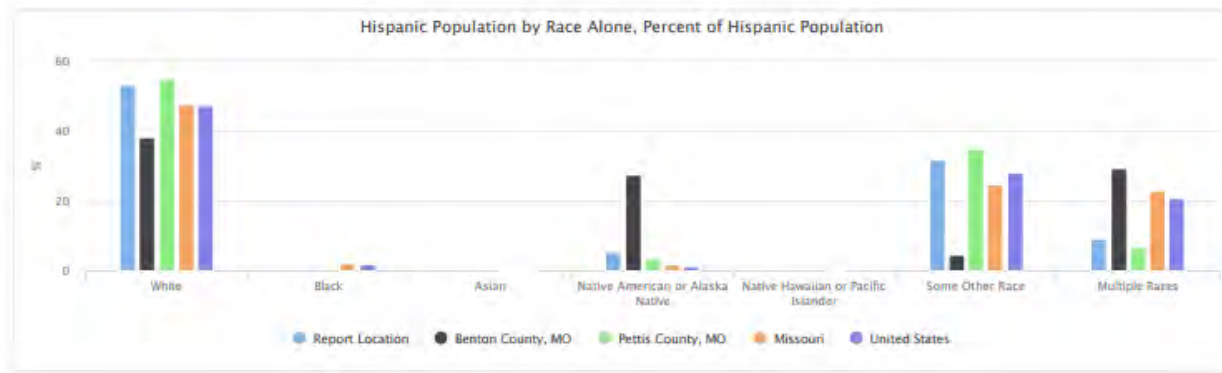

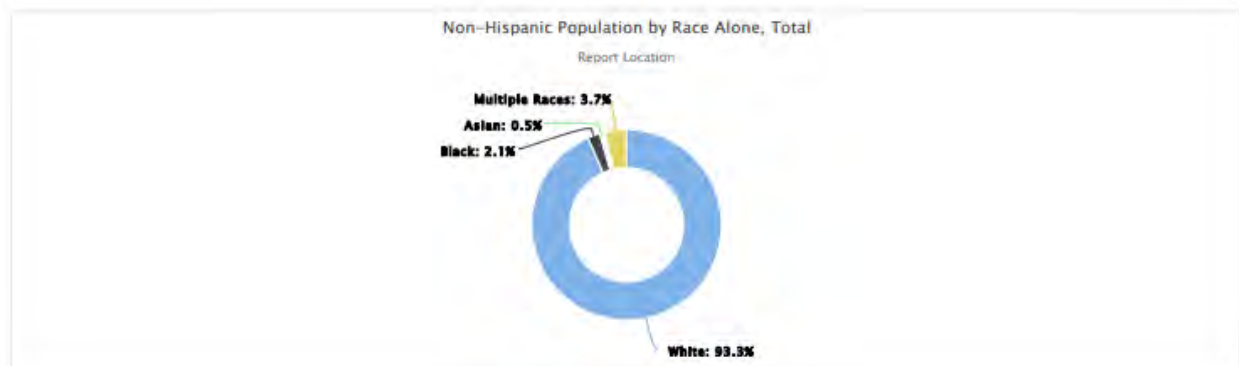

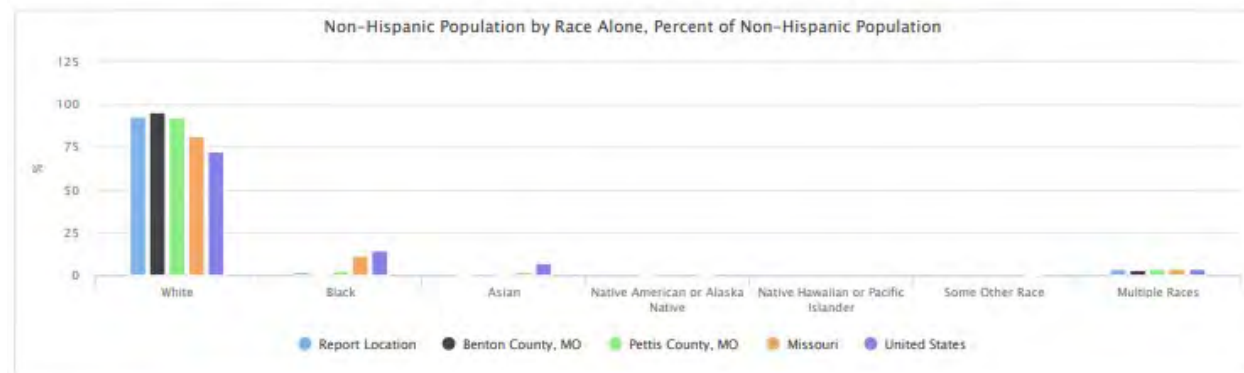

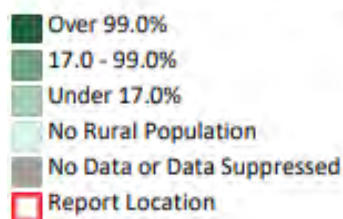

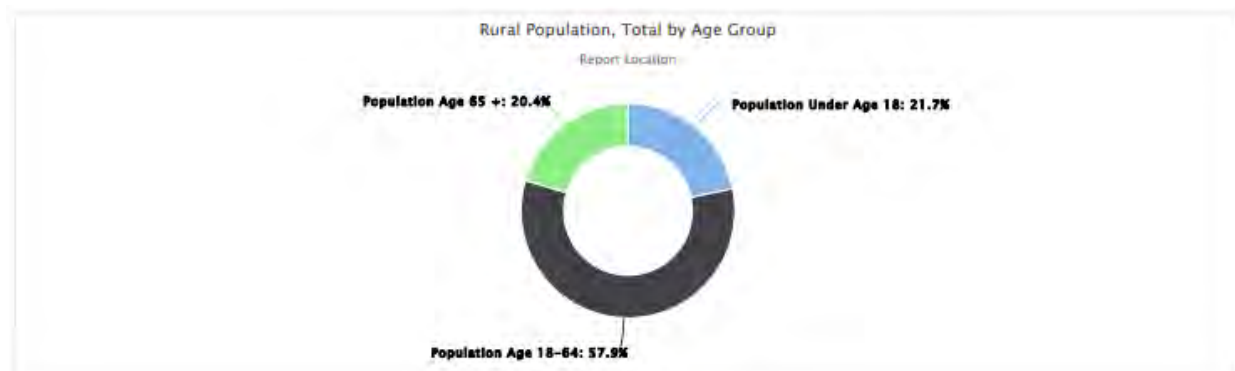
Population Living in Rural Areas, Percent by Tract, US Census Bureau 2020

