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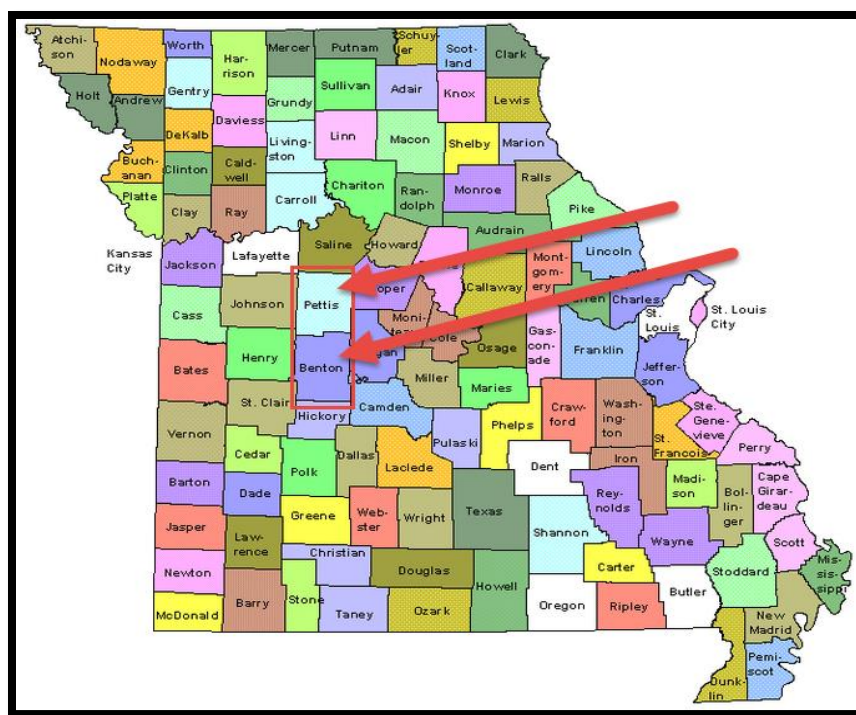


## Introduction

This report synthesizes and summarizes existing secondary data derived from multiple sources on community health indicators in Pettis and Benton counties. Multiple indicators, such as demographics, socio and economic factors, health conditions, risk factors, preventable practices and access to care, among other targeted community indicators, were used to help identify the current gaps within these communities.

A central goal of the secondary data analysis was to better grasp the most significant health issues facing the primary service area in general. ZIP code-level analysis was used for the top issues identified in an effort to recognize the specific populations within the respective counties that were disproportionately affected. A person's ZIP code is more predictive of their health than their genetic code. Having detailed, local information on health factors and health outcomes in the places where Missourians live can help community health leaders take action to create and sustain a healthy Missouri. It provides unique information on the top health factors facing counties in Missouri and the healthiest and least-healthy ZIP codes within each county. The data are arranged to include which health and social factors should be prioritized in each ZIP code. This analysis also will seek to help advance health equity and surgically target interventions where they are most needed.

Lastly, background and content for the collection of primary survey data were provided to supplement existing data for a holistic picture of community health in the primary service area of Bothwell Regional Health Center.

## **Executive Summary**

The people served by Bothwell Regional Health Center in Pettis and Benton counties in central Missouri live in a rural area that includes many unique qualities that citizens have the opportunity to experience and enhance their quality of life.

Education and cultural experiences are readily available. State Fair Community College's flagship campus is located in Pettis County with other locations throughout the central Missouri region. The Daum Museum of Contemporary Art and the Liberty Center Association for the Arts provide arts and entertainment.

People seeking outdoor recreation can choose among many activities including a robust park system in Sedalia, bike riding on the Katy Trail and fishing or water sports on nearby Truman Lake or Lake of the Ozarks. Sedalia, located in Pettis County, serves as home to the Missouri State Fair, which attracts approximately 400,000 visitors annually as well as the annual Scott Joplin music festival.

The occupations of supervisors of retail sales workers, elementary school teachers and secondary school teachers have large numbers of projected total openings, as well as having average wages that are higher than the average wage for all occupations in the west central region. According to unemployment statistics published by the Missouri Economic Research and Information Center database, the April 2019 unemployment rates for Missouri were 2.9 percent, 3.4 percent for the west central Missouri region, 2.9 percent for Pettis County and 4.2 percent for Benton County.

The community and region provide opportunity to leverage resources to address health issues identified in this community health needs assessment. The collection and analysis of primary survey and available secondary data from various sources identify three key themes from which efforts to improve health status and health outcomes may focus.

### **Increase Access to Primary Care, Mental Health and Dental**

According to the findings of the primary survey results of the 551 total number of individuals completing the survey, counseling/mental health services, alcohol and drug abuse treatment, and adult primary care services were identified as the top three medical services needed most in their community.

Secondary data support the community perspective regarding limited access to basic services. The current uninsured rate for both counties combined is 13.11 percent with nearly one in five adults living in poverty. One in four children living in Pettis County and nearly one in four Benton County children under age 18 live in poverty at 100 percent Federal Poverty Level.

The Robert Wood Johnson County Health Rankings 2019 report denotes the ratio of primary care physicians to residents lags behind Missouri (1,420:1) for both Benton County (3,770:1) and Pettis County (1,920:1). See Appendix A.

Similarly, the severe shortage of dentists is noted in Benton County with more than twice as many residents per dentists (4,770:1) as compared to Missouri (1,760:1) or Pettis County (1,770:1). See Appendix A.

### **Healthy, Active Living and Reduction of Obesity**

A review of the primary survey results reveals that obesity was among the top issues doctors addressed with patients during their visits. A further review reveals about 40 percent of respondents reported being told by their doctor they had high blood pressure and needed to lose weight. On the same note, 30 percent reported to have been told they had high blood sugar or diabetes. All these health factors align with the secondary data, thus requiring a comprehensive approach in addressing them through diet and exercise. When asked about the types of health education services most needed in the community, diet and/or exercise was at the top of the list.

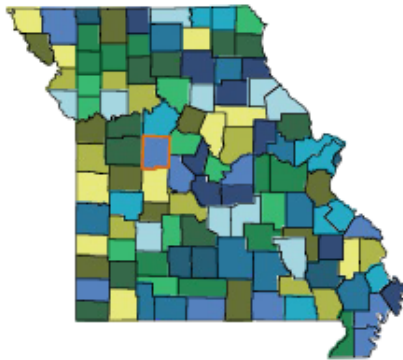
The secondary data support this focus. According to the Robert Wood Johnson County Health Rankings 2019 report, both [Pettis](#) and [Benton](#) County have higher rates of adult obesity at 36 and 34 percent respectively compared to the state rate of 32 percent. Both have a higher percent of physical inactivity compared to the state. These health factors have a strong upstream influence on health outcomes of mortality and morbidity. County level study survey data from the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services further reveals a higher percent of respondents reported that their health was in fair or poor status in Benton County compared to Pettis County. From a population health management standpoint, there is a great opportunity for care coordination with primary care providers and other community partners.

### **Enhance Services to Address Mental Health and Substance Abuse**

When primary survey respondents were asked about the medical services most needed in their community, counseling/mental health and alcohol and drug use were the top two issues identified. Community drug abuse and alcohol abuse health education services topped the list.

According to the [Pettis County](#) 2018 Status Report on Missouri's Substance Use and Mental Health, there were 189 hospitalizations in 2016 with a mental health primary diagnosis and 696 with a secondary diagnosis for mental health. The same report showed 19 hospitalizations with an alcohol primary diagnosis and 125 with alcohol as the secondary diagnosis. Lastly, 12 hospitalizations listed a drug-related primary diagnosis and 141 as the secondary diagnosis. [Benton County](#), on the other hand, had 75 hospitalizations with mental illness as a primary diagnosis in 2016 and 412 as the secondary. Related to alcohol, seven hospitalizations listed it as the primary diagnosis and 62 as the secondary. Drug use was the primary and secondary diagnosis for 12 and 68 hospitalizations respectively. 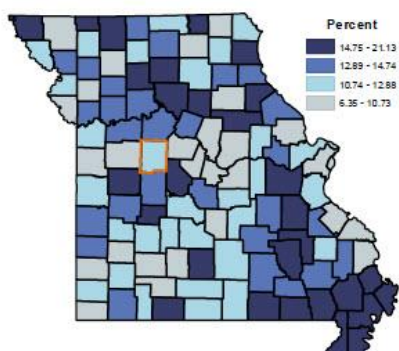

*Condition: Diabetes*



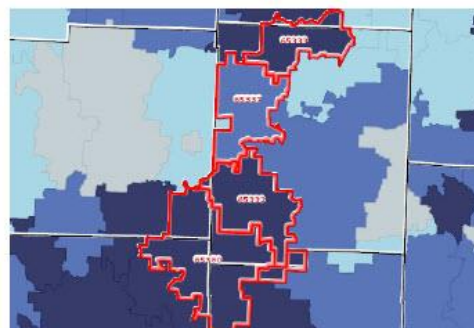

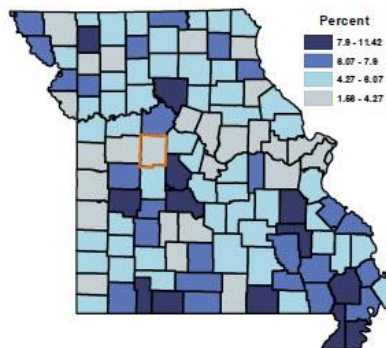

Condition: *Heart Disease*



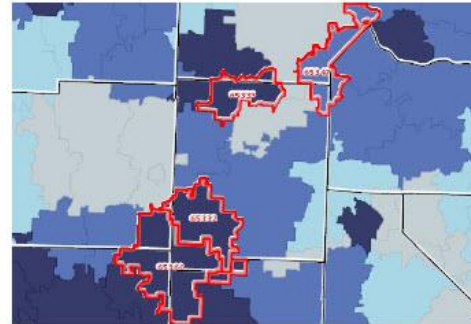

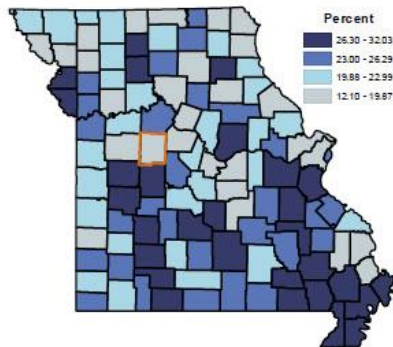

Condition: *Depressive Disorder*



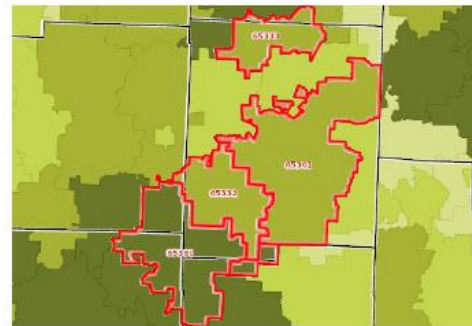

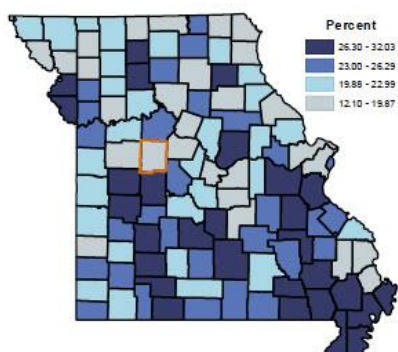

*Condition: Depressive Disorder*



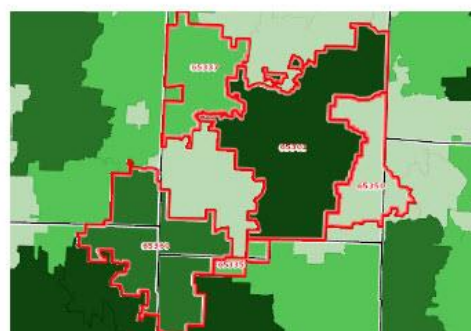

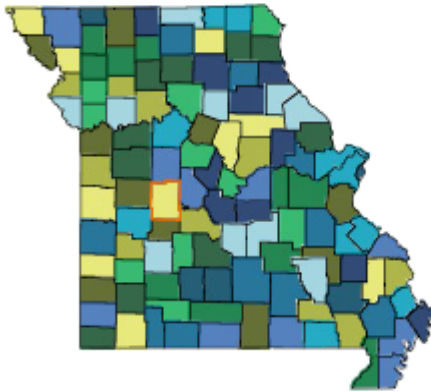

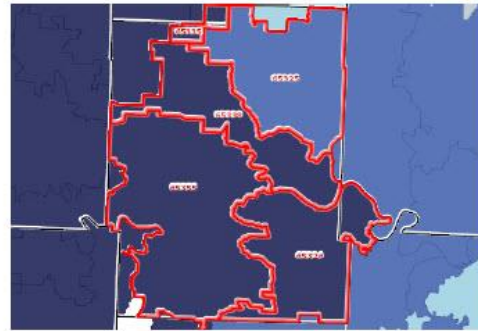

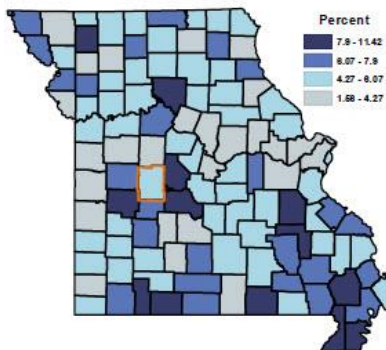

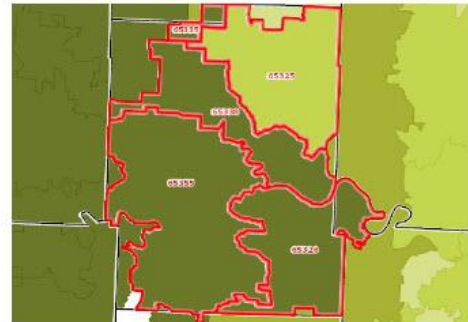

*Condition: Depressive Disorder*



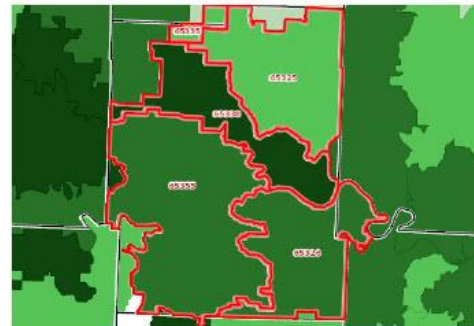

## **Recommendation**

Identifying specific populations and specific health behaviors and health outcomes that are influenced by the three health issues will enable providers and the community to focus resources and attention on priority areas. Of greatest importance is access to coordinated care to promote secondary prevention and chronic care management.

A myriad of strategies may be employed to address these seemingly disparate health issues. For example, work with community citizens, partner organizations and providers to educate about the prevalence of people at-risk of diabetes provides a platform to promote primary prevention through physical activity and healthy eating; implement simple screening tools in organizations and primary care settings to identify people at risk of diabetes; and incorporate care coordination with specialists to reduce complications such as heart disease. Although implementation may be broad, focused implementation and evaluation must target specific populations or organizations to determine the effect. Health status and health outcomes will not change notably within a three-year period of time across a community. However, health outcomes such as preventable hospitalizations for short-term complications of diabetes may suggest improved access and care coordination within primary care settings.

Addressing mental health and substance abuse must be a long-term strategy. The many factors including lack of access, stigmatization and factors contributing to all substance abuse, including prescription, illegal alcohol and tobacco use, require the cooperation of many partner organizations. However, based on survey respondents, the community may be ready to begin addressing this very complex health issue.

## **Community Defined**

Bothwell Regional Health Center's primary service area includes Pettis and Benton counties. It also extends into a 40-mile radius that reaches six contiguous counties: Saline, Johnson, Henry, Moniteau, Morgan and Cooper. Specific data was not collected for the secondary market area.

## **Community Characteristics**

Bothwell Regional Health Center serves an area diverse in agriculture and manufacturing industries. Pettis County is home to State Fair Community College, which has programs in nursing, radiologic technology, dental hygiene, occupational therapy assistant, health care specialist with emphasis in nurse aide, pharmacy technology and health information technology. Tourism in Pettis County is driven by the presence of the Missouri State Fair which hosts about 400,000 visitors during the annual event each August. Additionally, the fairgrounds is the venue for many events throughout the year. The Katy Trail and Sedalia's annual Scott Joplin Festival attract visitors to the community as well.

Located on U.S. Highways 50 and 65, Pettis County enjoys the comforts of rural communities with urban life and the Lake of the Ozarks within an hour's drive. It is a community rich in arts and entertainment with the Daum Museum of Contemporary Art housed on the campus of State Fair Community College and the Liberty Center Association for the Arts located in downtown Sedalia. The Sedalia community boasts a healthy parks system with seven parks, two outdoor aquatic centers, walking trails and a skate park.

A spirit of giving runs deep in Pettis County. Beginning with its foundation, Sedalia has been home to folks who know the importance of giving back to the community. Even Bothwell Regional Health Center, which opened in 1930, was the result of an effort by John Homer Bothwell to build a hospital in Sedalia. He pledged \$150,000 in seed money and encouraged the community to also support the project. The community has strong foundations benefiting education and health care, a United Way organization that allocates more than a half-million dollars to community agencies each year, and Open Door Ministries, which serves as a food pantry and thrift shop and provides financial assistance to low-income families.

In Benton County, Truman Lake and the Harry S. Truman Dam and Reservoir Visitor Center attract many visitors. The amenities attract many retirees. Currently, Harbor Village — a project of Katy Trail Community Health, the Warsaw Senior Center and Pathways Community Behavioral Health — is a 24,800-square-foot facility that houses multiple health and social services. These services include personal care managers, senior meals, adult care programs, recreational and educational programming for adults, wellness programs, financial and insurance assistance, and an entrepreneurial business center.

### **Other Health Services**

In addition to Bothwell Regional Health Center, Pettis County is served by Katy Trail Community Health, a federally qualified health center, the Pettis County Health Center and several private practice providers. Specialty care available in Sedalia includes cardiology, obstetrics/gynecology, ear/nose/throat, orthopedics, general surgery, neurology, oncology (hematology and radiation), rheumatology, pulmonology, nephrology, pain management, sleep medicine, urology and podiatry. Several privately owned therapy/rehab treatment centers are available as well as a private diagnostic center.

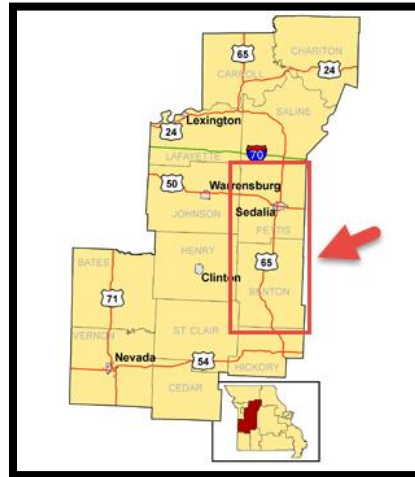
Bothwell Health Center-Truman Lake in Benton County offers primary care, therapy, women's health and radiology services. The Benton County-Warsaw area is also served by Katy Trail Community Health, Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare's primary care clinic and the Benton County Health Department.



## Occupations by Projected Growth

The Missouri Department of Economic Development identifies the area shown below as the west central region of Missouri. Economic data is gathered to gain insight and provide key information necessary to understand the economic status of the region. Community members, employers and policy makers can use this information to identify gaps and address them as needed to ensure economic stability. ### West Central Region

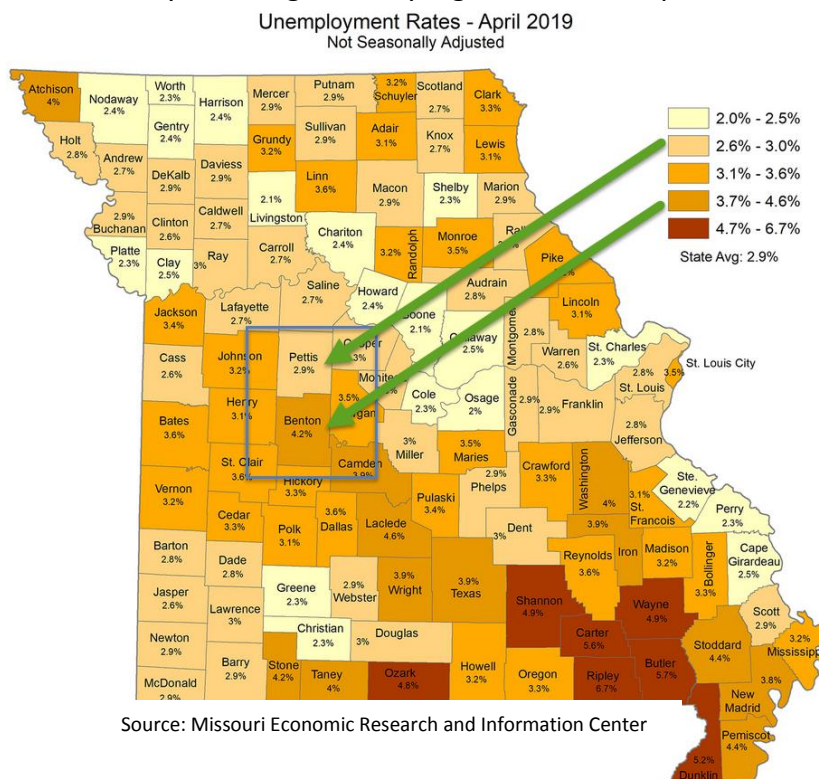

## Occupations by Projected Growth

The table below shows the top ten occupations by projected growth in Missouri's west central region. According to the Missouri Economic Research and Information Center, cashiers, combined food preparation and serving workers, personal care aides, retail salespersons, and secretaries and administrative assistants are the top five occupations with highest total openings in the region.

## West Central Region Top Openings

2016-2026

The West Central region is projected to have over 148,000 total job openings between 2016 and 2026. Total openings comprise growth openings, exit openings, and transfer openings. Growth openings are the result of an occupation growing between the base year and the projected year. Exit openings occur when a worker leaves the workforce entirely, such as retirement. Transfer openings occur when a worker leaves their occupation for a different one.

Of the top 20 occupations with the most total openings, 4 are in the *Office and Administrative Support* major occupation group. The occupations of *Supervisors of Retail Sales Workers*, *Elementary School Teachers* and *Secondary School Teachers* have large numbers of projected total openings, as well as having average wages that are higher than the average wage for all occupations in the West Central region.

## Primary Research Process

### Public Survey

To gather primary data from the market area, a survey instrument for quantitative data and multiple focus groups for qualitative data was employed.

### Survey Layout and Design

The Community Health Needs Assessment Survey was a questionnaire-style survey based on a template provided by the Missouri Hospital Association. The 66-question survey had three sections: (1) health behaviors, (2) medical care and services, and (3) demographics. With one exception, all were multiple choice questions. One open-ended question, "What health or community services should Bothwell Regional Health Center provide that are currently not available?" was used to identify gaps in services. The demographic section was placed at the end of the survey to head off any barriers respondents may have felt when answering questions about income, age and insurance status.

## Methodology

The survey was available online at brhc.org, and paper copies were widely distributed throughout Pettis and Benton counties. The survey period was May 1 to June 7, 2019. To incentivize participation, respondents were entered into a drawing for a \$100 Visa gift card. The goal was to collect enough completed surveys to be statistically significant for the combined population of both counties (62,000) with a five percent margin of error. This meant at least 382 completed surveys were needed; a total of 585 were received. Paper surveys were entered into the same online survey service used to collect online responses to easily analyze results. The survey was translated into Spanish and Russian and paper copies provided upon request. Paper surveys were distributed to the following locations:

### Summary of Key Findings

Key findings reveal that Pettis and Benton counties share many commonalities. When it comes to race description, both counties have a higher white population compared to the state and nation. Pettis County has a significantly higher Hispanic or Latino population compared to Benton County and Missouri. Primary data are an important part of community health

assessment. These data can fill in gaps in secondary data sources, highlight critical issues or concerns, and provide opportunities for community members to actively engage in the community health assessment process.

Survey results further reveal the top pressing health issues in their community are ability to pay for care, illegal drug abuse, lack of health insurance, obesity in adults and mental health. When asked about a preference on health education focus, the top responses were drug and alcohol abuse, diet and exercise, stress management and smoking prevention. Most of these findings are similar to the findings of the 2016 community health needs assessment.

Results from the most recently completed community health assessment survey show that 37.91 percent of the respondents mentioned being told by a physician they have high blood pressure. On the same note, 38.49 percent were told to consider losing weight for health reasons.

### **2019 Focus Group Summary**

As part of the Community Health Needs Assessment, two focus groups (one in Pettis County and one in Benton County) were held to gather insight on health information and perceptions from a variety of professionals in the community. Each focus group was asked the same base questions that focused on identifying general health issues, barriers the county and community face in overcoming the issues, and potential strategies to overcome the barriers identified. Although both counties have unique health issues, there were social issues that overlapped between Pettis and Benton counties, primarily the poverty level of the two counties. These social issues stem from community needs and impact overall health of the communities. Bothwell's role in both counties is to provide health care options along with health partners to better the communities which they serve. Detailed summaries from each focus group are included below.

#### **Pettis County**

Pettis County focus group members were influential individuals from essential community organizations and businesses. Health care administration and leadership members represented Bothwell Regional Health Center, Crossroads Hospice and the Pettis County Health Center. In addition to health care representatives, the focus group included participants from city and community partners including Care Connection for Aging - Sedalia Senior Center, City of Sedalia, State Fair Community College, the Sedalia Police Department and Tyson Foods. Members were selected to participate based on their organization's role in the community. Katy Trail Community Health's representative was unable to participate in either focus group, however, insight was provided via one-on-one communication. The other community health care provider chose not to participate.

Many specific health issues were identified as the biggest challenges in the community; many tied back to a social issue. The top health issues identified were lack of knowledge and access to available resources, lack of immunizations and mental health services, illegal and prescription substance abuse, and the poverty level of the community which affects overall health of the community. Other issues that were discussed included chronic diseases such as diabetes and obesity and primary care providers nearing retirement. The group discussed at length how the poverty level of the community drives many of the health issues.