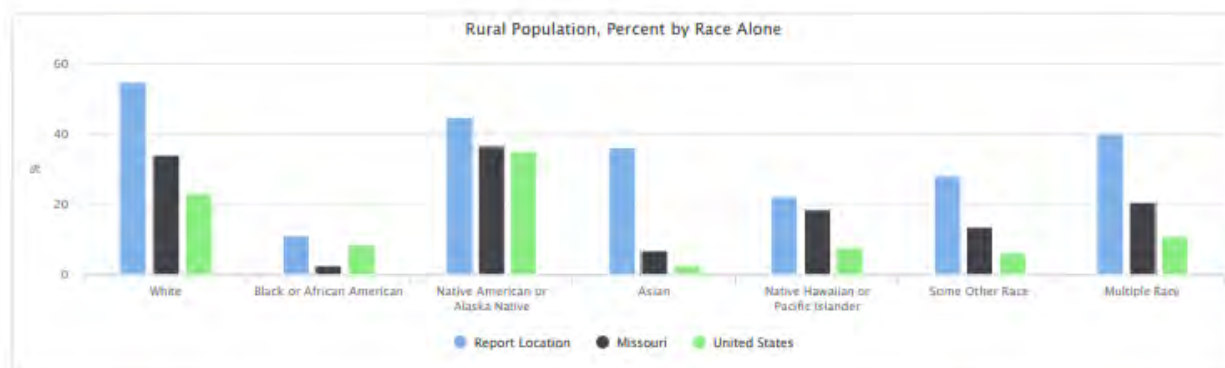

Veterans, Percent of Total Population by Tract, ACS 2018-22



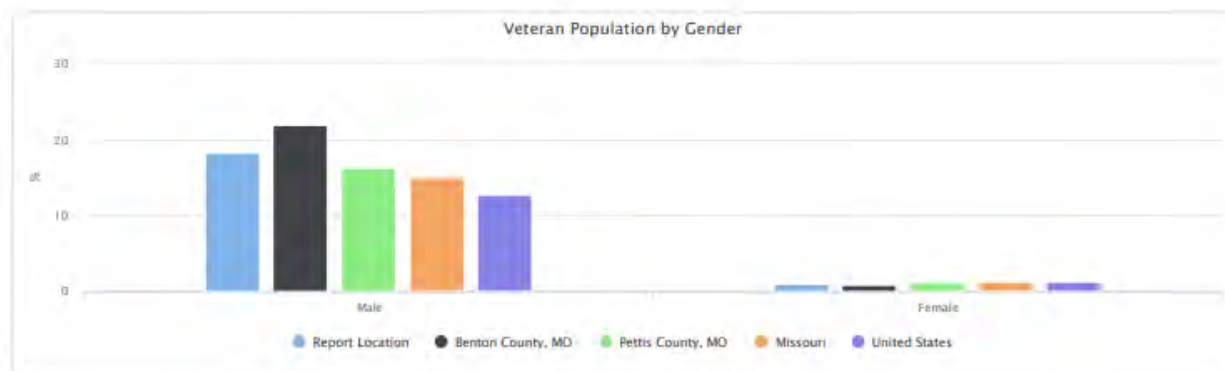

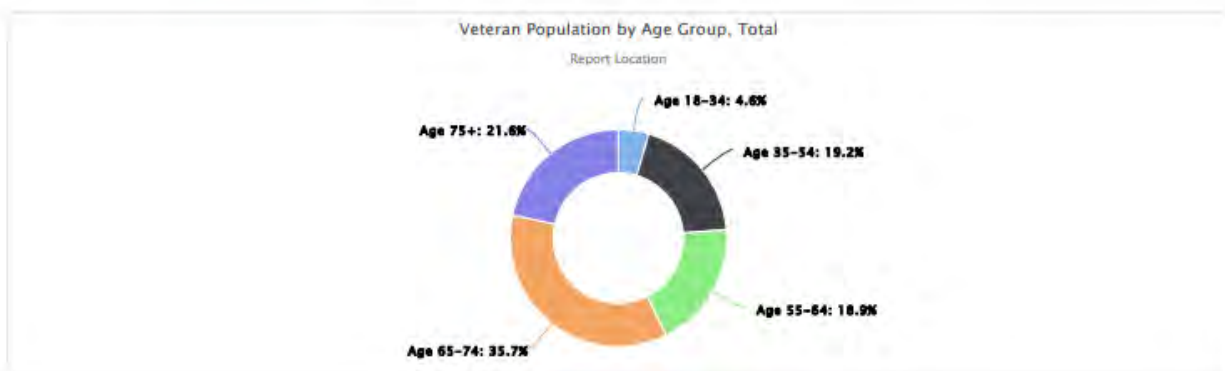

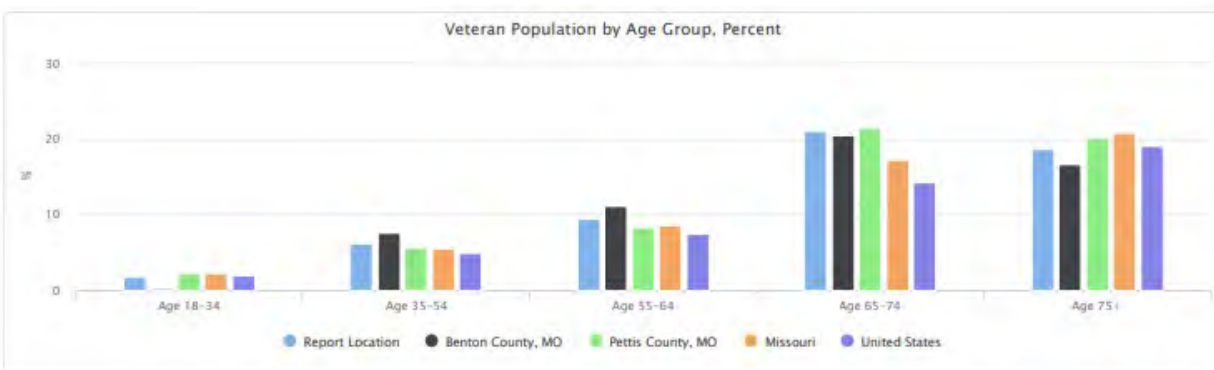

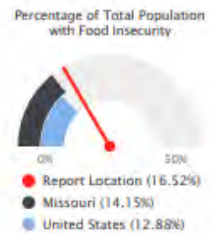

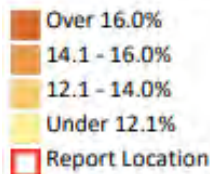

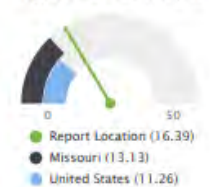

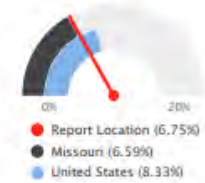

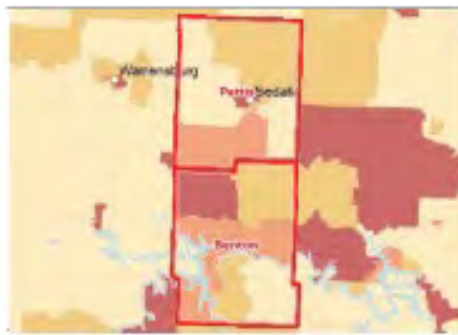

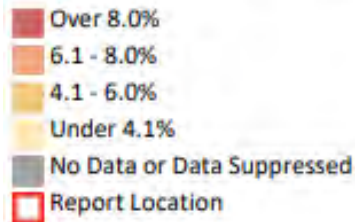
Percentage of Households with No Motor Vehicle

Households with No Vehicle, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



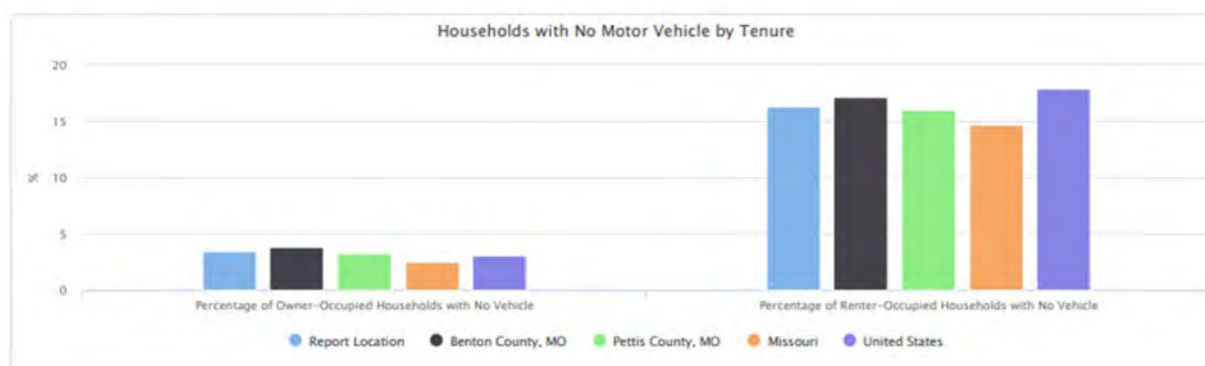

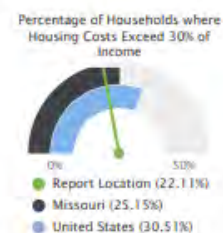

Cost Burdened Households (Housing Costs Exceed 30% of Household Income), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

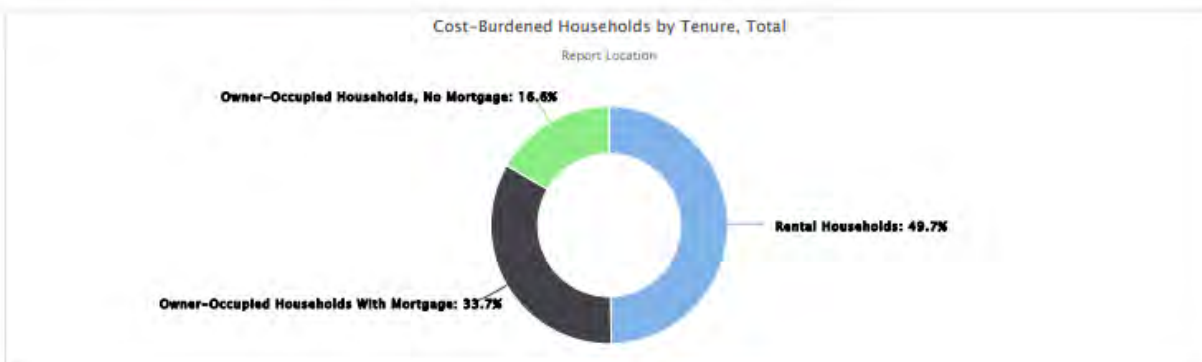

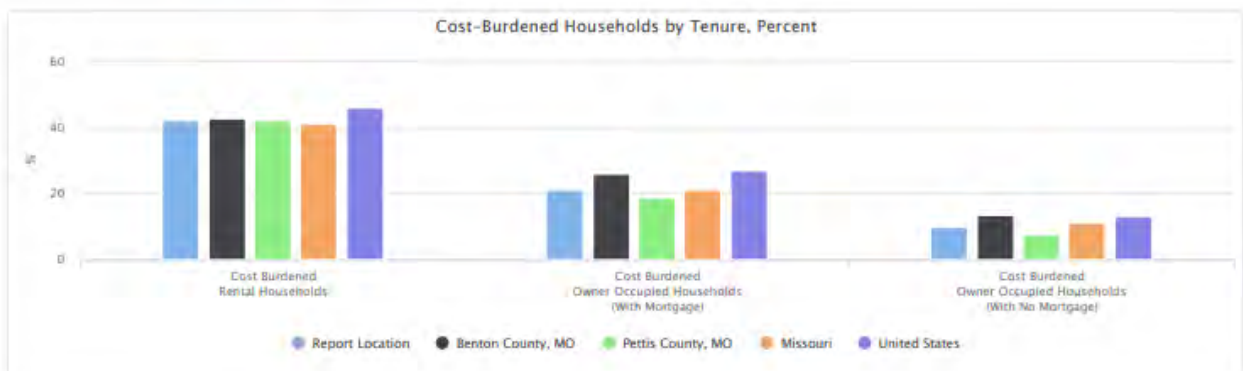

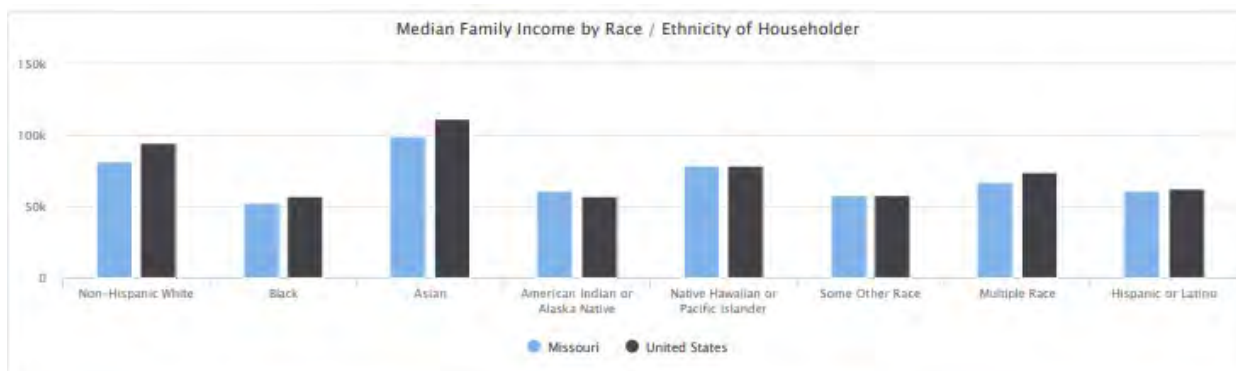

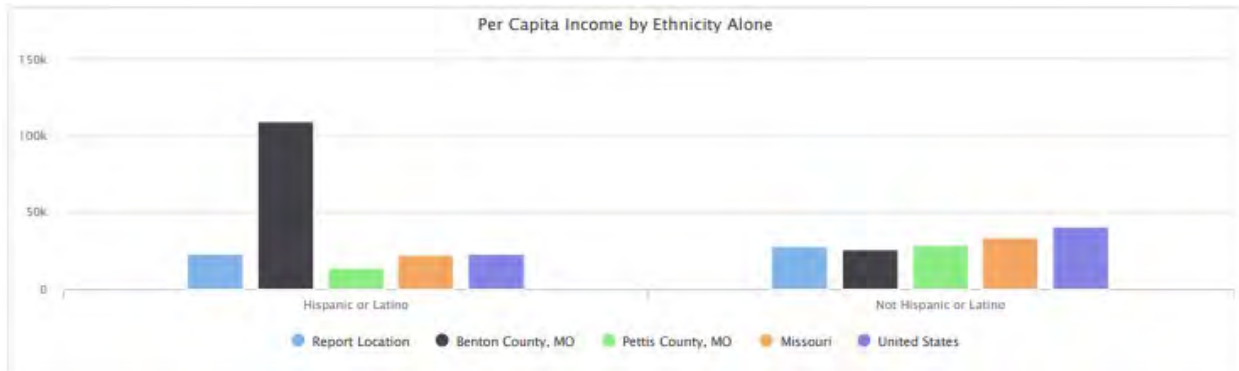

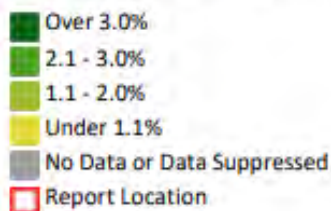

Percent Households with Public Assistance Income



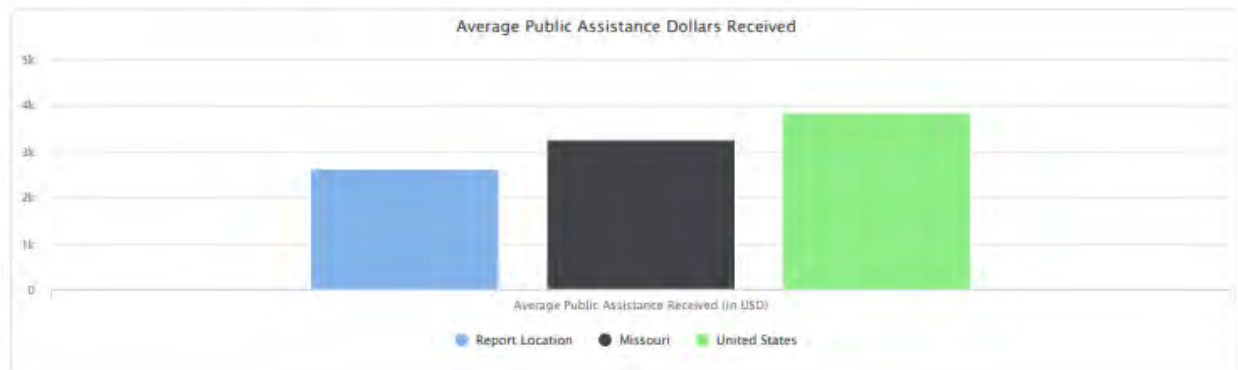

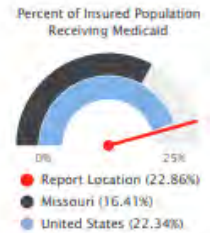

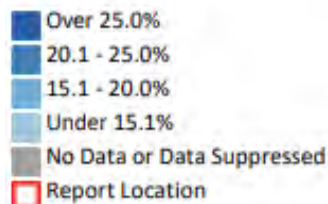

Insured, Medicaid / Means-Tested Coverage, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



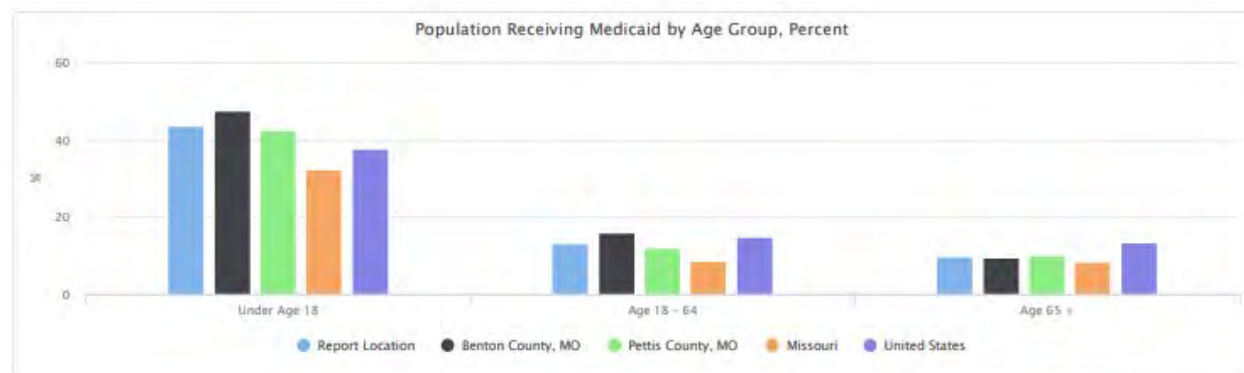

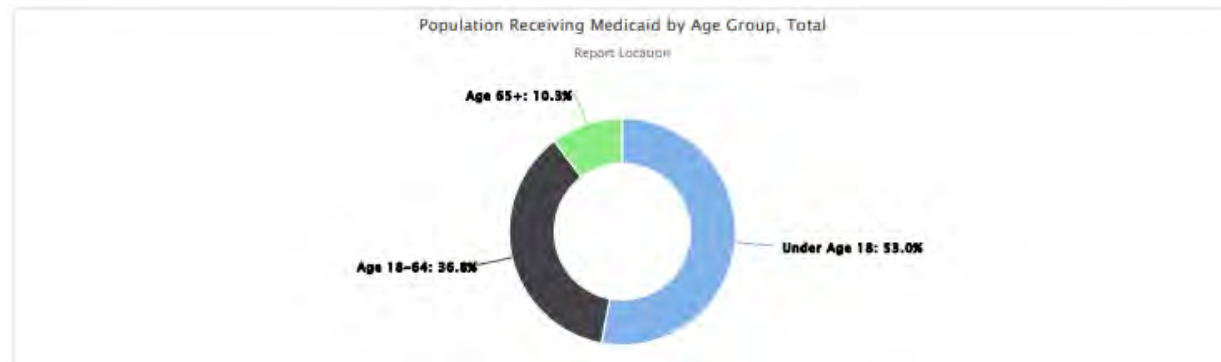

Inadequate Social/Emotional Support, Percent of Adults Age 18+ by County, CDC BRFSS 2006-12