Citizens lack knowledge and access to the many different services and organizations that help provide resources to the community. Applying for assistance is difficult for some due to

transportation issues, language barriers, reading levels, or not meeting basic requirements such as a permanent address which is required when applying for some government assistance. Due to lack of access to adequate housing options many lower income families deal with unstable housing. The cost of living to provide a stable, safe and clean environment for many is not obtainable even with a steady paycheck. Unstable housing conditions take a toll on both the physical and mental health of the family. The nutrition of the family suffers due to the lack of income available for the cost of food. It was discussed that school faculty and staff see the poverty first-hand as the meals provided there are the only nutritional meal available to children. Health issues arise without proper nutrition, and treatment is delayed due to the cost of health care.

The immunization percentage continues to decline in Pettis County as second-generation immigrants and other parents choose not to immunize their children. Although parents have the right to refuse immunizations based on religious or medical exemptions, many make their decisions based on false information circulated in society. The decline of immunized children in the public school system puts the community at risk for an outbreak of a variety of preventable diseases.

Mental health and substance abuse were also topics of debate. Currently there is a lack of resources available in the community to diagnose and treat mental illness. It often takes multiple days to find and place patients in appropriate settings to receive the required care. Due to the lengthy process, some resort to self-medicating which in turn results in substance abuse. Illegal and prescription drug abuse go hand in hand as there are a handful of addicts that had a legitimate injury and were prescribed medication. Once the injury is healed and the individual no longer has access to the medication, some resort to heroin. Heroin addiction is prevalent in the community and is a constant concern for community leaders.

Implementation strategies discussed to combat the identified issues included various mentorship and community worker programs that would help individuals learn more about available resources and help them sign up for those resources. Another approach is to synergize community efforts in tackling the substance abuse issue as many organizations are working on potential solutions, but it will take the entire community to implement. A single location, like a community center, could aid in offering services, education and health checks for the public rather than individuals having to visit multiple locations. The largest barriers to implementation are time and funding; organizations are limited by the available dollars in the community.

Bothwell is making strides to help the community by offering a few different programs. One of the programs includes Wellness Works — a program that will help occupational health coordinate with employees concerning insurance benefits. This in turn helps keep employees healthy and able to work. Another service being implemented is a centralized call center for Bothwell entities that should help ease the access to health care for patients. Eventually, this center could potentially act as a community health resource by incorporating other health partners.

## **Benton County**

Benton County focus group members were individuals from essential community organizations and businesses. Health care administration and leadership members represented Bothwell Regional Health Center and the Benton County Health Coalition. In addition to health care representatives, the focus group included participants from city and community partners including Benton County Care Connection for Aging and the Benton County Ambulance District. A representative from the Sedalia School District unable to attend the Pettis County discussion was also in attendance.

Many community health issues were identified including a lack of transportation, low literacy levels, children on Medicaid, poor nutrition for seniors and hospital readmissions. These are all related to two core issues: an aging population and the poverty/education level of the community. Although substance abuse is a concern, it was not identified as a key challenge.

The Benton County aging population has a difficult time accessing proper health care. Although options are available in the community, a lack of specialists and the constant turnover of physicians worsen the issue. Many seniors prefer to see the same physician and are uncomfortable with change. In addition to primary care provider changes, when transitioned back to the area from a larger health institution, seniors sometimes get “lost” in the system if they do not have a primary care provider listed. This leads to higher hospital readmissions as proper medication intake and treatment follow up are not monitored by a provider.

The poverty and education level in the county are low and affect the health of the community. A lack of transportation impacts the individual’s access to proper health care and nutrition. Meals are provided by a program through the Benton County Care Connection for Aging organization. Without home delivered meals one-third of the elderly population would be without food. Literacy is an issue among the population, making applying for available aid difficult. Although many applications for assistance are available online, a lack of in-home internet contributes to the access boundaries faced by the community.

Children who are on Medicaid are not seen on a regular basis, leading to health issues going undiagnosed. Children who would qualify for Medicaid are not being enrolled in part because many are in short-term care with grandparents and/or foster care while parents are “temporarily out of the picture” and don’t want to fill out the paperwork. Lack of transportation compounds the issue. Benton County has a higher immunization percentage because the older caregivers are firm believers in immunizations.

Implementation strategies discussed to combat the identified issues included working together to implement systems to help seniors continue their treatment when transferred back into the community from larger health systems, continuing to recruit physicians who want to practice in rural health, and encouraging Medicaid enrollment for children to ensure yearly appointments. The biggest issue facing implementation is the financial responsibilities of parties involved. It is hard to provide transportation and services when limited funds are available.

Bothwell is working to provide access to better health care by bringing additional specialties to the area and helping patients complete forms for disability and Medicaid while still in the hospital. Swing beds at the hospital also allow patients to transfer from larger health systems to Bothwell to continue their care closer to home, thus making follow up with primary care providers easier to coordinate.

## **Secondary Research Process**

Data from the U.S. Census, exploreMOhealth, Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services-Missouri Information for Community Assessment, Community Commons, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the University of Wisconsin's Robert Wood Johnson Foundation County Health Rankings are a few examples of secondary data sources that were used in this process. Data from the primary service areas will be benchmarked against state and national data whenever possible to identify emerging trends. Findings from these results will be the basis for any decision-making and will ensure that resources will be allocated where they are needed most.

### **Secondary Research Data**

Secondary data findings revealed Pettis County has over twice the total population compared to Benton County. Both of these counties have a significantly lower percent of blacks and Asians compared to the state and national trends. A review of the total population by ethnicity shows Pettis County has a substantially higher rate compared to Benton County and Missouri. Select health factors per the exploreMOhealth spotlight on ZIP health report reveals that Benton County has a higher prevalence rate of depressive disorder, COPD, diabetes, asthma, cancer and angina or coronary heart disease compared to Pettis County and the state. While Pettis County is trending lower than Benton County on all of the aforementioned measures, it is trending higher than the state on COPD.

A careful review of the social and economic factors of population with no high school diploma shows Pettis County has a slightly higher percent population age 25 and above with no high school diploma compared to Benton County. The population over 25 years with no high school diploma by gender in both counties, state and nation is higher than that of females across the board. According to the national center for education statistics database, Pettis County has a substantially higher on-time graduation rate than Benton County, Missouri and the nation. While Pettis County has a slightly higher percent population age 25 and above with a bachelor's degree or higher compared to Benton County, both of these counties have a significantly lower percent compared to the state and nation. This particular indicator is important because studies have shown that people with more education live longer, healthier lives than those with fewer years of schooling.

Education is important not only for higher paying jobs and economic productivity, but also for saving lives and cost savings. Both Pettis and Benton counties have a significantly higher percent of students eligible for free or reduced price lunch compared to the state and nation. It is also evident that the percent of children eligible for free lunch alone has increased significantly from 2010 to 2017. While Pettis County has a slightly higher average and median household income compared to Benton County, both of these counties have a substantially lower average and median household income compared to the state and nation. According to the five-year American Community Survey estimates, both counties have a lower average and median family income compared to the state and nation.

When it comes to the per capita income by race alone, white fair better in Pettis compared to Benton County while black or African Americans in Benton County fair better on the same measure compared to Pettis County. While Pettis County has a higher percent of families earning over \$75,000 annually compared to Benton County, both lag behind the state and nation. Compared to the state and nation, both counties have a slightly higher percent of individuals living in households with income below the 100 percent Federal Poverty Level. Evidently, a drill down of this data by ethnicity further reveals that the percent Hispanic/Latino living in poverty is higher than the non-Hispanic/Latino population in both jurisdictions. A review of this data by race alone further shows that black or African Americans have a higher percent of population living in poverty compared to white in both counties. Both of these counties have a slightly higher percent of children living below the 100 percent FPL compared to the state and nation. A review of this indicator by race alone reveals that a higher percent of black or African American children are living in poverty compared to white.

Benton County has a higher unemployment rate compared to Pettis County, state and the nation. The combined average annual unemployment rate for both of these counties has decreased consistently from 2010 to 2017. Benton County has a higher percent of households where housing costs exceed 30 percent of total household income compared to Pettis County. Compared to the nation, both of these counties have a lower percentage of households with no motor vehicle. A further review of this measure shows that there is a higher percentage of renter occupied households with no motor vehicle compared to owner occupied households in both counties, state and nation.

While Pettis County has a slightly higher percent of uninsured population compared to Benton County, both have a higher rate compared to the state and nation. The uninsured population by ethnicity alone shows the percent Hispanic/Latino is higher than non-Hispanic/Latino in both counties, state and nation. A drill down by race reveals non-Hispanic whites have the lowest percent of uninsured population compared to black or African Americans, native American/Alaskan natives, native Hawaiian/Pacific Islanders, and other races across the counties, state and nation. Both counties have a higher rate of uninsured children compared to the state and nation. They also have a higher percent of insured population receiving Medicaid.

Compared to the state, both counties had a lower percent of its population reporting food insecurity per the most recent data derived from the Feeding America database. Benton County reported a higher percent of child food insecurity rate compared to Pettis County. Both counties had an extremely low percent of food insecure children ineligible for assistance compared to the state and nation.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Behavioral Risk Factor Survey System, Pettis had a higher age-adjusted percent of adults aged 18 and older who self-reported lacking social and emotional support compared to Benton County, the state and nation. Both counties had a significantly higher teen birth per 1,000 population. Births to females age 15-19 per 1,000 by race and ethnicity revealed that it was highest among non-Hispanic whites in Benton County compared to Pettis County. While both counties had fewer violent crime rates per 100,000 population compared to the state and nation, Benton County had a higher rate compared to Pettis County.

A review of Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services County Level Study data reveals that a higher percent respondents reported their health was in fair or poor status in Benton County compared to Pettis County. Residents in Benton County reported a higher average of poor mental health days per month and average activity limitation days compared to Pettis County. A higher percent of respondents to the CLS survey indicated they could not get needed dental care in Pettis County compared to Benton County. While Pettis County had a higher percent of individuals who reported they did not get the required medical care overall, a higher percent reported it was due to cost and transportation in Benton County. Comparing the two counties, Benton County had a higher percent of respondents who reported smoking cigarettes every day, smokeless tobacco use, electronic cigarettes, and attempts to quit cigarette smoking. A higher percent of respondents of the CLS survey revealed they have not had their blood cholesterol checked in Pettis County. A higher percent of Benton County respondents revealed they have never had mammograms and recent flu vaccination.

Compared to Pettis County, Benton County reported a higher percent of individuals with high blood pressure, high cholesterol among age 35 and older, reported heart attack, angina or coronary heart disease, asthma, diabetes, cancer, COPD, emphysema or chronic bronchitis, arthritis, depressive disorder and kidney disease. Compared to Benton, a higher percent of Pettis County respondents stated they have sidewalks in their neighborhoods, roads and streets

with shoulders or marked lanes for bicycling in their community, ease in purchasing healthy food in their neighborhood, less exposure to secondhand smoke at work, and a higher percent of individuals that would support a state law supporting smoke free workplace.

The results of this secondary data analysis show Pettis and Benton counties have similar issues warranting a collaborative, well-coordinated, multifaceted approach to address the common problems together. They also share similar demographics, socioeconomic factors, chronic disease, leading causes of death, preventable hospitalizations, substance abuse, infectious diseases, maternal and child health factors, among other factors considered in this analysis. Sharing these results with them and looking for areas of collaboration will help address the underlying problems required to ensure healthy communities. Reviewing the secondary data closely and capturing the missing elements in the primary data collection process will assist Bothwell Regional Health Center and the community at large identify opportunities and current gaps to be addressed. Identifying the key partners that should be engaged earlier in the process will be critical in ensuring a successful prioritization and implementation of the Community Health Needs Assessment.

The following data from the exploreMOhealth.org database was used to aggregate secondary data analysis to identify which health outcomes and health factors are most important in Pettis and Benton counties. It was extremely important in helping to generate this customized Community Health Needs Assessment using county- and ZIP-level data on demographics, socioeconomic status, risk factors, preventive practices, health conditions and environment. With the changing landscape in health care, new population health strategies are refocusing health care delivery. The traditional delivery model has centered on hospital or physician's office care. However, to understand why poor emotional or physical health occurs in some communities, health care providers are looking upstream to the numerous factors that lead to positive or negative health outcomes. These factors include social, environmental and contextual determinants. These are community factors that create an intersection of traditional health care and public health.