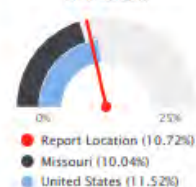

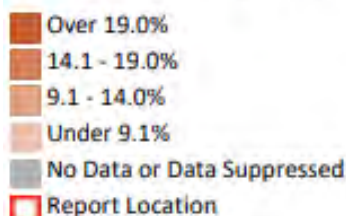
Percent Households Receiving SNAP Benefits

Households Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



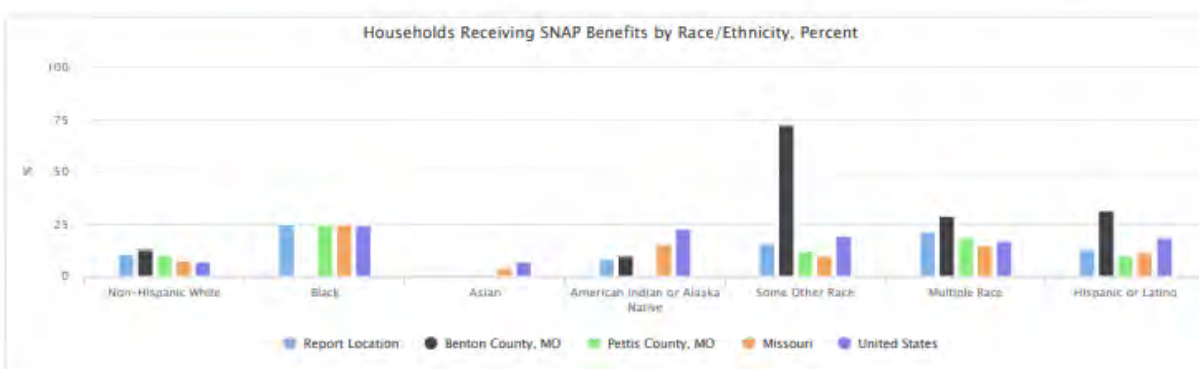

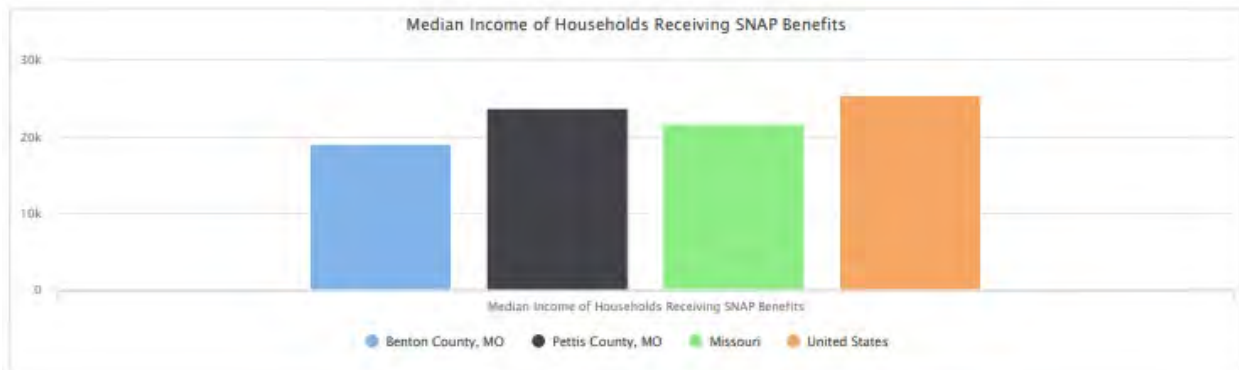

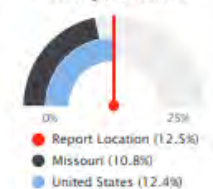

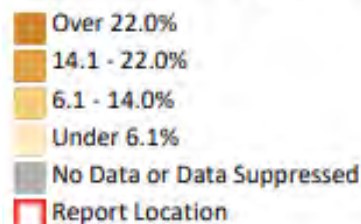

Population Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by County, SAIPE 2021

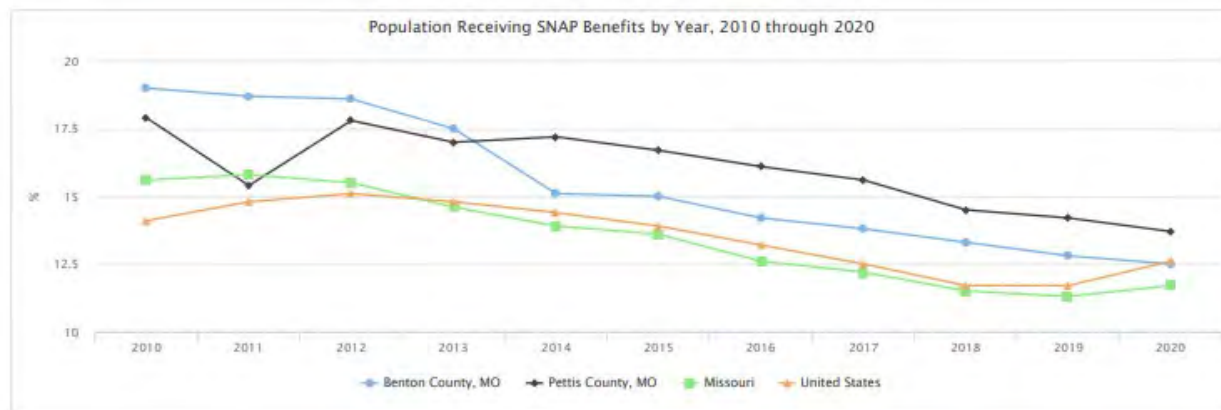

Population with a Bachelor's Degree or Higher, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

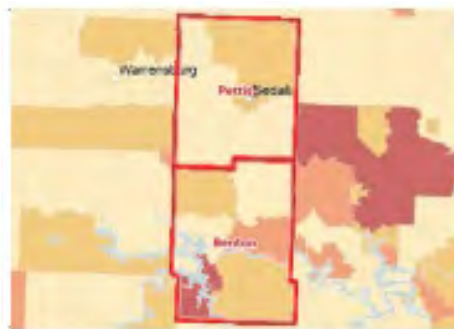
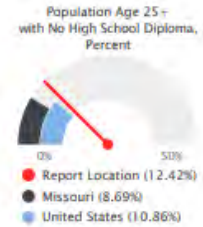

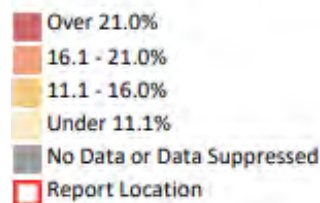

Population with No High School Diploma (Age 25+), Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



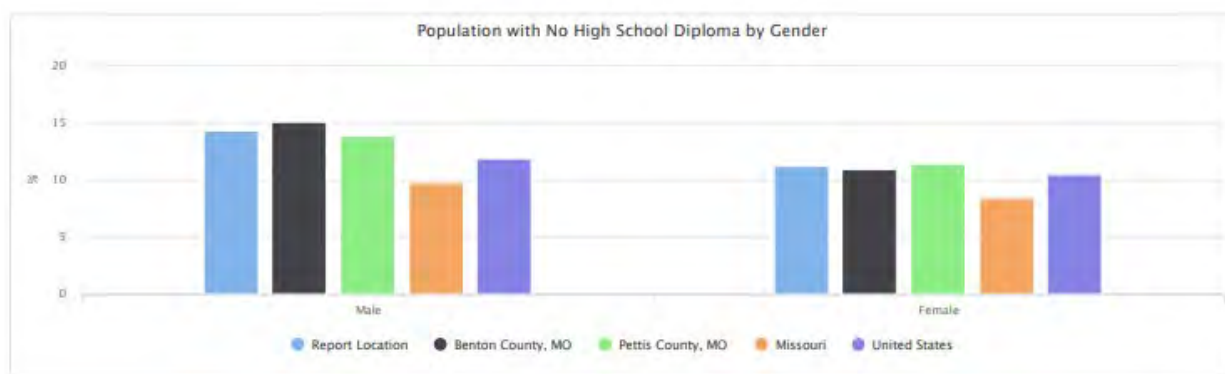

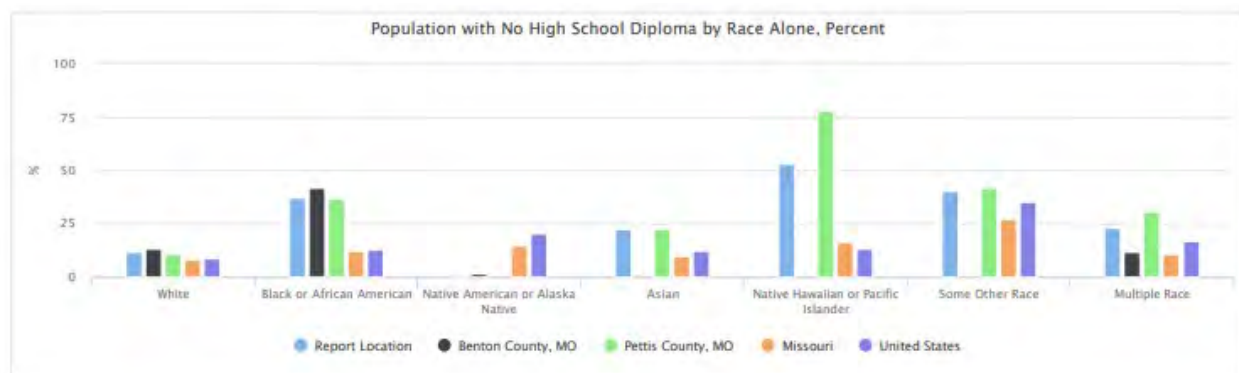

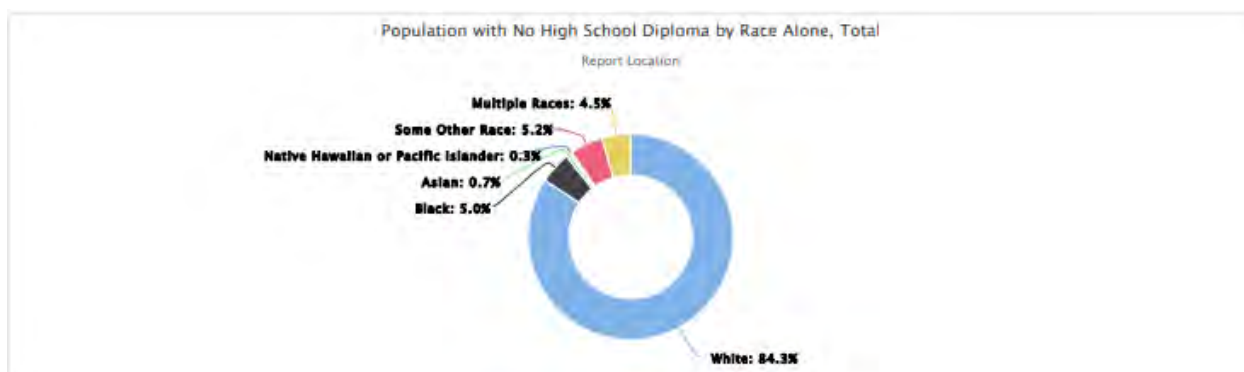

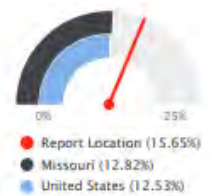

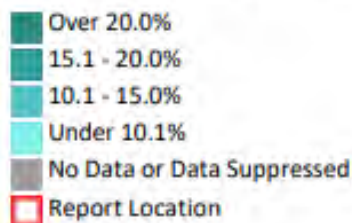

Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22



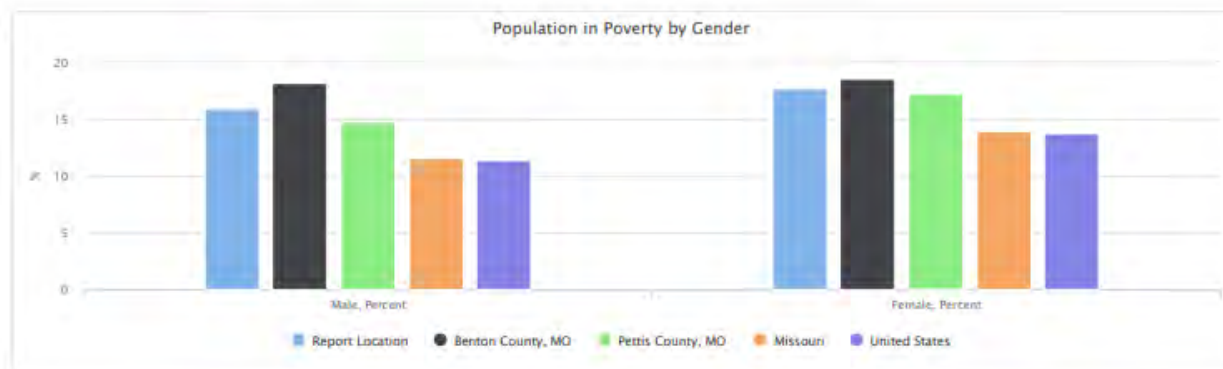

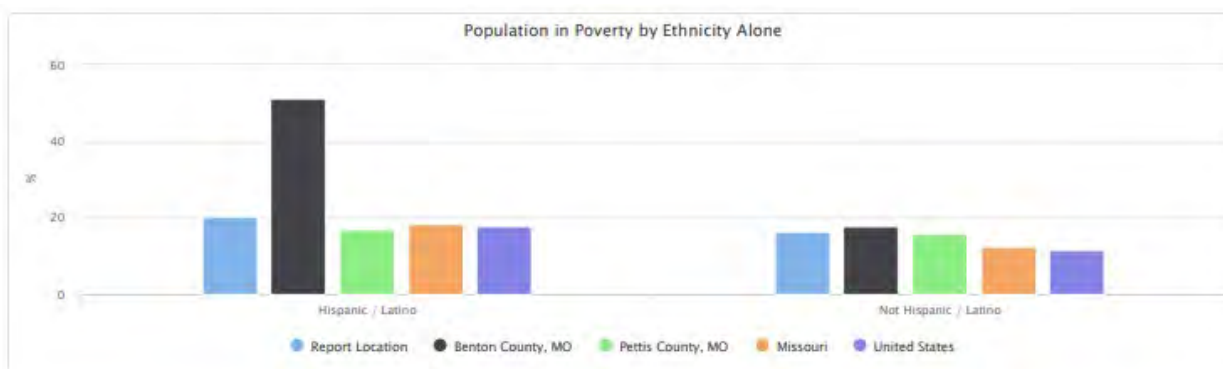

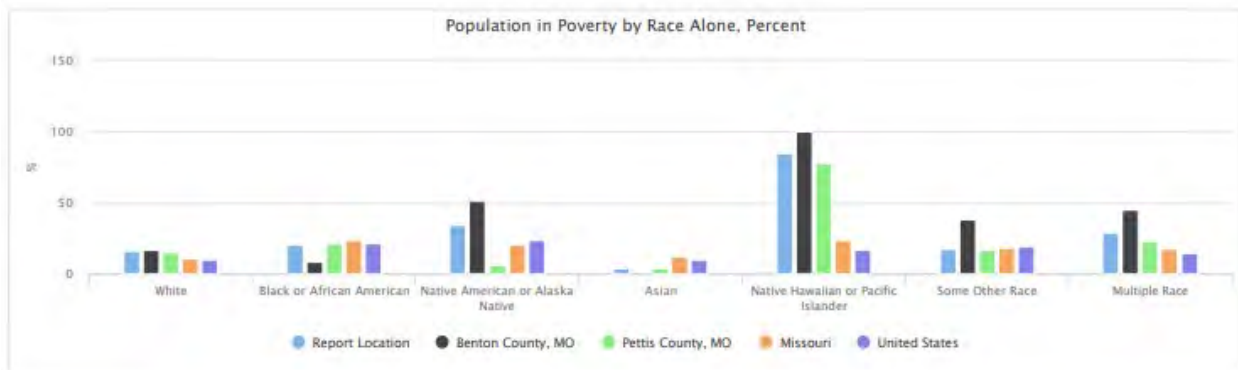

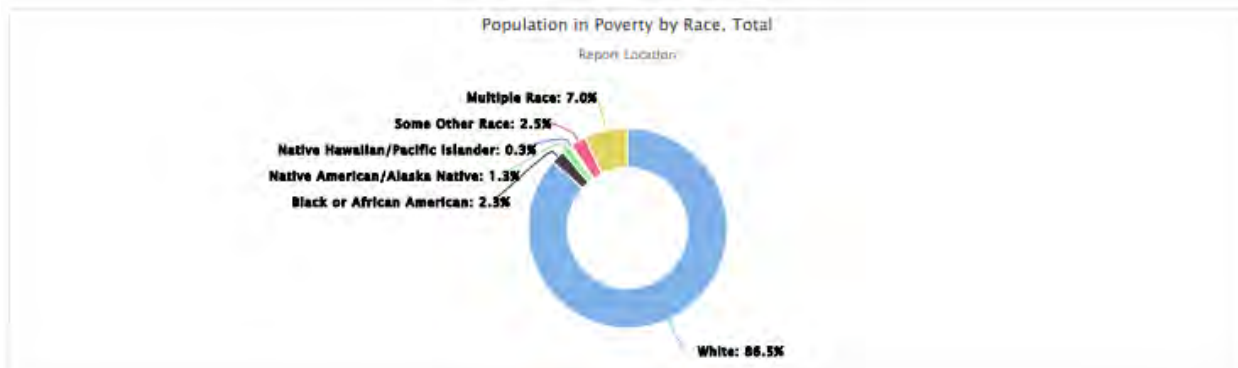

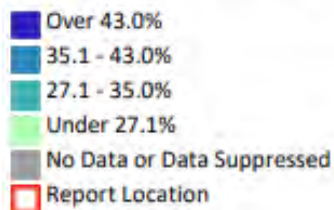

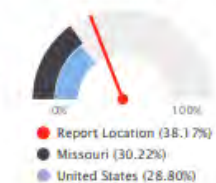

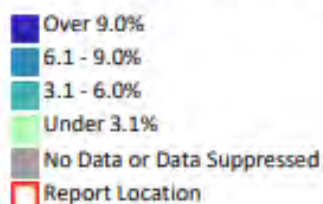

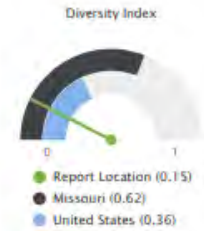
Population Below 50% Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2018-22

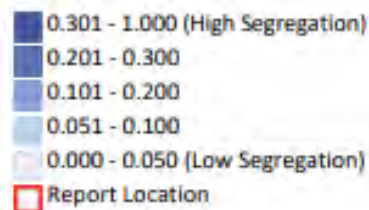

Racial Segregation (Theil Index) by County, US Census Bureau 2020

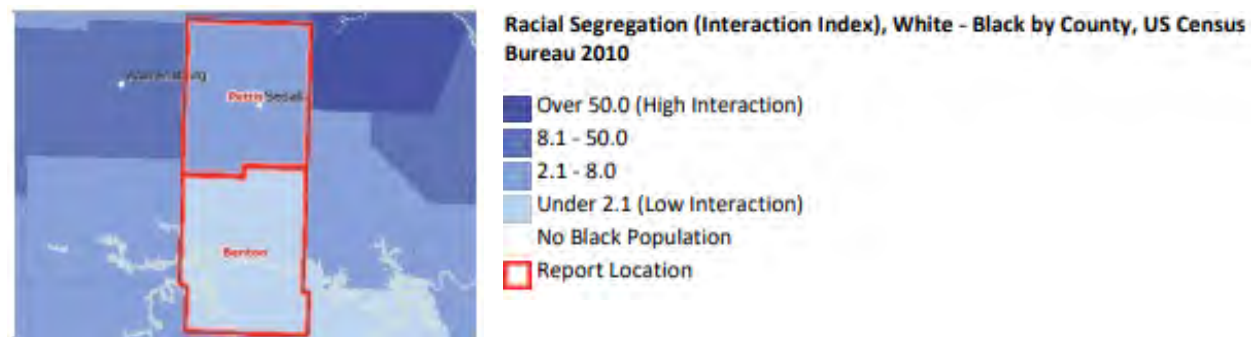

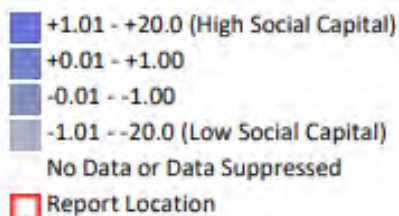

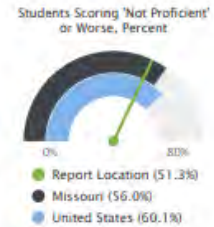
Social Capital Index by County, NERC RD 2014

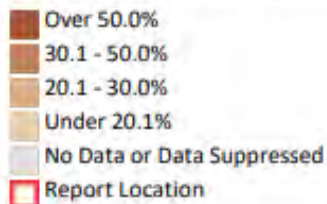

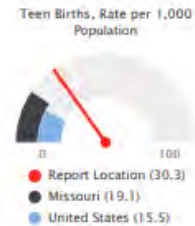


Language Arts Test Scores, Grade 4, Percent Not Proficient by School District (Elementary), EDData 2020-21