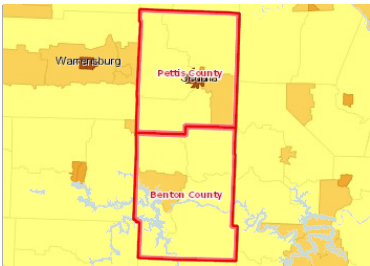

Population, Density (Persons per Sq Mile) by Tract, ACS 2013-17

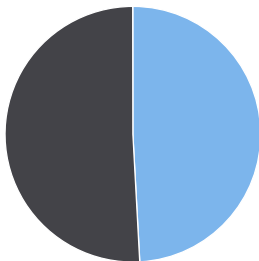

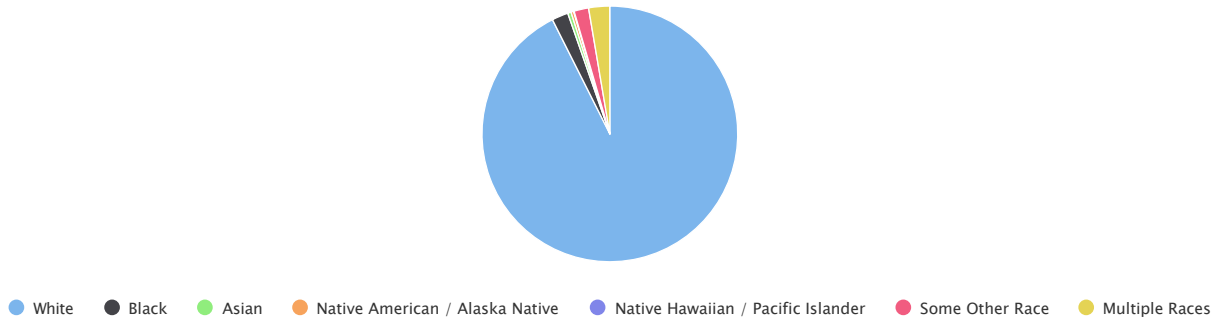

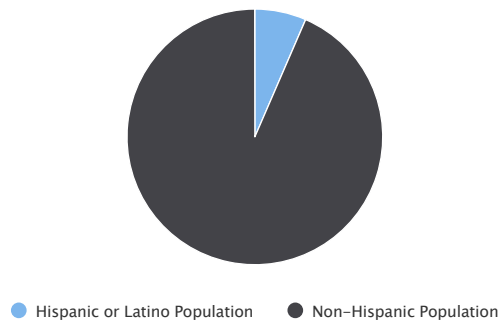

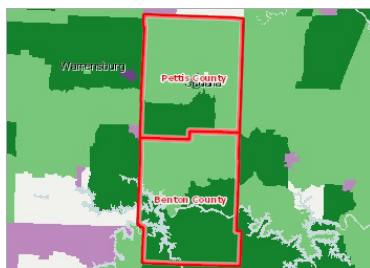

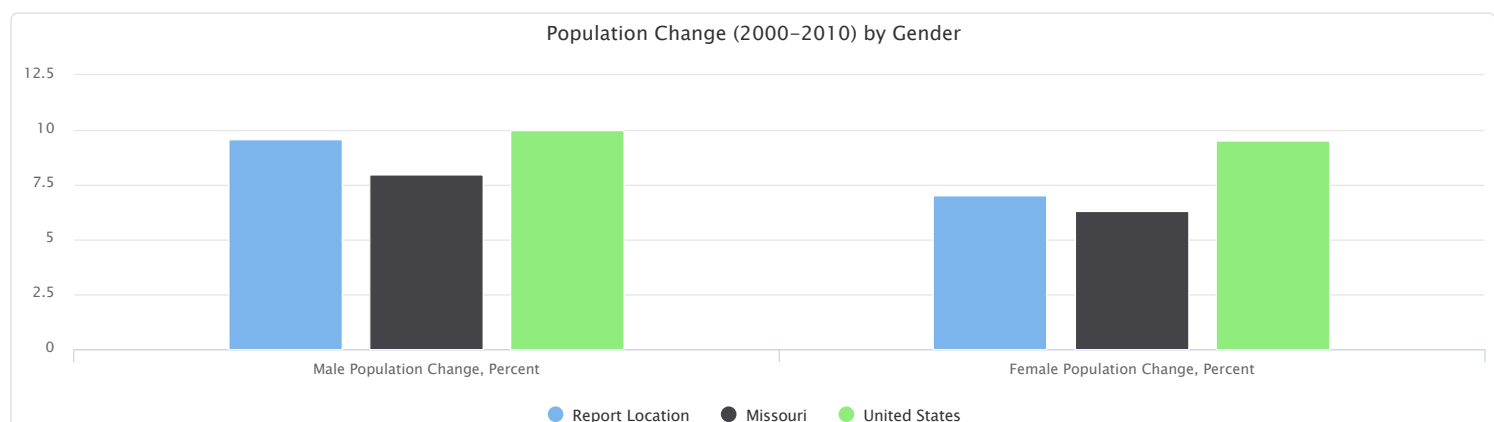


Population Change, Percent by Tract, US Census 2000 - 2010

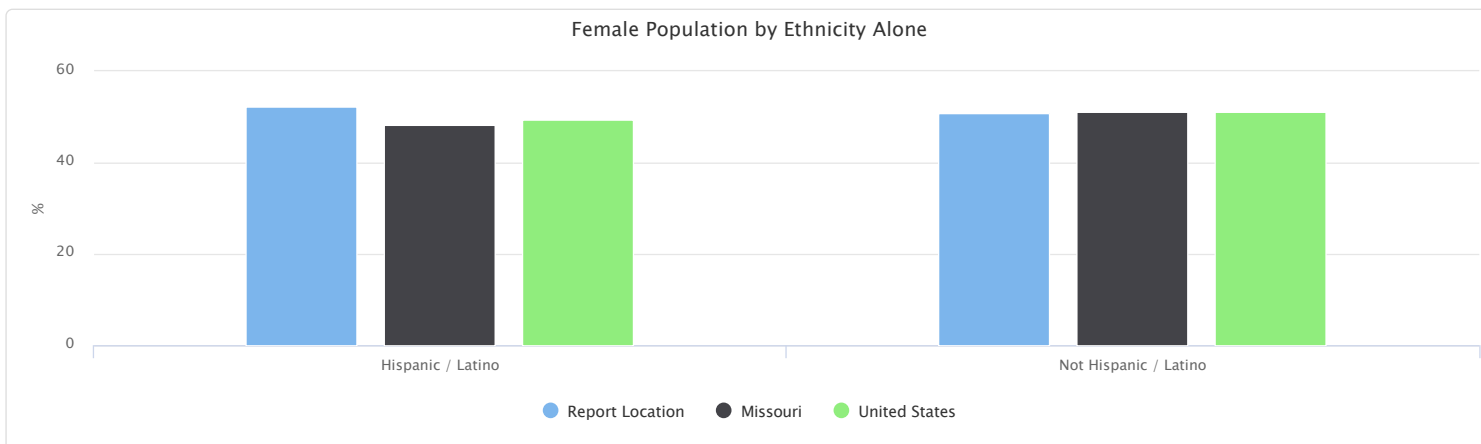


Female Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17



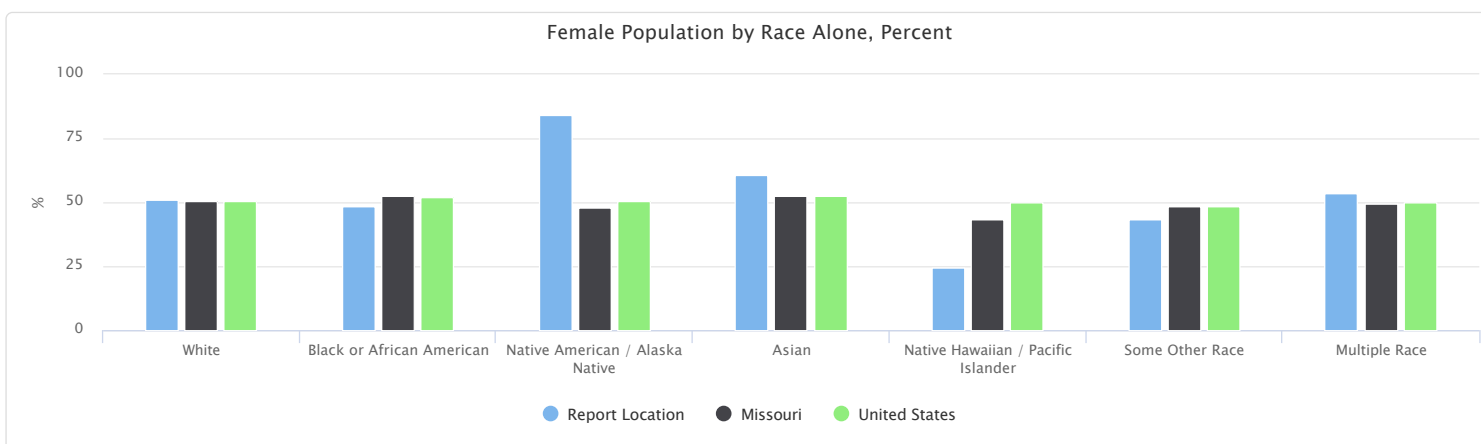

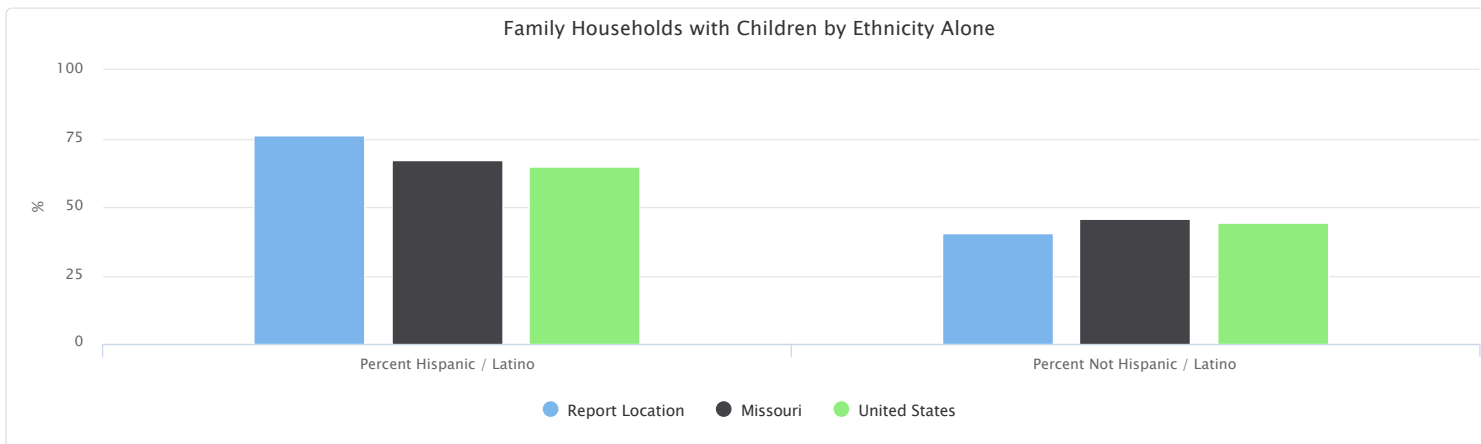


## Households with Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

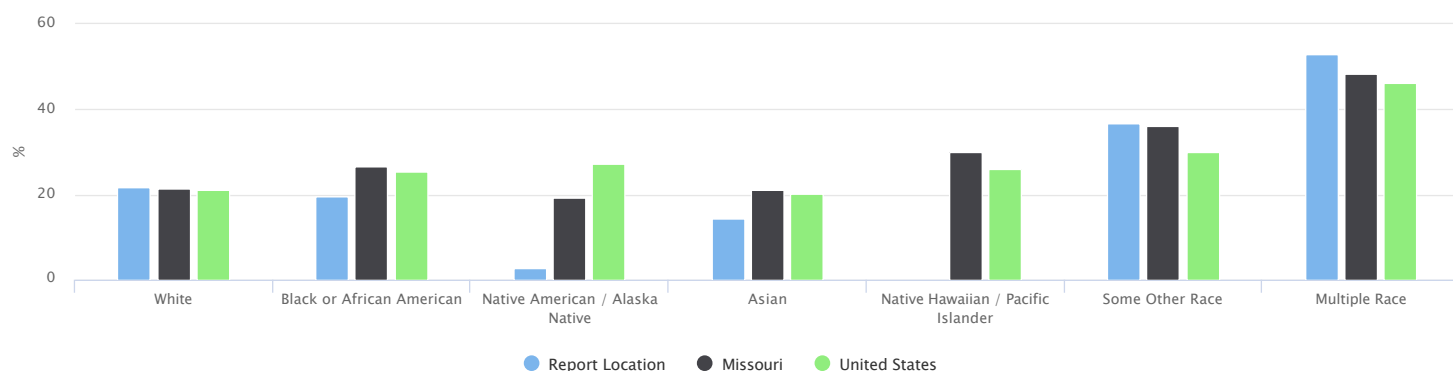

### Population Under Age 18 by Race Alone, Percent



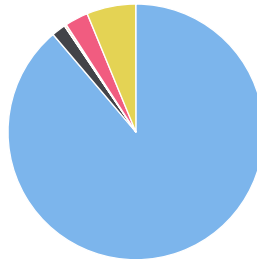

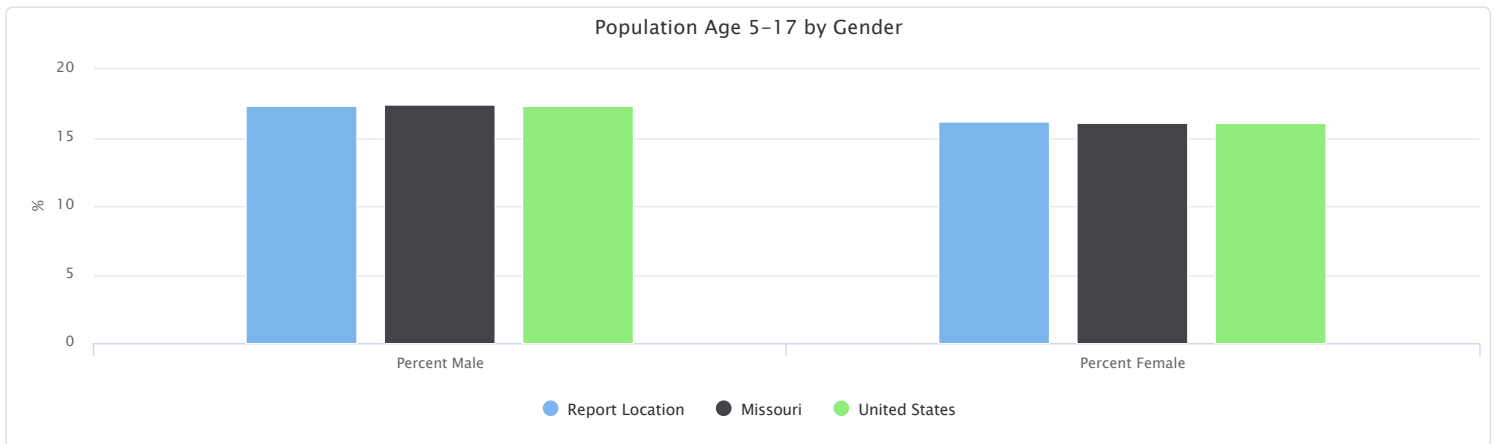


Population Age 5-17, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17



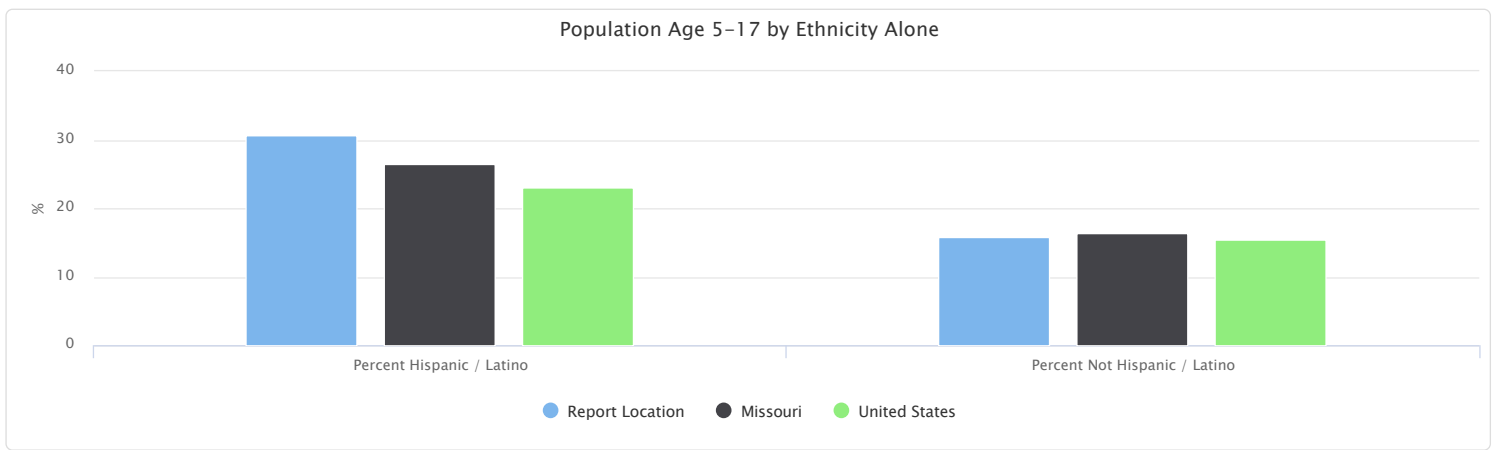

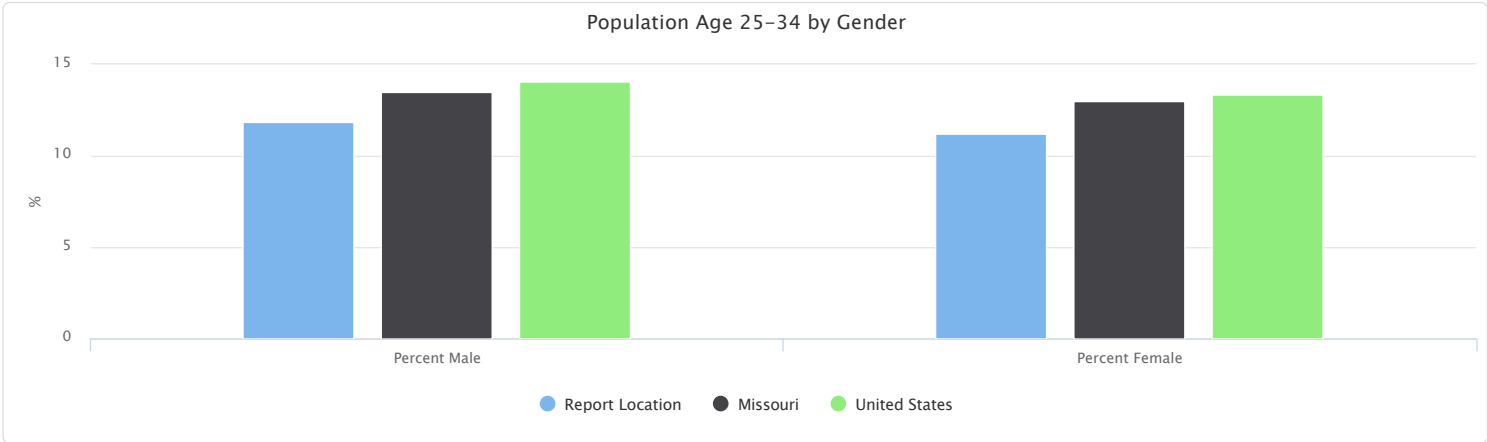


Population Age 25-34, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17



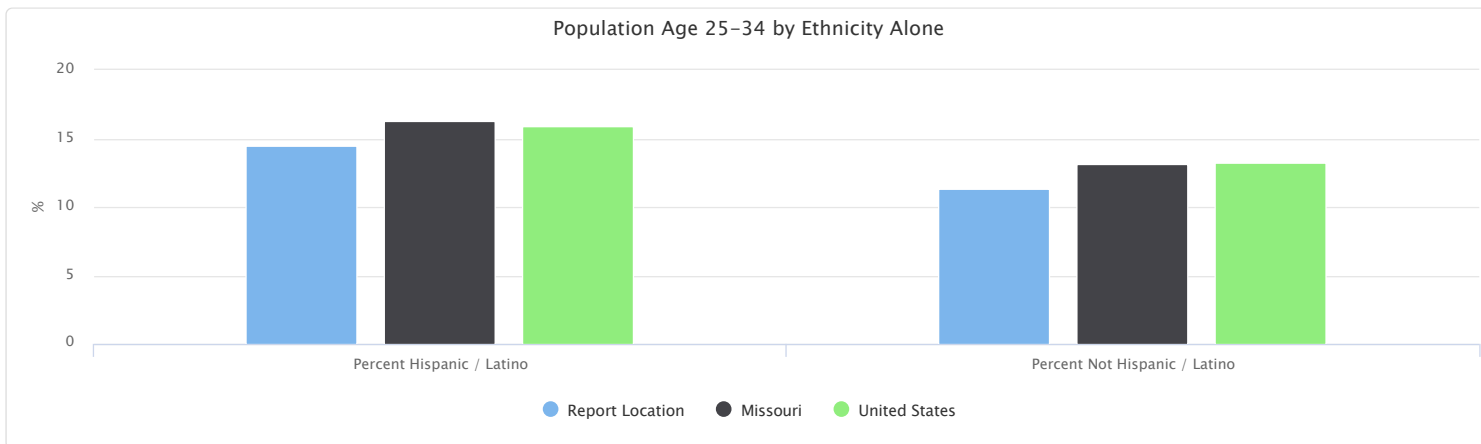

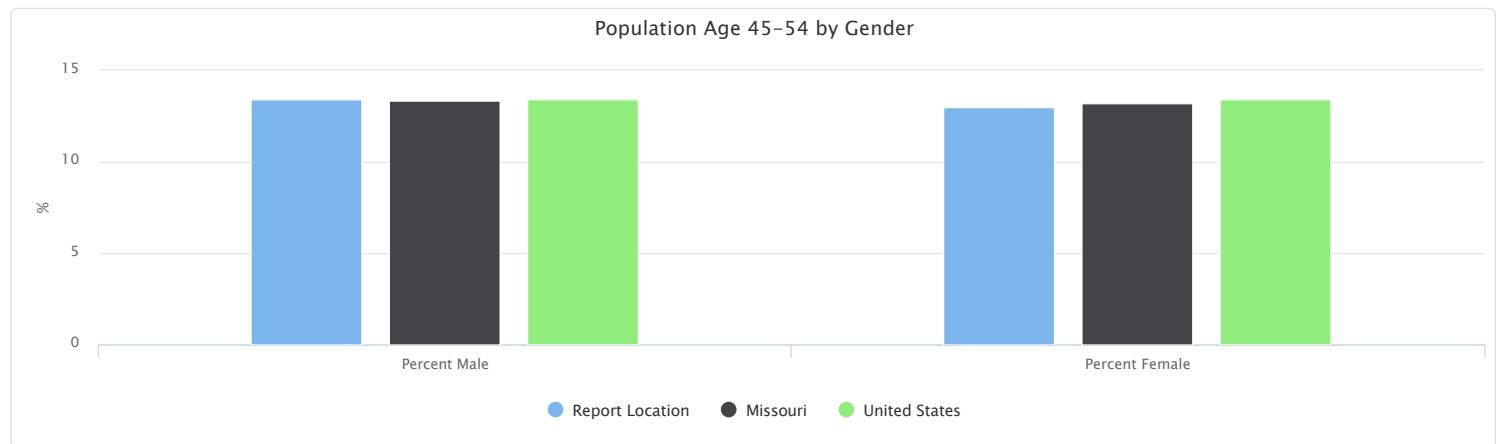


Population Age 45-54, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17



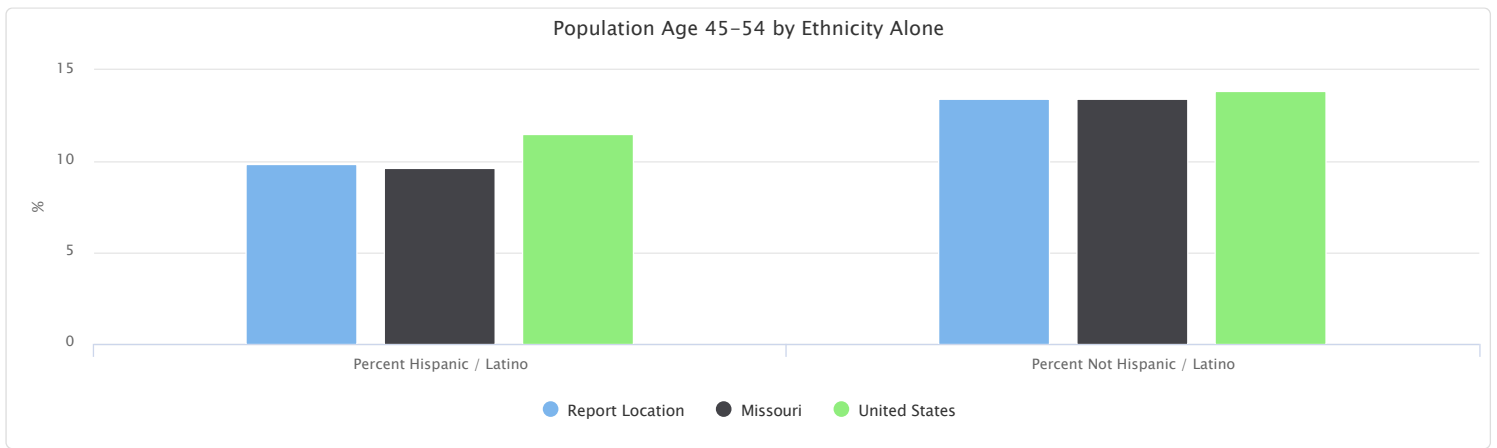

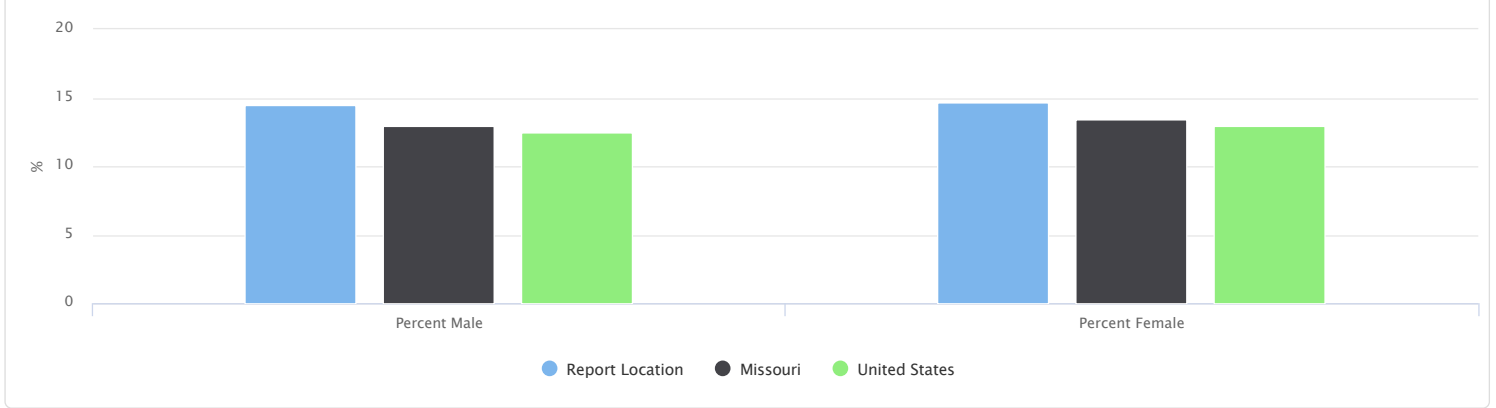

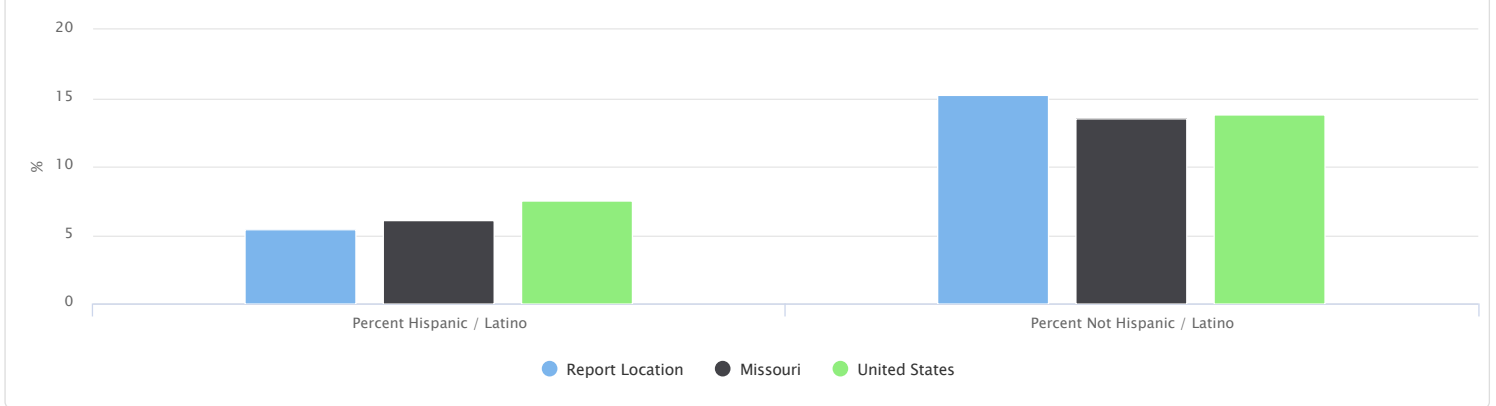
Population Age 55-64 by Gender

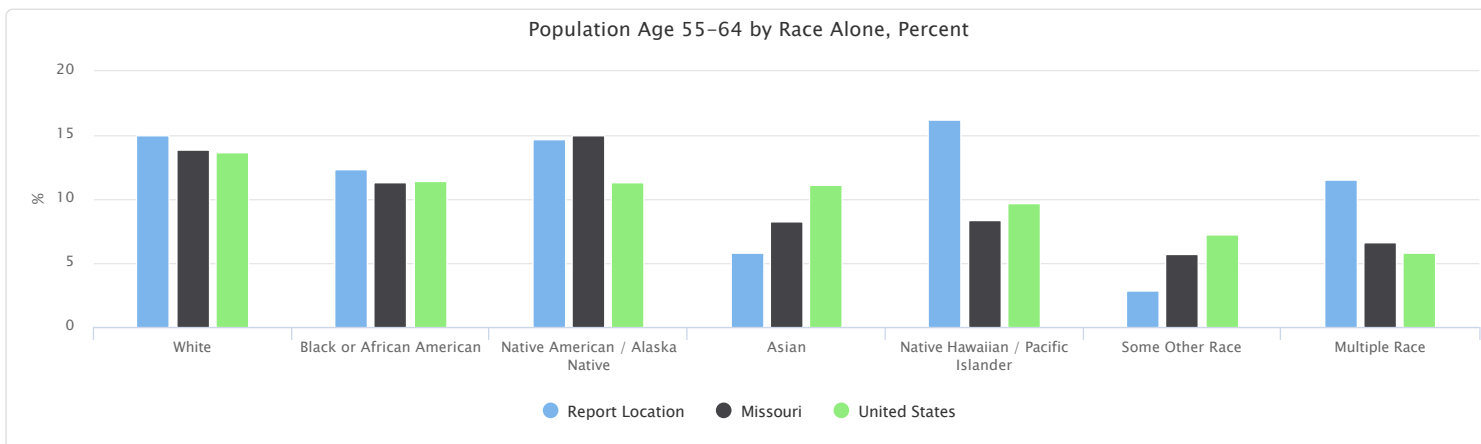

Population Age 55-64 by Ethnicity Alone



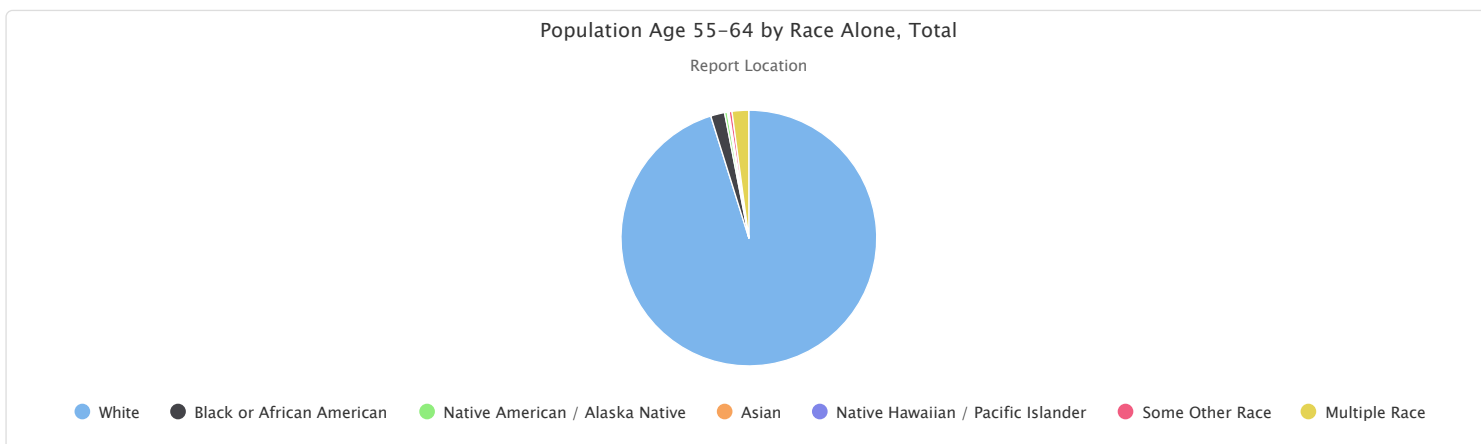

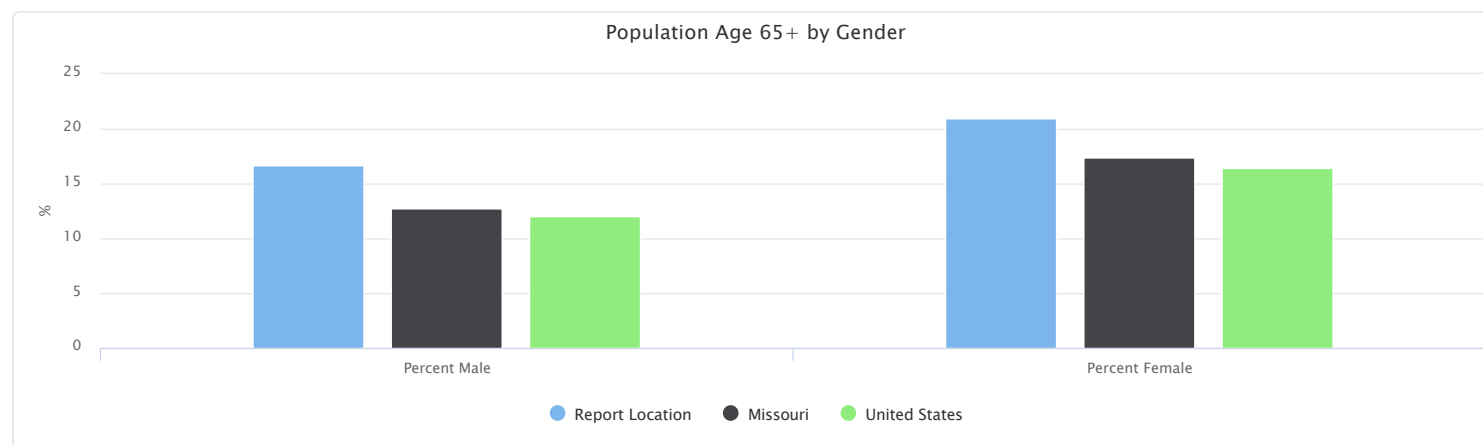
Population Age 65+, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