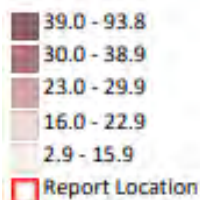

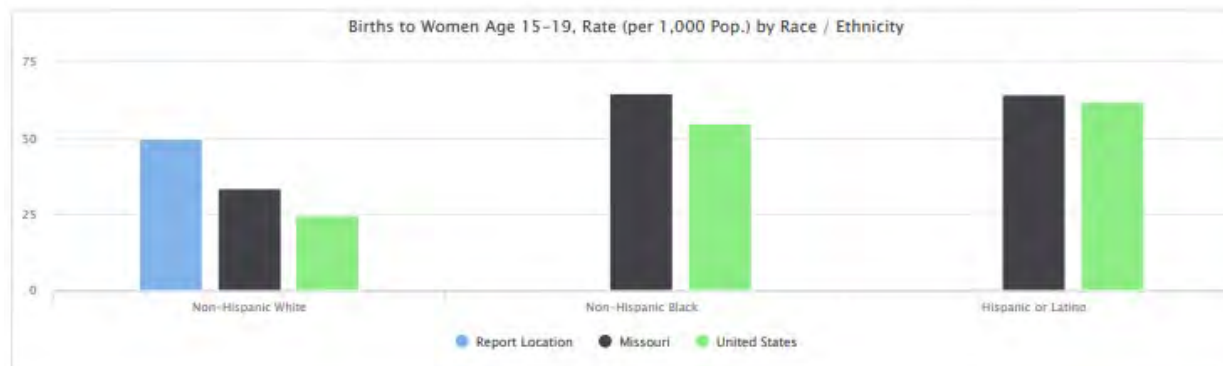


Teen Births, Females (Age 15-19), Rate (Per 1,000 Pop.) by County, CDC NCHS 2020



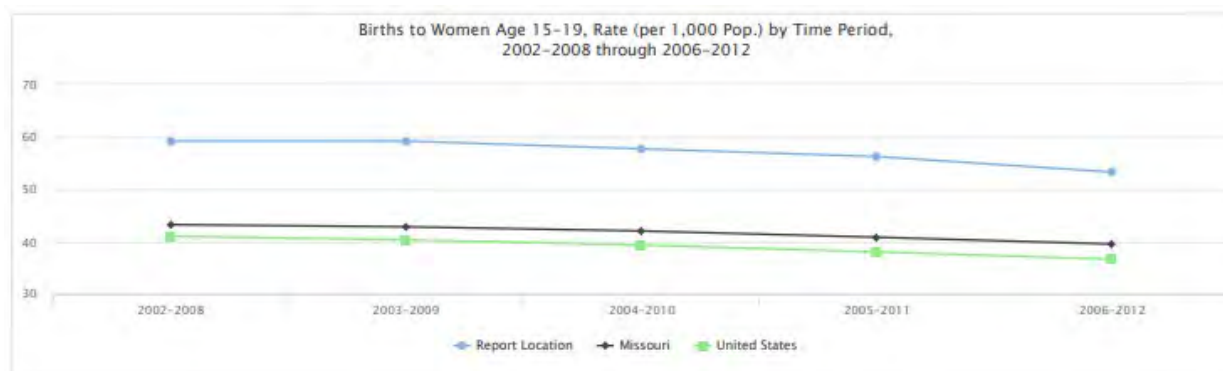

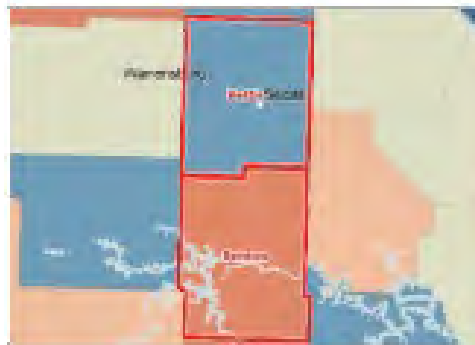

Drug Overdose Deaths, Adult, Percent of Adults Age 18+ by County, CDC BRFSS 2023

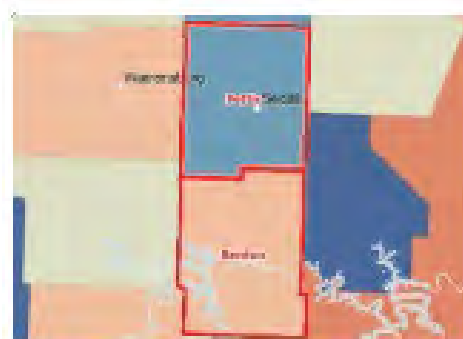

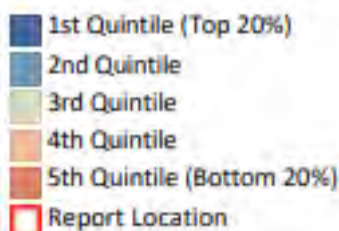

Excessive Drinking, Rank by County 2023

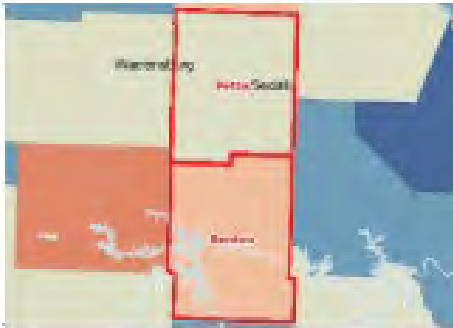

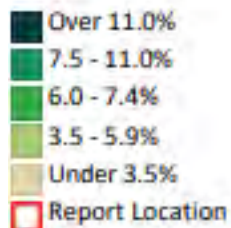

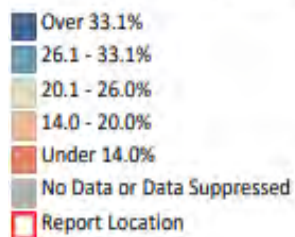

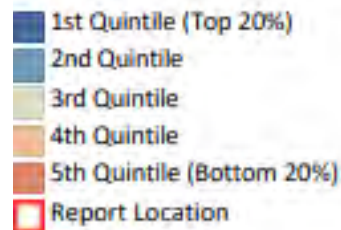

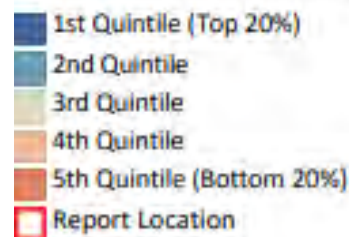

Sexually Transmitted Infections (Chlamydia), Rank by County 2023

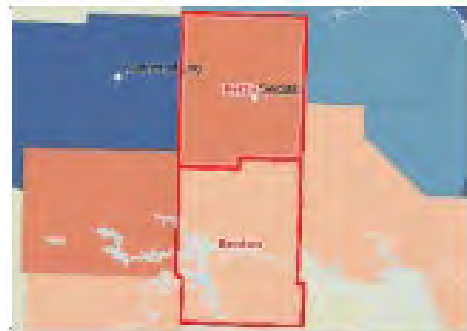

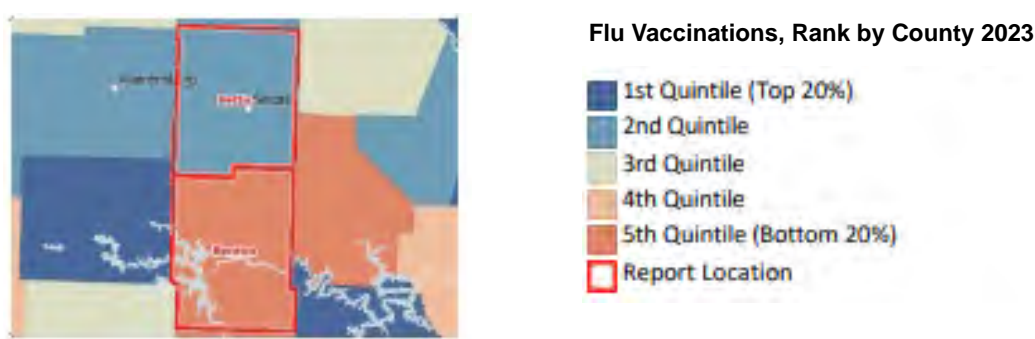

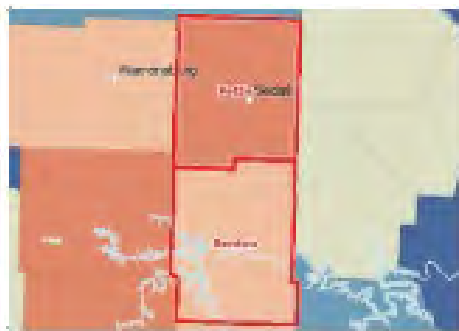

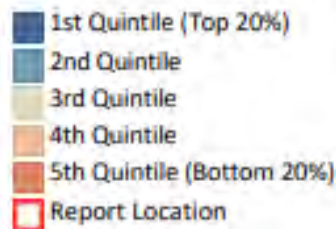

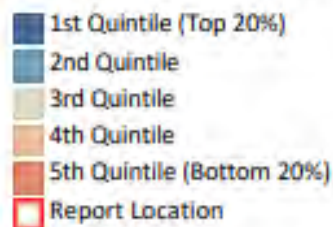

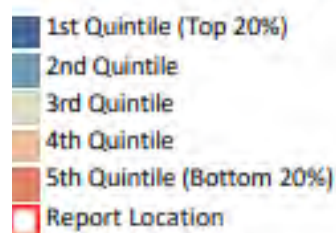

Access to Primary Care Physicians, Rank by County 2023

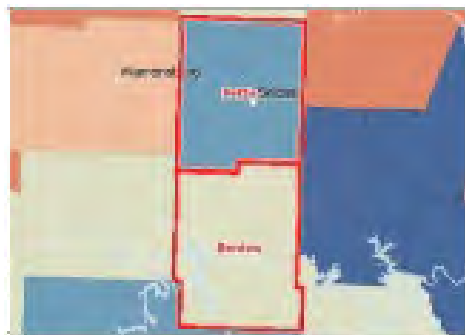

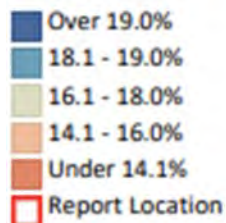

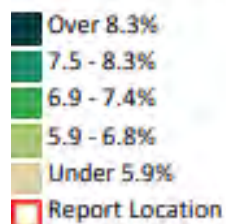

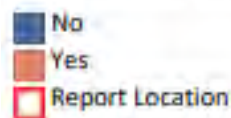

Drinking Water Violations by County 2023

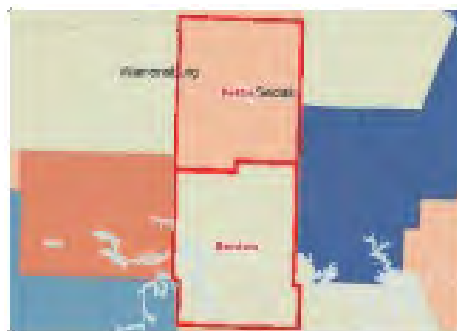

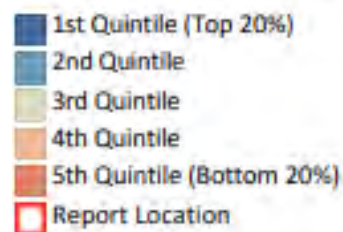

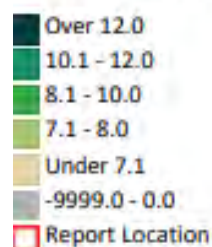

Severe Housing Cost Burden by County 2023

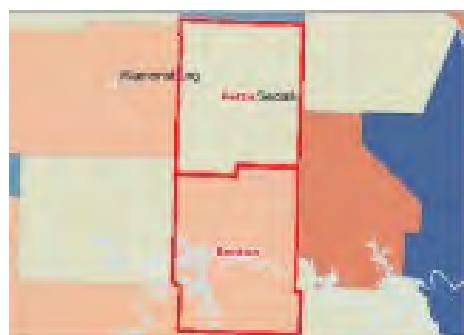

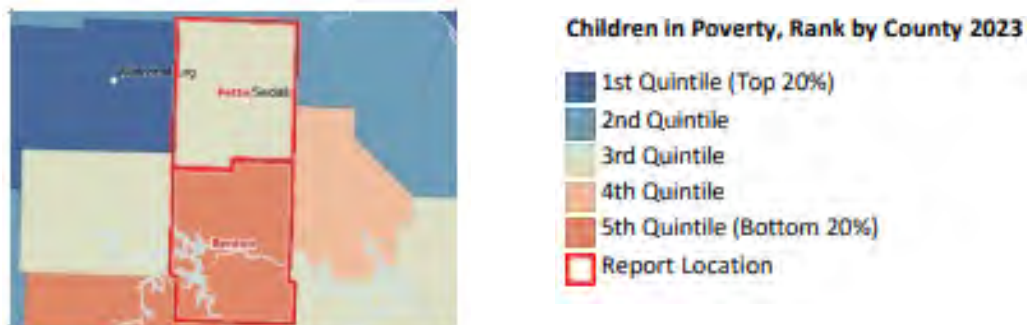