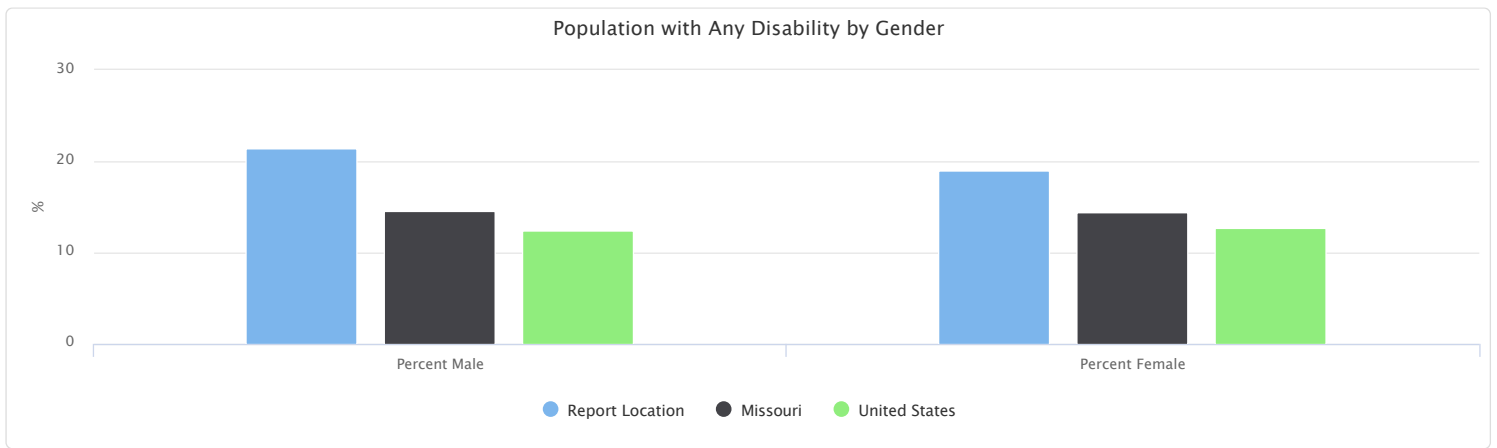


## Disabled Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17



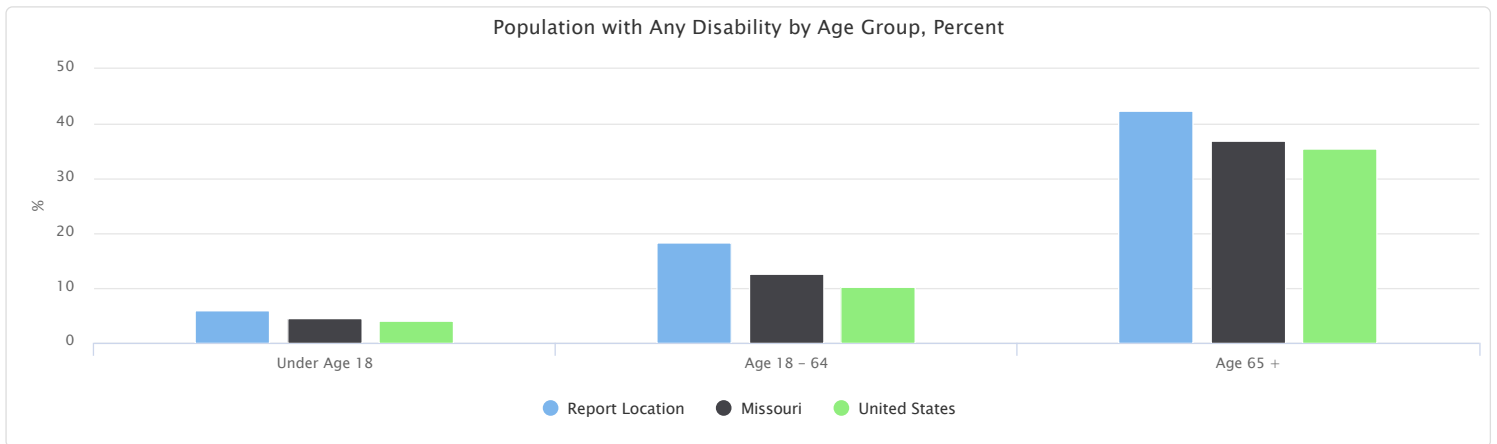

**Population in Linguistically Isolated Households, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17**

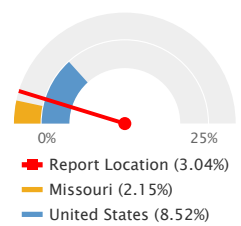

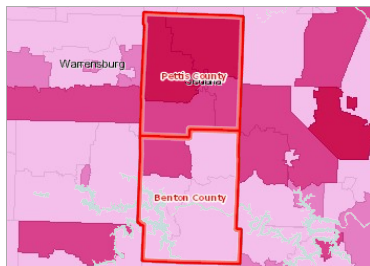

Percent Population Age 5+ with Limited English Proficiency

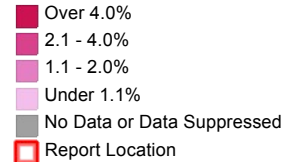

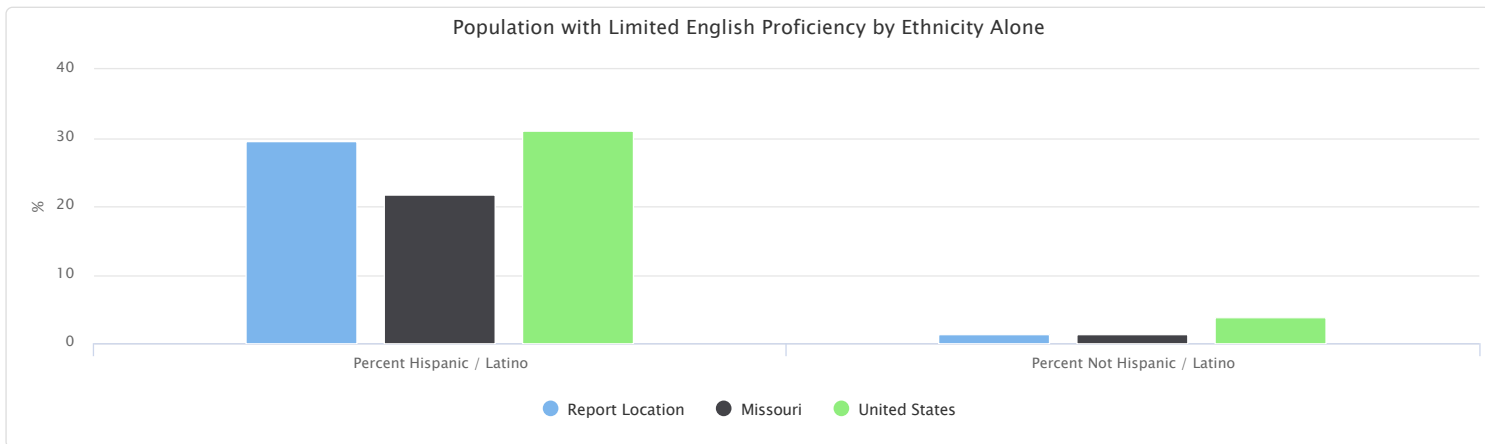
**Population with Limited English Proficiency, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17**

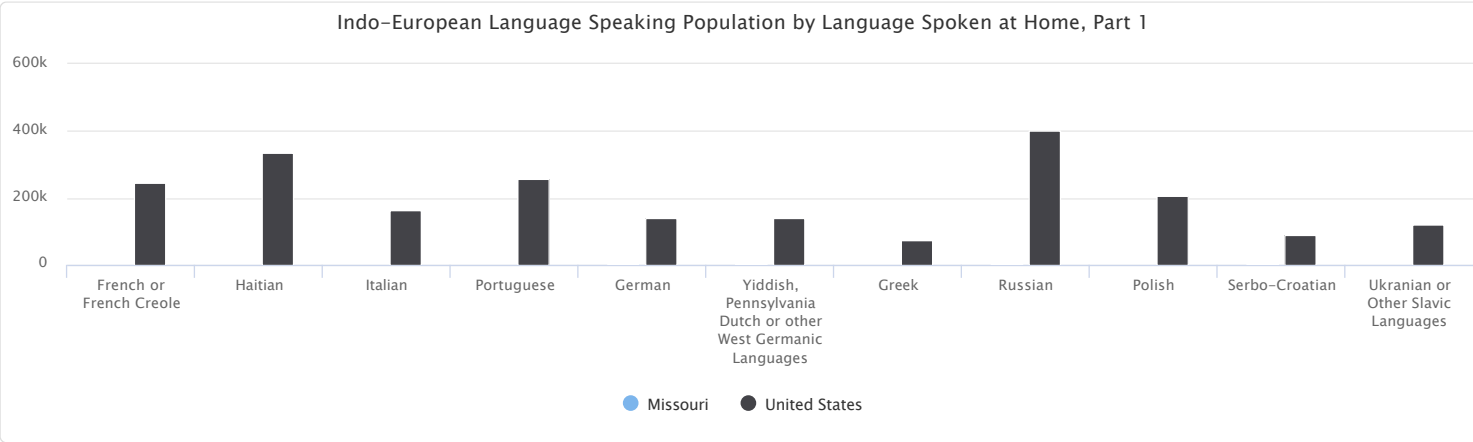

Population In-Migration by Race Alone, Percent

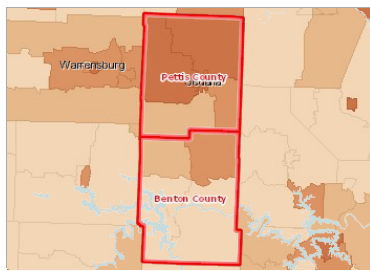

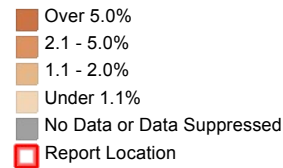

**Foreign-Born Population (Non-Citizen or Naturalized), Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17**

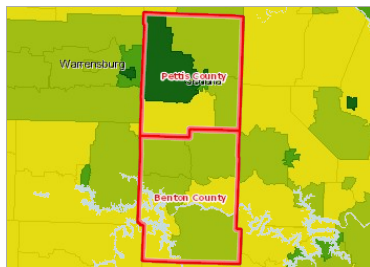

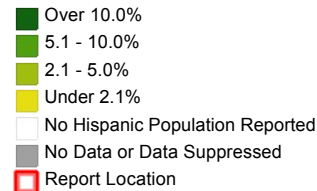

**Population, Hispanic or Latino, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17**

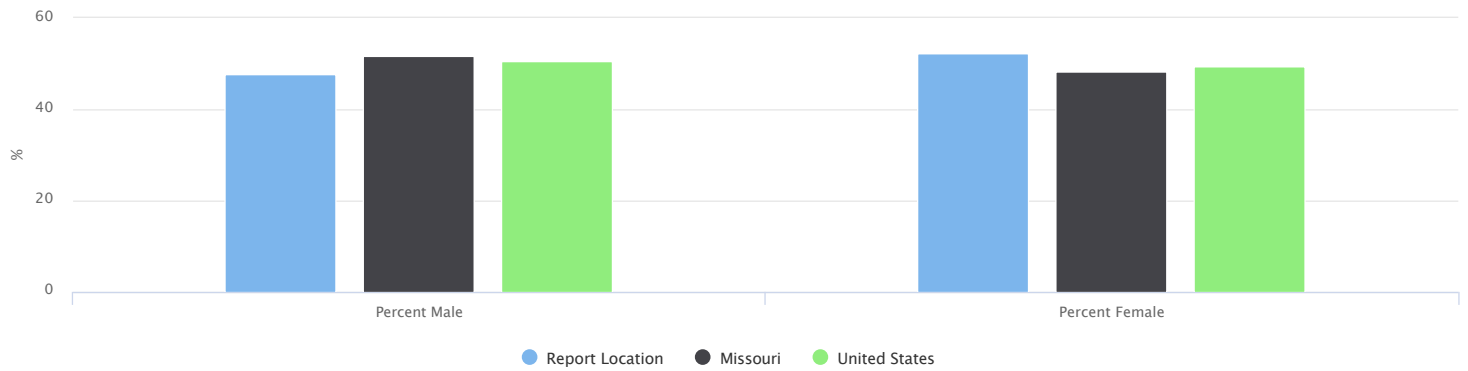

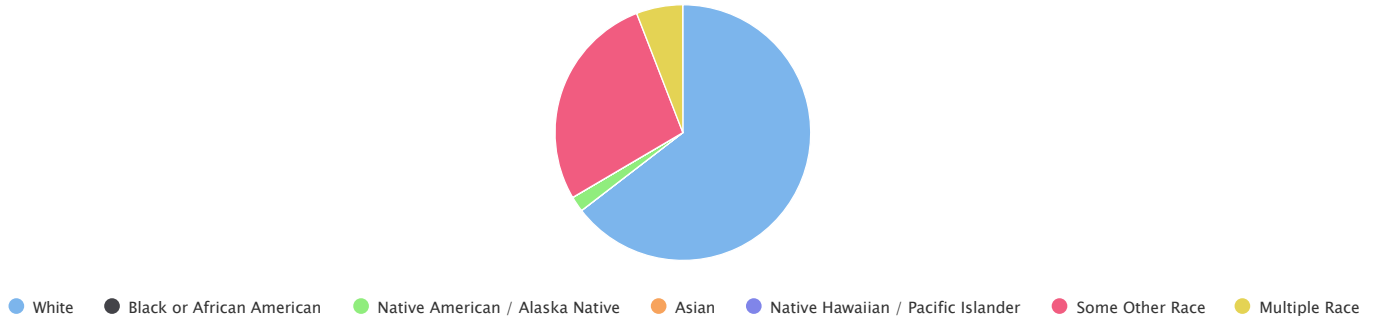

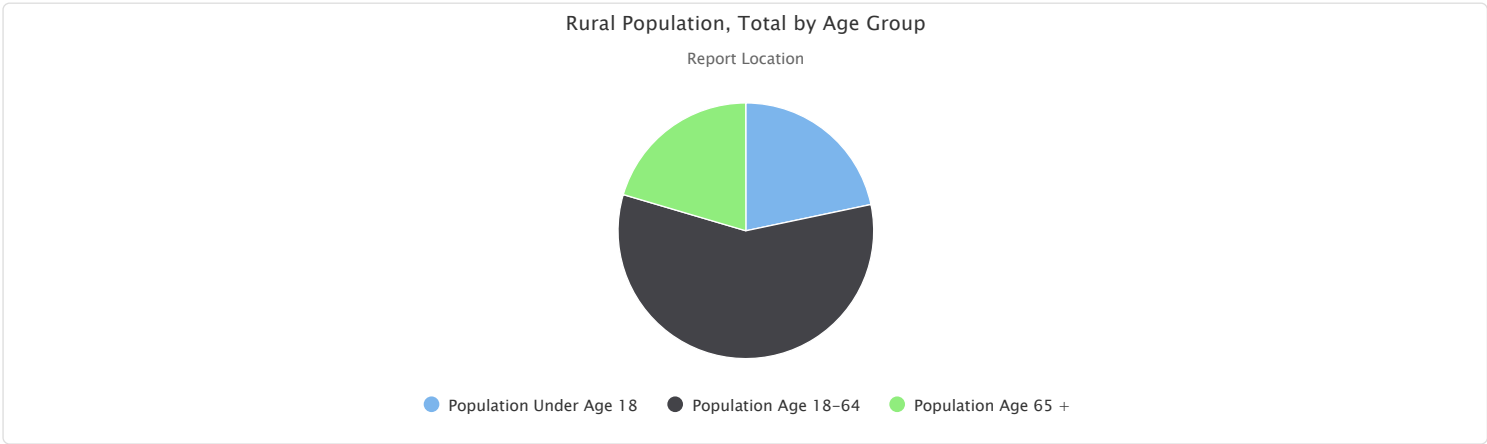


Urban Population, Percent by Tract, US Census 2010

### Veteran Population by Age Group, Percent



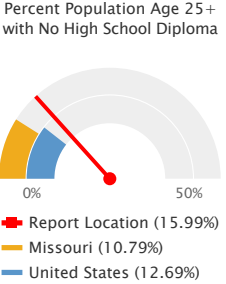

Population with a Bachelor's Degree or Higher, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

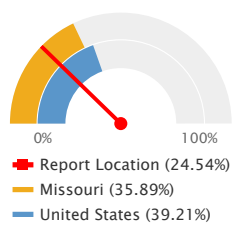

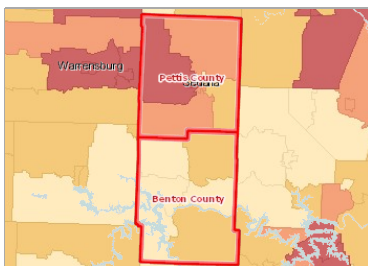

Percent Population Age 25+ with Associate's Degree or Higher

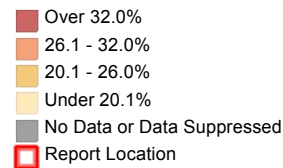

Population with an Associate Level Degree or Higher, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

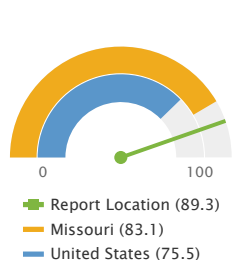

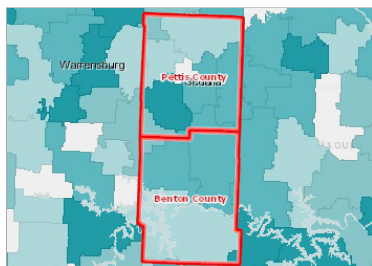

On-Time Graduation Rate

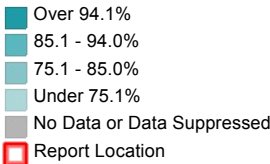

On-Time Graduation, Rate by School District (Secondary), NCES CCD 2008-09



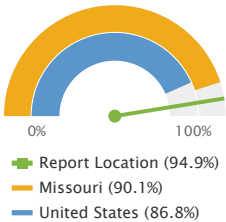

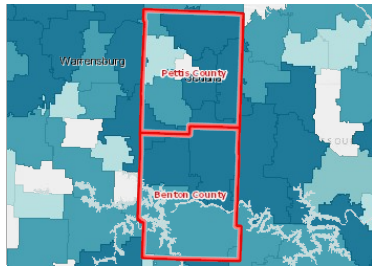

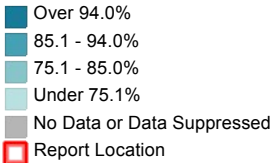
Cohort Graduation Rate

On-Time Graduation, Rate by School District (Secondary), ED Facts 2016-17

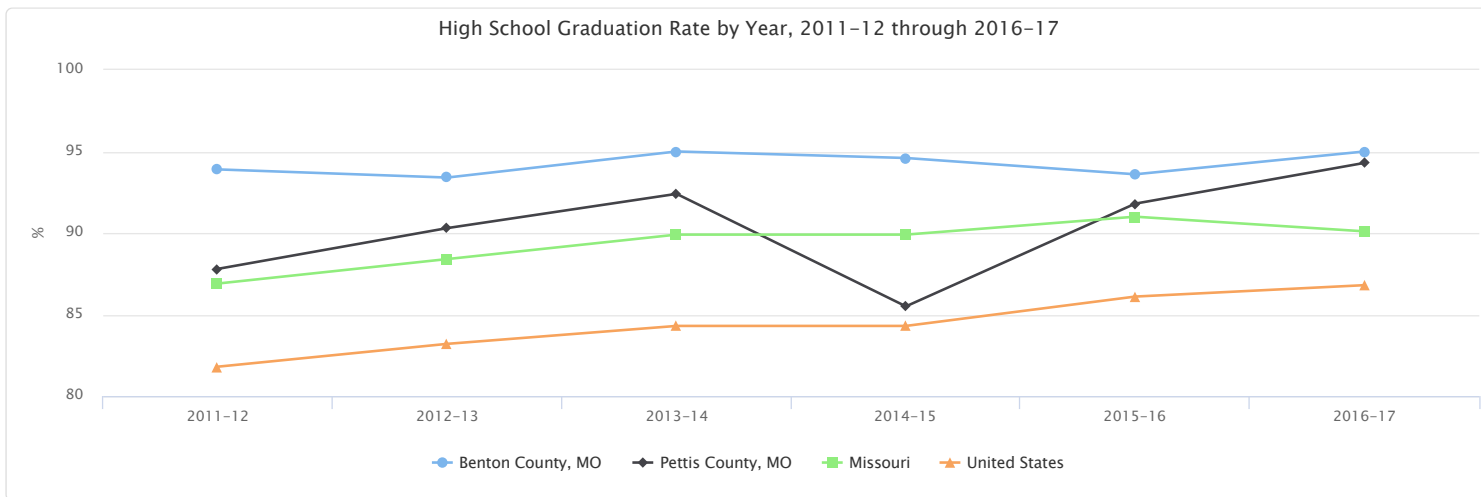

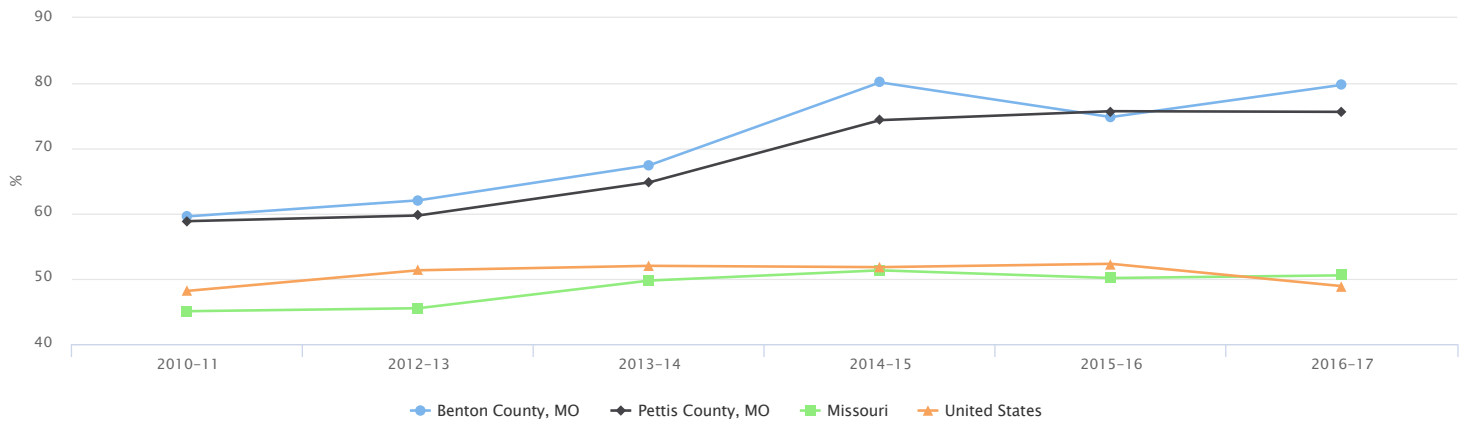

Children Eligible for Free Lunch (Alone) by Year, 2010–11 through 2016–17



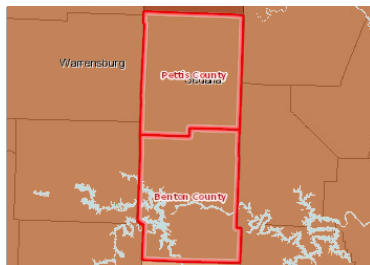
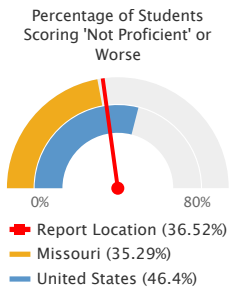

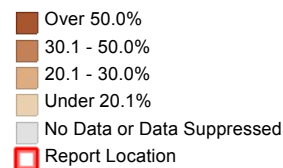

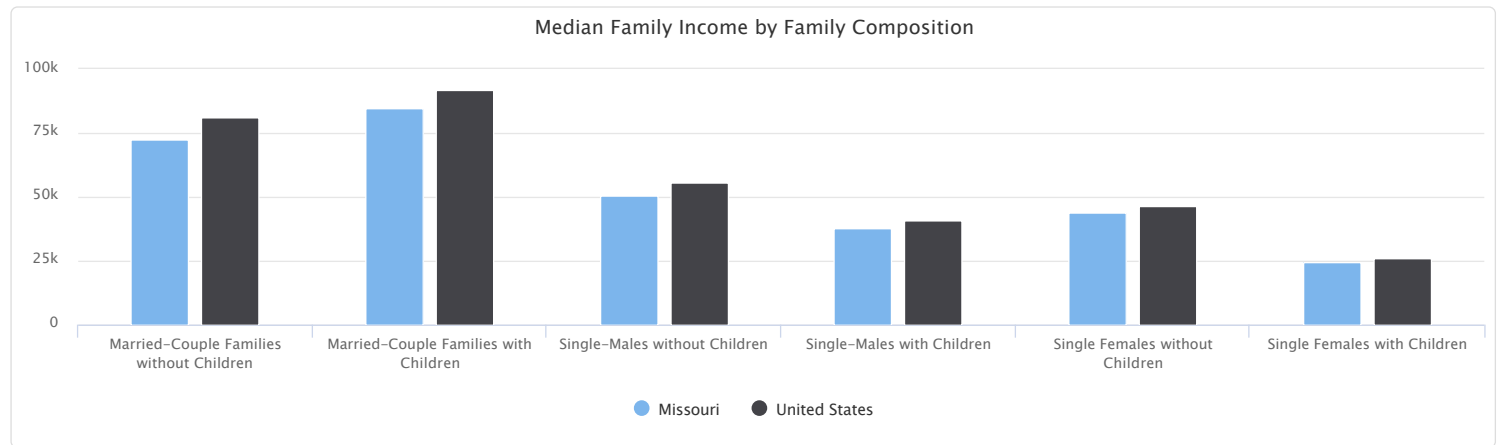


Median Family Income by Tract, ACS 2013-17



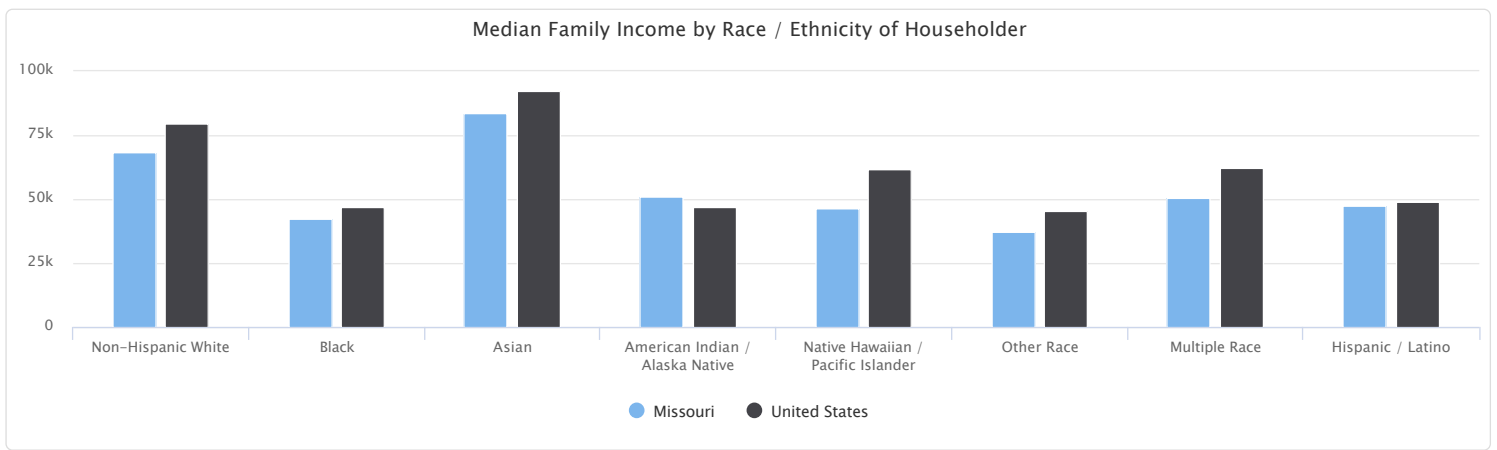

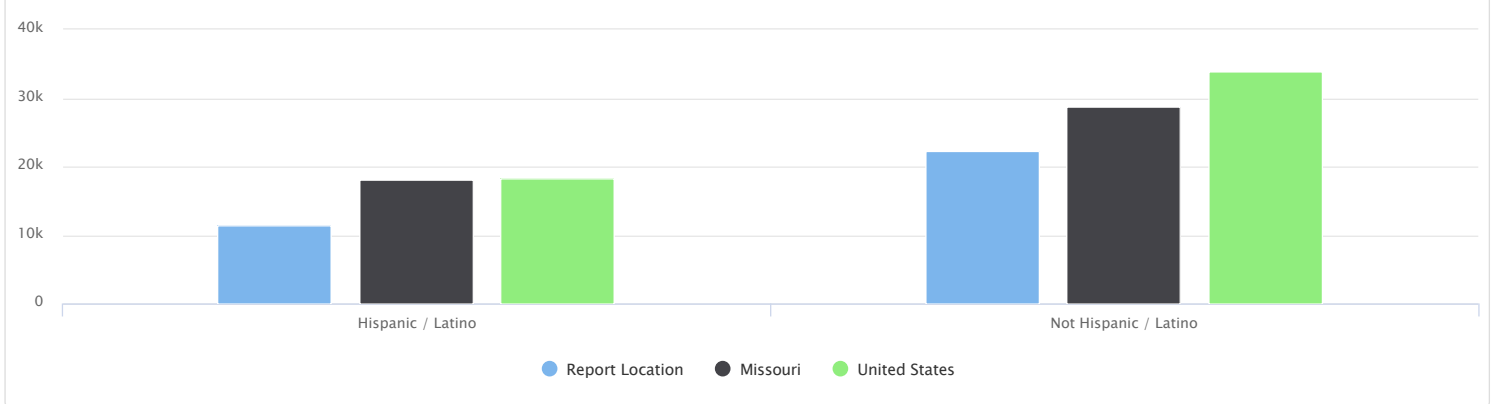
Per Capita Income by Race Alone

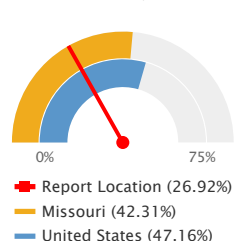

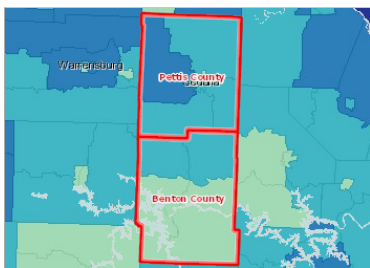

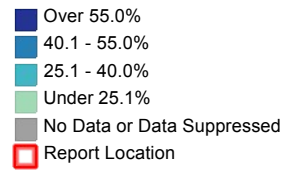

Family Income Over \$75,000, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

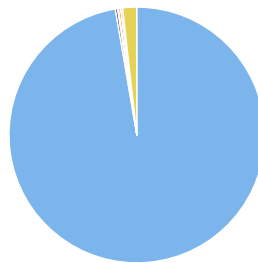

Percent Households with Public Assistance Income

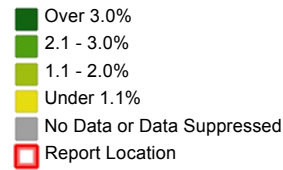

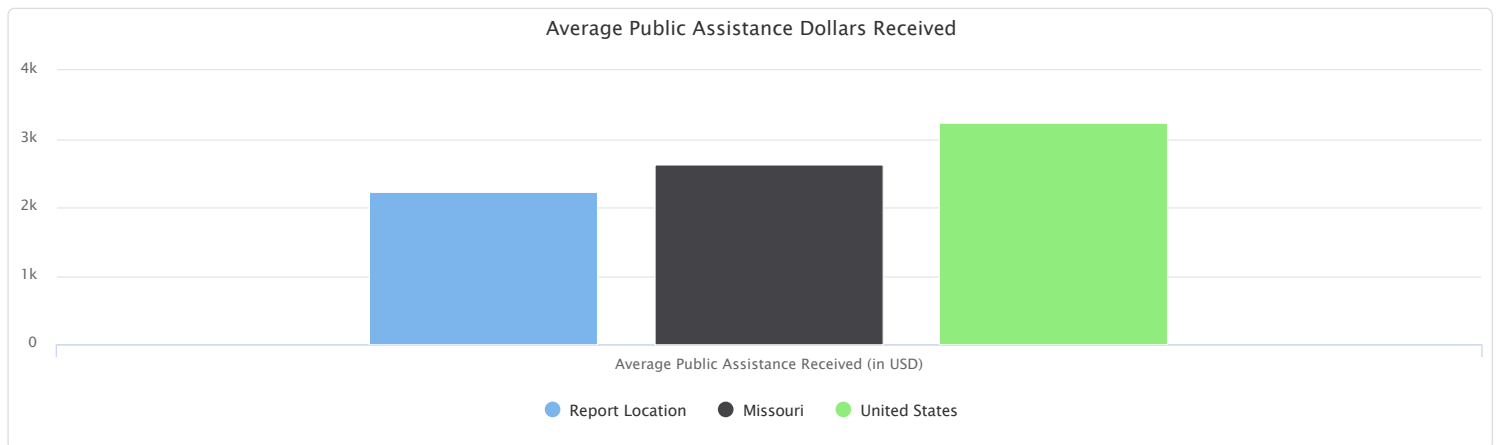


Households with Public Assistance Income, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

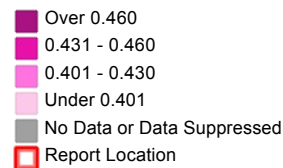

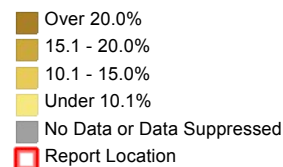

Percent Population in Poverty



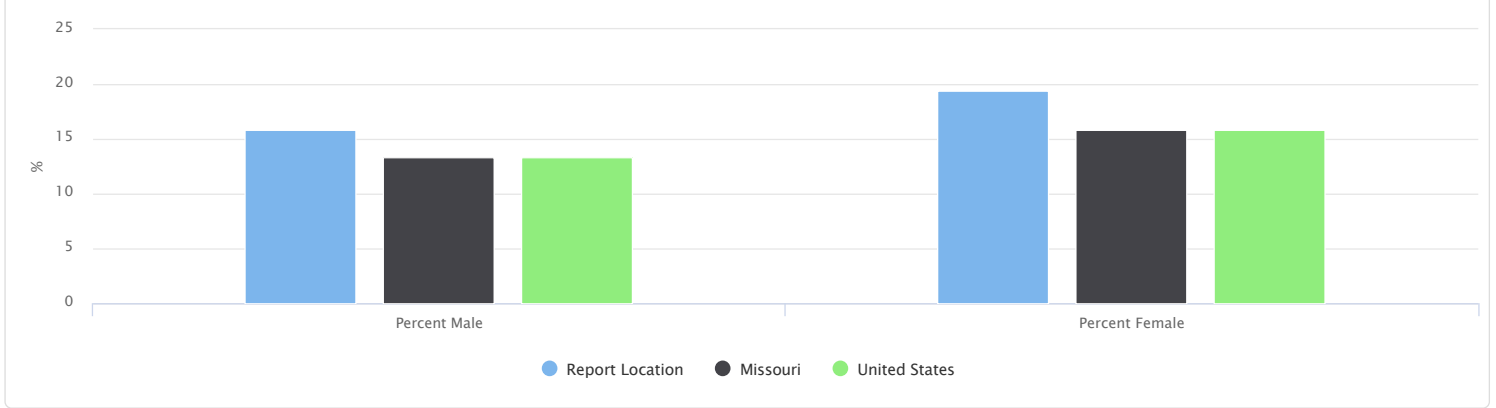
Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

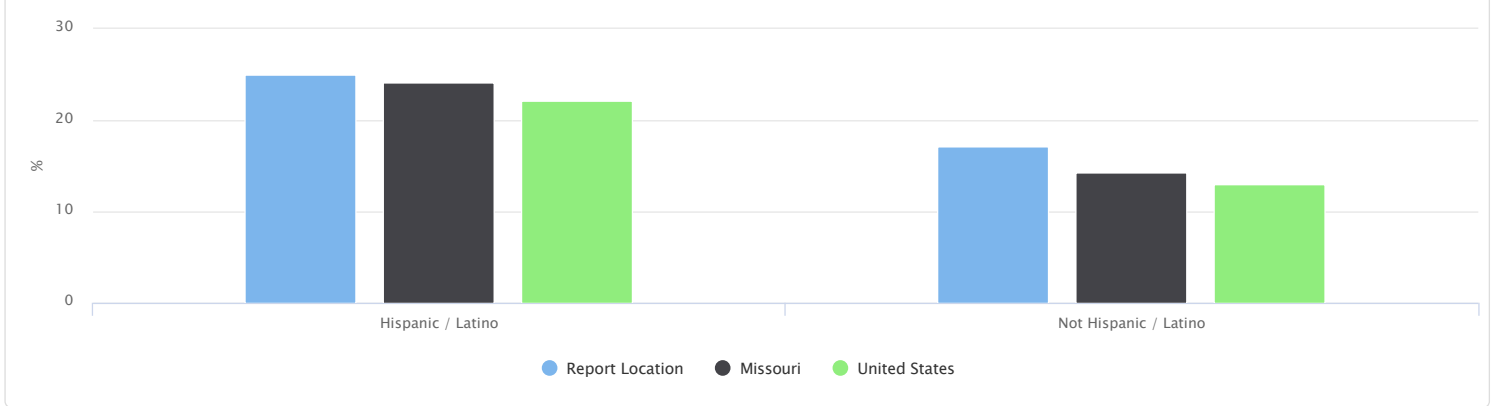
Population in Poverty by Gender

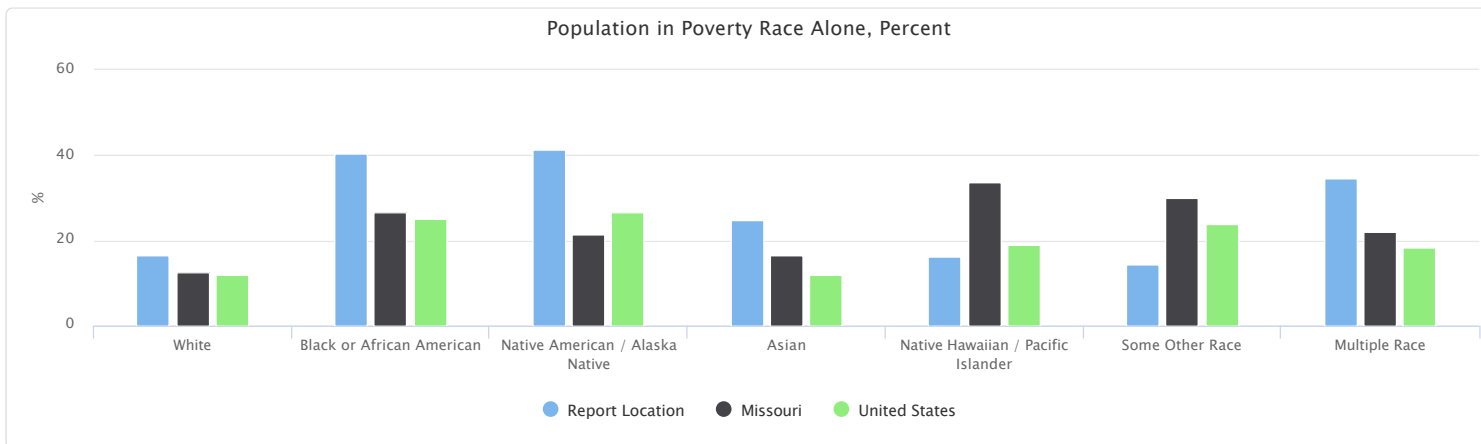
Population in Poverty by Ethnicity Alone

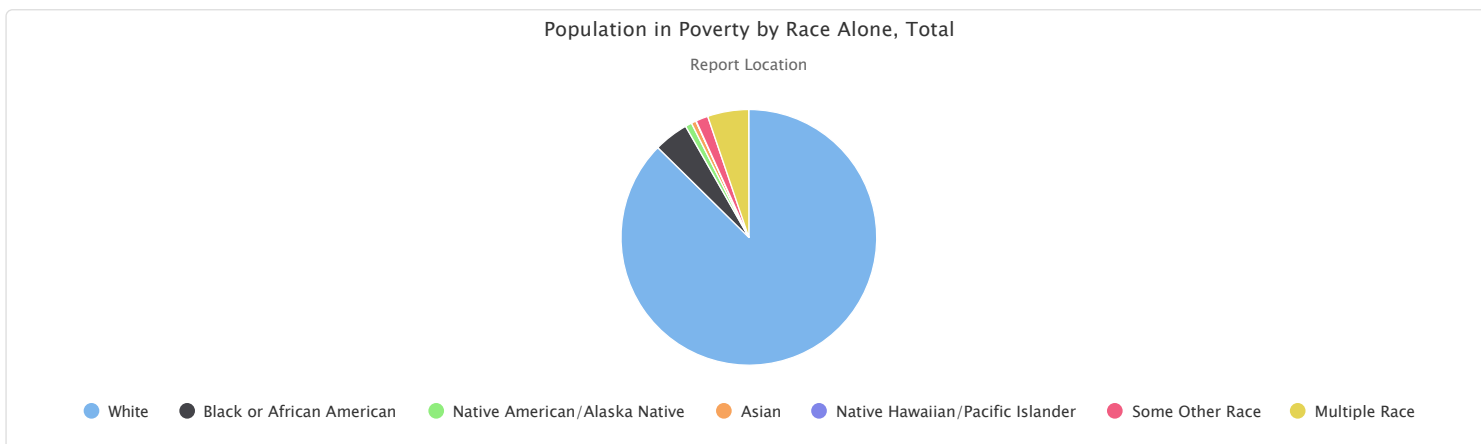

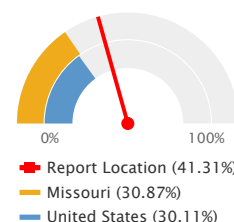

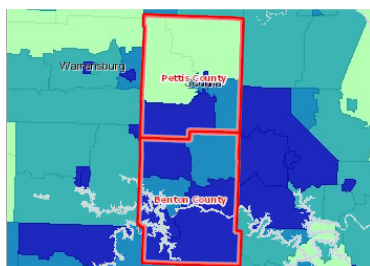

Percent Population with Income at or Below 185% FPL

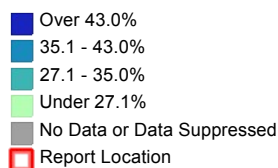

Population Below 185% Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

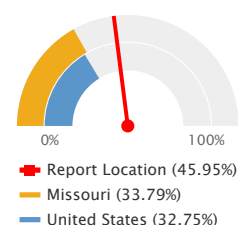

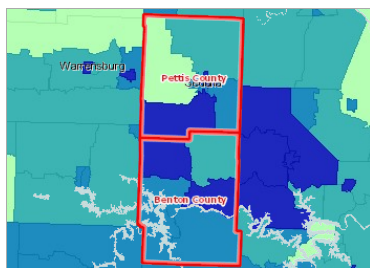

Percent Population with Income at or Below 200% FPL

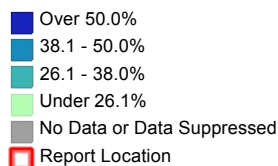

Population Below 200% Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

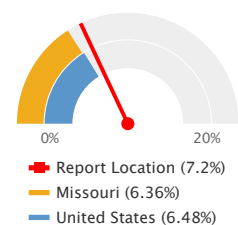

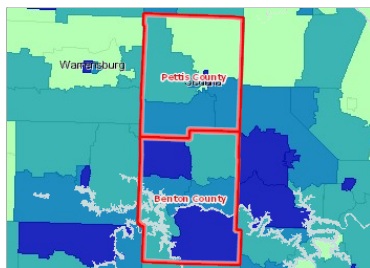

Percent Population with Income at or Below 50% FPL

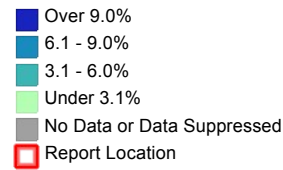

Population Below 50% Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

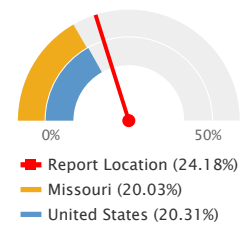

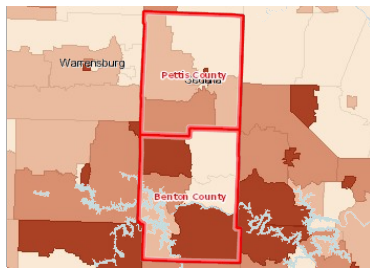

Percent Population Under Age 18 in Poverty

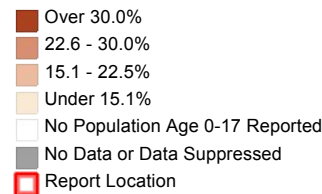

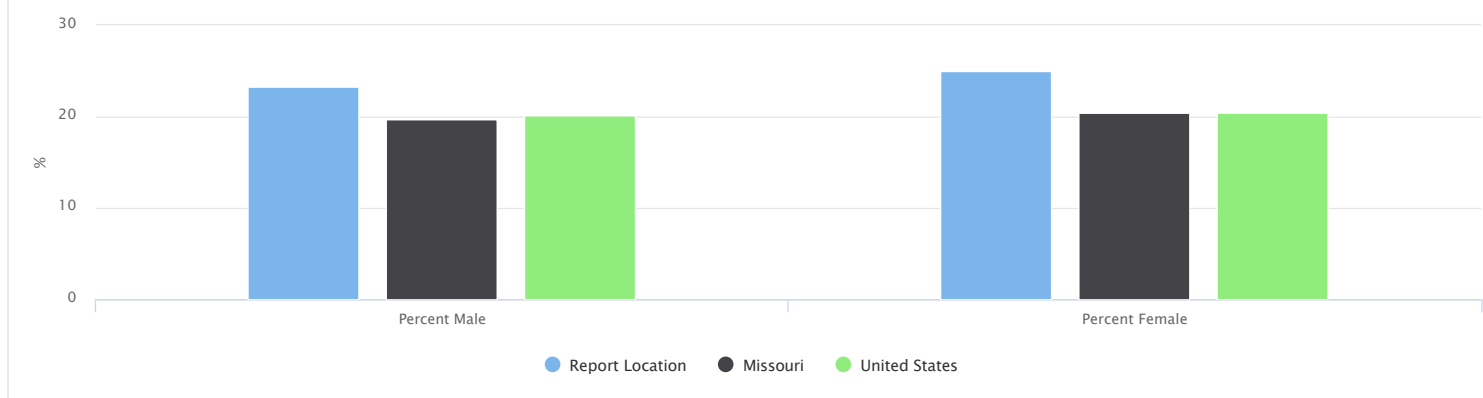
Population Below the Poverty Level, Children (Age 0-17), Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

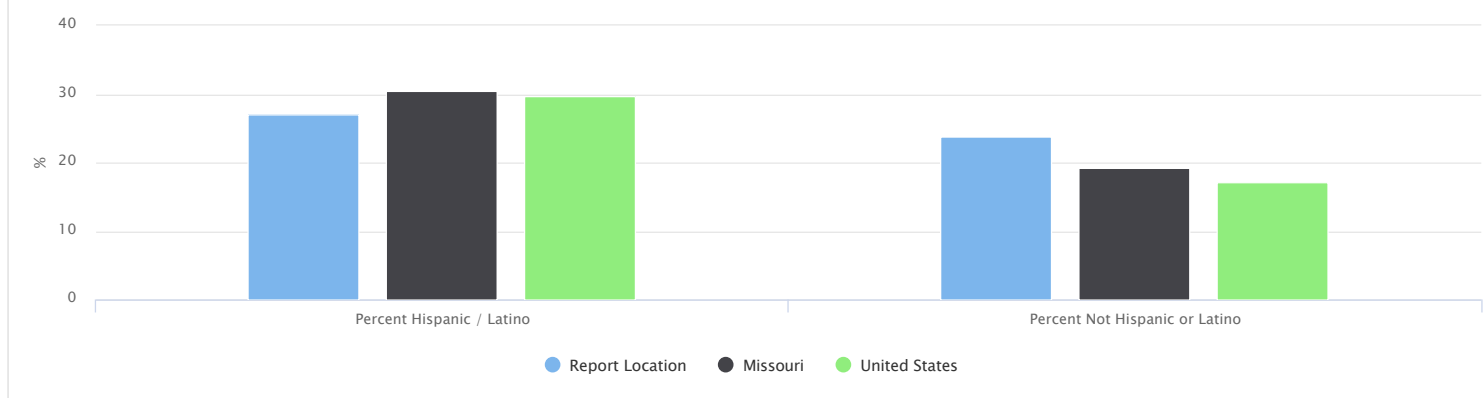
Children in Poverty by Gender

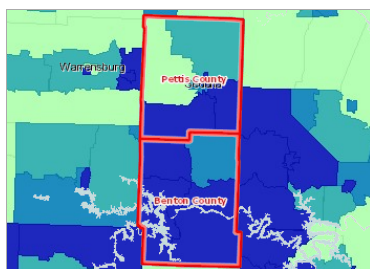

Unemployment Rate



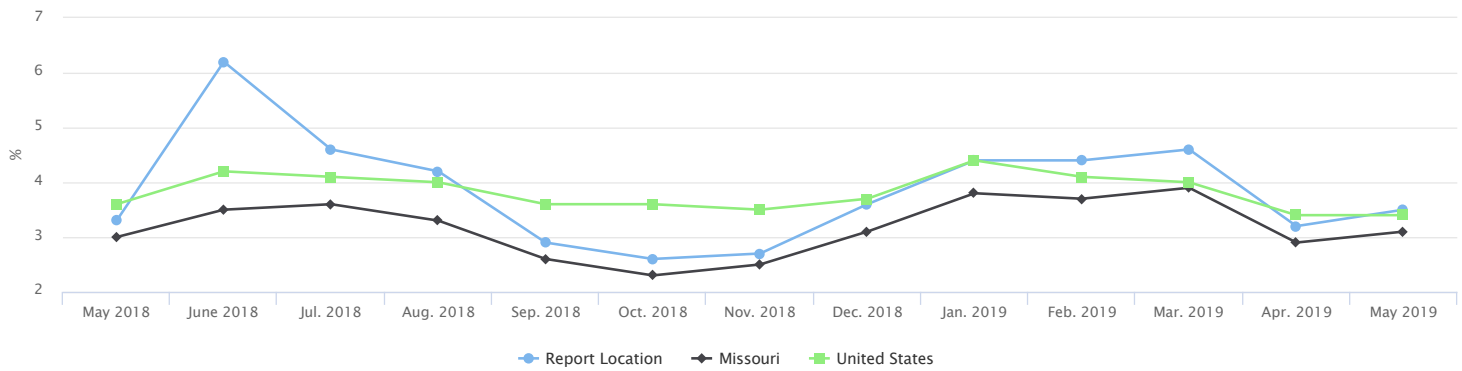

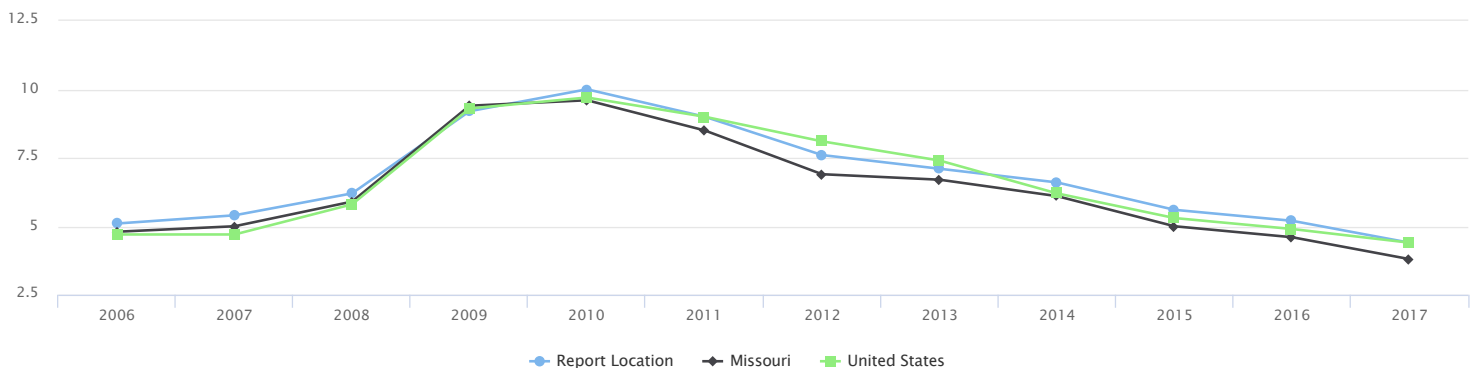
Average Monthly Unemployment Rate, May 2018 – May 2019