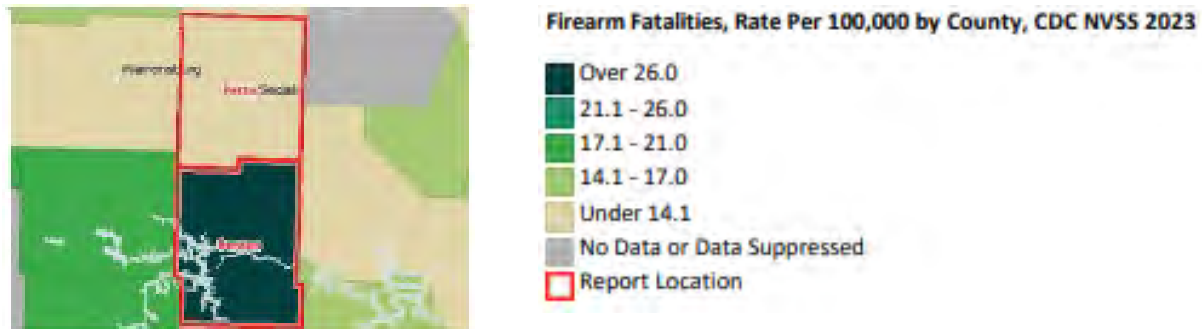

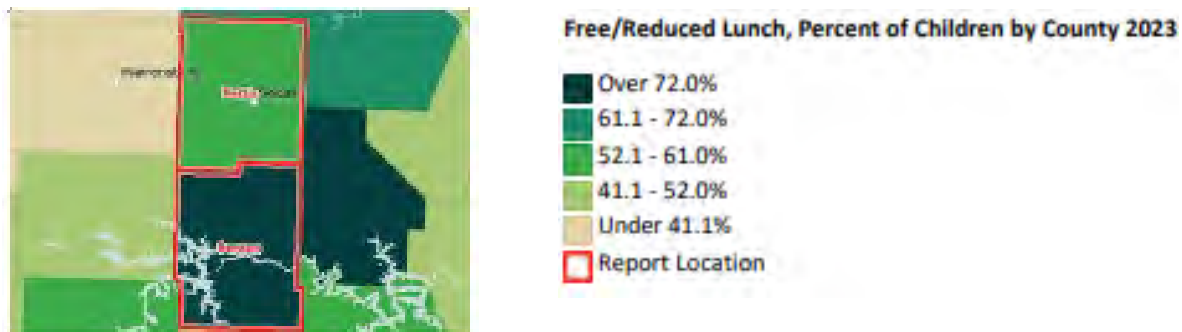

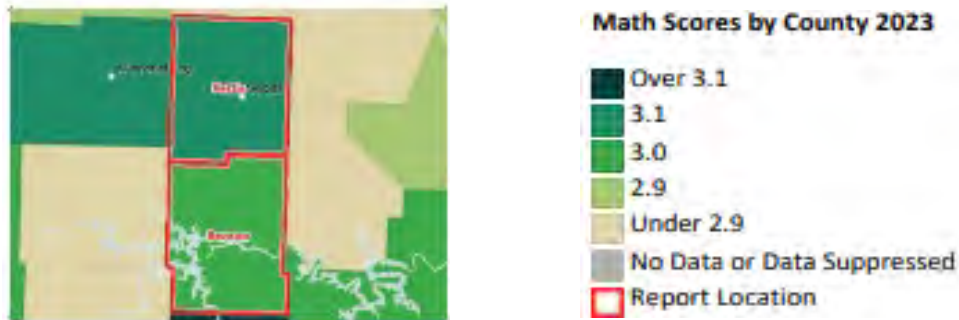

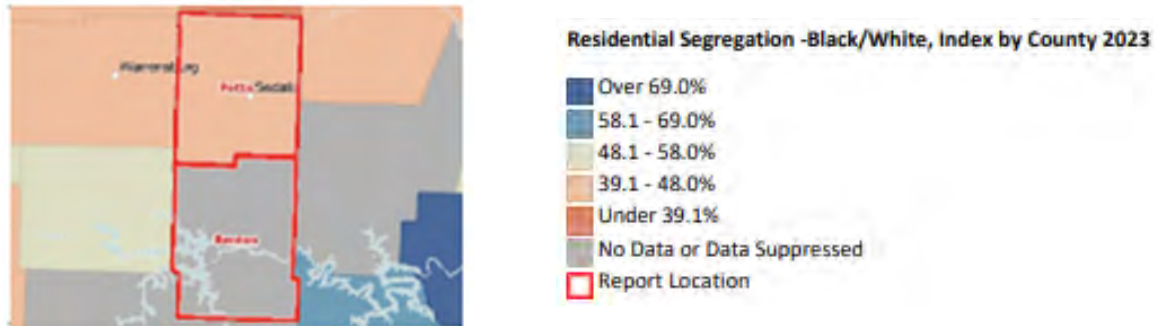

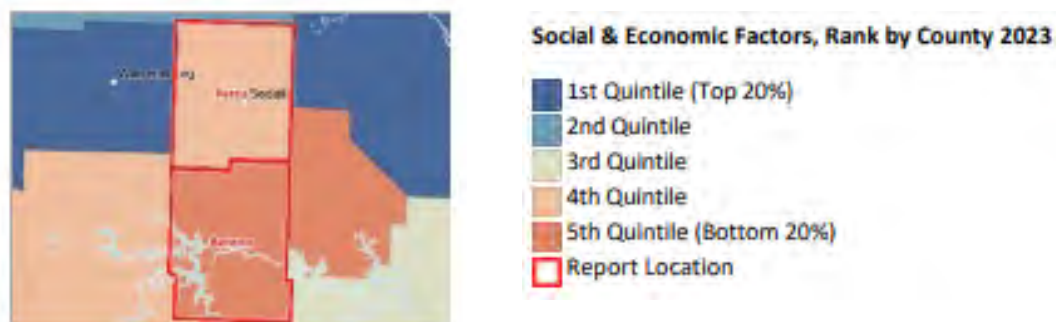

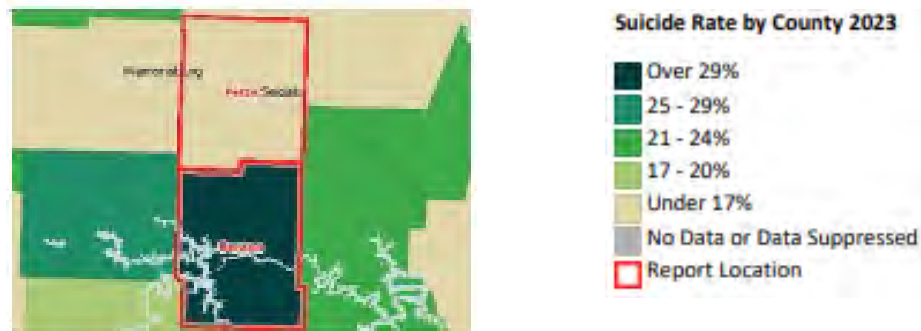

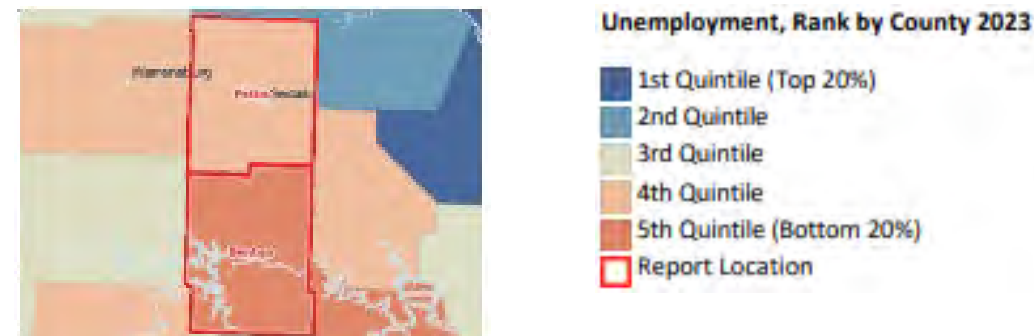

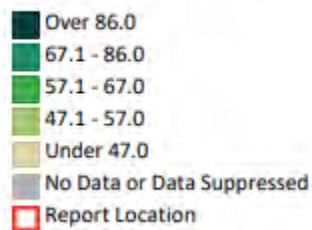

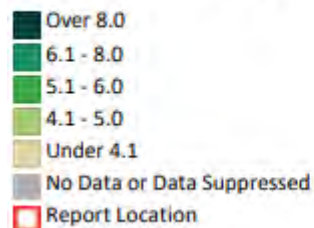

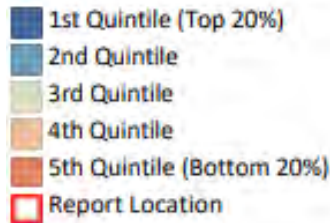

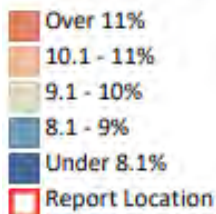

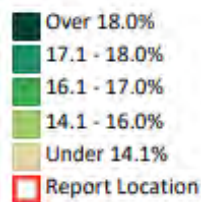

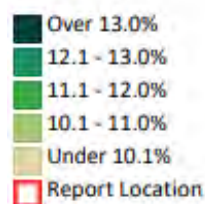

Frequent Physical Distress, Percent of Adults Age 18+ by County, CDC BRFSS 2023

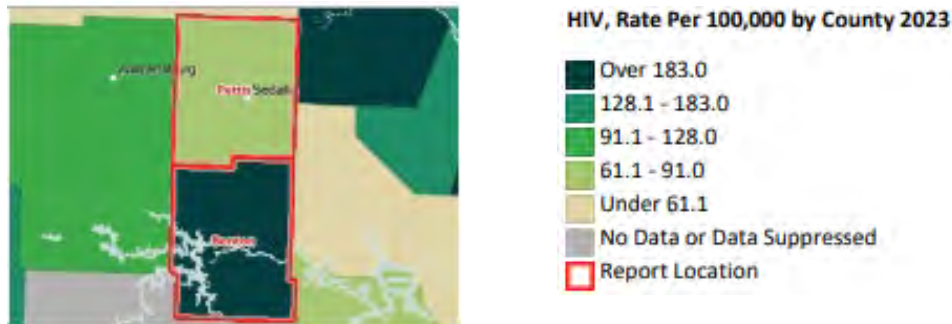

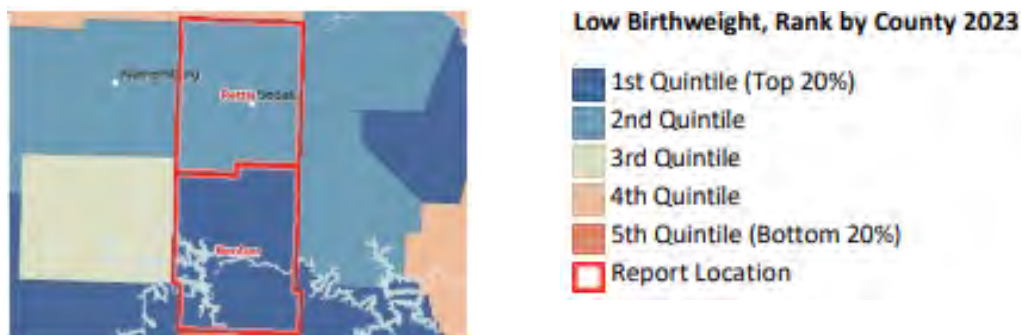

Arthritis and Lupus Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

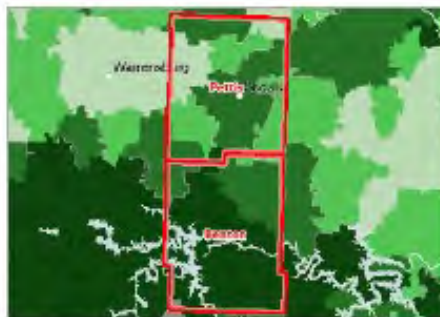

Atherosclerosis Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

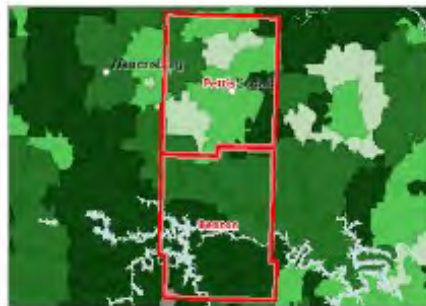

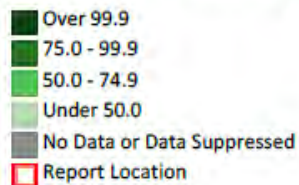

Chronic Condition Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

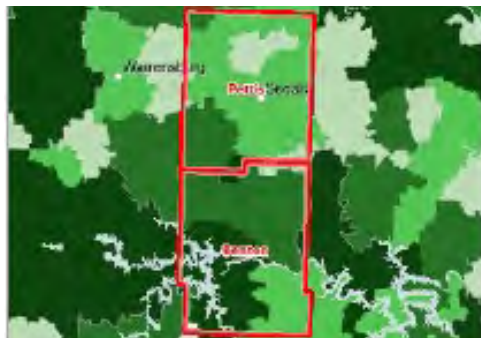

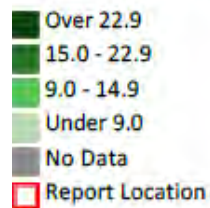

Colorectal Cancer Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

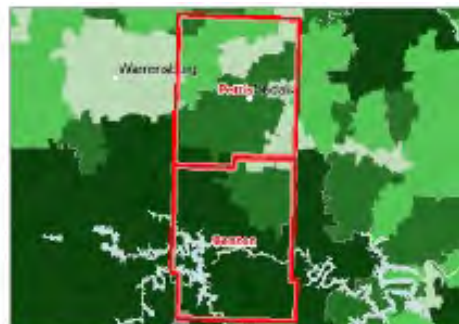

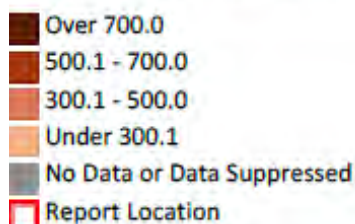

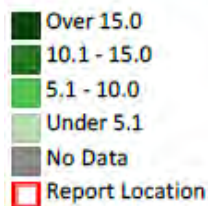

Female Genital Cancer Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Female Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