Average Annual Unemployment Rate, 2007–2018

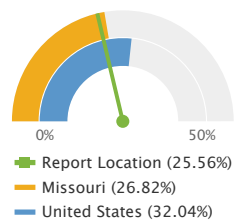

Percentage of Households with No Motor Vehicle

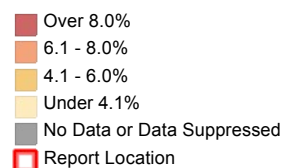

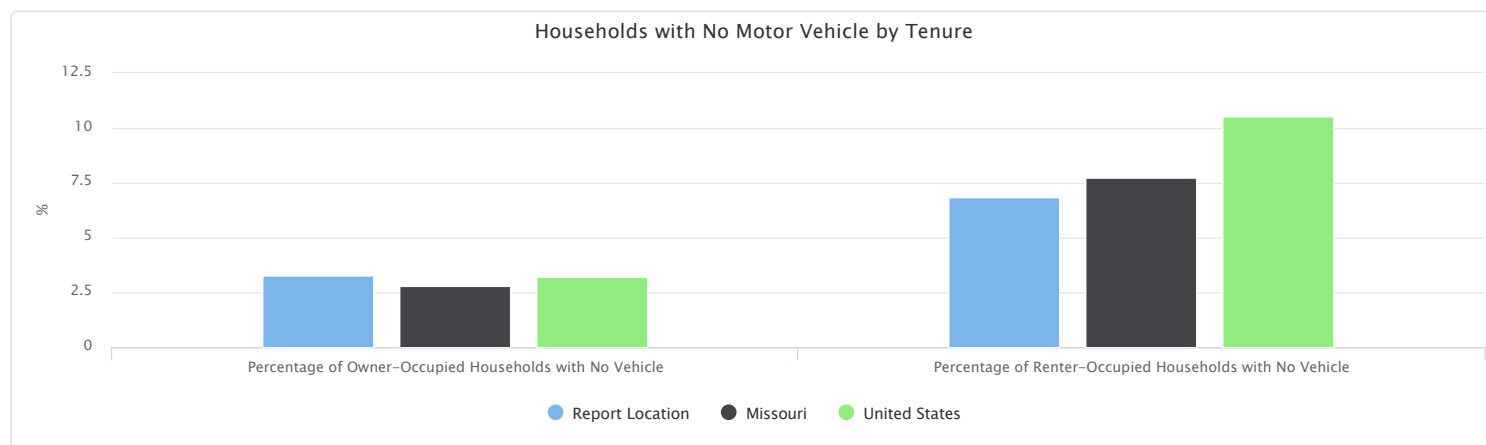

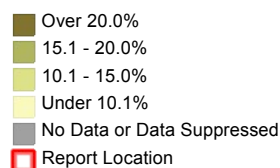

Uninsured Population, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

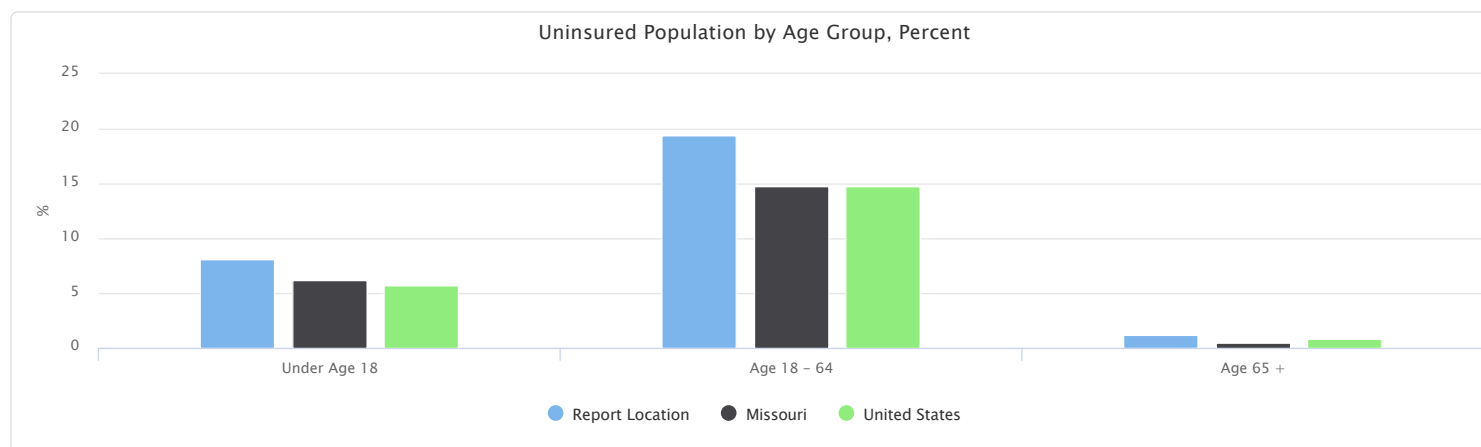

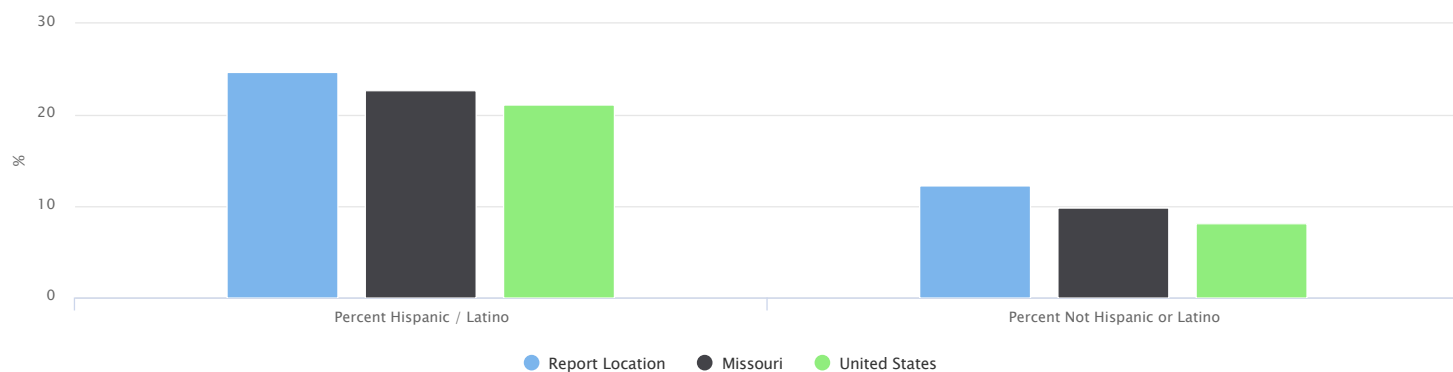

Uninsured Population by Ethnicity Alone



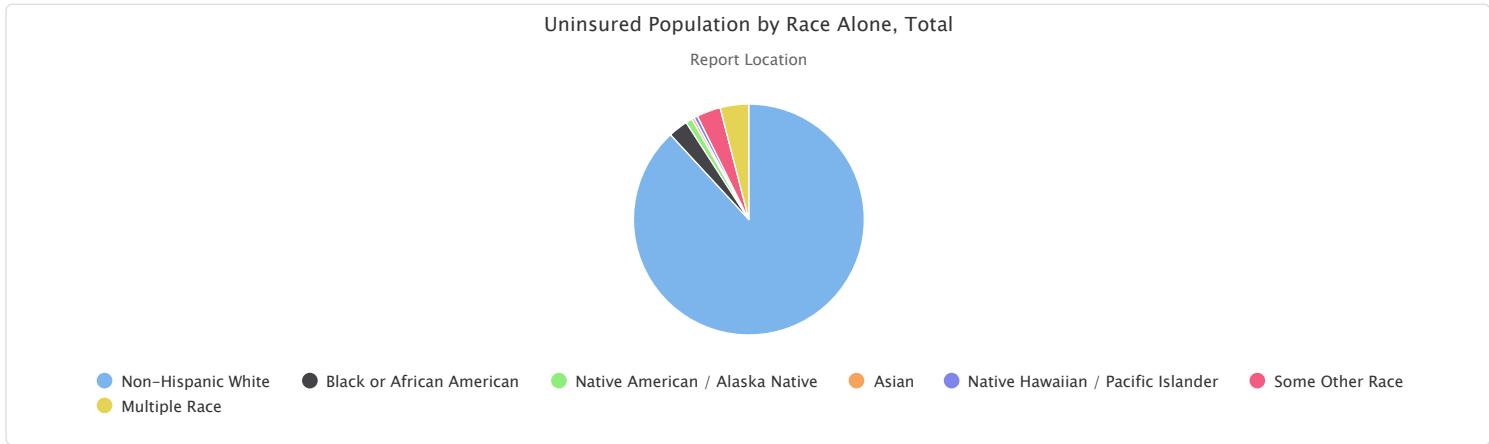

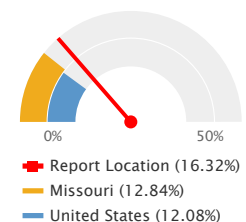

Percent Population Age 18-64 Without Medical Insurance

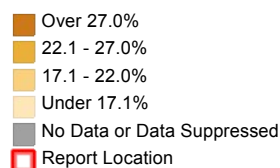

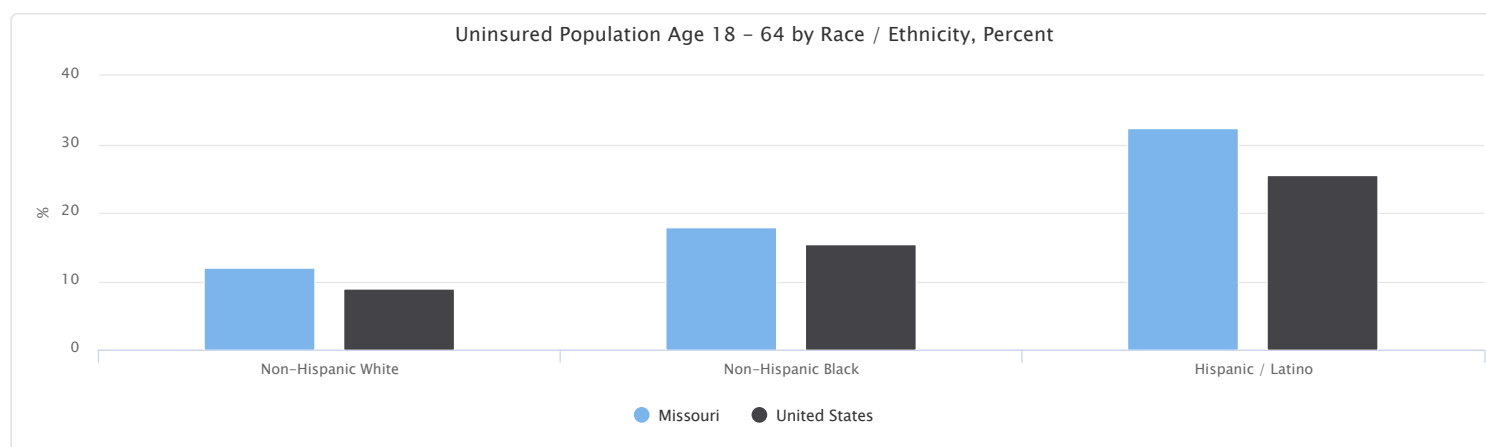
Uninsured Population, Age 18-64, Percent by County, SAHIE 2016

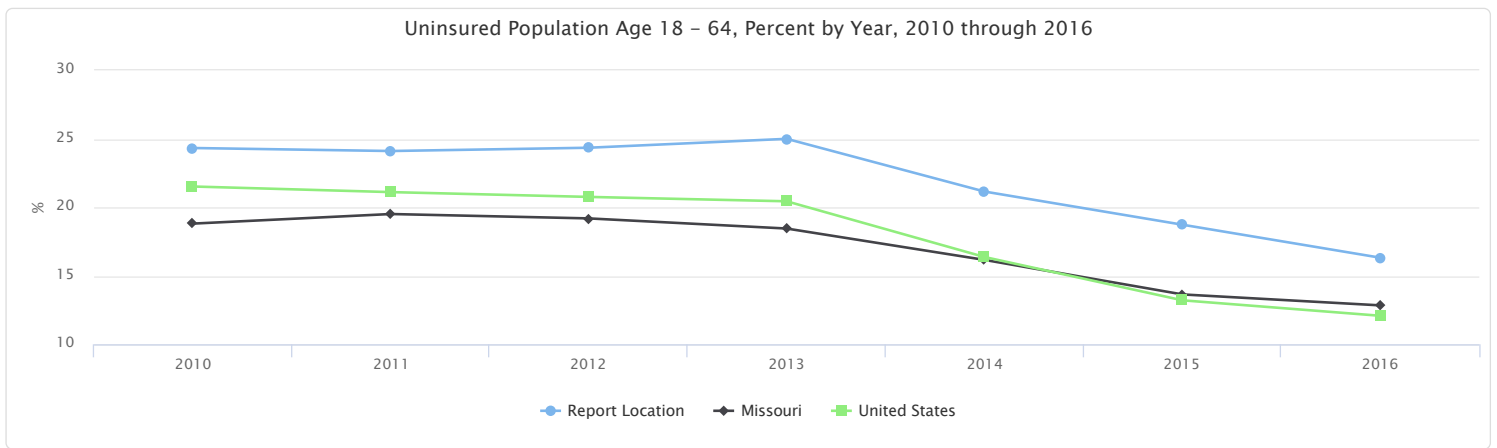

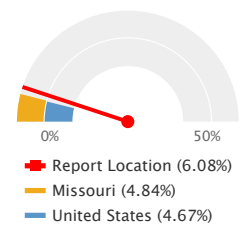

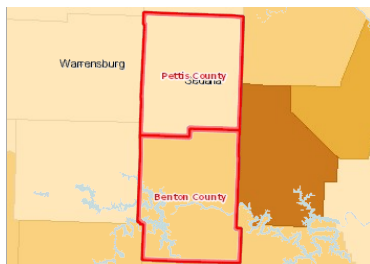

Percent Population Under Age 19 Without Medical Insurance

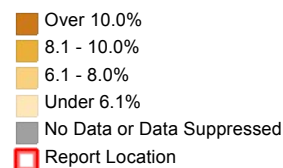

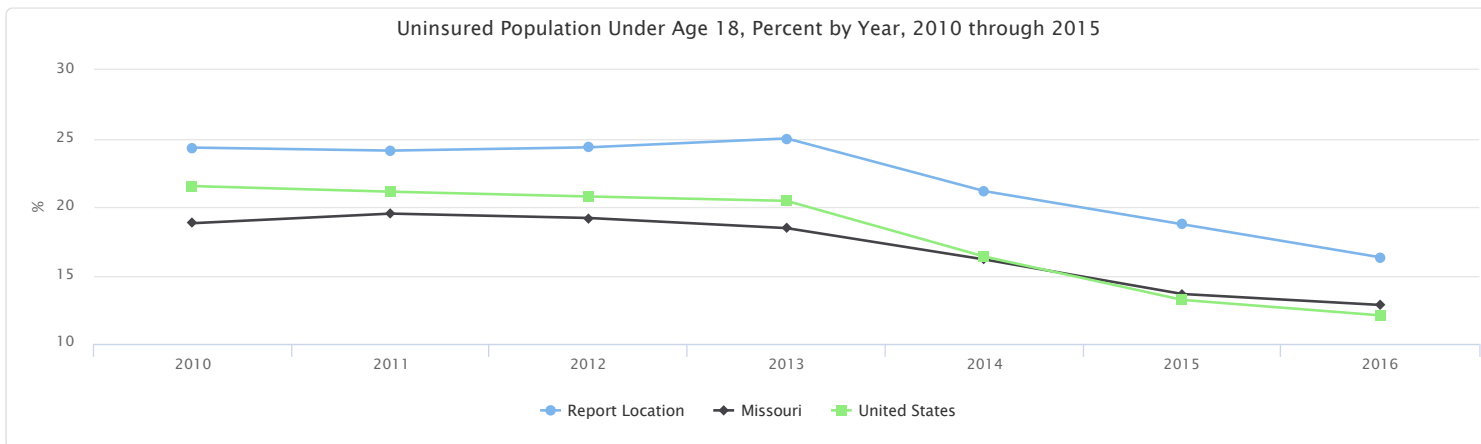


Uninsured Population, Age 0-18, Percent by County, SAHIE 2016

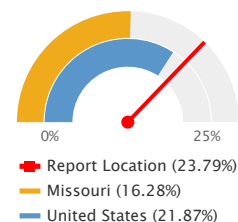

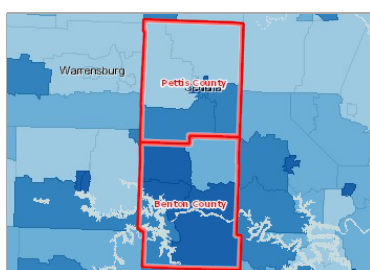

Percent of Insured Population Receiving Medicaid

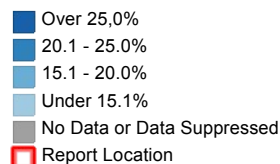

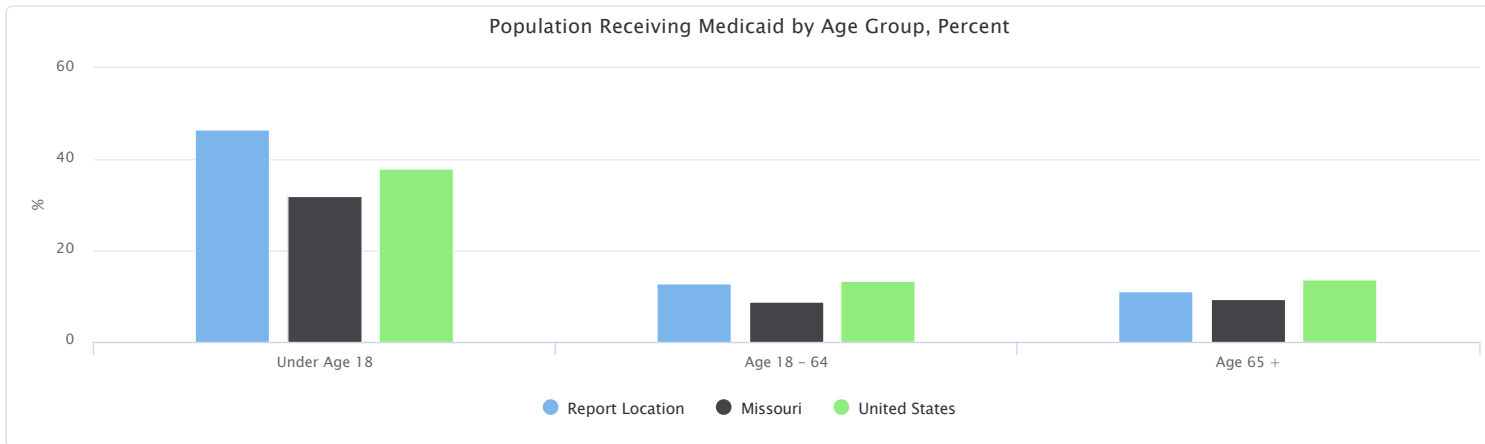
Insured, Medicaid / Means-Tested Coverage, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

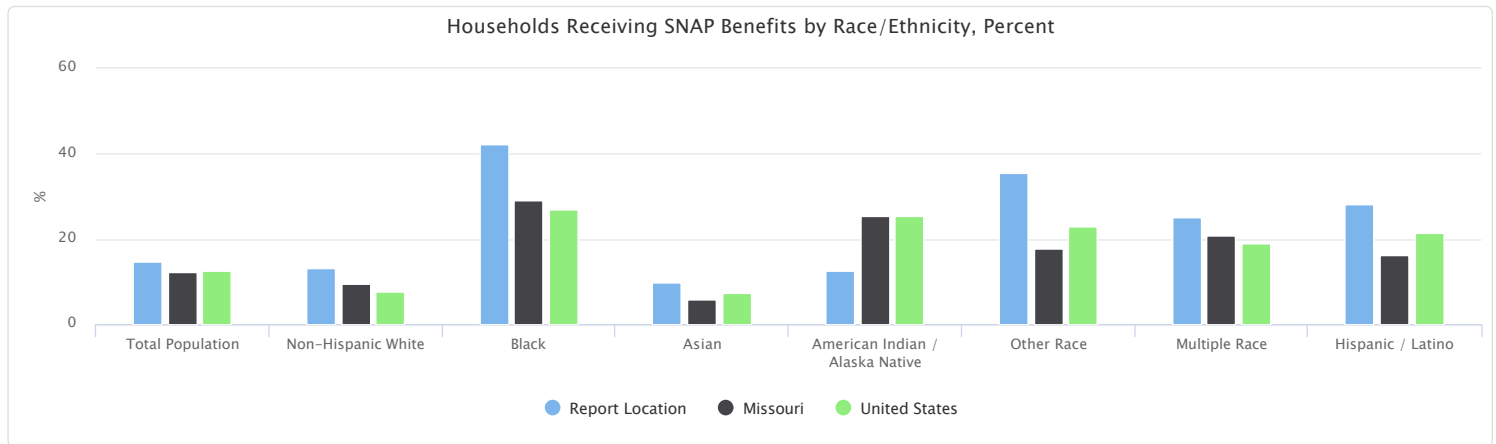


Households Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by Tract, ACS 2013-17

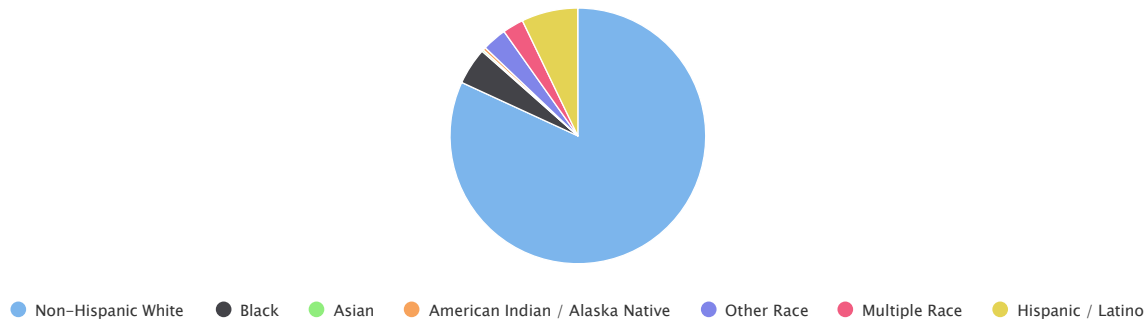

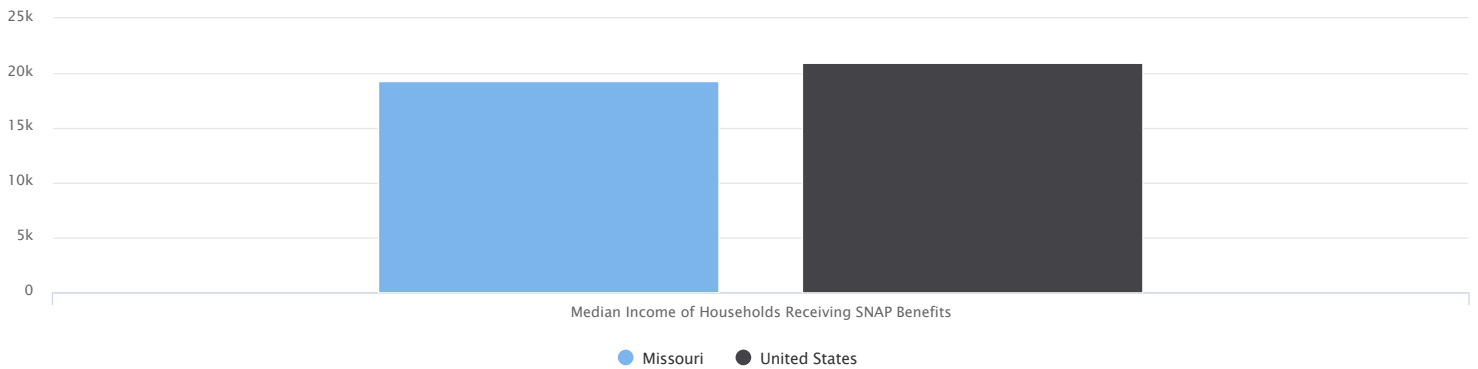

### Median Income of Households Receiving SNAP Benefits



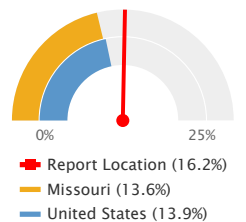

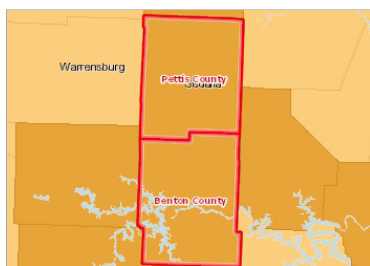

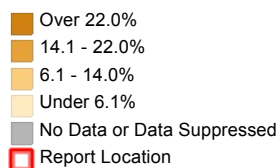

Percent Population Receiving SNAP Benefits



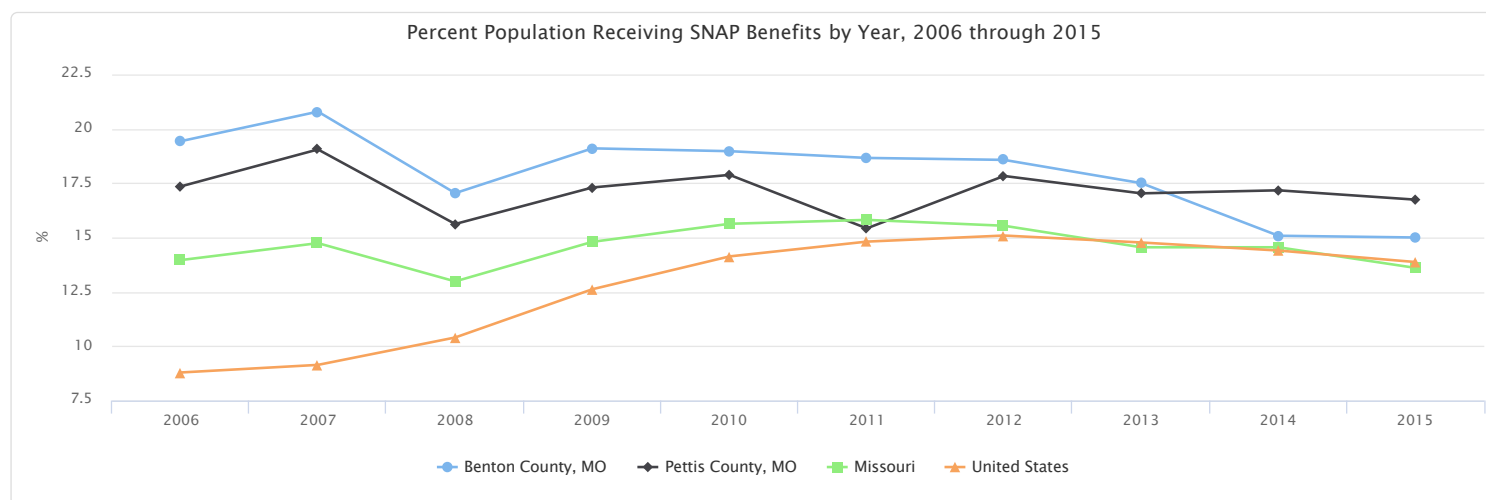


Population Receiving SNAP Benefits, Percent by County, SAIPE 2015

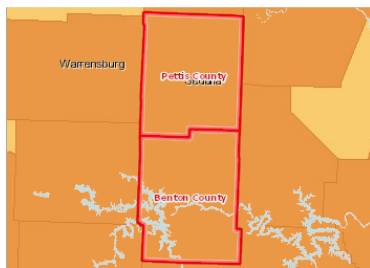

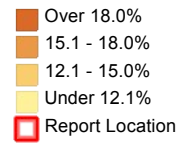

**Racial Segregation (Theil Index) by County, US Census 2010**

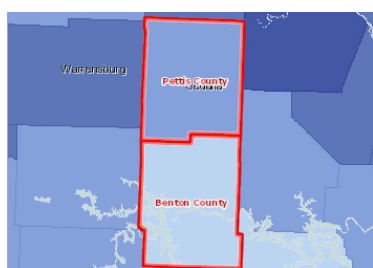

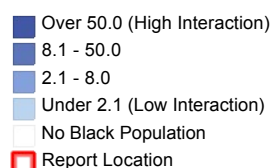

**Racial Segregation (Interaction Index), White - Black by County, US Census 2010**

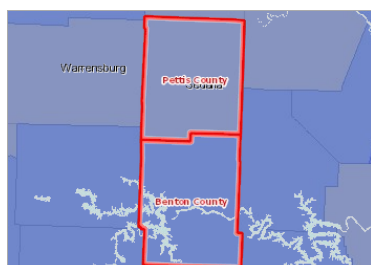

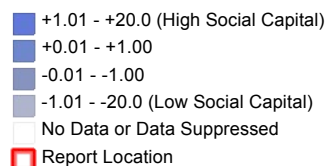

**Social Capital Index by County, NERCRD 2009**



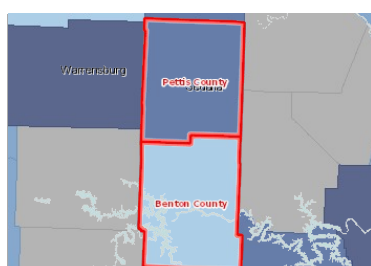
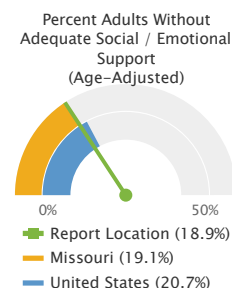

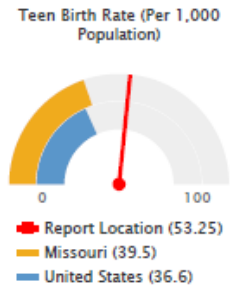
**Inadequate Social/Emotional Support, Percent of Adults Age 18+ by County, BRFSS 2006-12**

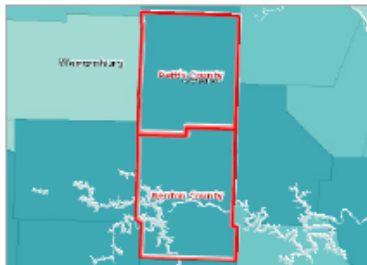

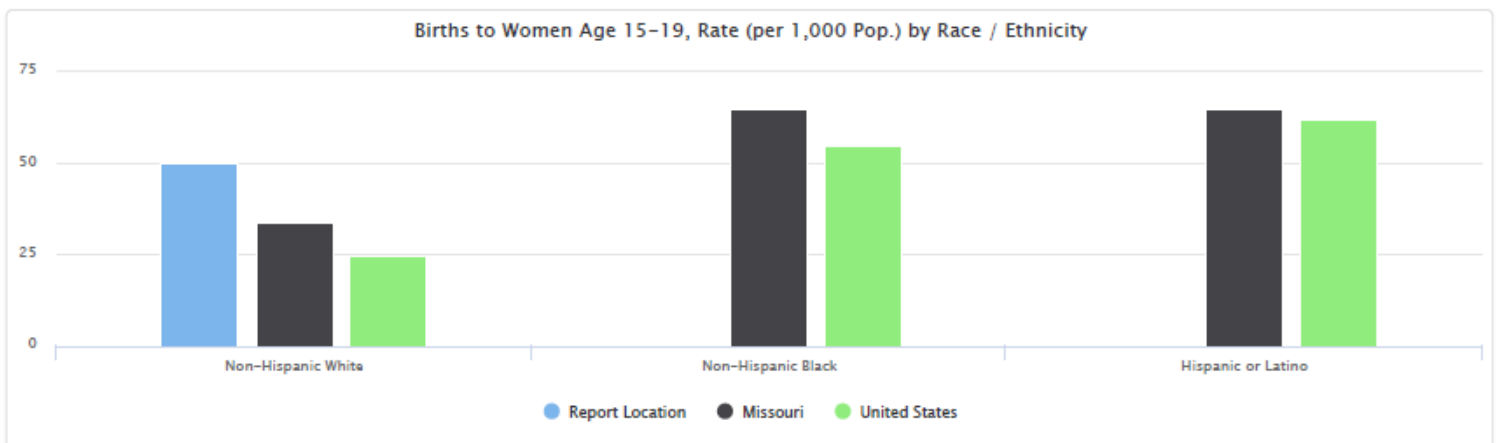


Births to Females Age 15-19, Rate (Per 1,000 Pop.) by County, NVSS 2006-12

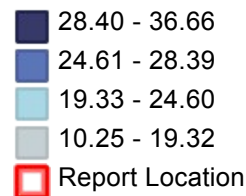

"Fair" or Worse Health, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016

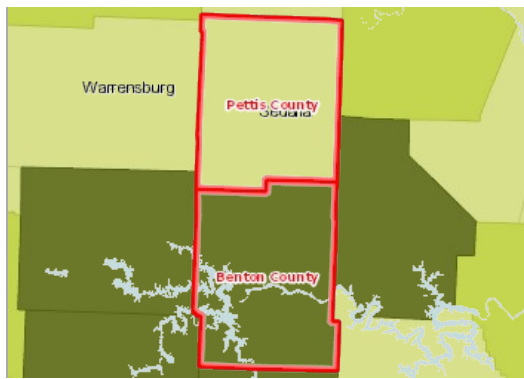

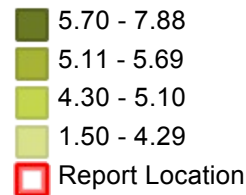

**Average Poor Physical Health Days Per Month by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

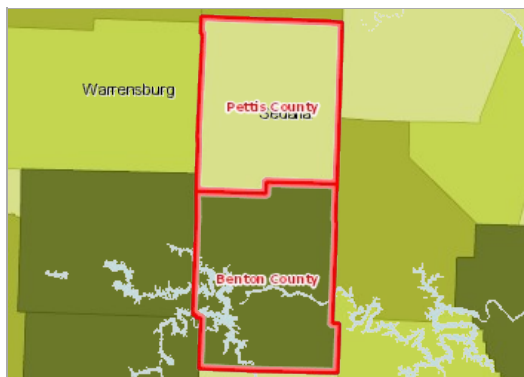

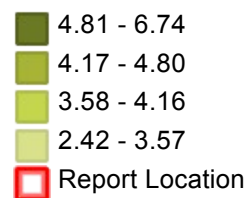

**Average Poor Mental Health Days Per Month by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

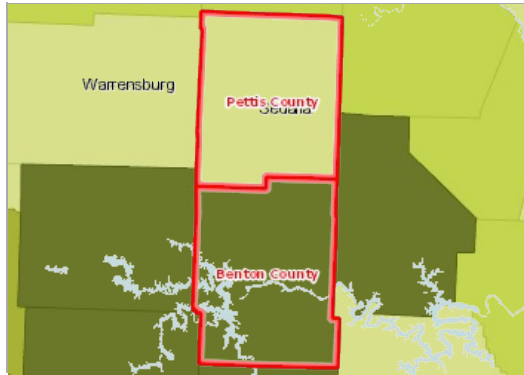

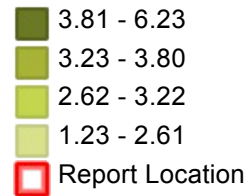

**Average Activity Limitation Days Per Month by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

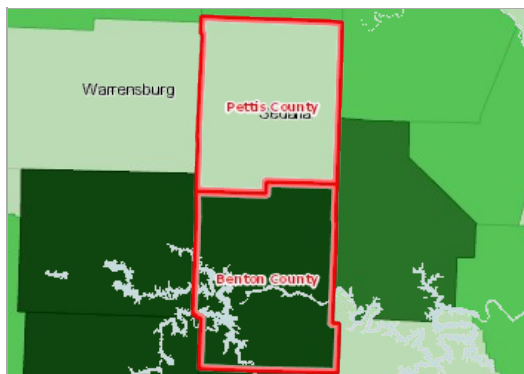

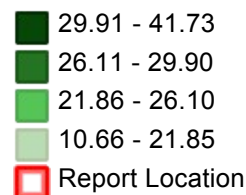

**Activity Limitation, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

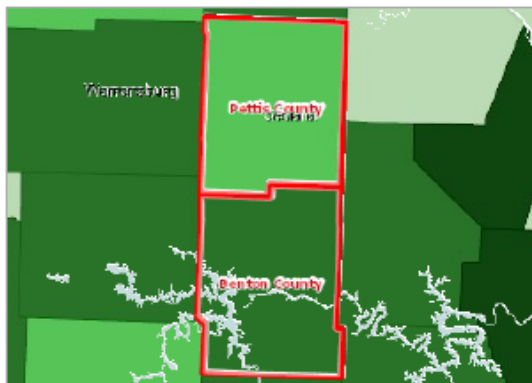

**No Health Care Coverage, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

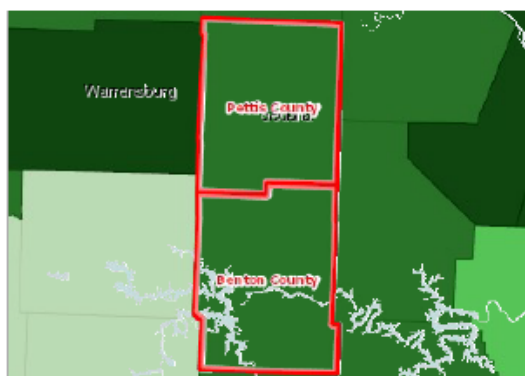

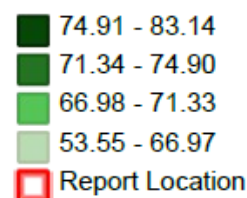

**Did Not Get Needed Dental Care, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

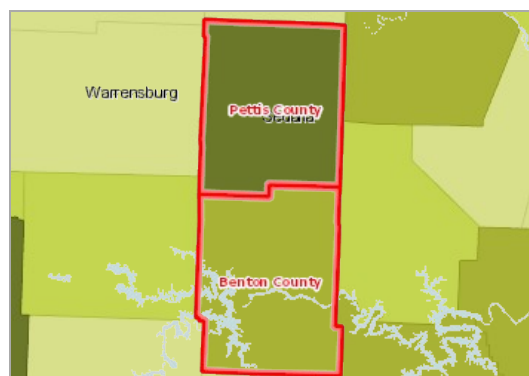

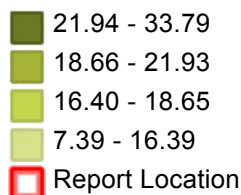

**Did Not Get Needed Medical Care in Last 12 Months, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**



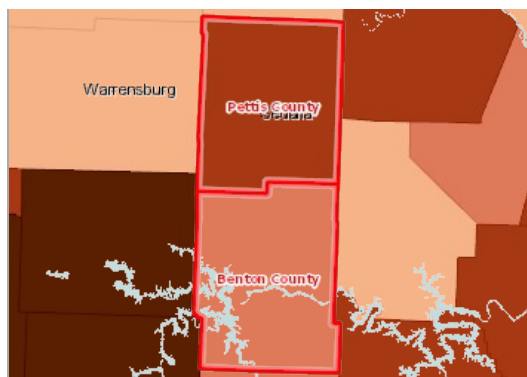

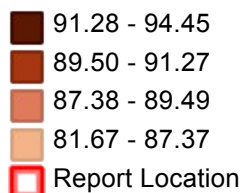

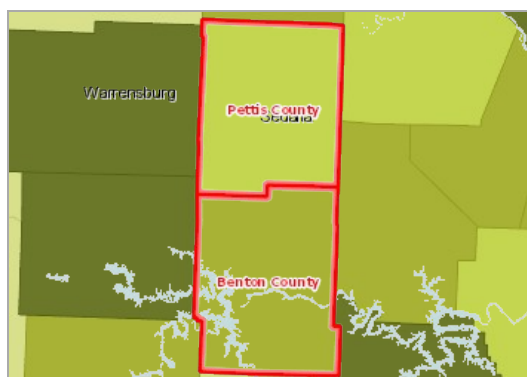

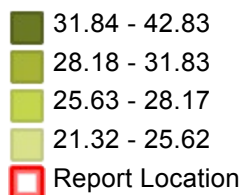

**BMI Normal, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**



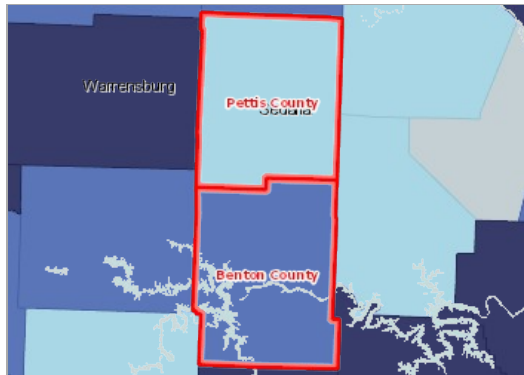

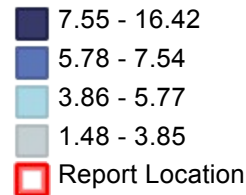

**Heavy Drinkers, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

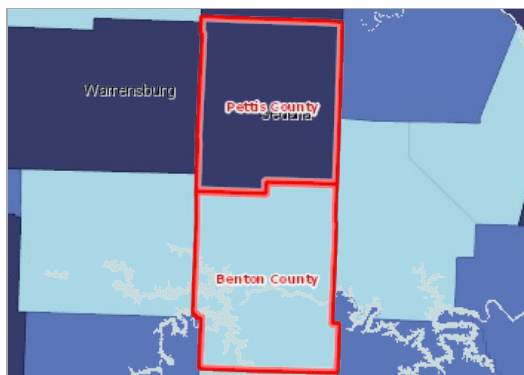

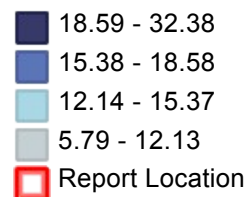

**Binge Drinkers, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**



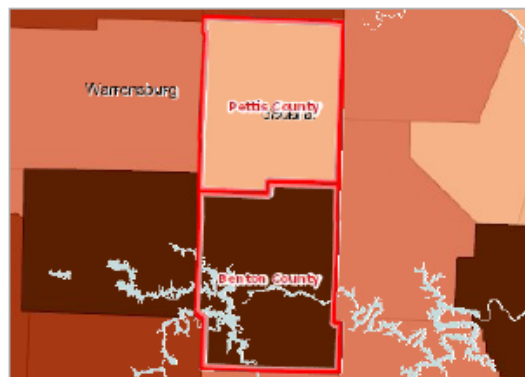

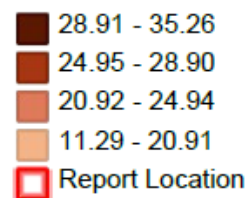

**Current Smoker, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

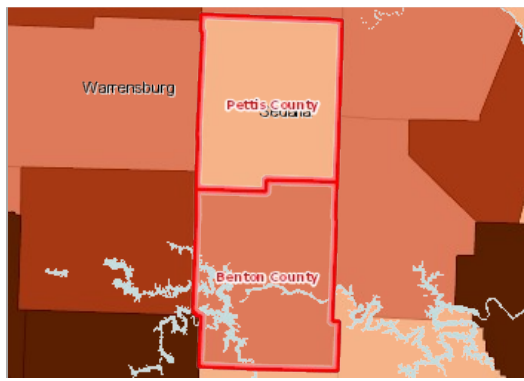

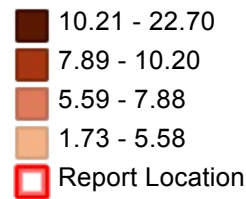

**Using Smokeless Tobacco, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

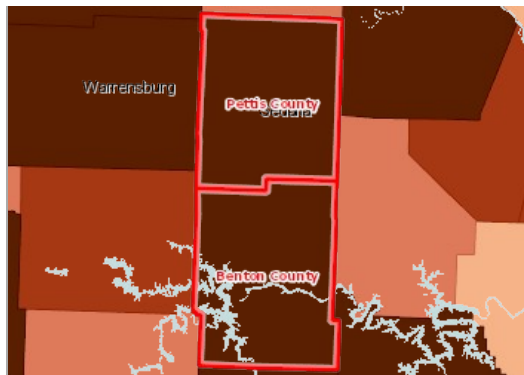

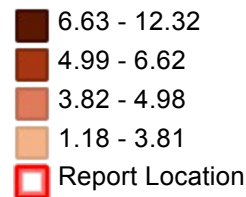

**Using Electronic Cigarettes, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

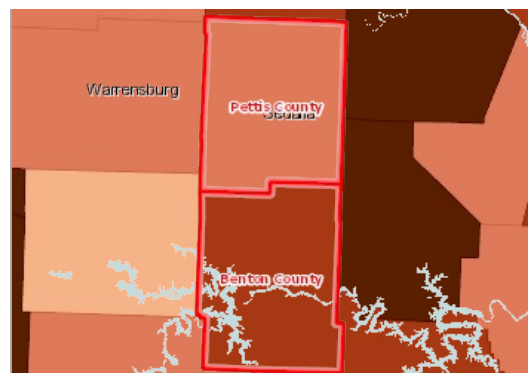

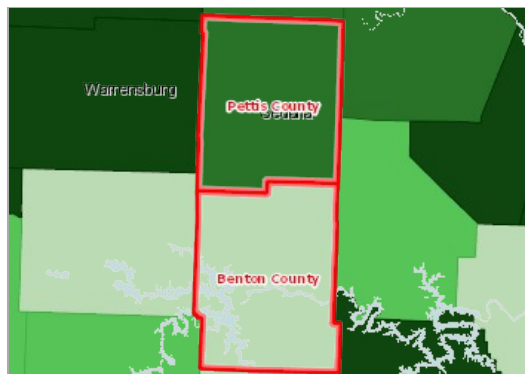

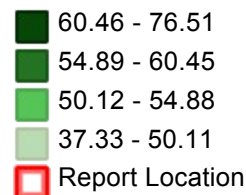

Dental Exam in Past Year, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016