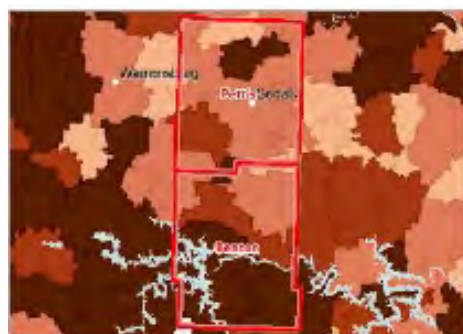

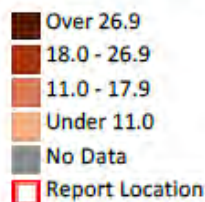

Gastrointestinal Cancer Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

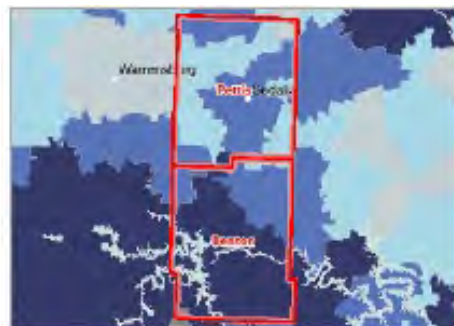

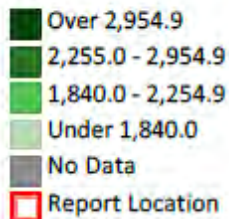

Hospital Utilization, per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

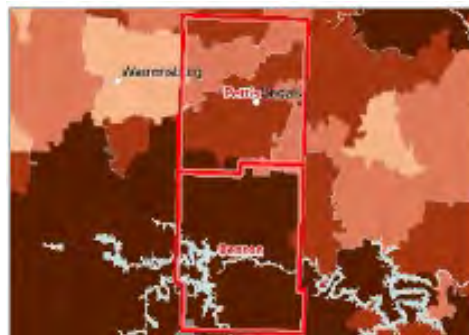

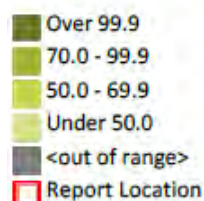

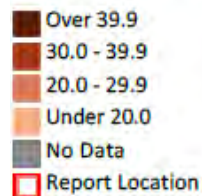

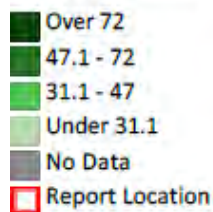

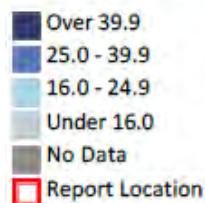

Lymphatic Cancer Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

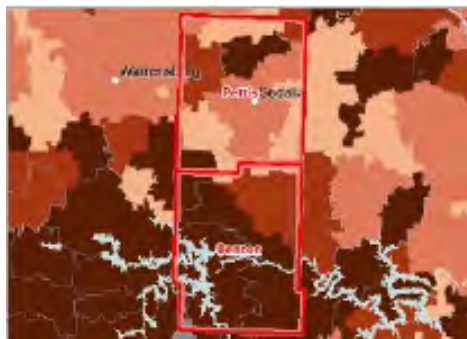

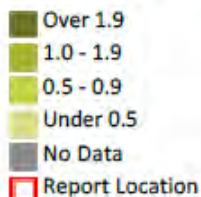

Unspecified Cancer Diagnoses Occurring in a Hospital Setting per 1,000 Total Population by ZIP Code, ZHR 2023

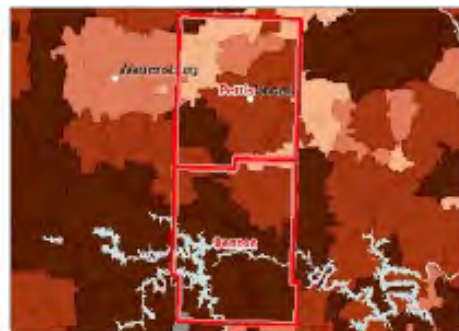

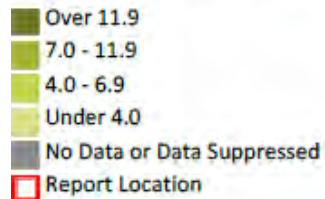

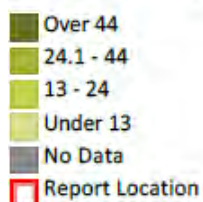

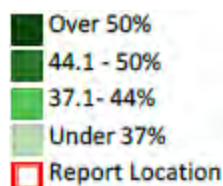

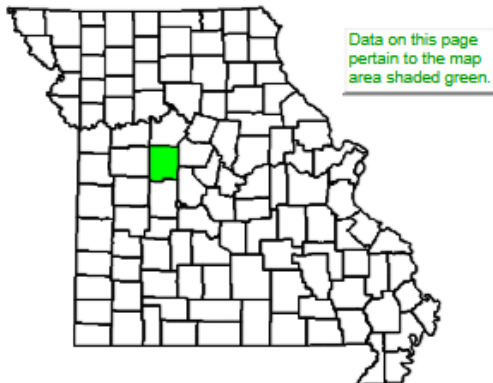

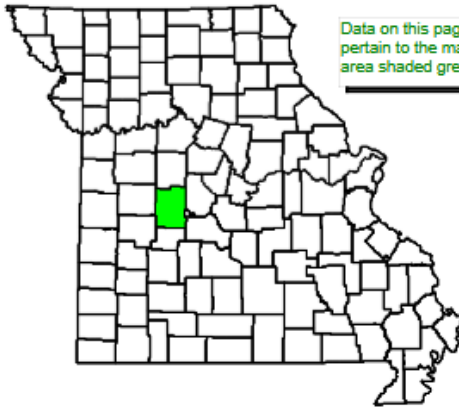

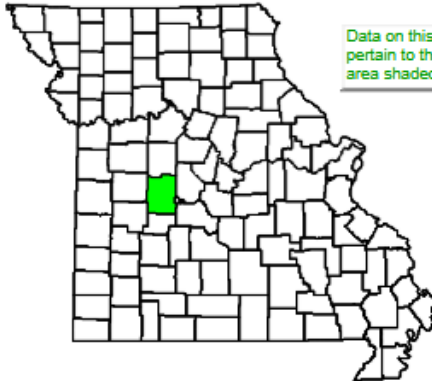

Pettis County Community Partnership

- **Baby Think it Over:** Our Baby Think It Over program uses computerized dolls to simulate what it is like to care for an infant. The program also promotes infant safety. Baby Think It Over simulators and curriculum materials are available to schools, youth groups, scouts, and other teen-serving organizations/programs.
- **MRCC Food Co-op:** Partnering with the Missouri Rural Crisis Center, once each month we can offer people approximately \$40 worth of groceries for \$22. Co-op members pay an annual membership fee of \$10 and the \$22 monthly co-op fee each month they receive an order of food which includes bread, produce, paper products, and canned goods, as well as MRCC's own Patchwork Farms meat products. Members may request multiple orders at the same price per order. Additional meat may be ordered at reasonable rates. All participants of the food cooperative must be current MRCC members. Anyone may participate, regardless of income.
- **Little Essentials:** Pettis County Community Partnership is partnering with The Changing Table, we can provide diapers, wipes, and period products to those in need. Each diaper user can receive up to 50 diapers per month. An assortment of period products is available to those that need them in our Give & Take store in Suite 28A.
- **Community Resource Directory:** We publish a directory of community resources that is available in our lobby at any time. Please contact our Executive Assistant to have information added or updated for your agency.
- **P.R.O.P. – Putting Roofs Over People:** PROP is the name of our current housing program. We provide housing services to households at risk of homelessness or those experiencing literal homelessness in the surrounding 9 counties. Services may include rental assistance, utility assistance, emergency travel assistance, identification fee assistance, security deposits, medication fee assistance, case management, etc.
- **Homeless Hotline – (660) 287-2228:** WE operate a housing hotline for a 9-county coverage area of the state. This hotline is available for individuals and families experiencing literal homelessness. Upon calling, case manager will complete a standardized Coordinated Entry assessment. This will ensure the household will be considered for housing opportunities in the area. This is a vital resource for those experiencing street homelessness.

- **Pillars of Pettis County:** This is a group of community partners who are working to find a viable solution to provide transitional housing for people who are homeless in Pettis County. The meetings are held in the PCCP Conference Room.
- **MO Reentry Process Steering Group:** Community partners share and coordinate resources around housing, education, family support, employment, mental health, and other issues. The meetings are held in the PCCP Conference Room.
- **Family Nutrition Education (Spanish & English):** Our educators help families learn how a well-balanced meal promotes child development and adult health. University of MO Extension is our partner.
- **Give & Take:** Give & Take is our free donation store. Our store is a great way for people to get rid of things they no longer need by putting them into the hands of others who can use them free of charge. We take donated clothing, toys, household items, books, artwork, jewelry and much more. We do take some furniture but please call ahead. Give & Take is an AARP Host Agency Site.
- **Educational Outreach:** The Pettis County Community Partnership through the Caring Community Grant works with local school districts in the implementation of new programs or supplementing existing programs that help in the academic enhancement of student achievement and, well-being of the students
- **Community Closet:** We have a supply of items donated by the community to help our community members meet their basic needs. These items include shampoo, conditioner, body soap, deodorant, razors, household cleaners, laundry detergent, paper towels, toilet paper, etc. Donations are appreciated anytime throughout the year. We rely on our community to help us meet this need.
- **Youth Futures Career Program:** Assist youth in learning and gaining the necessary knowledge, skills, and abilities to help them navigate to adulthood. Services are geared toward youth age sixteen (16) through (21) who are in the Children's division Foster Care system and are residents of Missouri.
- **Pets of the Homeless:** We are a Feeding Pets of the Homeless® Donation Site! Please bring by dog or cat food, treats, or supplies to help! Feeding Pets of the Homeless® is the first and one of the few national nonprofits providing pet food and emergency veterinary care to pets that belong to homeless people.