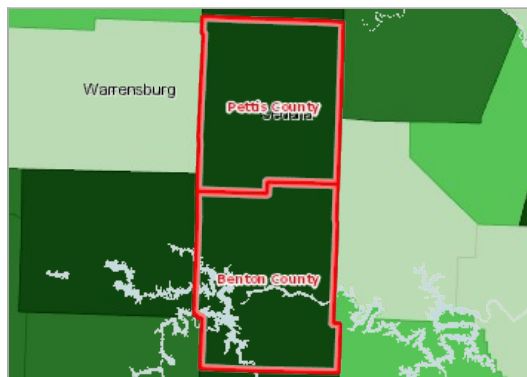

**With a Regular Doctor, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

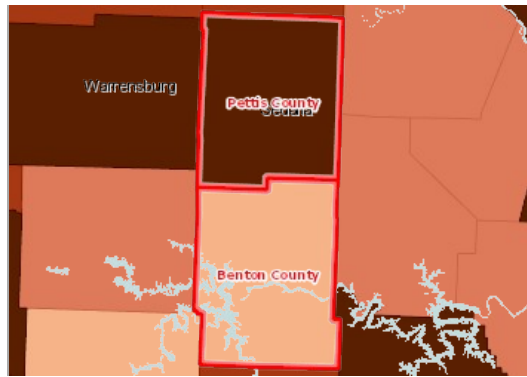

**Physical Activity in Last 30 Days, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

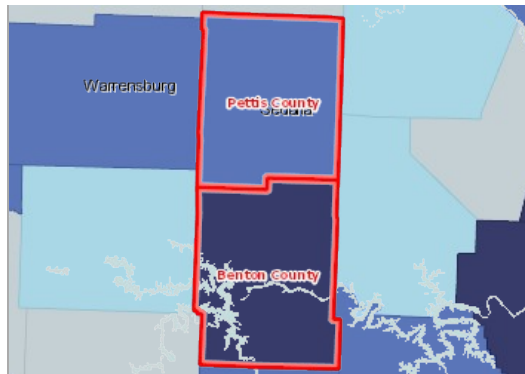

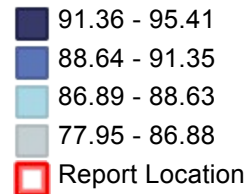

**Checked for Blood Cholesterol, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

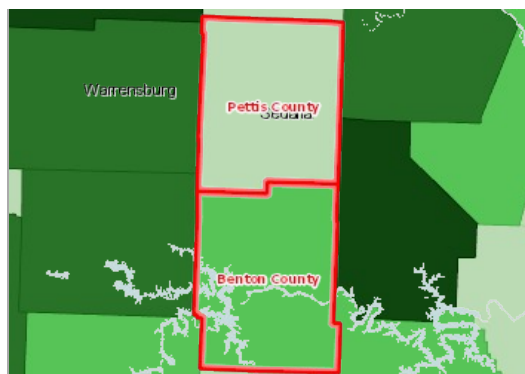

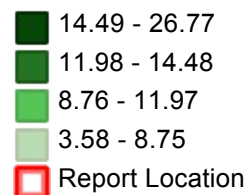

**Women Over 40 Who Have Never Had a Mammogram, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

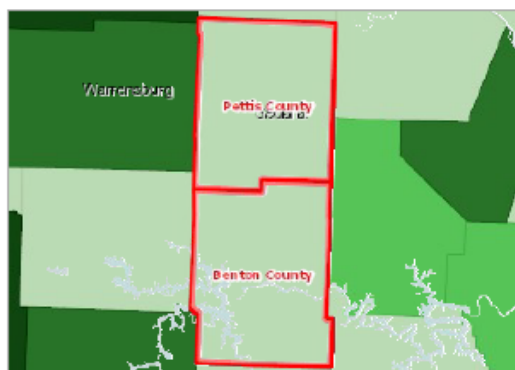

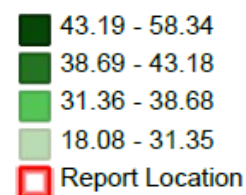

**Women Over 40 Without a Mammogram in Past 2 Years, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

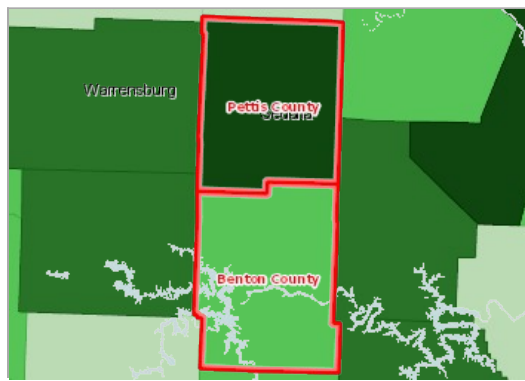

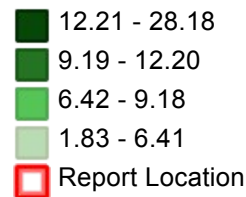

**Women Over 18 Who Have Never Had a Pap Smear, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

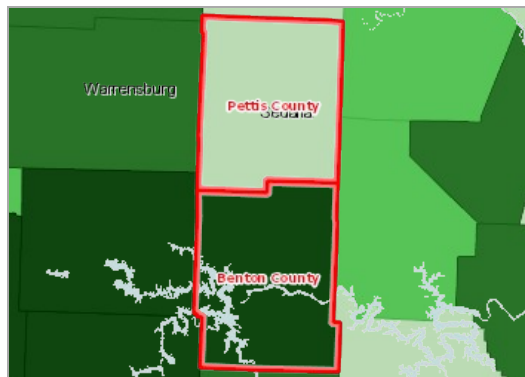

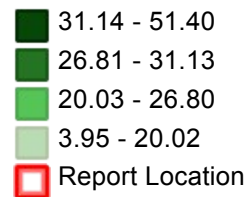

**Women Over 18 Without a Pap Smear in Past 3 Years, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

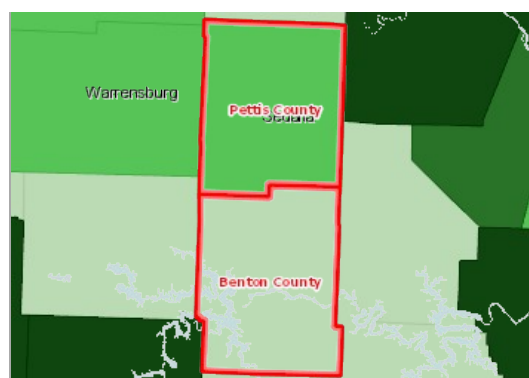

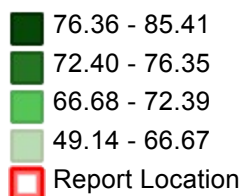

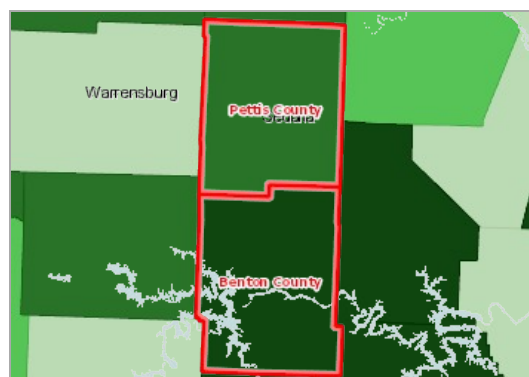

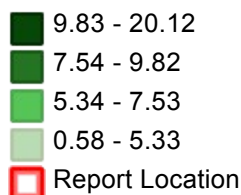

### Blood Stool Test in Past 2 Years, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016



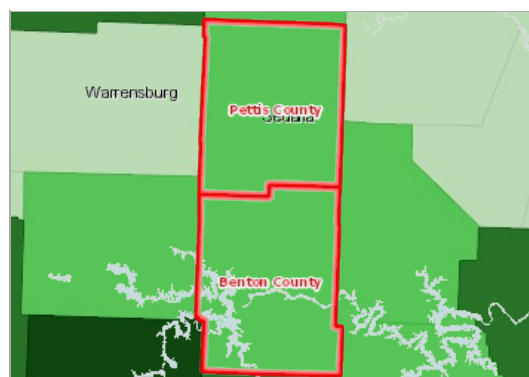

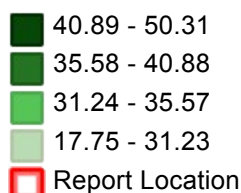

**Never Had a Colonoscopy, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

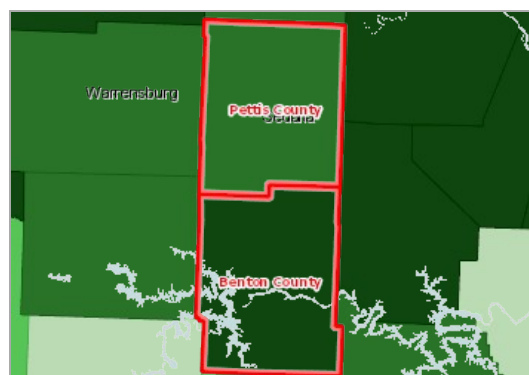

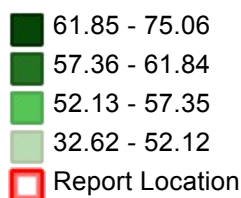

**Colonoscopy in Past 10 Years, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

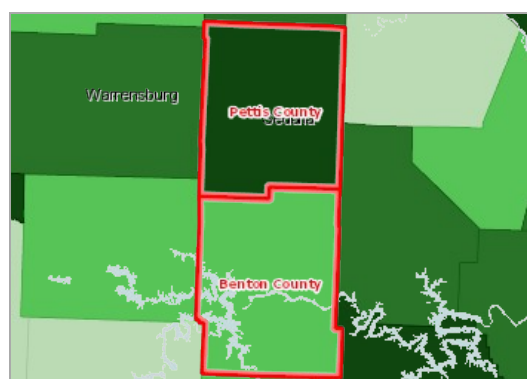

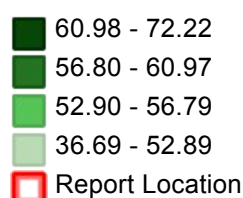

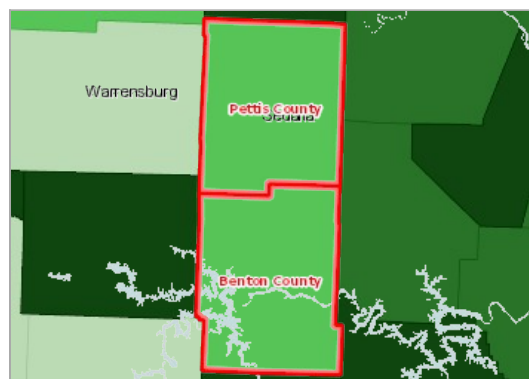

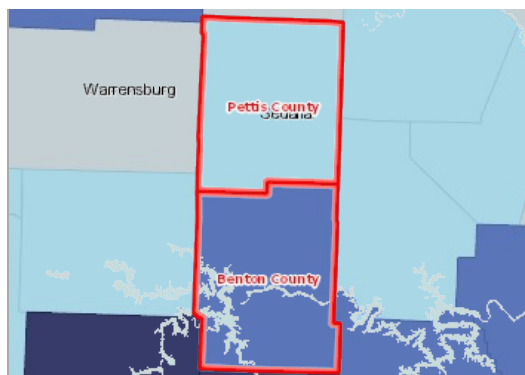

High Blood Pressure, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016

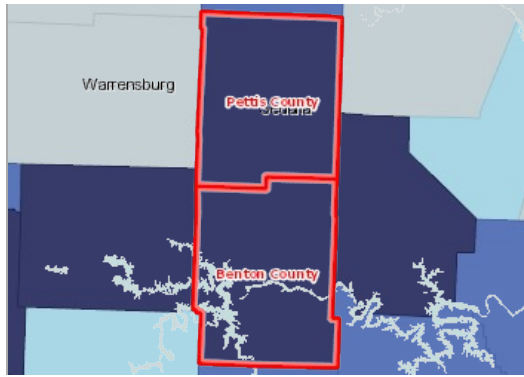

**High Cholesterol When Checked, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

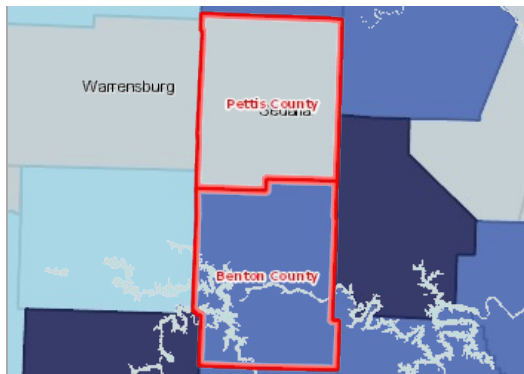

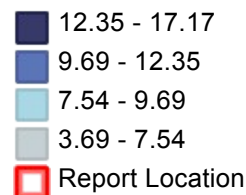

**Had a Heart Attack (Myocardial Infarction), Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

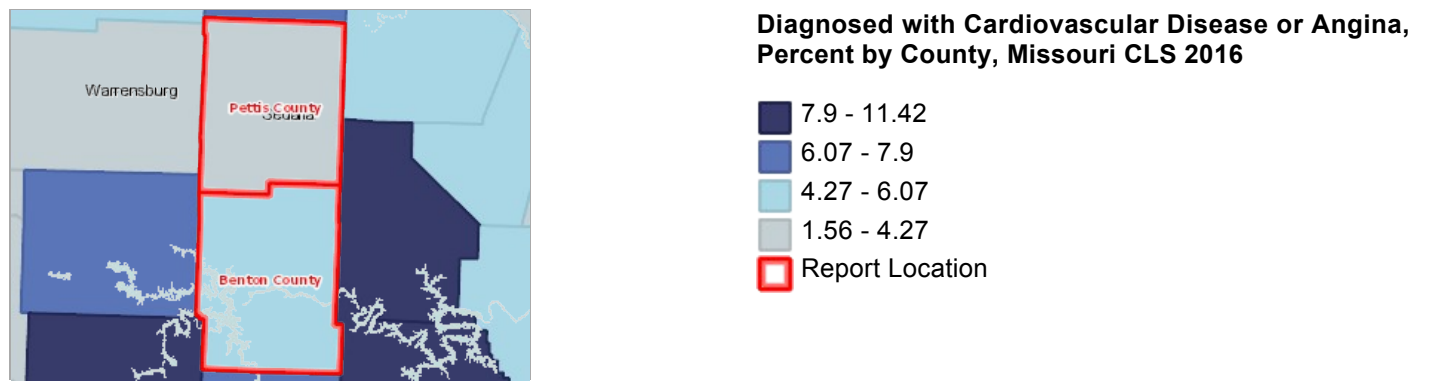

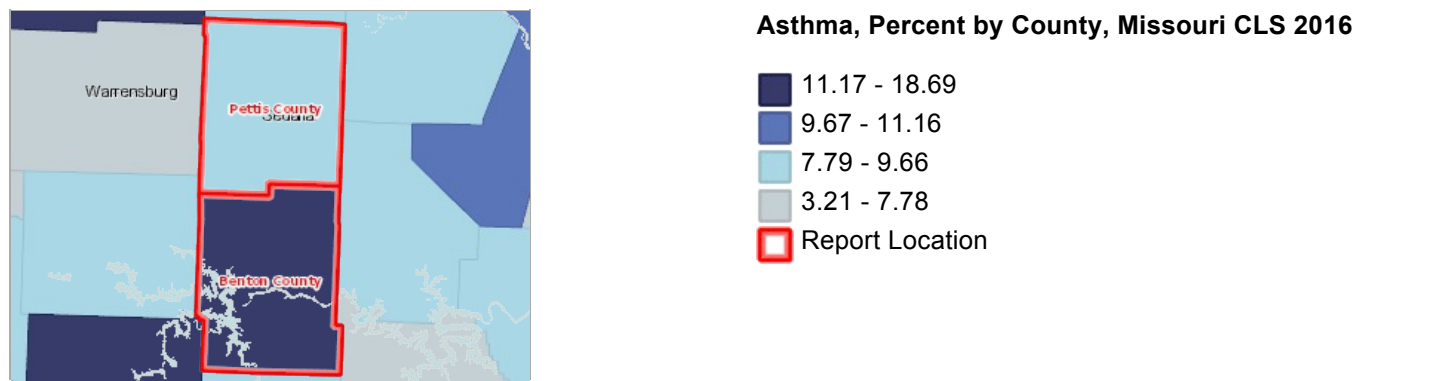

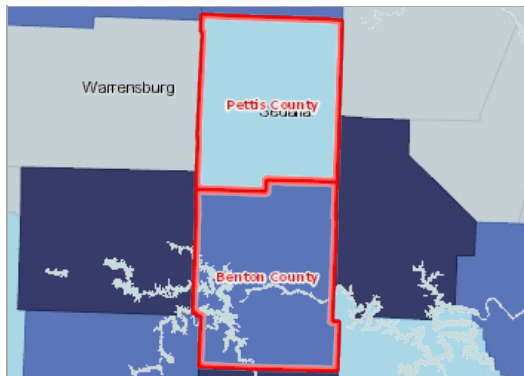

**Diabetes, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

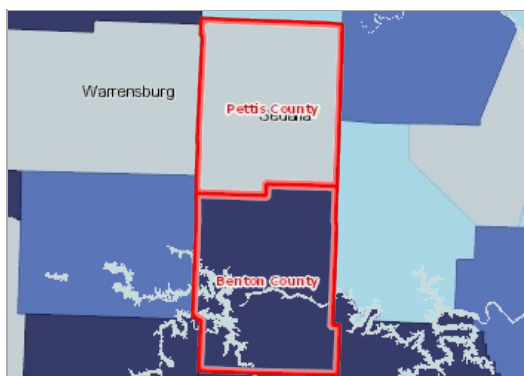

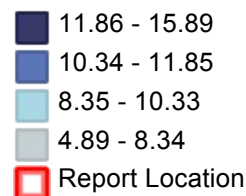

**Cancer, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**



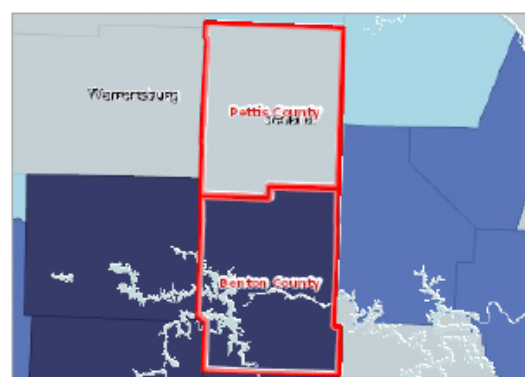

**COPD, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

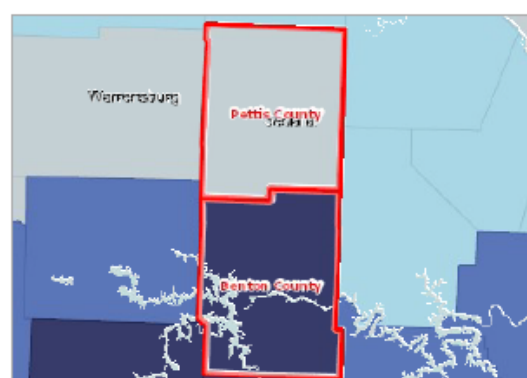

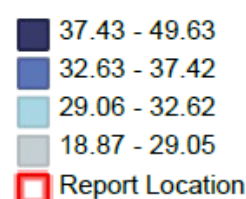

**Arthritis, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

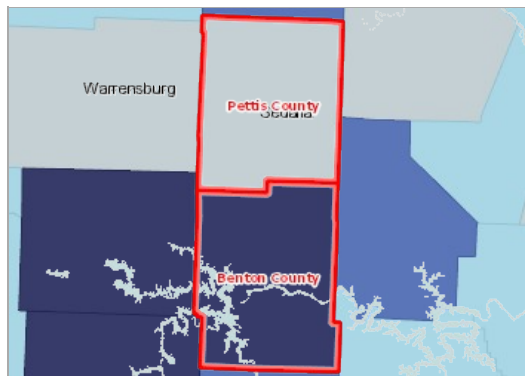

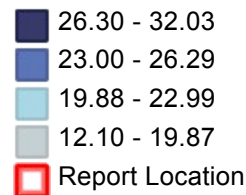

**Depressive Disorder, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

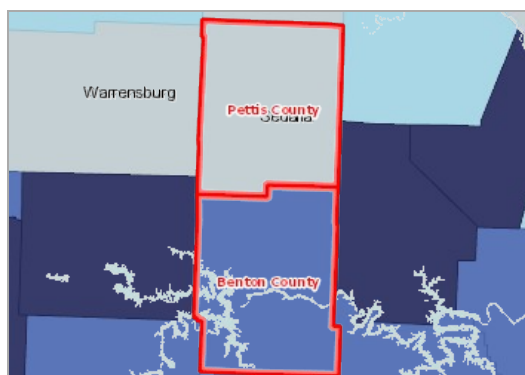

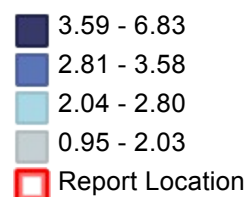

**Kidney Disease, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**



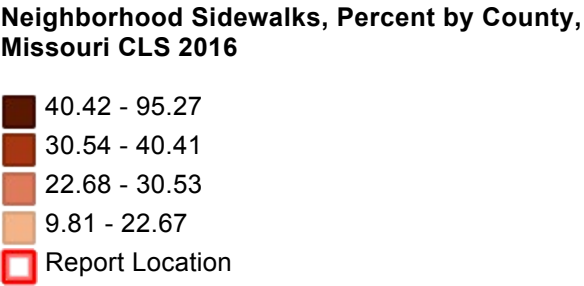
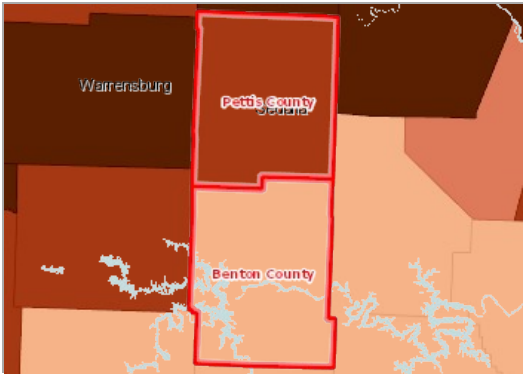

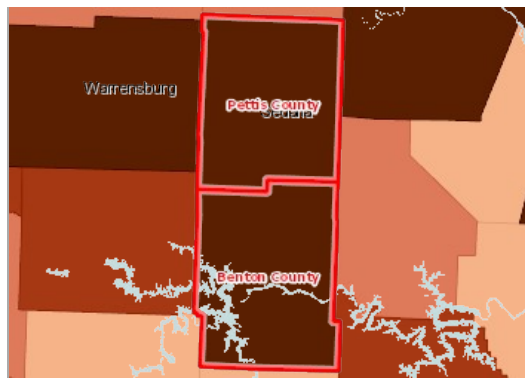


## Have Roads and Streets With shoulders or Marked Lanes For Bicycling in Their Community

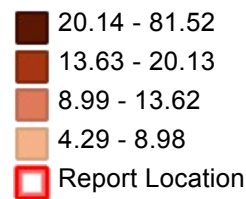

**Bike Lanes, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

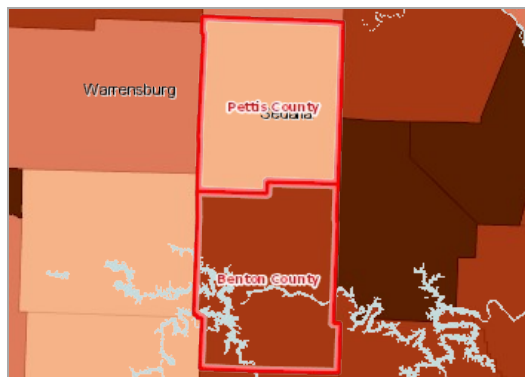

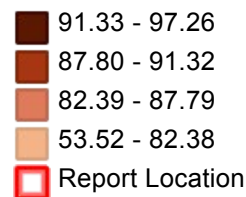

**Feel Their Neighborhood is Safe, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

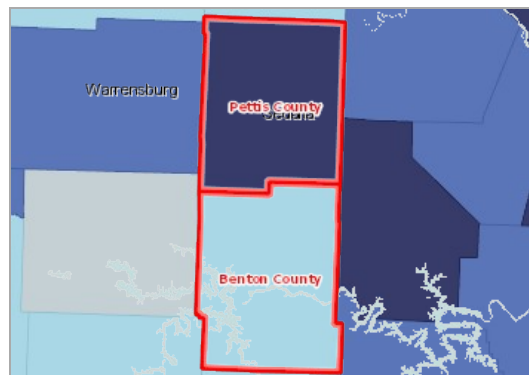

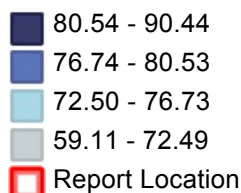

**Easy to Purchase Healthy Food in Neighborhood, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

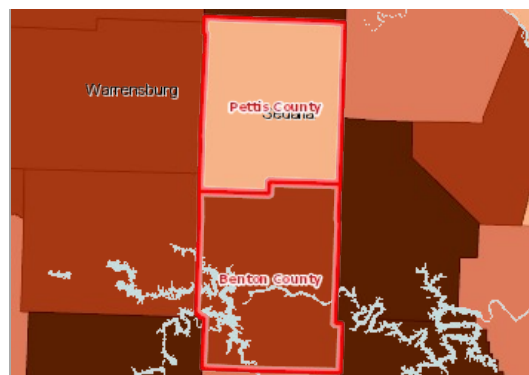

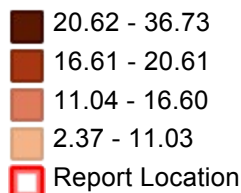

**Exposed to Secondhand Smoke, Percent by County, Missouri CLS 2016**

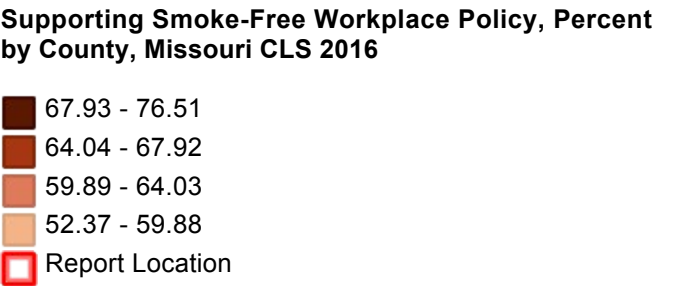
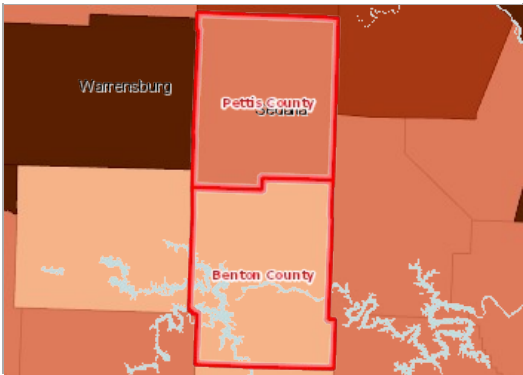

## **Youth and Family Services: Adolescent Coalition partner and the following:**

**Choosing the Best:** We can provide materials for this research-based prevention program wjicj was designed to motivate youth to choose abstinence.

**Baby Think it Over:** To augment teen pregnancy prevention efforts in our area we have computerized babies that simulate what it is like to care for an infant. Additional materials include abstinence and infant safety. We have twenty diverse simulators of both genders, as well as infant carriers, fully-equipped diaper bags (diapers, bottles, formula, blankets, clothing, etc.) available to loan to schools, youth groups, scouts, and teen-serving organizations in our service area. (Free of charge as long as returned in same good condition.)

**Fatherhood Initiative:** We are partnering with Powerhouse Ministries in Marshall to bring "Fathers Committed to Families" to Pettis and Morgan counties. A substantial body of research documents that fathers bring many benefits to the lives of their children. This research highlights the importance of resident and non-resident fathers to their children's well-being. Many scientific studies link positive fatherhood involvement with: lower levels of lying, disruptive behavior, and depression; fewer externalizing and internalizing behaviors and less delinquency; higher self-esteem; and less sexual risk (later sexual debut, fewer partners, less likely to be diagnosed with a sexually transmitted disease).

The program initially targeted high risk fathers, young fathers, fathers facing poverty, fathers who have recent or long term lack of employment, fathers with a family history of legal issues or substance abuse, or fathers who have limited experience in interacting with their children. Through teaching the curriculum we have learned that fathers of all ages and stages can benefit from completing the Fatherhood course. And, men thinking about becoming fathers will greatly benefit from the curriculum and learning from existing fathers.

## **Food and Shelter:**

**MRCC Food Co-op:** Partnering with the Missouri Rural Crisis Center, once each month we are able to offer people approximately \$40 worth of groceries for \$22. Co-op members pay an annual membership fee of \$10 and the \$22 monthly co-op fee each month they receive an order of food which includes bread, produce, paper products, and canned goods, as well as MRCC's own Patchwork Farms meat products. Members may request multiple orders at the same price per order. Additional meat may be ordered at reasonable rates. All participants of the food cooperative must be current MRCC members. Anyone may participate, regardless of income.

**PCCP Housing Services:** PCCP receives grants from various sources in order to assist people who are literally homeless, or imminently homeless, in securing stable housing. Skilled case managers interview potential clients to determine whether or not the client meets the funder's requirements for assistance. Assistance may be provided, as funds are available, to people who qualify. Determination is made on a case-by-case basis. Applications must be made in person. The list of items required for making an application is at the end of this section (see page 5).

**P.R.O.P. – Putting Roofs Over People:** PCCP facilitates this group of community partners to look at needs and coordinate resources to assist people who are homeless or imminently homeless. PCCP, Sedalia Housing Authority, MO Valley CAA, Open Door, Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity, DFS, Sedalia Schools, CASA, The Embassy, churches, businesses, and individuals work together to combat homelessness and provide transitional housing assistance. The P.R.O.P. coalition is a mix of over 50 service-providers and caring people working to help the homeless and hurting. It meets at PCCP on the 4th Monday of each month.

#### **Offender Reentry:**

**MO Reentry Process Steering Group:** Community partners share and coordinate resources around housing, education, family support, employment, mental health and other issues. All with an interest in reentry are welcome to attend. Meetings are held on the first Monday of each month at noon in the PCCP conference room.

**Reentry Resources:** Ex-offenders get a free Resource Guide and visit with our staff to find out where to access what they need to have a smoother transition back to the community.

**Multicultural Services:** Cherishing diversity of our residents, PCCP strives to heighten cultural awareness and appreciation.

**West Central Missouri Multicultural Forum:** This group brings people and regional resources together to proactively (and reactively if necessary) address issues relating to education, health and welfare, business and industry, law enforcement, government, transportation, and community service learning. The Forum currently meets on an “as needed” basis. All are welcome.

**Family Nutrition Education (Spanish):** Our educators help families learn how a well-balanced meal promotes child development and adult health. University of MO Extension is our partner.

**Cultural Awareness Activities:** Periodic events such as Martin Luther King Day, Make A Difference Day and Global Village are the types of activities we have sponsored.

  - l. All Other Income or Cash
  - m. Rental property value
  - n. Real estate property value
  - o. Social Security Award Letter – Current
4. Eviction Notice/Foreclosure/Utility Shut-Off Notice
5. Existing/current lease or mortgage statement (signed & dated)
6. Intent to Rent (we provide as necessary)

**In order to provide housing or utility assistance, all housing units MUST pass a housing inspection—the unit must be SAFE, DECENT and SANITARY**

- All utilities MUST be on & working**
- All windows, doors, lights and plumbing must work!!!**
- It must have working smoke detectors.**
- There can be NO broken or boarded up windows or doors.**
- If there are more than two steps, there must be a sturdy handrail.**

**PLEASE NOTE: No guarantees for assistance will be made until all documents are provided and approved, and the unit passes our inspection!!!!**

**Tips to seeking and receiving services as you utilize this guide:**

Don't call an agency and expect services: most cannot provide help over the phone. If you have a question that you want answered, feel free to call and ask. However, if you are seeking services, service-providers require you to be in their office, in-person, with documentation of need.

You are more likely to receive nice, kind and helpful service if you are nice, kind and honest about your situation.

Pettis County Health Center is a local public health agency that is supported by local taxes, by reimbursement from federal and state programs and by a sliding fee-for-service scale based on household income. Available services include general health and wellness screens, communicable disease control activities including immunizations and STD's, numerous child and adolescent health/safety programs including car seats and bike helmets, women's health services including family planning and Show Me Healthy Women for older women, health education activities. WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) Food Supplement Program, and environmental public health services. Certified Copies of Birth and Death certificates are available in the office for a fee, but only if the birth or death occurred in Missouri.

It is the policy of the Pettis County Health Center to provide equal services to all applicants without regard to race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, political belief, veteran status, and physical or mental disability.

At Pettis County Health Center we also now offer a Breastfeeding Drop Center for moms who have concerns or worries about breastfeeding can drop in during office hours to have their babies weighed and speak with a lactation consultant or other trained breastfeeding staff. Breastfeeding classes are available monthly. We also have a breastfeeding helpline that is answered after hours.

Pettis County Health Center is a local public health agency that is supported by local taxes, by reimbursement from federal and state programs and by a sliding fee-for-service scale based on household income. Available services include general health and wellness screens, communicable disease control activities including immunizations, and STDs, numerous child and adolescent health/safety programs, including car seats and bike helmets, women's health services, including family planning and Show Me Healthy Women for older women, health education activities. WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) Food Supplement Program, and environmental public health services. Certified Copies of Birth and Death certificates are available in the office for a fee, but only if the birth or death occurred in Missouri. It is the policy of Pettis County Health Center to provide equal services to all applicants without regard to race, color, religion, gender, age, national origin, political belief, veteran status, and physical or mental disability.

At Pettis County Health Center we also now offer a Breastfeeding Drop Center for moms who have concerns or worries about breastfeeding can drop in during office hours to have their babies weighed and speak with a lactation consultant or other trained breastfeeding staff. Breastfeeding classes are available monthly. We also have a breastfeeding helpline that is answered after hours.
